## Curriculum Focus Affects Education

What is a curriculum? For too many institutions it is the process by which a person is educated. What is an educated person? Is it one who has been taught the strict disciplines of accounting or math, or is an educated person one who is familiar with the basic questions of philosophy and the basic periods in history?

Our own school, Bryant, could easily fit into the first of the two categories. Representing the second in this report are Brown University and Harvard University. All have a different approach as far as what students should be, and are taught. Yet, all three schools claim to graduate "educated" persons.

The curriculum is the key to an education. The standard definitions given by Webster says that curriculums are "the whole body of courses offered by an educational institution," or "any particular body of courses set for various majors..." The first would apply to schools such as Brown and Harvard, and Bryant comfortably fits into the second category.

The Bryant curriculum as we know it today is the product of revisions that took place in the early 70's. (This discussion deals exclusively with the B.S. in B.A.

curriculum) Prior to 1972, schedules for students were made by the school from a rigid curriculum that dictated exactly what courses would be taken and in what order. There were only five electives in which students had to make any selection decisions.

In 1972 the curriculum became more flexible, and students could choose courses rather than be told what to take. Modifications since then have resulted in the checksheet curriculum that is now being used. This program sets a graduation requirement of 40 courses, including a core of eleven courses from seven disciplines. The amount of courses students can select on their own varies with the major.

Accounting majors have the lowest amount of electives, at 19, since all of their major courses are specified on the checksheet. Management majors, on the other hand, have the most freedom in course selection, with 26 electives.

Although these courses are referred to as electives, they all fit within particular distribution requirements. For example, marketing majors have 25 electives, but five must be marketing courses, two must be economics courses, four have to be social science courses, and so

As the semester began and the Bryant community settled back into its routines, students were again faced with the shock of paying high prices for their books. Many raised their voices in obvious contempt for the bookstore, all with the similar question: "Why do books cost us so much?" The business manager of THE ARCHWAY was seen ranting and raving through our hallowed halls, telling anyone who would listen about a book he had just purchased for \$11.20 that had been previously used 3 or 4 times. "Look", he'd say, holding up a severely battered book, "it's a piece of s---t!"

To try to find an answer as to why books cost so much, the bookstore manager, Dick Curran, was interviewed. He is an employee of College Stores Association.

Curran was asked why books are so expensive. He stated that it is basically the publishers that set the prices. All new books are marked up 20% on their original cost. Coming out of that 20% markup are expenses such as shipping and handling costs, salaries and a commission to Bryant College. The remainder is profit for College Stores Associates.

Curran would not officially state what the size of Bryant's

commission is. He suggested talking to Bill Valentine, director of purchasing for Bryant. Valentine, when first approached, would not comment. We went to talk to his boss, Everett Hutker. Hutker in return told Valentine to check with another superior to see if they could make that information public. Valentine did, and later said the figure was approximately 6% of total gross sales for the bookstore.

Asked why the college itself could not run a bookstore, Hutker replied that the school did run it until 1974. Bryant found it was losing money continually, and not running it efficiently. "We're not specialists, only generalists", Hutker said. Professionals had to be called in to run the store.

Hutker said that the school could lower book prices by doing away with their commission from the bookstore. However, the money the school makes on books is reinvested in the school, by paying utilities, etc. The school needs that added revenue and would only have to make up its loss in other

ways, such as through higher tuition or other means. Hutker also said that the bookstore should remain competitive with other schools. Presently the bookstore is competitive, with prices generally equaling other schools in Rhode Island.

Asked about the markup on

## Pub Capacity Awaits Local Move

In response to a letter from the college, the State Fire Marshall's office has reevaluated its assessment of the capacity of the Student Center. While the State Office has specified in a letter to the college that the present capacity will remain in effect for less concentrated uses of the facility (such as Wine and Cheese night), it will be raised for more concentrated uses (such as mixers).

The final determination of the latter figure rests with the Smithfield Fire Chief, and nothing can be done about letting more people into the Pub until that department posts new capacity figures. The college's

efforts to effect a speedy solution to the problem have been frustrated by the difficulty of reaching the people responsible.

Gerri states that she considers the Pub, at a higher capacity, to be inadequate only for dancing. While noting the "poor attitude" towards the Gym at the mixers held there, Gerri said that it is normal at most colleges to hold dances at facilities separate from their Pubs, usually a gym. She

Geraldine Hura, Director of Student Programs and Services, is hopeful that the capacity will be restored to at least last year's level (700). In the event that the town sets the capacity higher than that, Security and Student Affairs will work to make a final determination of capacity through experimentation.

hopes that the Gym will come to be used more for such events; the SPB is already considering it for some, such as the Halloween Mixer. Noting the logistics problems, Gerri stated that there are "better chances for a new gym than a new Student Center."

## FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

Last Saturday, in the early hours of the morning, Security forced WJMF off the air. This decision was reached after consultation with Jerry Ramos, Acting Director of Resident Life, in light of an apparent violation of WJMF's own rules.

A Security Officer visiting the station found 15-18 people there. WJMF's regulations allow only two unauthorized visitors for each authorized staff member present. Five people, including the DJ on the air, refused to leave the studios, on the grounds that they had a right to be there. Upon checking, Security found that none of the five were on their records as being authorized to be there; they were all required to leave.

(It should be noted that the station "reeked" of marijuana smoke, and a quantity of the substance was seized, but was not associated with any individual.)

In actual point of fact, however, one of the persons ordered to leave, the DJ, was authorized to be there in the eyes of the station. Had Security bothered to check with WJMF's General Manager, Steven Feinberg, before taking so drastic an action as ordering the station off the air, they would have learned that only a clerical error had kept him off the official list. The fact that he was not consulted grates on my sensibilities as the titular head of a student organization. Also inexcusable is the fact that while Security managed to send a copy of the report of the incident to the entire Student Affairs Office, it never bothered to inform Feinberg. He had to seek out the details of the report before being able to take corrective action.

I do not dispute Security's right to enforce reasonable rules, particularly those which the station has set up for itself (and does not police adequately.) I do not believe, however, that these rules should not work to thwart the efforts of the members of an organization, especially one which so directly serves the students, unless absolutely necessary. In this instance, it plainly was not. Further, it should be realized that organization heads do have a legitimate interest in matters concerning their operations. I hope that Security will have the courtesy to consult with Mr. Feinberg the next time there exists a situation of such import. Also inexcusable is the fact that while Security

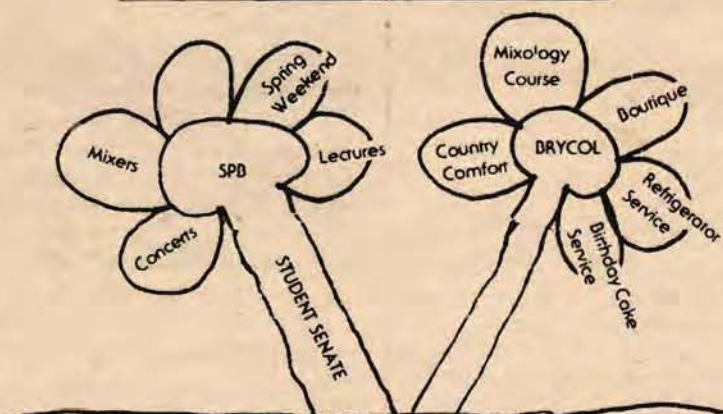

# TO TM OR NOT TO TM

Eliminate stress...increase learning ability...increase productivity on the job...decrease metabolic rate...reduce crime rate...achieve levitation...prevention of earthquakes. These are some of the claims of the TM Program to be offered by the Counseling Center beginning on October 3 and 4 with no-cost introductory lectures. Of course, some of these claims seem to be a bit extraordinary, but reducing stress and increasing learning ability is a very real possibility. However, there are criticisms and controversies concerning TM.

Transcendental Meditation, as defined by the *TM Book*, is "a simple, natural, effortless process that allows the mind to experience subtler and subtler levels of the thinking process until thinking is transcended and the mind comes into direct contact with the source of thought." To explain: Through the use of mantras (meaningless

sounds) during meditation, the student is able to go into a state of "restful alertness", which means that even though the body is resting, the mind is very much alert.

Proponents claim that by practicing the meditation twice daily, once in the morning and again in the early evening, the student should notice improvements in his life, including inner harmony, less fatigue, relaxation, better ability to deal with people, and increased learning ability. If the program is continued, follow-ups are provided by the teachers of TM to insure that the students are practicing it correctly. The student should, it is claimed, be able to fulfill his potential, accomplishing all of his goals. The program requires no special diets, exercises, or special clothing.

Numerous studies have been done on TM in the United States (Harvard University, University of California, University of Colorado, and the Academy of

## Graduate School Highlights

### FALL ENROLLMENT

Graduate School enrollment hit a new historic high this fall when over 850 Graduate students enrolled in 57 classes. Graduate students are taking their classes on campus, at Raytheon in Portsmouth, at Navy in Newport, and at BIF in West Warwick. By program, 70% of our students are candidates for the MBA with a concentration in Management, 20% in Accounting and 5% each for the Master of Public Service and for the new Master of Science in Taxation.

Our newest program, Master of Science in Taxation, is off to a fine start this fall with over 240 inquiries, 61 admissions, and 46 students enrolled in the four tax classes.

### GRADUATE STUDENT ASSEMBLY

The first Graduate student assembly for the 1978-1979 year

was held on Tuesday, September 26. Over 150 Graduate students attended. Vice Presidents Wood and Barlow were introduced to the Graduate students. The Graduate Dean, Dr. Lebovitz, discussed the Fall Enrollment and its high points (see Fall Enrollment above), and the problems encountered in connection with the Fall Semester: preregistration, registration, textbooks, split classes, class attendance, and housekeeping.

Graduate students were informed that pictures for ID cards would be taken during the period October 2- October 20 evenings at the Graduate Office.

Also, a survey was conducted by the Dean of the Assembled students of class times other than those currently being scheduled.

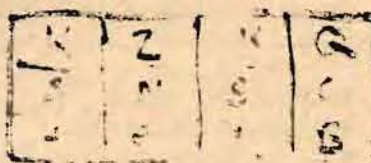

Management Journal) as well as studies in France, Canada, and the Netherlands. These have attested to the physiological benefits of TM (decreased metabolic rate, decreased heart rate, decreased blood pressure, and decreased anxiety.) TM also increases the growth of intelligence and problem-solving ability.

Here in the U.S., AT & T uses TM as a stress management technique for anyone in the company who wishes to participate. In Norway, the government is funding courses

at numerous universities in order to make it available to more people.

However, controversies have arisen. In October, 1975, a high school in New Jersey was offering courses in TM using funds from the New Jersey Department of Education, made possible by HEW. A nationwide "Coalition for Religious Information," and described Hinduism and violated the First Amendment, which requires church-state separation. They felt that Maharishi Mahesh, leader and founder of TM had "camouflaged" it as a "science"

so as to qualify for taxpayer funds and reach more followers. It has been referred to as the "McDonald's of meditation," attracting hundreds of thousands to participate (Time, March 1, 1976). The issue was settled on December 2, 1977 in favor of the Religious Coalition. TM cannot be taught in public schools, as it is "indeed religious in nature." (TM in Court, Spiritual Counterfeits Project, 1978).

According to teachers of TM and the TM Book, Transcendental Meditation is a "scientific discovery involving the basic laws of nature".

Members of all religious faiths can practice TM; in fact, priests, rabbis, and ministers, as well as athletes do.

Other criticisms of TM have involved misleading advertising claiming to teach levitation. However, upon attending the introductory lectures, one finds that only after becoming an experienced mediator, and signing up for an intensive training course of up to ten weeks, at \$245/week, can this level be reached. And, since Maharishi has forbidden public demonstrations of levitation, people have been quick to criticize. The documentation exists, however, on many of the benefits of TM: increased learning ability, improved physiological conditions, and increased job performance.

Of course, it is entirely up to the individual whether or not to participate in the TM Program. The introductory lectures offered on October 3 and 4 will give the student an opportunity to meet and speak with teachers and to decide if they want to take the course at the student fee of \$150 (which, by the way, is \$85 more than it was in 1975). According to TM officials, the fees are used to pay teachers, for renting facilities, and for building new facilities to cut rental costs in the future.

## INDIAN Poet Writes of Common Man

During the course of our school years, we often hear poetry read by a teacher or a fellow student, but it is a rare instance when the poet himself presents a sampling of his works.

Yesterday, in Dr. Baines' "Creative Writing" class, Sohan Singh Misha of Punjabi, read some of his award-winning poems to an attentive group of Bryant students. Punjabi, the "Land of Five Rivers", is a

divided country near India. Half of it is ruled by Pakistan and half by India. The culture and traditions of the people, however, have remained whole despite the political divisions.

The award Misha received was the Sahitya Akademi Award (equivalent to our National Book Award), for his collection of Punjabi poems entitled,

"Kach De Vastar." Misha is a poet of realism, stressing "the frustrations and agonies of common man." (Indian Tribune, February, 1978) especially the struggle in his own country, and the agony of being divided and separated from loved ones.

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During the class Misha discussed two of his poems. One was "The Prism":

No desire no hope  
I am a sharp-cornered colorless piece of glass  
Suddenly a pure beam of bright light  
touched my body, seven colors decorated me  
and a throng of people came to witness;  
That was not my extension, that was the miracle of light,  
Out of seven colors no color was mine.  
That bright beam disappeared.  
You, who confuse the medium with the source, now  
why do you demand that seven-colored miracle of me?

I am a sharp-cornered  
colorless piece of glass.

If you like  
Fling me on a stone  
I will break into tiny bits  
but no color will come out of me.

As you can see, this poem is simple and sincere. It may have suffered somewhat in the translation, but the idea is still basically the same. Misha usually writes his poems in one sitting, as with this particular one. He does not always need an inspiration; just observing life provides enough material.

Younger than most recipients of the Sahitya Award, Misha was born in 1934. He completed his M.A. in English from Punjab University College in 1957,

going on to teach English at a college in Sathiala. He is currently working as the Producer of "Spoken Word (Punjabi)" at All-India Radio in Jullundur.

Besides the United States, Misha has also visited Britain and Canada. Before seeing the students he expected them to be neither serious nor attentive, but his conception soon changed. "The students are very attentive and relaxed here," he commented.

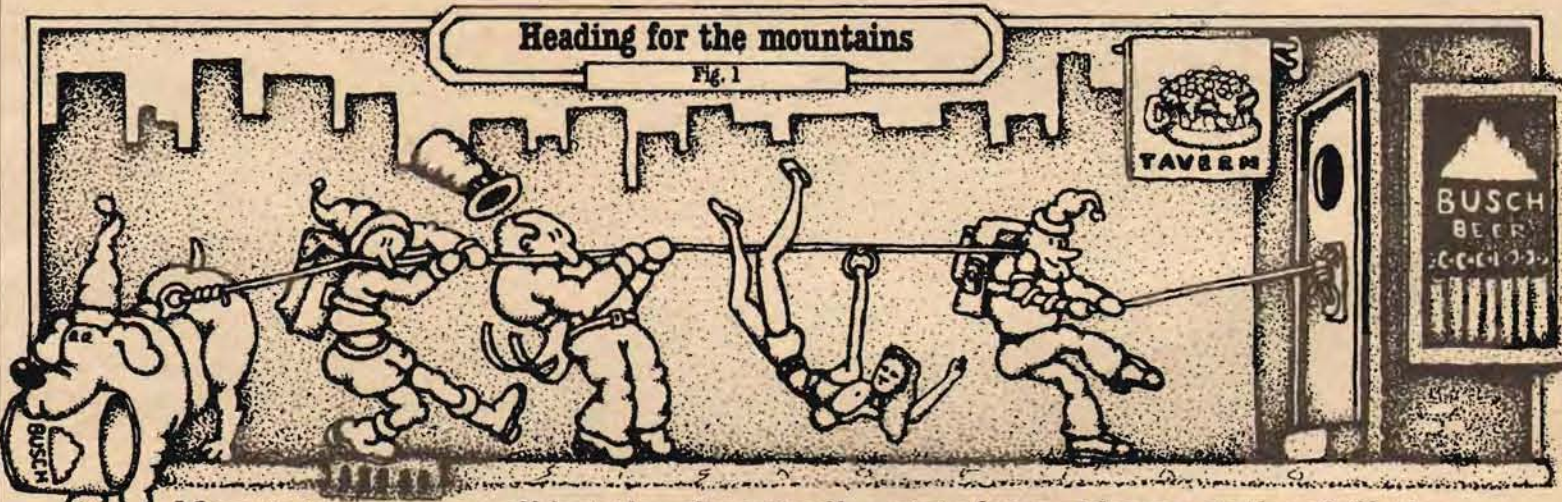

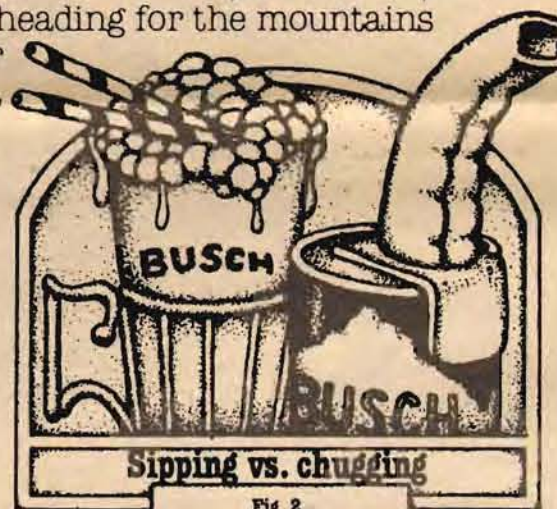

used books, Curran said that a 25% markup is used. He gave an example: A book is purchased by the student for \$10.00 when new. It is then sold back to the bookstore for 50% of the new price or \$5.00. (The present policy of the bookstore is to pay 50% on all books that will be used again. If the book is not to be used again at Bryant, only 10% or 20% will be paid for it.)

That used book that the student received \$5.00 for is then resold at \$7.50; which, according to Curran, gives the bookstore a 25% markup from the original sale price. While this is technically correct, the

bookstore is paying \$5.00 for that used book and is getting a resale of \$7.50, which the ARCHWAY interprets as a 50% markup, not a 25%.

Those books that are discontinued for use at Bryant are not generally shipped to other schools, where high profits could be made. They are instead shipped to book wholesalers at a

small profit margin. This is done because paying labor expenses and warehousing rent for stored used books is not as profitable or convenient as selling to wholesalers.

When asked how students could obtain lower prices for books, Curran just shook his head saying, "I don't know what to tell you." Publishers charge high prices, making large profits, and the students change that on an individual level would be impossible. He did offer the suggestion that if teachers used the same books continually instead of changing books the students would pay less. This would also result in higher profits for the bookstore. Curran ended by reiterating that it is the publishers that make the big money in books, not the bookstores. What can be done about that? He did not know the answer.

## Curriculum Varies Widely

on down the checklist.

Bryant believes that students should be exposed to various fields of study, making students aware of areas they were previously unfamiliar with. Some discover an interest in a major they had never considered before.

With a vocational product in mind, Bryant concentrates its efforts at preparing a graduate to immediately enter a professionally skilled job. If employment can be used as a measuring stick, the curriculum at Bryant works when one considers that 97 companies recruit at Bryant and approximately 90 percent of the graduates have a job lined up upon graduation.

Harvard, considered by many the leader and initiator of new trends and changes in

educational policies, recently amended its General Education Program, which allowed students free selection of courses in any combination, to a program with a core curriculum consisting of from seven to ten courses in five core areas. Effective as of May 2, 1978, the change ended 33 years of a curriculum with an untraditional structure.

The argument for the change centered around the question of whether Harvard is indeed graduating educated people. Apparently the Harvard faculty is "engaged in a collective fit of conscience" over this matter. The goal of the new program is "to have students acquire basic literacy in major forms of intellectual discourse."

But the philosophy of a non-restrictive curriculum is still strongly supported at Brown University. Also a liberal arts college, Brown instituted a "new curriculum" in 1969. The new curriculum, which was instigated by some "highly motivated students in the late 60's," abolished distribution requirements, established "Modes of Thought" courses designed for freshman to introduce the demands of self-discipline and intellectual freedom, gave a greater flexibility in concentrations (also known as majors) opportunities for independent work, and a revised grading system of A, B, C/No Credit or Satisfactory/No Credit option.

The only responsibilities left to students are to complete 28 courses, choose a concentration, and meet the eight-to-ten course requirement for the concentra-

tion. The success of the "new curriculum" at Brown is attributed to the principle that each student is responsible for his own education. All students must make early decisions regarding the course path each will take. If a course gets too tough, students supposedly will stick it out, especially since they decided it is what they wanted.

An uncontrollable problem that can arise at Brown are the students that fail to diversify their course selections. Some could easily take 28 art courses or 28 English courses and still graduate. There is student counseling at Brown that is suppose to alleviate this problem, but it is admittedly weak.

Bryant, Harvard, and Brown all have their own interpretations of what an educated person really is. Each lies on a continuum ranging from a strict checklist curriculum with distribution requirements to one offering complete freedom in course selections. Bryant aims courses, provided everyone takes the seven to ten core courses. Brown gives complete discretion to students, forcing them to make important decisions early in their educational experience.

All three have established a format for educating, and all three will continue to prepare people for the "real world." But with every school providing its own interpretation of a proper education, who is to say which is the best system?

Keep asking yourself, "What is an educated person?" Should you find the answer, you could change the whole education industry!
