

Alcohol Awareness Promoted

"This is our best opportunity to get the public involved in alcohol awareness," said Brian Farley, coordinator of the Fourth Annual Alcohol Awareness Road Race.

The race was originally named after Kristen Hatch, a Bryant student who was struck and killed by a drunk driver on route 116 in April 1990. The race consisted of three events; the 5K road race, the two mile alcohol awareness walk, and the one mile fun run.

The 234 participants in the September 26 race had to pay an entry fee ranging from \$6 to \$12. The money raised will go to the alcohol awareness programs on campus.

"The (Smithfield) Lions are committed to alcohol awareness," said Brian Farley, race coordinator. "The time to adopt sensible drinking is now when you reach the legal age. It is hard to change once you have been doing the same thing for twenty years."

The honorary chair of this years' race was Daria Bruno, a disc jockey from B101.

"It was great to see such a big turn out with the bad weather," Bruno said. "(Alcohol awareness) is a great cause and a lot of attention should be paid to it."

In previous years, the race was five miles; this year it was

changed to a 5K or 3.1 miles. Leading the pack of 122 runners was Matt Boyd, who finished with a time of 16:35. The first Bryant student to finish was senior Tom Gaspar who came in right behind him posting a time of 16:53.

Other Bryant runners included senior Chris King, men's cross country and track coach Harry Smith, resident assistant Tim Boyat, faculty member Rob-

ert Gibson, alumnus Patrick Treanor, Robert Pures, and employee Loraine Cournoyer.

This race is planned to continue into the future. Farley remarked that he hopes to see good things stem from this program.

"I will never forget the tragedy of Kristen's death," Farley added. "Every student who passes

through Bryant College's door should be aware of this tragedy."

According to Farley, this factor alone should get people to come out and support the race.

"People should realize that Kristen could have been anyone. She wasn't in the car. She wasn't driving; she was just an innocent victim," Farley concluded.

Davis Grant to Benefit Liberal Arts and Business Programs

A\$225,000 grant from the Davis Educational Foundation will enable the building of an electronic classroom, which will reduce instructional costs and increase efficiency in the Accounting and English Programs.

Through the joint efforts of Saeed Roohani, Accounting Professor, Mary Lyons, English Chair and Evelyn Dvorak, a proposal for the electronic classroom was developed this summer and submitted to the Davis Foundation.

According to Dr. Mary Lyons, the electronic classroom will be very beneficial to the College. "It is an opportunity for the liberal arts and business programs to share the same resources," said Lyons.

The classroom will contain 40 computers, half IBM and half Macintosh and will include CD-ROM and multi-media.

According to Dean Michael Patterson, the computers will allow material to be covered faster by creating a "paperless environment." In addition, accounting students will be able to critique software programs.

Paterson is optimistic that in the future, the electronic classroom will become networked with computers from around the world. He commented, "Bryant students will be able to see how students in Europe deal with a similar case."

The Davis Educational Foundation was established by Stanton and Elisabeth Davis. Prior to his retirement, Mr. Davis was the chairman of Shaw's Supermarkets, Inc.

Bryant's Enrollment Increases Despite National Slump

The recent drop in the average number of high school graduates has caused the enrollment at many institutions of higher learning to decrease. Bryant, however, is the exception to the rule. This year's freshman class contains a total of 632 students, the largest class to enter Bryant in two years.

There are four principal factors that affect enrollment at colleges and universities. They are demographics (or the number of students graduating from high school), interest in academic program offerings, the economy, and competition from other institutions. With the number of high school graduates diminishing, the percentage of students interested in business decreasing, and the economy in the state of uncertainty that it is, it is easy to see why enrollment may be down. Bryant has tried to combat these problems by expanding their national and international reputa-

According to Dr. Walter Roettger, executive vice president at Bryant, "Bryant's Class of 1997 is also a more diverse class, as well as a class of high quality."

Bryant's multicultural enroll-

ments were 12.5% higher than last year. In addition, there are 57 students from 35 different countries who are enrolled as undergraduates here at Bryant.

The Bryant Enrollment Support Team (BEST), along with the Admissions Office, is working to ensure that future enrollment will continue to increase. BEST is a network of Bryant alumni from across the country who attend college nights and open houses, call students and share their Bryant experiences with them, and basically help Bryant spread its reputation throughout the nation and the world. All alumni who are a part of BEST have volunteered their time and effort. The head of the BEST program is Eileen Chekal, Coordinator of Stewardship and Volunteer Admissions Programs at Bryant.

Hopefully, the future interest in Bryant will continue to expand. According to Roy Nelson of the Admissions Office, they are "...trying to diversify the college gradually."

Bryant has already had approximately 22,000 requests for information regarding next fall's freshman class. By continually recruiting perspective students, high enrollment may continue to increase in the years to come.

Visiting Professor Aims to Link Business and Education

Visiting Accounting professor from Australia, Dr. Alan Dunk, aims to develop stronger links between education, the accounting profession and businesses during his semester at Bryant. Dr. Dunk is the KPMG Peat Marwick Distinguished Visiting Professor from The University of Western Sydney.

One of Dr. Dunk's projects is an eight seminar program, titled the Rhode Island Research Workshop Series. Information to be used for publication will be taken from the seminars.

"When faculty publish material it provides a signal to the academic market that Bryant conducts research," says Dunk, "It benefits both the college and its students."

If there is an issue or a concern that you strongly believe will impact your life or others, then don't be afraid to bring it to the surface.


Your ideas are just as good as the next person's are. If you want to make a difference, right here and right now, then voice your opinions and suggestions to the various campus organizations.














Men's Tennis Back to Business Women's Golf Looking to Return to Glory **Looking For Players**
