

## New Casino Raises Questions Concerning Student Gambling

As the possibility of building a new casino in Narragansett is debated throughout the area, the widespread problem of gambling again comes into question. According to Bill Phillips, of Bryant Counseling Services, "Gambling is the addiction of the 90s."

The Wampanoche Indian tribe is currently working on plans to build the casino in Narragansett. Despite the state's objections to the casino, the tribe is driven by the notion that it is their land and their decision. Will Bryant be affected by this decision?

Phillips doesn't seem to think so. "If you want to go, you can. Many students already travel to Ledyard, so a casino ten or fifteen minutes closer won't make much of a differ-

ence," says Phillips.

Phillips began his gambling research eight years ago when a group of students went to him for help with gambling addictions. He developed a support group for them in addition to conducting a survey about the prevalence of gambling among students. The survey of 2000 students from nine colleges and universities in six different states revealed that "gambling is out of control."

According to Phillips, students who became involved in gambling do so for the thrill of competition, not necessarily for the money.

Those who become addicted eventually find themselves with high phone bills from calls to bookies, bad grades from staying up late for game scores, and loss of friends. By the time they realize this says Phillips, "They are in way over their

heads."

Another issue concerns the legality of gambling. Sports betting and the use of false identification to get into casinos are illegal. "These illegal acts can come back to haunt (students) in the long run," says Phillips.

Last week, Phillips appeared on television as part of a three-part series about teenage gambling. Topics included how and why many students gamble and whether the state promotes or prevents the problem.

"The community is not respectful of gambling addiction as a legitimate problem because it is a clean addiction characterized by secret behavior. Unless it starts to get the recognition it deserves, it is a problem that will never go away."

## WJMF Off the Air for the Weekend

Two transistor malfunctions caused the main transmitter to fail at 88.7 WJMF on Thursday. This kept the station off the air until Tuesday at 7:00 a.m.

According to WJMF's Chief Engineer Bryan Palmieri, the preliminary examination of the engineering office revealed extreme heat and poor ventilation as the cause of the blown transmitter.

WJMF hoped to be back on the air on Saturday, but couldn't resume until Monday morning because parts to fix the transmitter were flown in from Illinois.

"Being off the air was not just an inconvenience," says General Man-

ager Scott Terrien. "It stopped us from advertising and co-sponsoring an event at The Strand and our weekly spotlight shows had to be canceled," Terrien added.

The repaired transmitter is only temporary and this worries Palmieri. "We hope to finish the repairs over spring break, so a breakdown will not happen again," he added.

According to Palmieri, the transmitter has since been fixed, but will probably need to be replaced soon because it is estimated to be 20 years old. One transistor has been fixed, but the other one needs to be replaced.

The spotlight shows will be rescheduled and WJMF hopes to get a new co-sponsoring night at The Strand.

## PUBLIC SAFETY BEAT

**Larceny**  
February 21, 1994 - On February 20, 1994, Department of Public Safety Officers booted a vehicle due to unpaid fines. On February 21, 1994 the subject came to the DPS office to inquire about the unpaid fines and to inquire about the possibility of the release of the vehicle. The subject was informed of the DPS policy, which requires all fines to be paid before release of the vehicle.

Later that day while on patrol an officer observed the loading or unloading of the vehicle. A short while later while passing the same spot the officer reported that the booted vehicle had been moved. A quick check of the area was made for the boot and for the vehicle, neither could be located.

Smithfield Police were notified of the situation and the DPS officer left campus to check at Parentes and the Sunoco on Rt. 7. After leaving campus the officer noticed the vehicle in question at Parentes. SPD were notified and asked to respond. The operator of the vehicle was taken into custody by SPD for Larceny. When asked by the DPS officer as to the whereabouts of the boot, the subject claimed it was not in the trunk. After being read his rights, SPD inquired as to the location of the boot and the subject refused to reply until he spoke with legal counsel.

The subject and the vehicle were transported to the Smithfield Police Station. Upon arrival and while waiting for the warrant the subject consented to a search and the boot was located. The subject was charged with Larceny and operat-

ing a motor vehicle with a suspended license by the SPD.

**Larceny**  
Between the dates of February 21, 1994 and February 22, 1994 subject(s) broke into a Jeep parked in the C-3 parking lot. Upon gaining entry to the vehicle the subject(s) removed a Magnavox CD Player and Adapters. Anyone with any information as to the location of the stolen equipment is asked to call DPS.

**Keg Confiscation**  
On February 24, 1994 a vehicle passed the ECS a DPS officer noticed the trunk of the vehicle riding extremely low. In addition to this several cases of Natural Light beer were in plain view in the backseat. The vehicle was located behind the Bryant Center. The subject was asked to open the trunk and at first refused. One case was confiscated from the backseat. Upon being advised of the possibility of the vehicle being towed off campus, the subject opened the trunk and two kegs were found. The kegs were confiscated and destroyed in the Unistructure compactor.

**Defacing Government Property**  
On February 25, 1994 it was noticed the money that had been used to pay a subject's \$150 parking fine had been defaced. The money which was used to pay a ticket was defaced with fowl obscenity's toward the DPS. Charges were filed against the individual.

**Vandalism**  
On February 27, 1994 DPS officers were dispatched to investigate vandalism that occurred in Dorm 16. After being awoken by a loud crashing sound the Resident Direc-

tor investigated to find the lockset and door damaged beyond repair. The Resident Director questioned a few students and was unable to determine anything. Anyone with any information on this vandalism is asked to call DPS.

**Streakers at Bryant**—Bryant students who have gone natural were sighted early Tuesday morning about 12:45 a.m. and reportedly were seen until "the wee hours of the morning." Apparently, the streak freaks were often seen in the area of dorm 10 where they later entertained an audience of about 300 to 400...Streaking is not just a spectator sport, but one in which all can participate. The occurrence of streaking at Bryant has not been unique; colleges and universities across the nation have had similar incidents in the past few weeks.

The Archway dedicated the two center pages of this week's issue to revealing photos of streakers. In addition, The Archway's editorial for the week states that the staff does not condone streaking calling this latest fad "a pisser."

**Senate Referendum**—Last week's Senate election ballots included a referendum asking for an increase of the present Senate budget allocation of \$5.15 per student, per semester, to \$12.50. 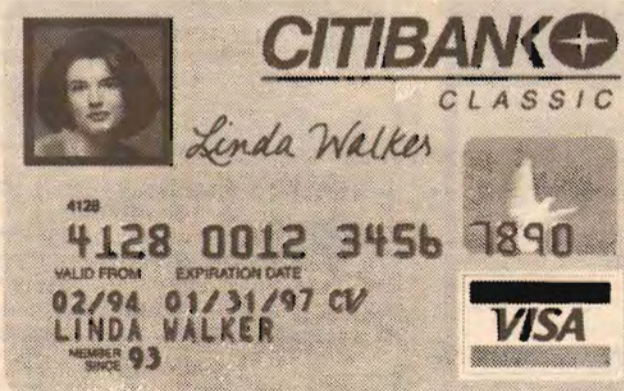

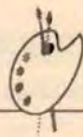


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## Providence Poets

Poets were both young and old, novice and experienced. With a time limit of three minutes per poem, the poets covered such topics as: relationships, religion, sex, drugs, individuality, birth, racism, and family values.

### One Bug You Definitely Don't Want To Squash

"Imagine if you will (and you will), a train collision. Two mighty trains, one skinny rail, frightening velocities and then... a thunderous BOOM!!!" This is how Rhode Island's Superbug is explained in their press release for their second cassette *The Dog and The Salmon*.

Last Friday night at Lupo's Heartbreak Hotel in Providence, Superbug played with that thunderous boom as they rocked through their live set on the way to \$3,000 and 48 hours of studio time as the winners of the 1994 Rock Hunt. Superbug, which consists of Buell Thomas on vocals and trumpet, Marc Archambault and Chris Manchester on guitars and vocals, Rob Verdi on bass, and Bill Lawing on drums beat out local favorites The Neo 90's Dance Band, as well as Blueshift Signal, and the Velvet

Babies to take home first place.

Winning the Rock Hunt is just the beginning for what many on the local scene are calling "the next big thing out of Rhode Island," following in the footsteps of such local greats as the Throwing Muses and Belly. After what has turned out to be an incredible month of February, they opened up for the Gin Blossoms to a sold out crowd of 1,300 at Lupo's on the 16th, Superbug is looking to the future and the possibility of putting out a CD.

Unlike other scenes from around the country, the music scene in Rhode Island does not have one distinct sound that defines the entire scene. There is a complete melding of styles and musical genres in the music currently coming out of the Ocean State. The combination of Archambault and Manchester on guitar on tracks such as "Big Indian," "Latitude," and "Twine &

Cord" gives Superbug a distinctive rock-funk sound. Thomas's soaring vocals on "Send A Letter" makes it easily one of the two best songs on the tape, along with "Big Indian."

The addition of Thomas's trumpet on "Latitude," "True to the Day," and "Indignant" gives the band a jazz-latin sound that mixes perfectly with the duel funk-rock guitars, Verdi's bass, and Lawing's drumming. If one had to attach a tag to Superbug's style, it would have to be funk-rock with a jazz edge on the alternative tip. Know what I mean?

One really cannot categorize Superbug as anything but a great new band. The combination of the different musical styles gives Superbug a unique sound and have them poised to keep growing. In the second half, Bryant regrouped and was able to score the first six points of the second half. They were then able to cut the lead down to three points and keep AIC on their toes.

Finally with :58 seconds left in the game, Dave Burrows hit a free throw to tie the score at 87 and looked to pull off the upset once again.

However, AIC was able to regain the lead with a free throw by James Hector. Herman Thomas then hit two clutch free throws to give Bryant a 89-88 lead with :11 left to play.

However, Chad Haywood then hit a baseline jumper to win the game. Bryant's final shot attempt went off the rim as the buzzer sounded.

High scorers in the game was Burrows with 21, Jerome Grier with 17, Thomas with 14, Chris Berntsen with 13, and Noel Watson with 12. Berntsen also grabbed nine re-

bounds and had two steals despite fouling out with 1:47 left in the game.

Prior to the AIC game, Bryant defeated Stonehill 89-68, in the semi-finals, and Springfield 86-78 in the quarter finals. The Stonehill game was much of a match for the team as they lead the game for most of the way.

However, the Springfield game

was a lot closer then the score revealed. Bryant was able to jump out to an early first half lead and Springfield was able to get back into the game. At the half, Bryant had a narrow seven point lead, and it looked like the momentum was shifting.

When the teams returned to the courts, Springfield was able to chip away at the lead and tie the game. Coach Ed Reilly then called a timeout to settle the team down.

## Sportsmanship and Ethics Discussed

On Monday night, Bryant was host to a town meeting on Ethics and Sportsmanship in Sports. This event was a kick off for National Sportsmanship Day which was Tuesday, March 1.

The night started with a welcoming address from Patrice Jones, executive director of the Rhode Island Scholar-Athlete Games. The main speaker of the night was Brian Holloway, a former Pro-Bowler for the New England Patriots, was up next and spoke about his personal life experiences.

After Holloway spoke, the symposium was divided into small groups to discuss hot topics in a one-to-one basis. The participants were divided into three groups: adults stayed in the Janikies Auditorium; the college students adjourned to room 361; and the high and junior high school students went to room 360.

The group of 24 college students discussed problems facing athletes on campus. The lack of support from both the student body and the administration was the biggest concern.

According to the athletes, the crowds at the games consisted mostly of friends, fellow athletes, and parents. Athletes at Bryant especially have a tough time, since Bryant has a strong academic background.

The school is looking for students who are as strong academically as they are in sports. If a player wants to come Bryant to play volleyball, she might be overlooked for someone who want to attend Bryant for it's strong academic background.

Another major topic in the groups was the role of coaches in the lives of athletes. Coaches that are too demanding, will not get the respect of their players.

A coach should be a person you can go talk to when you need help with anything. However, he or she must still be a coach.

Maria Bras, of the women's vol-

leyball team said, "On the court she is the coach, off the court she is your friend."

The groups then headed back to Janikies for an inter-active session. Joe Rocco of WJAR Channel 10 Sports joined the crowd and played host. A panel of notable figures in Rhode Island sports field questions from the crowd about sportsmanship and ethics.

The panel consisted of Dave Bloss, Sports Editor from the *Providence Journal-Bulletin*; Dennis Coleman, sports lawyer and agent; Dr. Linda Hackett, Athletic Director - Bryant College; Holloway; Alice Sullivan Rhode Island Athletic Council; and Lt. Governor Robert Weygand.

This group started the conversation by discussing recent events in sports. "If Dan Jansen had not won the gold, he would be viewed as a eight time loser. The only way people remember athletes is if they win," commented Joe Rocco.

The final topic of the night was the role of coaches and parents in sports. When parents pressure their kids to do well, they might not be good sports. Coaches also have to know the limit when it comes to their players. If an athlete is constantly being hounded to win they lose the desire to play. When that happens, those players will do what ever it takes to win.

President William E. Trueheart summed up the night when he said, "Ethical principals are important and they should have a high priority in our lives. Athletics gives us a strong set of ethics and fair play."
