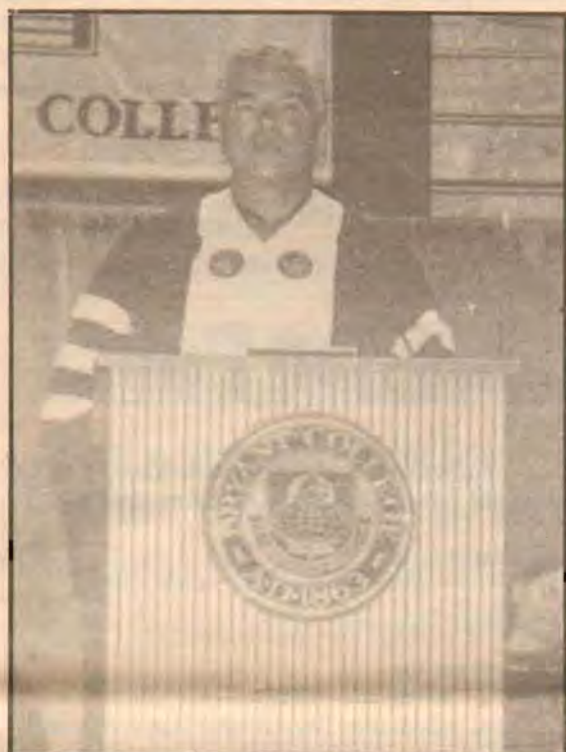

New "Beginnings" Provide Opportunities

"Beginnings are unique in that they provide opportunities...to better ourselves and to go further than those who have gone before," remarked Rob Fontanella, President of the Student Senate.

"Beginnings," the theme of this year's Convocation ceremony, was chosen to recognize all new students and to welcome them to the Bryant tradition of academic excel-

lence.

As President William E. Trueheart stated, Bryant is on the threshold of new beginnings as the college welcomes new faculty and students and strives for AACSB accreditation.

"The campus is alive with hope and enthusiasm," said Dr. Trueheart.

David Nyham, Associate Editor of the *Boston*

Globe, addressed the theme of beginnings in his keynote speech. He told students not to be afraid to change majors or to start the year with a clean slate.

Nyham touched on four different topics in his speech: time, money, confidence and altruism.

He said, "Time is our most valuable asset. You have to waste it in order to learn how to use it."

On the topics of money and altruism, Nyham cautioned against "wearing blinders of greed" and suggested opening one's eyes to na-

ture and learning from successful people.

He also added that we have to learn to do for others and not for ourselves. Nyham's simple philosophy was that you get out of life what you put into it.

During the ceremony, both the faculty and students were recognized for their accomplishments. Presidential and trustee scholarship recipients, the Delta Mu Delta Honor Society members, the National Order of Omega members, and the Dean's list students were honored.

Dr. Marie B. Coté, Professor of Accounting and Dr. Burton L. Fischman, Professor of English were recognized for receiving awards for teaching excellence during the academic year.

Dr. Martin Rosenzweig, Professor of Mathematics presented Dr. Phyllis A. Schumacher with the Distinguished Faculty Award.

Schumacher said she was honored to receive the award from her peers. "Teaching math at Bryant is a pleasure," said Schumacher.

Professor Kumar Chittipeddi, head of the CIBED Task Force, was chosen as the 1993 Rhode Island Professor of the year.

Dr. Judy Barrett Litoff, Professor of History and Dr. Joseph A. Ilacqua, Associate Professor of Economics, served as Co-chairs of Convocation.

The concept of Convocation was introduced several years ago by Dr. William T. O'Hara, now President Emeritus, to bring the entire campus together in celebration of each new academic year.

Subway Replaces Deli/Grill

Remember the restaurant survey in your box last semester? Well, even if you do not remember the survey, you have probably seen the new Subway store which replaced the Deli/Grill. The Subway store is part of the national franchise, but is owned by the Murphy family: Bill, Marlene and their son Billy.

This is the first time any of them have run any type of food service, in fact Bill will be retiring from the Army shortly. Marlene has been working as a secretary, and now she is helping to manage the store.

Marlene feels "the twenty-eight student employees are very enthusiastic, and very hard working." The first few days were very hectic because all the employees had to be trained for the various positions. Now, most of the employees

work 7 to 10 hours per week. The store is open from 7am to 11pm on Monday through Friday, 10am to 11pm on Saturday, and 11am to 11pm on Sunday.

Even though the Subway has opened for business, they do not yet accept points. The Murphy's have every intention of introducing the point system at the Subway. Steps have already been taken to get points at the Subway, and around the Bryant Center.

Currently, one can use points through ARA for various items. At Salmonson Dining Hall, one can only use points to bring guests in for meals. This applies to South Dining Hall for dinner too. Students with meal plans get a fixed dollar amount to spend at the South Dining Hall during lunch hours. Those who go over this limit, may pay the balance with points or cash. ARA also offers a catering service for students.

Congressman Visits Bryant With Dual Purpose

Rhode Island Second District Congressman Jack Reed visited the Bryant campus on Friday, September 10, 1993, in order to tour The Rhode Island Export Assistance Center. The Rhode Island Export Assistant Center (RIEAC) has been relocated to the building behind Residence halls four and five on the outskirts of campus.

One of the things noticeable in the center is a huge map of the world which encompasses the geographic realm in which RIEAC deals. RIEAC's primary purpose is to identify and develop potential export opportunities for the state's products and guiding businesses through the actual trading procedures.

In order to perform these actions,

RIEAC is funded by sources including the Rhode Island Department of Economic Development and by federal and state grants. Since RIEAC is a federally funded program, Congressman Reed was at the center to grasp an understanding of what the center does.

Aside from personal consulting to clients, and training and informational programs, the center also holds an "Export Round Table" in which senior corporate executives meet with RIEAC staff, international business consultants and state and federal export representatives in order to assist the client.

The heart of RIEAC is the International Trade Databank Network. The DataNetwork is a system which incorporates information for clients including: Client Profiles, Export Yellow Pages Directory, Trade Leads, Export Contracts, and Mar-

ket Research. These tools enable business to use up-to-date data and resources to determine exporting opportunities.

While at RIEAC, the Congressman also met with a student employee of interest to him named Vanja Dukic. Vanja is like many students at Bryant; she is a sophomore Actuarial Math major, a Resident Assistant in a Freshman hall and is active on campus. There is one way in which Vanja differs from most Bryant students—she is from Sarajevo, Yugoslavia. While most people only read about the fighting amongst the Serbs, Croats, and Bosnians, Vanja knows that this turmoil is taking place in her home country.

Congressman Reed's interest in Vanja stems from his trip to Sarajevo nearly three weeks ago.

"When an individual makes a decision to seek counseling, he/she is taking a constructive step toward dealing with life's challenges." Students can hear this and many other positive messages when they call Guideline, the newly established telephone counseling service at Bryant College. Developed this year by on-campus counselors Roseanne Dana and Bill Phillips, Guideline provides an excellent opportunity for students to receive advice from a professional from the privacy of their own rooms.

Guideline was developed to provide information on typical student issues. It deals with such common problems and concerns as long distance relationships, tension at home, roommate conflicts, and sexual orientation. Guideline allows students to anonymously get information and suggestions which may help them deal with these issues. Although Guideline's messages are pre-recorded and not as extensive as in-person counseling, it is hoped that students will perhaps see this as the first step in facing their prob-

lems and finding solutions.

In addition to being purely anonymous and confidential, Guideline allows students to realize that they are not alone in what they feel and that many students share similar concerns. This understanding may provide the incentive necessary for students to seek support.

Bryant counselors also hope that Guideline will help promote the face-to-face counseling services offered at Bryant. Located on the top floor of the Unistructure in the Student Affairs Wing, Counseling Services offer professional, confidential counseling to Bryant undergraduates. Appointments may be made Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm by calling 232-6045 and are free of charge. "Counseling allows an individual to think through concerns and issues with the help of an unbiased, objective listener."

Unlike high school guidance counselors whose main purpose is to assist in college application and acceptance, these counselors work to offer support and suggest options. Guideline is one of these options and can be accessed by calling 232-6444 from a touch-tone phone.

On Tour with Depeche Mode

"I've had to wait eight years to see Depeche Mode perform live, and the show was just incredible!" remarked Bryant student Despina Tartsinis after seeing their recent concert at the Worcester Centrum. "Dave Gahan had my attention the entire time."

Depeche Mode has embarked on the first tour for the album "Songs of Faith and Devotion" that came out in spring of this year. The band toured Europe prior to coming to the U.S. and will travel on to Canada to round out the tour.

A simulated thunder and lightning storm helped to prepare the crowd for the intense concert opener *Get Right With Me* which the band performed behind an array of draped curtains and colored lights. Lead singer Gahan chose to tease the crowd a little and remain hidden behind the curtains, allowing only the silhouette of his body to be revealed to the audience. Needless to say they loved it.

Gahan was the only one on the lower level of a two level stage where the rest of the band and backup singers performed. Video clips on a large back drop screen in addition to smaller screens around the stage enhanced the

visual aspect of the concert.

Depeche Mode went right from the new to older albums and played a great mix throughout. Songs including *Enjoy the Silence*, *Policy of Truth*, *Never Let Me Down Again*, *Behind the Wheel*, *Everything Counts* and an extended version of *Personal Jesus* were among the older tunes and the audience helped with the singing.

The entire band's performance was excellent, but Gahan definitely played up to the crowd encouraging clapping and help with the chorus. His excellent dancing abilities certainly kept the girls in the audience interested, as well as when he rested the microphone in the waist of his pants so that he could remove his shirt.

A nice surprise during the show was when Martin Gore, shy lead guitarist, sang two songs so that Gahan could take a breather. Eventually each band member moved down to the first level of the stage to end the second encore with *Everything Counts*.

Although the sounds of concert opener *The The* differed greatly from that of Depeche Mode, the two bands complemented each other well. Matt Johnson and the band played such recent hits as *Love is Stronger Than Death*, *Slow motion bedlam* and *Dogs of Lust* from their new album "Dusk."

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Library Continually Expands

As many of you may have noticed, there is a new addition to the reference section of our library this semester. Over the summer the ProQuest MultiAccess System was installed on the main level of the library. The installation of this system adds six new computer workstations to supplement the ones that were already in place.

The installation of this system was made possible by a grant that was allocated by The Champlin Foundation and secured by library director John Hannon. The Champlin Foundation, based in Providence, has given to our library in the past and is well-known for its educational grants within the state of Rhode Island. When

the need for a larger MultiAccess System was brought to their attention by Hannon, the Foundation was quick to step in and help out.

The new system, which was installed by University Microfilms International of Michigan, will offer many advantages to Bryant students. We will be able to search for information from over 2,800 major journals which contain over 25,000 articles. The system offers central printing, remote printing, and fax deliveries of these articles. This system will also enable us to obtain articles from over 350 regional newspapers and magazines, some as close by as Providence and others as far away as Hawaii.

Unlike in the past when the database was often tied up, the wait for a terminal should be relatively shorter this year. Besides the addi-

tion of the new terminals, there will be limited access placed on the use of the ProQuest system. First priority will be given to Bryant students and a 20 minute time limit will be placed on all usage. This will help to ensure that all students are given equal access to the system.

A nominal fee will be charged to all persons using the MultiAccess System. This will be done via InterCards and the fees collected will be put towards securing copyrights for future journals and articles.

If you have a chance sometime, stop by the library and check out the new ProQuest MultiAccess System. I guarantee you will not be disappointed. And while term papers still won't be much fun, they will definitely be a lot easier to write with the help of this new system.

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
