Bryant Ranked Among Top Specialty Business Schools

For the fourth year in a row, Bryant College has been named one of the top business schools in the country by *U.S. News & World Report* annual publishing of the top schools in America.

Out of the twenty five business specialty schools across the U.S., Bryant ranked number three. The biggest change from last year is Bryant's moved up from fifth to third place in academic reputation. Out of a possible one hundred points, Bryant's overall score jumped from 87.9 to 89.5, an increase of 3.4 points since 1991.

"We are delighted to be recognized, for the fourth consecutive year, as one of the nation's best business schools. It is deeply gratifying to know that presidents and deans of the nation's universities hold Bryant's academic programs in such high esteem. That is the

finest affirmation of our commitment to excellence," said President William E. Trueheart.

To rank the institutions, *U.S. News & World Report* conducted a survey of academic reputations among 2,655 college presidents, deans, and admission directors. They combined these findings with statistical data in order to determine the placement of each of the almost 1,400 accredited four-year schools surveyed.

Barron's also recognized Bryant as one of the country's leading business colleges. In addition, through Bryant's Center for International Business and Economic Development (CIBED), over 10,000 people representing 1,800 firms take advantage of Bryant's continuing education programs by recruiting on campus annually.

This year's ranking of the best colleges across the U.S. is located in the October fourth issue of *U.S. News & World Report*.

Recruiter's Reception Insightful

"The Recruiter's Reception provided an invaluable opportunity for Accounting Association members to gain insight and knowledge on prospective firms," remarked Joshua Berger, President of the Bryant College Accounting Association.

The accounting profession was well represented at Monday evening's informational seminar. All of the "Big Six" Public accounting firms, as well as various regional and local firms were present to answer students questions and offer advice. Company literature was distributed in an attempt to help students make an informed decision concerning their career. In addition, students were also offered a taste of the opportunities available in private accounting.

Company representatives, many of whom were recent Bryant graduates, provided valuable information on all aspects of their firms to prospective employees. To help senior accounting majors alleviate some of the stress and anxiety of

determining their career path, recruiters offered some useful advice.

Nicholas Gerostathos, a 1991 Bryant graduate, now a member of the Coopers & Lybrand staff advised students to make interviewing and job searching a precedent over their course load. However, to continue to perform in course work, Gerostathos says it is essential to possess good time planning skills. He emphasized the importance of the decisions that soon-to-be graduates must make. These choices can have an effect on one's life-long career opportunities.

Mr. Gerostathos added, "Stressed-out seniors should keep a good attitude, figure out what they like, and don't give up." He cautioned that a poor attitude or uncertainty about what career path to pursue will be more than evident to a recruiter in an interview.

David Cannata, a five-year employee of Price Waterhouse and also a Bryant alumnus, agreed: "Don't stress-out, relax, and be yourself." He pointed out that sincere personalities and qualities are the key to a successful interview.

"Look at all the firms and determine whether your interest is in

public or private [accounting]," stated Keith Lacy a 1989 Bryant graduate and currently an auditor for KPMG Peat Marwick's Providence office.

Mr. Lacy added, "You have to feel comfortable with the firm you work for." Moreover, Lacy stressed the need for students to be at ease in the office environment in which they may work. Firms with more than one office tend to have different cultures depending on the employee mix and the client base of the office.

Overall, Accounting Association members found this reception to be helpful and informative. "It was beneficial. It gave me insight on the differences between small and large firms," remarked Scott Swenor, an accounting major and current senior undergoing the career search.

"It was a great opportunity to meet recruiters on an informal basis," stated Judy Bellante, Director of Career Services.

Accounting Chair Gary Cunningham commented, "The firms found the reception to be extremely positive and they were pleased to have an opportunity to meet the students."

Douglas Pike Construction Update

The construction that has been delaying traffic from the intersection of Route 116 and Route 7 to the entrance of the Bryant College campus has now been completed. The purpose of the construction was to install sewer lines on the West side of the road from the intersection to the entrance of Parente's.

In the Spring, new construction will begin on Route 7. Douglas Pike, which carries traffic into the entrance to the college, will be widened to a four lane road. The road is being widened to facilitate traffic into the new industrial park, Island Woods, which is presently under construction across from the

college entrance. The addition of a four lane road may include the installation of a traffic light at the campus entrance.

According to George Coronado, the Director of Public Safety, the new road system will help expedite traffic into the campus. The benefits of a new road system will be reaped at the beginning of each school year while students move in and the traffic is heavy.

Coronado also believes that the addition of the two lanes will accelerate the flow of cars onto to campus during Parents' Weekend, Open House, Alumni Weekend, Commencement and the daily flow of traffic. The construction will benefit the college community, but we must first patiently wait until the construction is completed.

CIBED Seeking to Fill Position

The Center for International Business and Economic Development (CIBED) is currently searching for a permanent director and hopes to have someone in office by January 1, 1994. President Trueheart has appointed Professor Kumar Chittipeddi to be the Interim Director of CIBED.

Over the summer, eleven students were awarded CIBED Graduate Assistantships. These students will work with faculty and staff members on a variety of projects

related to defense conversion, international business, and economic development issues.

A systematic market research study is being developed to provide objective assessments of the training needs of businesses in the New England region. CIBED is also developing strategic partnerships with area educational institutions. In addition, several collaborative proposals were submitted to the Federal Government for its Technology Reinvestment Program.

For the second year in a row, CIBED offering its Entrepreneur-

ship Training Program for displaced workers and managers. To help Bryant internationalize, The International Trade Data Network is looking into entrepreneurship education programs in Russia.

Although Bryant has not yet received the federal grant, efforts are being made to get the \$2 million released, as well as additional money for developing defense conversion programs.

Moreover, CIBED is looking to build consulting teams of faculty and students to provide real-time solutions to the problems facing businesses.

Study Reveals Flattery Will Get You Somewhere

Flattering and agreeing with your boss increase your chances of promotion by about five percent, according to a soon to be published study conducted by Bryant's Dr. Ronald J. Deluga and J.T. Perry.

In the study, accepted for publication by *Group & Organization Management*, Deluga and Perry found positive relationships be-

tween supervisors' appraisal of subordinate performance and the degree to which subordinates complimented, agreed with, and made themselves appear to be "ideal" subordinates.

Worker performance is the main spur to advancement, but "kissing up" behavior, according to Deluga, "can make a real difference." Although tactics such as endless flattery can backfire, alienating supervisors and peers alike, Deluga

said "kissing up still works" even when participants know it is happening.

The study noted that supervisors can discourage insincere flattery by requiring subordinates to criticize plans, to paint worst case scenarios, and to suggest alternatives, i.e., to "reward open inquiry and meticulous evaluation."

Deluga said the study will be appear in *Group & Organization Management* within six months.

Sincerity Is the Key to Success

"Performance is what matters most when you want to get ahead," says psychology professor Ron Deluga, "but kissing up can make a real difference. People can be rewarded without it, but it won't be easy - and it won't be as often."

According to a study conducted by Professor Deluga, flattery increases your chances of advancement by about 5 percent. These types of actions are commonplace, but that does not necessarily mean that they are ethical. Some people may do anything to get ahead in the world, while others truly work hard for their achievements.

Flattery may occur in the form of always laughing at someone's jokes or constantly agreeing with their ideas. By kissing up to your boss, you may get the promotion or bonus that you wanted.

Chances are that if this type of behavior happens in the workplace, it also occurs in the educational environment.

Do you know students who are always offering to run errands for professors or who participate in every class discussion and don't give other students the chance to even speak?

These types of actions, commonly referred to students as brown-nosing or boot-licking, can be very irritating to others. It's one thing to get to know professors so they can associate your name with your face, but there's a big difference between that and brown-nosing them.

When you over-flatter people you may alienate peers and professors because they may not credit the validity of your statements or give you the help that you need.

You may think that flattery will get you everywhere, but the fact is that if you're not sincere, you're not being true to yourself. True success means attaining it by your own merit and effort.

Whenever I mention that I come from Sri Lanka, people usually associate it with one of two things - either tea or terrorists. Sri Lanka has been famous for its fine tea for centuries and for its ongoing civil war for a considerably shorter period of time, but there is more to this country than ethnic problems and excellent beverages.

Sri Lanka is a small island, about the size of Massachusetts, on the southeast tip of India. It's a tropical country. There is sunshine all year long, except for when the "monsoon" winds blow into the country, providing much needed rainfall. Often called the original "Garden of Paradise," Sri Lanka has a favorable climate and fantastic natural beauty. And the capital city, Colombo, on the west coast has some of the best night life and the best seafood restaurants in that part of the world.

Am I beginning to sound like a tour guide? It's difficult not to be enthusiastic about the place. Visitors from all over the world keep coming back to it to rediscover it yet again. Some of them even stayed for a while - like the Arabs and Malays who visited it, and the Portuguese, Dutch and British who invaded it and colonized it for over 400 years. These successive waves of colonizers have left a strong and highly visible legacy in the land.

The people in Sri Lanka are famous for their friendly manners and their easy-going ways. The pace of life in Sri Lanka is very relaxed. There's a running joke that goes like this: "In America they drive on the right. In Europe they drive on the left. In Sri Lanka we just drive in the shade."

If you want to escape from real life and just chill, there is no better place to do it than Sri Lanka. Trust me. I live there.

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Blindness:

A New Outlook for Bryant College

As the first blind student to attend Bryant College, I felt that it was up to me to let the Bryant College community know that they should be proud of what they have achieved: successfully providing a blind student with the necessary resources that he needs to succeed. Part I. of this article will attempt to explain or clear up some views about blind individuals that I see as a problem.

I grew up in Tiverton, RI and went to public school all of my life. My parents thought that if I went to a public school I would be around sighted people and know what is right and wrong, how sighted people act in certain situations, and learn to be independent. As a result of this, I graduated in 1992 in the top 33% of my class, and was viewed as a "normal" student, and not a blind kid.

Imagine yourself taking a course having to memorize lectures rather than taking notes. Imagine going to class without a textbook, or not having a textbook available. Imagine taking a calculus exam orally, telling the instructor each and every little step in the procedure. It is not easy, try it sometime! These are some of the things a blind student must deal with when he/she is going to college. You might think that it is difficult, wouldn't you? Not at all. Just a lot of persistency, practice,

and dedication.

As a young man, I recall telling my father over and over again "Dad, I can't." My father used to say "Mike, don't give me that. You keep trying, and I will tell you if you can or not." Those words are probably the best words a parent of a blind child could give, because those words taught me, while growing up in a sighted environment, to be persistent. When I first applied to Bryant College in 1992, I realized that it was going to be tough. Now, as a sophomore, I see that it is not as difficult as it first sought out to be.

There are a lot of misconceptions that people have about blind individuals that I would like to clear up right now. Firstly, individuals who are blind are not any different than sighted people, aside from the fact that they cannot see. This means that blind students should not be subjected to any kind of special treatment. Secondly, I have observed that some sighted people become very fearful when confronted with a blind person. I would encourage sighted people to not be afraid of offending me or any other blind person. I very often joke with my friends about my blindness, saying "he blindest guy at the college." If you cannot laugh about it, you might as well forget it.

The worst thing a person could do is feel sorry for the blind person. If my parents always felt sorry for me, I would probably not be here at Bryant. Often I find that people just don't know what to say, and that is not right. Think of a blind person as a person who cannot see instead of a handicapped person. Sighted people should not feel uncomfortable when talking to someone who is blind. This leads me to my fourth

point. Blindness is not a disability, it is an inconvenience, so, you must treat it that way. This means that you must be persistent about what you are going to do. An example of this is getting around school on my own. Bryant may seem small, but it is very big in comparison to what I am used to. I have no doubt in my mind that when I graduate, I will know this campus just as well and if not better than any sighted person does.

In summary, blind people can do most of the things that sighted people can with some minor modifications. I would say to the Bryant College community, don't freeze up when you see a person who is blind and think that he/she is different and therefore not "part of the group." If you get to know the person, and think of them as a "normal" student, you will find that they are just like everyone else.

The faculty and administration here at Bryant has helped me a great deal since I was a Freshman. I very often have to think of alternatives or ways around problems that come up in classes. The majority of the faculty who have dealt with me have adjusted quite well. It becomes especially difficult in such abstract subjects as mathematics and economics where graphs are very often the source of information. Those professors whom I have worked with and am currently working with, you should be commended. Information Technology has contributed much to helping me with my education also. They have purchased several machines that have made things much easier. In Part II. of this article, I will discuss blind people and technology, with an emphasis on these tools.



His sophomore year he was named to the First Team All-Conference and the First Team ECAC for third basemen. Last year he was Second Team All-Conference.

Off the diamond Walonis only competes in other sports to stay in
