

Omicron Delta Kappa Induction

At 6pm on Sunday, October 31, 22 juniors, 10 seniors, and 6 faculty members will be inducted into Omicron Delta Kappa (ODK), a national leadership honor society. The induction ceremony will last approximately 45 minutes and it will meet the specific guidelines outlined by the national society. Inductees will learn about the history of ODK and learn what it means to be a part of the community.

In addition, Dr. Eakin, the Vice President of student affairs and the Dean of students, and President Machtley will speak at the ceremony. Following the ceremony, everyone will go to the Bello Center for a celebratory dinner that will last approximately one hour.

ODK was established by student and faculty leaders at Washington and Lee University on December 2, 1914. ODK stresses leadership in 5 major areas: scholarship/academic excellence; athletics; journalism, speech, and mass media; creative and performing arts; and finally, campus or community service, social/religious activities, and campus government. Campus or Community Service, Social/Religious Activities, and Campus Government. In order to be nominated for ODK membership, students must demonstrate leadership in one of these five areas. Furthermore, there are five essential qualifications for ODK membership: exemplary character, responsible leadership and service in campus or community life, superior scholarship, genuine fellowship, and blessing to democratic ideals.

ODK started at Bryant University in 2005. The goals of the society, according to Faculty Secretary Rich Hurley, are "to recognize student, faculty, and staff leaders as well as individual and personal

Providence Mayor shares insights, experiences with sociology class

On Monday, October 18th, students in Professor Judith McDonnell's Sociology 385 class were provided the unique opportunity to listen to a talk from Mayor of Providence, David N. Cicilline.

The class is titled "The Sociological Imagination—What We See When We Watch TV" and a major component of the class includes watching the HBO series, "The Wire." The particular season that the class is watching focuses on the effect of politics on the city of Baltimore. One character which is developed throughout the season is Tommy Carcetti; the audience is exposed to his political struggle in trying to become Baltimore's mayor.

"We attempted to draw a parallel and make our classroom experience as real as possible by asking Mayor Cicilline to share some of the things he has experienced as Mayor of a capital city as diverse and unique as Providence" said senior Jose Batista.

Throughout his talk with the class, Mayor Cicilline—who won the mayoral race in 2002 by a landslide 84% of the vote and was reelected in 2006 by an 83% margin—discussed some of his major initiatives as mayor and how it affected the city. He was involved in encouraging Providence

schools to start an afterschool program for students and, since his tenure began, crime in the city has dropped significantly.

"He was a moving and inspiring speaker...I found him very insightful" Julie Kuchyt, a student in Professor McDonnell's class, said following the class visit. She was particularly moved by one story he told of a mother who called him very upset; her daughter was unhappy at her school and wanted to switch. He personally returned her call and assured her daughter that if she was still unhappy in the future that he would help her switch. Both students were intrigued by how closely Mayor Cicilline's experiences related to "The Wire."

In addition to having a great effect on students in the Sociology course, the mayor's visit is also significant for Bryant University as a whole. As Batista said, "Mayor Cicilline's visit to Bryant University is an example of the opportunities that become accessible when one embraces change." He applauded the great changes that have been brought about during President Machtley's tenure, such as the move to Division 1 athletics, innovative construction such as Hall 17 and the Interfaith center, and the liberal arts program.

"I think that this course in its entirety is a great example of the innovative work being

put forward by passionate professors such as Judy McDonnell" he said.

By bringing such a prominent political figurehead to the classroom, it can be concluded that professors at the University are dedicated to enhancing their students' educational experiences. Mayor

Cicilline gave Professor McDonnell's students the opportunity to embrace the concepts they have learned and see them applied to the everyday.

Mayor Cicilline is running for United States House of Representatives in District 1.

Current student and faculty members nominate students who they believe exemplify all the qualities of ODK. This past year, 102 juniors and 95 seniors were nominated. In order to be nominated, students had to meet specific requirements, such as being within the top 35% of their class. After the initial nomination process, 41 of the selected juniors and 30 seniors decided to apply for membership.

Current members were instructed to look over the applications and vote for the 20 juniors and 10 seniors that they believed would be best suited for ODK. However, this year there was a tie during the voting, and therefore, 22 juniors are being inducted rather than 20.

Rich Hurley stresses that ODK is not a student organi-

zation; its role is not to run campus-wide events. The society's focus is bringing

community members together to discuss topics and have proactive dialogue. Nevertheless, throughout the year ODK takes part in several service events and professional development events. The members meet once per month and the first meeting of the year took place on Sunday, October 17, 2010. At this meeting, David Greenan, a business professor at Bryant University, gave a lecture about the importance of teamwork and leadership.

The ODK President, Jed Haddad also explained one major event that ODK participated in last year and will host again this spring: the Cambridge Union debate. The Cambridge Union Society is a debating society from the University of Cambridge in England. Last year 4 members of the Cambridge Union and 4 Bryant ODK members participated in a debate about the role of technology in today's society. The ODK members worked with faculty

and staff for 6 weeks leading up to the debate to prepare their side of the argument. The debate was held at the Bello center and 100 community members came to watch.

The Cambridge Union Society holds this debate annually but last year was the first time that Bryant University participated; Jed expressed tremendous excitement about this year's debate which will be held sometime in late march or early April.

Jed proposed that what really sets ODK apart from other honor societies is the fact that the members are so diverse. ODK isn't just a group of honors students; there are athletes, artists, scholars, and many more. The students are from all different parts of campus life.

Finally, Rich Hurley would like to congratulate all the current ODK members for bringing in a class of in-

Reason for going:

I wanted to go to a country I'd never been to before with none of my friends. I wanted to be in surroundings that were extremely different than ours at Bryant. I wanted to go to a Spanish-speaking country to improve my Spanish and finish my minor. Why not Spain? I chose Seville, Spain because of the weather there. The southern province of Spain, Andalucía, has some of the nicest weather in the world.

Best experience/memory:

Going to a bullfight. This was an incredible experience. Bullfights consist of 6 bulls against 3 matadors. The matadors take turns as the bulls come out one by one. All 6 bulls are eventually killed and dragged out of the ring by horses. I was a little thrown back by the gore of the first bull killing. But after a couple bulls, I could see why bullfighting is such a cultural phenomenon in Spain.

Funny cultural experience:

Going to Carnivale in Cadiz, Spain. This was pretty much a giant Spanish version of Halloween. Millions of people dressed up in the greatest costumes, drinking in the streets and going nuts.

How was the school different from Bryant University?

La Universidad de Pablo de Olavide was nothing like Bryant. To start off, it was a 45 minute commute to get to campus - a 15 minute walk to the metro, 20 minutes on the metro, and then a 10 minute walk to class. The classes were larger in size, and very diverse. There were students from all across the globe studying abroad in Seville too.

Would you study abroad again given the opportunity?

I would absolutely study abroad again. I can't wait to go back to Seville. If there is a common regret I hear from people who have graduated it's that they didn't study abroad. I took that to heart, and I'm glad I went abroad. Everyone should go abroad if they get the chance.

Student Senate Speaks

Very often, Students at Bryant comment about how they are often unaware of what Student Senate is doing or what projects we're working on. This column is here to do just that, explain what Senate is up to, what projects are currently underway, and what to expect from them.

Senate has certainly hit the ground running this year. Having been back at school for roughly eight weeks, Senate has launched some of the most ambitious projects it has ever taken on in the history of the university.

The Executive Board, led by President Kristin Lede, announced last Wednesday that the Senate has officially started efforts on its annual overarching project. This year's main focus is to add student input and opinions to the university's goal of re-modeling and improving the Bryant Center.

The Executive Board and Senate Legislative Body together, will be running major efforts on campus to collect as many opinions and constructive criticism as possible regarding the initiative.

The type of feedback we are looking for is specifically regarding these five areas of the building: external foundations (exterior appearance, accessibility), information technology (media use, meeting reservations), student

space (meeting space, student recreation), architecture and design (themes, physical structure), and operations (staffing, overall service). Apart from receiving student advice, we are also investigating student unions from other colleges and universities which are both near to us and have similar student demographics.

Senate also has undergone a new internal restructuring in terms of its committee system. For managing student concerns and smaller issues, Senate has broken down into four major committees, Academic Affairs, chaired by Nick Mancuso (2012), Student Services, chaired by Billy Kehlaher (2012), Student Affairs chaired by Tom Robinson (2012), and Community Outreach and Public Relations, chaired by McCall Peltier (2013).

Every Senator has been allocated to one of these various committees so that major aspects of our University can be focused in on by a smaller group of Senators. Each committee was tasked with creating their own semester-long, year-long, and three-to-five year-long goal for where they would like to see their specific area of work at our university (e.g. Academics or Diversity) improved in the future.

In future articles we will be releasing these goals to the Bryant community, and any other specific projects that are being fulfilled by these committees.

All in all, Senate is headed in one of the best directions that it has ever been, as each Senator has taken on a complicated process centered on making this university a better place for all. Keep an eye out for what changes are going to start taking place around campus!

The Blackstone National Park NOW!

Did you know that the Blackstone River runs from Worcester, Massachusetts all the way to Providence, Rhode Island? Did you know that this entire area is the birthplace of the American Industrial Revolution? Have you ever traveled along the beautiful Blackstone Bike Paths or visited any of the historic mill villages right around the corner?

Whether you answered yes or no to these questions, the John H. Chafee Blackstone River Valley National Heritage Corridor (yes it is a mouthful) is in need of your

help. Since the 1980s this area has been protected under a temporary Congressional fund. However, Congress has made it clear that after October of 2011, NO MORE FUNDS WILL BE PROVIDED! All park rangers, tour guides, museum staff, river cleanup and bike path maintenance crews will be forced to shut down their operations, unless we step in to help. By making this area a permanent National Park, Congressional funds will continue to provide this area with the crucial support it needs to keep running like it has for the past 25 years.

This semester as a part of the Management 200 curricu-

lum, my teammates and I are determined to educate the residents of this historic area, including Bryant University, about why this area is so important and why it needs to be made into a "National Park NOW!" We are also collecting signatures from all faculty, staff, and students on our Massachusetts and Rhode Island petitions that will be sent to Congress along with the proposed plan for the making of the National Park with headquarters in Woonsocket, RI.

What can you do to help? We are NOT asking for monetary donations, just your support. Write a letter to your local representative(s) whether in California or Colorado or Rhode Island and express your concern for this area and why Congress needs to establish this park. Sign our petition. Over 130 students have already signed our petition and my teammates and I will be going around campus on numerous occasions throughout the rest of this semester. (Look for those dates coming in a future Archway!) Our goal is 1000+ signatures and you can help us get there.

After about two weeks on the job, the new bookstore manager, Patrick McKiernan, says that he is still getting his feet wet. McKiernan has been an employee of Follett, the company that owns the bookstore, since February, but he is still very new to the Bryant Community.

Originally from Massachusetts, he attended the Valley Forge Military Academy for two years, and graduated from Villanova. McKiernan says that his school has definitely influenced his business career by greatly improving his communication skills as well as in making day-to-day decisions.

After graduating from Villanova, McKiernan worked for Habitat for Humanity in procurement. Essentially, the job consisted of purchasing the supplies necessary to build the houses. This task was a huge responsibility because it involved "serious money," McKiernan says,

since he was responsible for around 104 houses during his time there. He also recognizes a world of difference between working for a non-profit organization and

The three major networks block Google TV

The three major broadcast networks, uneasy about viewers bypassing cable and satellite providers _ and the networks' own websites _ to watch their TV shows, have begun blocking a new service from Google Inc. that is designed to make it easy for people to watch program-

ming online.

ABC, CBS and NBC confirmed that this week they began blocking Google TV from accessing full-length episodes of prime-time shows such as "NCIS: Los Angeles," "Dancing With the Stars" and "Parks and Recreation," a move aimed at forestalling the technology giant's entry into the living room.

Google TV seeks to marry the Internet with television by allowing viewers to search the Web for shows and then

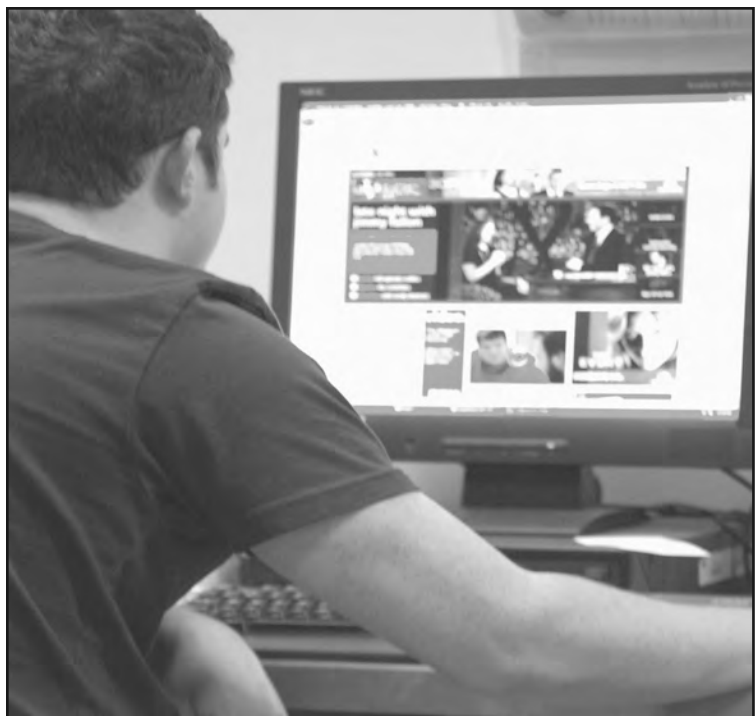
watch them on their TV sets. The technology is designed to make it easier for people to watch TV shows when they want, rather than be at the mercy of network schedules or sift through the Web to find shows on the networks' own websites.

But the networks worry that providing consumers with direct access _ via the Internet _ to popular shows would undercut the economics that support the industry. The networks fear, among other things, that Google TV could disrupt advertising and encourage people to discontinue their cable TV service. Cable providers pay billions in fees to carry the programming of the networks' co-owned cable channels.

Others have cited fears that Google TV would fuel piracy by letting viewers access bootleg streams of TV shows on the Internet.

"Google TV enables access to all the Web content you already get today on your phone and PC," Google said in a statement. "But it is ultimately the content owner's choice to restrict their fans from accessing their content on the platform."

Google continues to pursue talks with the networks. It also is in discussions with Hulu about bringing the Hulu Plus subscription service to the platform _ which would

SIFE Credit Craze: Advice on Student Loans

Many college students will graduate from college with student loans to pay off, however, often times they do not know how to handle the repayment of these loans effectively and can end up in serious debt. It is important to pay off any kind of loan as quickly as possible in order to

The faster you pay off your student loans, the better situation you will be in. Interest rates continue to rise and you will end up paying more money in interest down the line if you only pay back the minimum payment now. Even if you can only afford to pay the minimum monthly payment, it is better than falling behind on your payments and sending them in late. Late payments can affect your

avoid the accumulation of interest. There are several ways to do this, and many resources that are available to provide help as well.

An easy way to start paying off a student loan quicker is to pay more than the minimum amount each month. In order to do this, figure out how much extra money you can put toward the loan, and then send in an additional payment that goes directly toward the principal amount. Reducing the amount of principal will decrease the amount of interest that you owe.

If you feel that it is hard to pay more than the minimum amount, try getting a part-time job and saving a portion of the money you earn to put toward the loan. Cutting back on unnecessary expenses by selling your car for a less expensive used car is a good idea. Also, trying to rent a less expensive apartment would be a good alternative.

credit score, and in the extreme situation where a student loan is 270 days late or more you can be subject to wage garnishment and tax refund seizure.

The first step before applying for student loans is to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This can qualify you for grants, work-study, and other forms of student aid. A good federal loan to look at is the Federal PLUS Loan which is usually less expensive and has better repayment terms than most private loans.

There are many private loans to apply for, but the best private loans will have interest rates of LIBOR (London Interbank Offered Rate) +2.0% or PRIME -0.50% with no fees. There are plenty of resources and information available online and at your college to help you find out which loans are the best for you and the most effective way of paying them off.



give Google TV users access to full-length episodes of shows from ABC, Fox and NBC.

Forrester Research analyst James McQuivey said that blocking access to network shows on Google TV wouldn't prevent people from watching the shows online because simple workarounds, such as hooking up a laptop to the TV set, can accomplish the same thing.

"This doesn't stop people from watching online content on their televisions," McQuivey said. "It just frustrates them."

Some content providers have sought to work with Google. Time Warner Inc. plans to offer HBO Go _ which allows people who already pay for HBO on cable or satellite to watch shows online _ through Google TV.

Time Warner executives say cable operators historically have done a poor job helping viewers navigate hundreds of channels of TV shows or movies. Google TV could fill that niche by expeditiously producing a list of sites where viewers could see their favorite shows.

Johnny Cupcakes comes to Bryant

Johnny Cupcakes, the founder of a multi-million dollar clothing line, came to Bryant University on October 20, 2010 for a presentation sponsored by Bryant CEO.

Johnny was voted america's #1 Young Entrepreneur of 2008 by BusinessWeek magazine and now he lectures at colleges, high schools and other institutions around the world. At 7:30pm in Bryant University's Janikes Theater, Johnny talked about how to start and uphold a new business without startup money. He also answered questions from students eager to learn from a successful entrepreneur. In addition, Johnny Cupcakes apparel was sold at a discounted price outside of Janikes following the presentation.

Growing up, Johnny's parents worked tedious full-time jobs and it made him wonder: why do people do jobs that don't make them happy? Johnny decided at a young age that he would never take a job that he hated just to make money. Instead, he applied his creative ideas and determination to run his own small businesses: lemonade stands, yard sales, snow shoveling, candy and drink sales, and he even bought items form a joke shop's wholesale catalog to resell to his peers.

Unfortunately, some of these schemes got Johnny into trouble. For example, he was almost expelled from his high school when a student had an allergic reaction to the itching powder that he sold. Clearly, school wasn't always easy for Johnny, especially since he has a borderline learning disability, but that didn't stop him from graduating high school in 2000.

Upon graduating from high school, Johnny decided to give college a try. He attended the Art Institute of Boston, but somehow he knew that college wasn't the right place for him to be. He was always too distracted by all his new business ideas and he didn't fit in with the typical college party scene. As Johnny's peers went out partying and drinking, he saved his precious time and money, putting 110% of his efforts into all his business ideas. There were several ideas that Johnny pursued before finally turning to t-shirt designs. The first big business project that Johnny tried was button making. He bought a button maker off ebay for about \$130 and made custom pins to resell. He would sell his pins at shows and concerts, to bands and organizations. As the business grew, Johnny de-

cided to partner with a friend and eventually their customized pins made their way into the store that Johnny worked at, Newbury Comics. The two businessmen were making a few thousand dollars per month, but eventually, Johnny's partner lacked the ability to commit enough time to the business and it inevitably failed. However, Johnny assures us that this failure helped him learn about different business tactics for the future.

As Johnny continued working at his "real job" at Newbury Comics, coworkers started giving him random nicknames and of course, the nickname that stuck was "Johnny Cupcakes." This is what sparked Johnny's t-shirt business. Originally, Johnny printed a shirt that said Johnny Cupcakes and wore it to work, not intending to start

a business. However, so many people were interested in his t-shirt design and he finally agreed to get some more printed and sell them.

Most of Johnny's original t-shirt designs would poke fun at pop culture. For example, one phrase on a shirt is "make cupcakes not war." The Johnny Cupcakes logo pokes fun at tough guys who wear skull t-shirts; instead of a skull, Johnny made a design with a cupcake. Johnny stresses that creating a simple

iconic logo that is memorable to consumers is key to brand recognition. He explained that including less detail allows the logo to be easier to memorize.

After the Johnny Cupcakes t-shirt business started taking off, Johnny decided to take a huge risk and quit his job at Newbury Comics. He believed that it would be a better use of his time and money to put all his efforts into his t-shirt business. Unfortunately, at this time, Johnny didn't even have a location to sell his shirts so he had to set up personal meetings with his customers in order to make sales. A solution came quite quickly; Johnny was in a small band and they got signed to a record label. As his band toured, Johnny wore his t-shirts and other bands that he performed with started buying his shirts as

well. This brought tons of free publicity and viral marketing.

Johnny doesn't set aside much money for advertising his company. Instead, he relies mainly on word of mouth and free publicity. Also, he encourages other entrepreneurs to get involved in trade shows, where buyers, press, and magazines come from around the world. While tradeshow can get expensive, Johnny insists that "you have to spend money to make

money." His first trade show in Los Vegas allowed him to get his shirts in stores all over the world. He even received offers from companies such as Urban Outfitters, Nordstrom, and Barney's but he turned them down because he didn't want his unique business idea to turn into another fad.

Later on, Johnny pulled his shirts out of all the stores they were in and opened his own shop online. Johnny deduced that people are generally willing to spend more money online because it is convenient, people don't physically see the money leaving their wallets, and they buy more to take advantage of the shipping fees. Most importantly, people will post on social networking sites such as Facebook and Twitter about online shopping, which adds in more viral marketing.

Nevertheless, Johnny still had some business lessons to learn in order to succeed. Specifically, Johnny had to learn the importance of packaging his products. When he started running his online business, Johnny didn't have special packaging for his shirts, but all of that changed. He believes that packaging adds value to a product so he started selling his shirts in customized Johnny Cupcakes boxes, shaped like food boxes. After starting to develop his packaging techniques, Johnny moved on to focus on his company's location.

Johnny's first official store was a renovated boat garage. It was cheap – only \$700 per month – and because it was zoned commercially, it could be used as an office, a warehouse, for shipping, for an art show, or even for an actual store. However, looking back, Johnny realizes that this first location was not a very good decision for a shop. His next shop opened on Newbury Street in Boston, MA.

While the rent for this location was much more than his original shop, there was also more foot traffic and Johnny had big plans to make this store a success. The store was designed like a bakery, and it was certainly an expensive investment. Luckily, Johnny was right when he said "you have to spend money to make money" because there were over 400 customers on line for the grand opening of the Boston store. Over the course of that one day, Johnny made more than 3 months worth of rent and with that money he was able to hire his mother as the company's CFO.

Johnny's third major location opened on Melrose Avenue in Los Angeles, CA mid-day Saturday. The warm weather played a deciding factor in finally investing in

this location. Johnny spent 6 months building out this location, and although his budget was set at \$60,000, he ended up spending \$700,000 total. Why did he go so far over his budget? Well, Johnny values high quality and he won't cut corners to save money at his customers' expense. The major feature of this new location is a 10-12 foot giant oven display which turned into a secret entrance to the store's stockroom. In addition, the cash register was modeled after an oven – a visually appealing point of the store for customers.

Now that Johnny Cupcakes has various established locations, the company has room to experiment with new ideas. For example, a new store in London is expected to open on February 1, 2011. This will be Johnny Cupcakes' first international store, which will hopefully boost international internet sales all over the world.

While Johnny is eager to continue to allow his business to grow, he asserts that he will never franchise; he wants to keep things personal. All of the Johnny Cupcakes products are limited edition, which prevents them from turning into a fad and that is an ideal that Johnny prides himself on. He's had times when he thought the company would fail, but Johnny knows that being an entrepreneur is all about taking risks.

Last year Johnny Cupcakes made over \$4 million in sales. When asked about his goals for the future, the businessman said that he has enough ideas to last forever. Johnny has been in the t-shirt business for 10 years now and he doesn't see an end approaching. Some of Johnny's other plans include starting other clothing lines, opening restaurants, and writing children's books. Recently, Johnny Cupcakes had a tour around the United States; he made 31 stops in 6 weeks and made approximately \$250,000. This was a great chance for Johnny to meet some of his online customers and set up temporary stores in different states.

Johnny plans to put the revenue acquired from this tour toward his future store in London. Johnny Cupcakes truly cares about all his customers, and he tries to build positive relationships with them to maintain customer loyalty. Overall, Johnny is just an average guy with determination. He didn't have any special training or a higher level education; he just had a great idea and ran with it. That is what makes a true entrepreneur successful.

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There is an ironman among us

Matt Galluzzo stands at five feet six inches tall and weighs about 150 pounds—with his backpack on, filled with books, standing in the rain. Not very intimidating at first glance. But those close to Galluzzo know it is a much different story. Matt Galluzzo, a Londonderry, New Hampshire native, they will tell you, is an Ironman.

What qualifies this skinny twenty-one year old finance major as an Ironman? The four Boston marathons that he has run and the seven straight years he has bicycled across the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in one week-end to raise money for cancer are not what certifies him as an Ironman.

Galluzzo is an Ironman because he completed an Ironman distance triathlon, one of the most challenging athletic endeavors known to man. An Ironman triathlon consists of a short swim of 2.4 miles, a Sunday stroll on a bicycle for 112 miles, and a leisurely marathon distance run of 26.2 miles. The total distance traveled is 140.6 miles, almost the same distance between Boston and New York City.

It took Galluzzo 10:46 of continuous exercising to complete Ironman Florida last year in his first attempt. In November, he is going back for his second time. This year, he is going in with more experience, more confidence, and more speed.

So on the morning of November 6th in Panama Beach,

Florida, Galluzzo will stand on the sand looking out onto the water of the Gulf of Mexico waiting for the announcer to start the race. Many thoughts and concerns will be running through his swim cap covered head. "Did I take in enough calories? Did I focus enough on the swim? What about my transitions? Is my bike fine-tuned? Can I make it through the grueling marathon?" He'll settle down those thoughts, though, just like he always does.

"Standing at the start of every race I've ever done— a marathon, Ironman, or a local 5K— I've had my doubts and concerns. Then I push those thoughts out of my head and think about my preparation," Galluzzo said after a recent four hour cycling session.

"I always think back to my training. The hundreds of miles I've spent running on various trails through the woods, the time on the bike that can be measured in total days and not just total hours, and more early mornings in the freezing cold water at the pool than I like to think about. When I think about all that I know I'm ready."

Galluzzo's accomplishment last year in Florida was the most difficult thing he has ever done. "It is a long day out there, and eventually your body shuts down. The challenging part is getting your body to keep moving, one step at a time, even when it keeps saying no."

In his first Ironman, he was naïve and didn't know what to expect. After one under his

belt, Galluzzo has much more confidence. He is coming off a successful summer of racing in half-ironman distance races to prepare his body for the demands of the full Ironman.

"This summer I have been putting up the fastest times of my life. My training has been great, and I know what I have to do in Florida: just keep going until I get to the end," he said.

Galluzzo participated in his first triathlon when he was 17 after his friend urged him to come along and try it with him. He has been hooked ever since.

"This sport is so addicting. I am honestly obsessed with it. It never gets boring or tedious like other sports. Managing training for three different sports is the fun

part, because if you don't want to swim one day, you can bike or run instead and vice versa."

His obsession explains why he continues to pursue the Ironman competitions. He has to make many sacrifices—early mornings at the pool,

missed parties, missed family gatherings, lack of social life, but it is that feeling of crossing the finish line that keeps him coming back for more.

"Crossing the finish line, every single time, makes all of the pain and sacrifice worth it. When the announcer said 'Matt Galluzzo, you are an Ironman' last year I felt like I was dreaming. I can't wait to hear it again this year. Nothing compares with that feeling," he said.

While many people don't consider exercising for over ten hours straight to be fun, Galluzzo does. Yet Matt Galluzzo is not your average twenty-one year old Bryant University student. He is far from it - he is an Ironman.

First Team All-New England by the NEIBA and took part in the New England All-

Star game at Fenway Park.

English started 48 games in right field as a junior last season, hitting .335 with 56 hits and driving in 21 runs. The Windsor Locks, Conn. native had 14 multi-hit games last spring including a four-hit performance at Virginia Tech. Defensively, English recorded 97 putouts and five assists in right field, finishing the season with a .991 fielding percentage.

To no one's dismay, Denny Hamlin (#11) was the fastest man in Friday's qualifying session. The rest of the top 10 qualifiers were: Marcos Ambrose (#47), Greg Biffle (#16), Ryan Newman (#39), Juan Montoya (#42), Tony Stewart (#14), Carl Edwards (#99), David Reutimann (#00), Jamie McMurray (#1), and David Ragan (#6).

Hamlin brought the field to the green flag, with Ambrose on the outside of the front row; on lap 11, Ambrose went around Hamlin for the lead. Hamlin dropped back to 12th by lap 32, with what looked like a serious problem with the car. The first caution of the day came out on lap 47 when Travis Kvapil blew a tire, spun and hit the wall. Caution flag pit stops cycled through, with Ryan Newman becoming the leader and bringing the field to the restart on lap 53. Newman would get passed in turn 1 by Jeff Burton (#31) on lap 82.

After restarting 15th, Hamlin was in the top 5 by lap 104.

Elliott Sadler (#19) spun out in turn 2, and was penalized for stopping on the track and intentionally bringing out the caution on lap 111. Another set of yellow flag pit stops cycled through, with Burton restarting as the leader on lap 116. Three short laps later, on lap 119, contact between Jimmie Johnson (#48) and Ambrose blew out Ambrose's tire, which caused him to spin out and hit the wall. On lap 132, Ken Schrader (#26) got tapped from behind by Casey Mears (#13) and spun on the backstretch, which brought out the 4th caution of the day.

The rest of the race consisted of numerous cautions, and as the saying goes, "cautions breed cautions." Martin Truex Jr. (#56) lost power in his car and couldn't make it to pit road, and brought out the 5th caution on lap 170. On lap 185, contact between Sam Hornish Jr. (#77) and Scott Speed (#82) would send Regan Smith (#78) into the wall, which brought out the 6th caution. Allmendinger (#43), Mark Martin (#5) was sent spinning and ended up with severe damage to the rear of the car. During this exchange

The race restarted on lap 293, with Jr. still in the lead. The 12th caution came out on lap 348 for Biffle's tire blowing out, causing him to spin. Hornish Jr. had his fair share

of problems on the day; on lap 358, he spun and hit the wall causing serious damage to bring out the 13th caution. Kevin Harvick (#29) passed Jr. for the lead in turn one on lap 378. The battle for 12th place got heated up between Gordon and Kurt Busch (#2) on lap 384 which brought out the 13th caution; Gordon tapped Busch and passed him, and a half a lap later, Busch sent Gordon spinning across the track and his car slammed the pit wall. The last caution came out on lap 397 for Tony Raines (#34); he was unable to get to pit road and was stopped in turn 4.

Kevin Harvick restarted as the leader on lap 402; Hamlin passed him on lap 471, with

29 laps to go and never looked back. This was Hamlin's third win in a row at Martinsville; his fourth overall at the track, and he leads other drivers with 7 wins in the 2010 season. In only 183 starts, Hamlin has 15 victories; 11 of them have come in the past 48 races.

Hamlin had told the media, throughout the weekend, that he would be victor of Sunday's race; Mission Accomplished. He gained 35 points on Jimmie Johnson, and sits only 6 points out of the points lead. Next weekend the Cup circuit heads to Talladega, Alabama and the wildcard race in the chase, where one mistake could make all the difference.

NFL contemplates new rule

After this past Sunday's amount of helmet to helmet hits in the NFL, the majority of analysts and league officials believe that a change in policy is on the horizon. While the NFL has imposed stricter policies for helmet to helmet contact after new data on the effects of concussions surfaced in recent years, the frequency of this form of contact has not significantly declined.

On Sunday, former NFL linebacker Rodney Harrison made a comment that has deeply resonated with league officials. After being asked what the league should do about the recurring issue of helmet to helmet contact, Harrison used his personal experience to answer the question. He claimed that the only punishment that got his attention when he was a player was a suspension. He went on to explain that players in today's game have such high salaries that fines are not effective in deterring them from making illegal hits.

While there have not been any definitive changes in policy yet, NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell has told the media that he plans to reevaluate the League's policies and

punishments related to helmet to helmet contact. While it is understandable that there is a bevy of controversy surrounding these vicious hits, this reevaluation of League policies should not, in any way, portray players as trying to inflict permanent harm on one another. The notion that any player is trying to inflict permanent harm on another player is completely false.

There is a line between competition and maliciousness, and the players know that. While there are certainly

going to be harsher punishments put in place for illegal contact in the NFL, it would be a shame to let these accidental hits appear like purposeful violence in the media.

We complain when players are not entertaining, so we cannot persecute them when they are trying their best to make plays. In most instances, when a player suffers a helmet to helmet hit, the last player to leave his side is the player that made the hit. That speaks volumes to the intent of NFL players.

...World's most expensive stadiums to build

10. ANZ Stadium, \$624 million

This stadium was opened in 2000 as the primary stadium for the 200 Olympics in Sydney, Australia. It has a capacity of 83,500. Since the Olympics, the stadium has been remodeled to function as Australia's premier rugby and football venue.

9. Lucas Oil Stadium, \$675 million

Lucas Oil Stadium opened in the summer of 2008 as the new home of the Indianapolis Colts. The stadium has a capacity of 63,000. It is slated to host the Super Bowl in 2012.

8. Soldier Field, \$714 million

This stadium originally opened in 1923. In 1971, it became the official home to the Chicago Bears. The stadium underwent major renovations in 2003 and now has a capacity of 66,000.

7. The Emirates, \$770 million

London, England celebrated the opening of this stadium in 2006. With seats for 60,000 this stadium holds concerts and is the home stadium to Arsenal Football Club, one of the world's most valuable soccer teams.

6. Rogers Centre, \$930 million

This stadium was opened in Toronto, Canada in 1989 with a capacity of 50,000. It is the home of the Toronto Blue Jays and the Canadian Football League's Argonauts. In 2008, the Buffalo Bills established the centre as their "second home."

5. Stade de France, \$974 million

Stade de France was built for the 1998 World Cup and hosted that year's final match between France and Brazil. The stadium has a capacity of 80,000 and now is used mainly for soccer, rugby, and concerts.

4. Madison Square Garden, \$1.1 billion

Located directly above Penn Station, the Garden was opened in 1968. It has a capacity of 18,200. It is home to the New York Knicks and Rangers. It is also famous for the concerts it has hosted over the years from Jay-Z to Billy Joel.

3. Yankee Stadium II, \$1.3 billion

The new Yankee Stadium opened in 2009 after three years of construction. The stadium has a capacity of 51,800. The stadium was specifically designed to retain the history and "magic" of the original Yankee Stadium. In their first season in the stadium, the Yankees won their 27th World Championship.

2. Olypmic Stadium, \$1.4 billion

Olympic Stadium was built in Montreal, Canada for the 1976 Olympic games. During the Olympics, the 60,000 seat stadium was used for baseball and football. The stadium also was the home of the Montreal Expos until they became the Washington Nationals in 2004.

The dangers of Four Lokos

We all know that most responsible adults lecture college students about the dangers of alcohol abuse, and most of the time, their warnings are not taken seriously. How much harm has a few drinks done to anyone? However, the new popular drink for college students has really stirred up some controversy in the news today.

The drink in question, Four Loko, has an alcohol content of 12% per 23.5 oz can in the US market. While this alcohol content alone – the equivalence of approximately 4 beers – should raise a red flag for potential buyers, the real issue at hand is the fact that this alcohol is combined with high levels of caffeine, taurine, and guarana. (These four main ingredients served as the inspiration for the drink's name: Four Loko.)

Basically, Four Loko is an alcoholic energy drink that has recently been deemed "Liquid Cocaine" by CBS News. Due to the well-known fact that alcohol and caffeine are dangerous when mixed, Phusion Projects, the producer of Four Loko, has undergone several investigations by the FDA and the safety of the company's product is questionable. Furthermore, the marketing practices used to sell the product are also under investigation. Many claim that the company does not warn customers of the dangers of mixing alcohol and caffeine; however, Phusion Projects assures us that their drinks contain a "safe balance" of these ingredients.

Overall, this product poses a serious threat to public health, especially when college students are overdrinking to begin with. In fact, many colleges have gone so far as to ban Four Lokos from their campuses. This decision was made following an incident involving 23 intoxicated students being hospitalized in the span of only a few weeks. Apparently, for school administrators, the fear of Four Lokos

and similar drinks stems from the fact that they are so easily accessible to underage drinkers and because they "go down easy," it's hard to realize when a person drank too much, putting his health in serious danger.

ous that some action needs to be taken to stop Phusion Projects and other companies from producing these alcoholic energy drinks, I can see why there is so much controversy surrounding the issue.

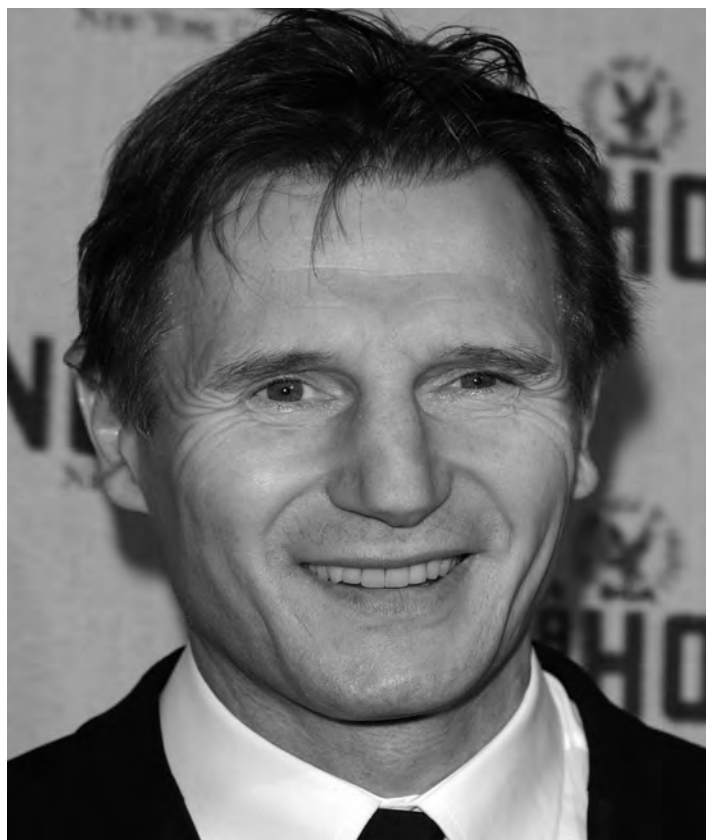
scenes story, giving you a glimpse into the ladies' lives amidst all the turmoil, frustration, misunderstanding, and eventual rebuilding from one simple comment made by just one of their members—a comment that, unfortunately, has come to define them even more than their incredible music has. I recommend you see this movie to challenge not only your own assumptions about free speech, but also your perceptions of controversial celebrities.

3.) *The Visitor* (2008) While this film received much critical acclaim and awards-season buzz a couple of years ago, nothing really came of it. It is too bad, as this quiet,

powerful movie deserves to be seen by many. While it is political at heart—telling the story of a lonely older man who befriends two immigrants and takes them into his home and his life—it remains mostly non-partisan, letting you feel for the characters and make your own decision. In the lead role, Rhode Island actor Richard Jenkins (remember him as the dad in "Step Brothers"?!) gives a moving performance that unjustly lost out on a Best Actor Oscar.

4.) *Les Miserables* (1998) Did you know Liam Neeson, Uma Thurman, and Claire Danes starred in an adaptation of Victor Hugo's beloved classic novel? I certainly did not, up until a few years ago. But this under-appreciated movie holds true to the spirit of the original tale, even if it is drastically condensed. Full of betrayal, adventure, heartbreak, and redemption, this timeless story is made most intriguing thanks to a slew of compelling performances. 5.) *Big Trouble* (2002) A complete box-office bomb, this underrated, and wildly hilarious film from the director of *Men in Black* cost \$40 million to produce and grossed less than \$8 million. Fortunately, that means you can find it very cheaply on

Secretariat tells the true story of the racehorse that won the Triple Crown in 1973. When Penny Chenery (Diane Lane) inherits her father's farm after her mother's death, she has some tough decisions to make, including what to do with her family's horse farm estate.

With her father's health also deteriorating, Penny is in conflict with her inner emotions regarding her father's horseracing background as well as the lessons he taught her about life and what matters the most within it. As she is amidst her cognitive whirlwind, a foal is born on the farm that promises much potential.

In an astounding turn of events, however, Secretariat wins The Kentucky Derby and The Preakness Stakes, and causes an outstanding upset at The Belmont Stakes by not only winning, but win-

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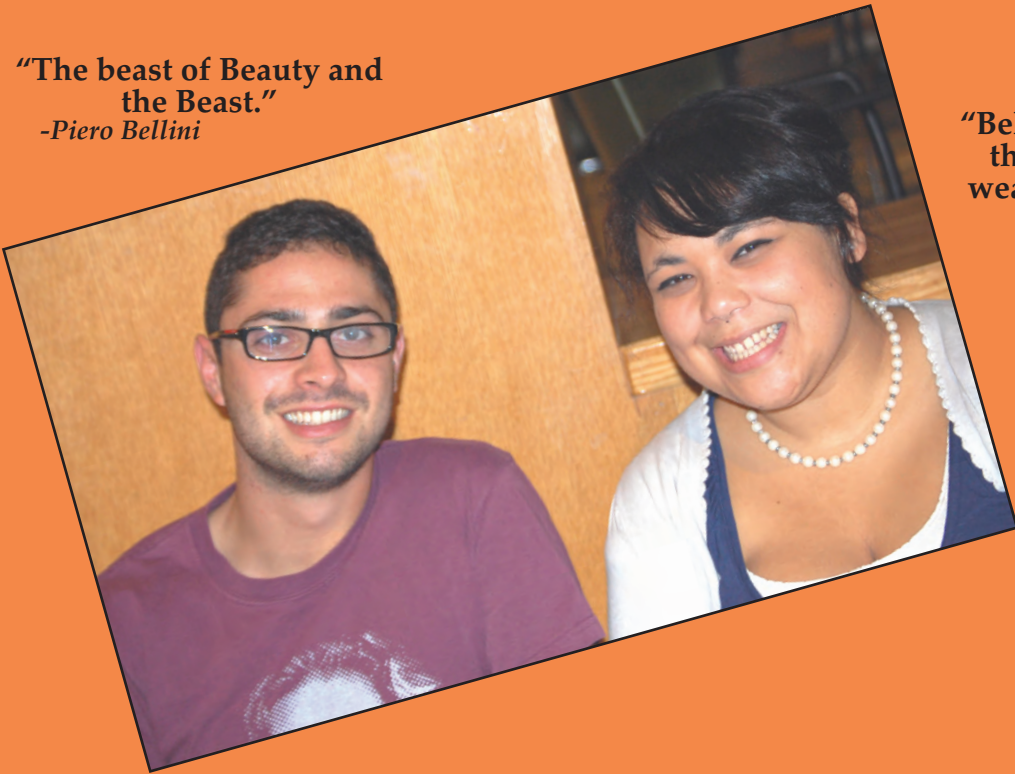
