Sol Koffler Honored By College

The Bryant College Student Center will be dedicated in honor of the Koffler family on Thursday, October 19, 1978, at 3:30 p.m., in appreciation of a major gift from Dr. Sol Koffler, Chairman of the Board and Treasurer, American Luggage Works, Warren, Rhode Island, and his daughter, Phyllis Koffler. The Koffler name thus becomes one of the most prominent on the Bryant Campus. In 1972, in recognition of an earlier significant contribution to the Bryant Development Fund, the core of the Unistructure, the College's principle building, was designated as the Koffler Rotunda.

The Student Center, a sixteen-sided, three-story, wood-sheathed building houses dining and recreational facilities, game rooms, bowling alleys, and television and lounge areas. The focal point for campus social activities, the Student Center is

also used for mixers and receptions. The building affords a sweeping view of the surrounding Wionkhiege Valley.

Dr. Koffler, founder of the American Luggage Works, Inc. in 1936, has had a remarkable career in the luggage industry. Over the past four decades, he revolutionized the industry in every respect by introducing

Trustee Chairman Speaks Out

Background-

Dr. William P. Robinson, Jr., Associate Commissioner of Education for the State of Rhode Island, has been associated with Bryant College for many years. A member of the Board of Trustees since 1963, he was named Chairman of the Board in 1975. Dr. Robinson is a graduate of Providence College. He earned his Masters of Education degree from Rhode Island College and received honorary doctorate degrees

from Catholic Teachers College of Providence, Providence College, Our Lady of Providence Seminary, and Mt. Saint Joseph College.

Q. In your opinion, what is the role of the Bryant College Board of Trustees?

A. The job of the Board of Trustees is to see that the College is run, *not* to run the College. We are very fortunate at Bryant in that the members of the Board are people whose sole interest as Trustees is the welfare of the College. This Board functions as a cohesive body. I would be disturbed if it functioned any other way.

The role of the Board, as I see it, is that of a policy-making body. This is a broad, general term, but implies an obligation to see that the institution is properly financed, and that it is operated in a sound, efficient, and economical manner.

The establishment of new programs should be determined in the light of anticipated revenues and the cost effect of the programs.

Oftentimes a program may be desirable, but it is not economically feasible to

establish.

Q. Bryant has made some big advancements in the last fifteen years. In your opinion, what are some of the more significant ones?

A. Of course, the move to Smithfield was the biggest change. Accreditation was also an important landmark. Over the years, the administration has endeavored to bring in additional faculty with terminal

degrees, which is a must now in the world of academia.

Q. For those graduates who have not seen the new campus, could you describe its impact upon the Bryant community and potential members of the community?

A. The campus is a tremendous attraction! I know that landscape and buildings of

themselves do not make the institution. But I think that the beautiful atmosphere, well-lighted rooms, and pleasant surroundings, make for a better milieu in which to learn. Registration implies that a student has been enrolled in class and made full payment.

people.

Q. Could you share some insight with us as to where you think Bryant College is going?

A. I see no disposition on the part of the Trustees for us to expand. I think the general position of the Trustees is that they want Bryant to be a top quality institution. It is a good college, but certainly it could be better. I do not see the Trustees taking on any substantial new programs unless we have the means to support them in a quality fashion.

I'm satisfied with the Trustees' position on this. Let's make sure that what we have is the best before we start looking in other directions.

Q. Let's talk about the Bryant Alumni. Many are active in the Rhode Island community.

A. Bryant can take pride in the fact that so many of its alumni have gone into important positions in the business world. And, I understand that they have sought to bring Bryant alumni into the enterprises in which they are employed. WJMF Album Review

BOSTON: Don't Look Back

The Pro's by David Batzer

After two years and a new recording studio, Boston has released the new Boston II, *Don't Look Back*. The delay was caused by (1) it took Tom Scholz time to write seven of the eight songs on the album, and (2) his desire to record and mix the album at his hideaway studio instead of recording there and mixing in California as was done on the first Boston album.

The biggest drawback to the album is it's done by Boston. Most people expected something new and different, but what they got was typical "love it or hate it" Boston rock and roll. The problem is that Boston II is set up amazingly like Boston I, giving people the impression of rehashing the old album instead of something new and fresh.

But from the classic instrumentals of "Journey" right down to the gutsy rock 'n' roll of "Party" this Boston album is pure dynamite. If Tom Scholz is the heart of Boston, then Brad Delp is its voice. His unmistakable tone lets you know from the beginning that this is Boston.

Side one is easy-going Boston. "Don't Look Back", "The Journey", "It's Easy" and "A Man I'll Never Be" leads the listener down the straight road of rock, never reaching the ecstatic screaming highs or touching the depressive lows. It's just nice, easy listening.

Side two, on the other hand, is a rollercoaster of emotions from the excited atmosphere of "Party" to the slightly mellower

The wait is over!! Boston's "new" album has been released under the pseudonym *Don't Look Back*. Ironically, Boston neglected to heed their own advice...

It is rather hard to distinguish *Don't Look Back* from *Boston*; their new music duplicates their old tunes, or more accurately *Don't Look Back* is merely new regurgitation of old material. Boston's unique tempo is kept the same. Amazingly, a style so vibrant two years ago allowed itself to ferment to a bitterness. The title cut is boring, lyrics expounding on the vice on living in the past.

"Journey", a token instrumental piece, adds new dimensions to the word dull. Brad Delp's vocals as in "It's Easy" are monotonous, at best predictable. "A Man I'll Never Be" is extremely reminiscent of "Let Me Take You Home Tonight", enough so as to serve as a prime illustration of cloning. "Party" parallels "Smoking"-same theme different tune. Boston has never been recognized for their profound lyrics but lines such as, "I've been tossed around plenty before....But I've gotten used to bad news," manages to reach unprecedented lows."

Boston's phenomenal success in 1976 can never be matched, and perhaps it would be naive to believe the group could ever recreate the charismatic aura they generated 2 years ago. That, however, is no excuse for *Don't Look Back*. The album may become a brief commercial success, but it will remain an eternal acoustic disaster.

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
