# AACSB Accreditation **Enters Final Stage**

Bryant will enter the third and final stage of the AACSB accreditation process when a panel of AACSB reviewers visit the College at the end of this month. The reviewers will be on campus from November 28 to December 1.

Bryant is currently accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges Inc., however the College is seeking accreditation of the business program.

In order to develop a better understanding of the College environment, these visitors will be talking to students, faculty, deans, administrators, department chairs and several trustees.

During the review process, the accreditation team will examine such areas as the admission of students, the curriculum, and various facilities and personnel on campus.

The reviewers will also be asking the students a variety of questions including why they chose Bryant and whether they would recommend the school, They will also ask about the computer and library facilities. And overall, the team will try to determine whether the faculty gives

In order for accreditation to occur, 50% of the faculty must have Ph.D.'s and 75% of the faculty must be full time. Bryant's preparation for accreditation began by hiring new faculty and completing a six volume self study. This months site visit will mark the end of the process. The AACSB reviewers will then make a final decision by April.

In the country, only about 295 business programs out of 1200 are accredited by AACSB. Historically 50% of the self-studies are accepted and approximately 50% of the schools pass the site visit successfully

# **New Courses Offered During** Winter Session

As registration for Winter Session nears, Bryant students are frantically reviewing lists of courses offered, trying to meet both time and credit requirements. Because Winter Session classes meet for several hours every day, students want to choose classes that will not only satisfy these requirements, but also be unique and interesting. Three such classes being offered this Winter Session include "Liberal Education and the Corporation,""Managing in a Chaotic World," and "American Writers in Spain."

Being taught this January for the third consecutive year, "Liberal Education and the Corporation" began as a seminar given by Professor Michael Fraleigh entitled "Sociology of Work." The students who took part in this seminar found it to be very interesting and posed it as a challenge to Professor Fraleigh to begin such a course here at Bryant. These students prepared a tentative course outline and presented it to Professor Fraleigh, whose initial skepticism was replaced by enthusiasm and hope for a successful class.

The course is designed to teach students how to be successful first

in college, and later in their careers. Most importantly, Professor Fraleigh hopes students will learn that "choices made in college influence success in careers."

"Liberal Education and the Corporation" is, for the most part, taught in a seminar format. The course also includes short lectures and activities. Through participation, students will learn how to make active choices and set goals for themselves.

Bryant students the importance of liberal learning skills for innovative thinking and provide them with clear answers to that question.

"Managing in a Chaotic World" is another course being offered this Winter Session. Dr. James Segovis will be instructing this class which will teach students how to deal with changing situations in the business world on both a personal and professional level.

"As organizations become more dynamic, chaotic, and complex, students need to know how to deal with turbulent and unpredictable environments," states Dr. Segovis. This course will provide students with those skills by taking theories from mathematics, such as the Chaotic Theory, and applying them to social science. Also discussed in the course will be modern management techniques and the effects of different organizational structures on behavior. with individuals' ability to adapt in constantly changing and often conflicting situations. "Jurassic Park" will also be read and discussed. Professor Segovis says he is very enthusiastic about the course and thinks it will be a "fun topic to deal with."

Another unique course that will be offered this Winter Session is "American Writers in Spain." Due to the efforts of Professor Urgo, this class will be taught by Maria Jose Alvarez, who is a professor at the University of Leon in Spain. It is intended to expose American students to innovative ways of viewing their culture.

This is the second year that this course, taught completely in English, is being offered. It was given great reviews last year and Professor Urgo hopes that opinions will be similar this January.
