Bryant's annual Up 'til Dawn

Tragedy is an unfortunate part of life that we will all have to go through at some point. What differentiates us from each other is how we choose to respond to tragedy. Yes, there will be some sort of denial stage that we go through, but then we have the choice to dwell in denial or accept it for what it is and move on.

This is especially true for the patients at the St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital. Every one of these children has been diagnosed with can-cer, but rather than give in to it, they fight every day to take back their lives. Since St. Jude has opened, the survival rate has increased from 4% to 94% in just a mere half century. Without the generous donations of thousands world-wide, it wouldn't be possible for the staff to conduct their research and treat these chil-

dren free of charge.

Up 'til Dawn is a studentled, student run fundraiser that is held on college campuses nationwide to raise funds for St. Jude's. Students stay up until dawn sending out letters asking for donations to help these cancer-stricken children.

Up 'till Dawn started on the Bryant campus three years ago by Amanda Mackay and since then has raised \$55,000, raising \$25,000 of that last year alone! This year they hope to raise even more, but contributions from the Bryant community are essential to their success. Participating in Up 'til Dawn is easy: gather 50 addresses of potential donors (twenty-five to get into the event) and address them on an envelope and you're done. By addressing an envelope you have possibly saved a child's life and very few people can say that.

This year, Colleges Against Cancer and Greek Life have teamed up to make this the best Up 'fil Dawn event yet.

Search for permanent College of Business dean continues

On June 30, 2010, Jack Trifts, the dean of the College of Business at Bryant University, officially resigned. Trifts was the first appointed dean of the College of Business and he served this position for 5 years. He was very well-liked and an excellent dean but he and an excellent dean, but he also loved teaching. When his contract was up, Trifts decided to return to the finance

department as a professor. Since July 1, Carol Demoranville, a former professor of marketing, has been serving as the interim dean of the College of Business. Demoranville is not directly involved in the search for the new permanent dean, but she has knowledge about the ongoing process. According to Demoranville, a search committee was put together this past summer, which is responsible for finding potential applicants, evaluating them, and conducting interviews. Demoranville will continue serving as the interim dean until the new dean is ap-

The search committee on campus is made up of faculty and students. The committee is also working with a search firm, which is typical at highlevel positions. The principal of the firm has a lot of contacts in acc. tacts in aca-

demia, so he can put out inquiries about the open position at Bryant to people who he thinks would be interested.

In addition, announcements have been put out in The Chronicle of Higher Education which describes the position available. In order to apply, prospective candidates must go through the search firm. The firm will make the first pass through resumes and applications and then forward the best candidates to the search committee. Next, the committee has phone interviews with the candidates

and selects the best out of that group of people to invite to campus for in-person interviews.

According to Demoranville, at this point in time, the search committee has received the names of accept-able applicants from the search firm and they are in the process of scheduling phone interviews, which will take place in November. If

Unfortunately, the applicants for dean are confidential at this point, but when campus-wide interviews begin, there will be more information regarding potential candidates and the decision process.

Business include supervising the activities of the faculty and participating in the strategic planning process of Bryant University. Demoranville is currently deep into this planning process. She explained that the goal is to find out how Bryant needs to out how Bryant needs to adapt to a changing market-place, decide how to provide quality education, and most importantly, figure out what students will need in the future. Demoranville believes she was selected as the interim dean due to her experience with managing a business. She is also knowledgeable about accreditation and assurance of learning, which are two vital aspects of

Furthermore, Demoranville worked closely with the former dean, so she knew a lot about current projects. One thing that Demoranville enjoys about this temporary position is, "you never know what the day's going to bring; there's always something new that comes up."

Demoranville and Bryant administration are currently working on two major projects. The first is a research day that will tentatively take place this spring on April 20. The day is all about celebrating academic excellence at Bryant by allowing faculty and students to present research they are working on.

could present research regarding their honors thesis, international business, or MBA consulting projects. Student organizations are also encouraged to get involved in the event. Classes will be cancelled for the day so that all students have the opportunity to participate and observe. A committee made up of 2 faculty members from the School of Business, 2 faculty members from the School of Arts & Sciences, 2 people from Student Affairs, 1 from Academic Advising, and 2 students selected by the faculty senate are working on this event. The committee is also considering handing out awards for categories such as best faculty paper, best student paper, and best presentation of the day.

The next major project is between Academic Affairs and Student Affairs to set up a business incubator on campus. Demoranville explained, "we make students at Bryant come up with [business] ideas starting in their Business101 classes [during freshman year]" so it is important to provide them with the tools they need to get their businesses started. Currently, they are working on finding space on campus for students to work. By the end of this semester or the beginning of next semester, everything should be ready to start setting up the incubator.

'Ways and Means' to get money for your club

The Ways and Means Committee is a subcommittee of the Student Senate, which is chaired by the Senate Treasurer, Aaron Fortin '11. The committee is comprised of six senators and six general stu-dents, as well as the Director of the Center for Student Involvement, John Lindsay, and the Budget Coordinator, Dar-lene Weiss. The six senators on this year's committee include Angela Marchio '11, Luke Stankiewicz '11, Alexandra Geer '12, Joshua Grolman '12, Alex Barbosa '13 and Garrett Kistler '14. The six general Bryant students include Derek Castello '11, Maria Fontana '12, William (Brian) Gowen '13, Eric Hyland '11, Whitney Schwarz '11 and Ashley Trautner '13.

The Ways and Means Committee hears Requests for Additional Funding, which are one time, nonrecurring requests for things that were unable to be budgeted for in the previous year's budgeting cycle. When a club or organization comes forward with a request, they first discuss it with the Senate Treasurer. Following the submission of the request to the Treasurer, the request is brought forward to the committee. During the hearing, the club

representatives present their proposal to the committee, and the committee asks clarifying questions in order to better understand their request.

The committee deliberates and comes forward with a recommendation to the Senate. If the request is less than \$1000, the committee decision stands. If it is over the \$1000 amount, the recommendation is brought before the Senate for final approval. At the meeting, the Senate can choose to fund the whole proposal or just part of it. They cannot allow more money than was requested, however as an appeals board, they can allocate more money than Ways and Means recommended.

In the past, the Ways and Means Committee has funded conferences, community service trips to Peru, jersey's for the hockey team, and buses for senior week, among other things. Watch original, student-made films at the Bulldog Film Festival

On Tuesday, November 9th, SASS is hosting the 3rd annual Bulldog Film Festival. The event will be in Janikes Theater from 7pm to 9pm. A reception will be held outside the theater following the festival in addition to a short Q & A session with the winning direc-

tors. Each year there are typically over 50 film submissions from Bryant University and other colleges in the New England area. The three faculty members in charge of narrowing down the submissions are Tom Roach, Tom Dooley, and Elizabeth Walden. At the upcoming festival, 19 films will be shown, 3 of which are from Bryant University students.

This year will be different than they past because a spe-cial Best Bryant film prize will be awarded in addition to the usual top 3 audience selected films and the winning film selected by the jury. The 16 films for this year's festival come from the Massachusetts School of Art, Rhode Island School of Design (RISD), Boston iac University Rhode Island Col-

lege, Providence College, and Bryant University. One film that the faculty members are excited to present this year is called Modern Alchemy, which is directed by a student from Boston University.

In the past, the Bulldog Film Festival has been run in conjunction with the Bryant University Department of communication and the Bryant Literary Review but this year, the three major staff members are in charge along with an elite SASS committee: Cory Beaudoin, Trevor Dumont, and Angela Marchio. There are certain criteria for the film submissions for the festival. Films can be a maximum of ten minutes long (no minimum) and the competition is open to undergrad and graduate students who have short films in the following

categories: narrative films, documentaries, animation, experimental, art films, and music videos.

At last year's Bulldog Film Festival, the audience award and the judge's award went to Mind the Gap, directed by Kristal Williams-Rowley from Boston University. According to Cory, one of the SASS committee members working on the Bulldog Film Festival, Kristal's

film was "about the daughter of a train conductor in Boston who stalked the victims of train accidents." In addition, the two other films selected by the audience were Meatwaffle and Wall Pets.

Usually about 100 people come to watch the Bulldog Film Festival. It is open to Bryant University students, students from regional schools, faculty and staff, and the general community. There is no entrance fee for the festival and additionally, there is no charge to watch the event.

Last year, audience members included students from RISD, Johnson & Wales, Providence College, and of course, Bryant University. SASS's Bulldog Film Festival is an excellent opportunity for students to view

unique films from their peers and Cory assures us, "we are very glad to have the support from the Communications Department and Literary Studies Department to make this happen."

The Community Service Office says 'We can help you help others'

If students want to get involved and help others, they should visit the Community Service Office. The organization's goal is to utilize the Bryant community Service Exchange (BCSE), a database that allows students to search for community service opportunities available that appeal to them.

The BCSE website, which can be accessed through BlackBoard, was established by Bryant SIFE in 2008 and since then, the efforts have been joined by the Service Leaders in the Community Service Office. The office is located on the third floor of the Bryant Center and it is staffed by a Community Service Leader during the following times: Monday 9:30-12:00pm, Tuesday 11:00-1:45 pm, Wednesday 11:00-1:30pm, Thursday 12:30-1:45pm, and Friday 10:00-1:30pm.

The Community Service Office Coordinator is Connie Cabello and the Service Leaders are Angela Marchio and Natalie Donoyan. Angela focuses on the BCSE website, which is a resource that should be utilized by all students on campus. She also works directly with SIFE to update service opportunities advertised to students in the website. In addition, Angela is working on selecting a service "theme" for each month of the year. For example, during October service opportunities were focused on organizations for kids; November will

work mainly with food pantries and food drives; the tentative theme for December is helping the elderly during the holiday season.

Natalie is in charge of planning community service events, organizing them, and spreading the word through the use of emails and flyers. Natalie's first

To lead up to the event, Natalie had people sign up through Bryant, ordered buses to provide transportation to and from the walk, and advertised the event through Facebook and Twitter. Recently, Connie, Angela, and Natalie worked on reforming the Community Service Office mission statement. In the old version, there was no mention of having "service leaders" and that is a major focus of the new mission statement. Angela and Natalie both agree that it is important people know they have service leaders act as liaisons to help people find what works best for them.

Furthermore, the new mission statement contains three specific learning outcomes for participants: to engage in valuable life experiences, learn about challenges of citi-

zenship, and develop skills to become socially responsible citizens. Connie, Angela, and Natalie are also working on perfecting their community service tracking system at Bryant. They want to get all clubs and organizations to track hours for community service so Bryant can show others what we are all doing to help the community.

Unfortunately, many students on campus are still hesitant about recording the community service they perform. A lot of students don't track their community service hours because they believe the work should be selfless. However, according to Angela, "It's ok to get something out of the opportunity." 

I had al-

ways wanted to study abroad and felt London would be the perfect place to experience a new culture in a city atmosphere. I knew by studying in London for a semester I would not only be able to become familiar with English customs but also travel around Europe fairly easily and gain exposure to several other cultures.

Best experience/memory:

My best experience included my spring break where I was able to travel to several places in Europe including Barcelona, Spain, and the island of Crete in Greece. In Barcelona I was able to experience a city that hardly ever sleeps and got to relax in the tropical atmosphere, which was a nice change from the dreary London

weather. Traveling to a resort on the island of Crete where my friends and I were able to get an all-inclusive bargain for five nights and enjoy the warm weather and view of the Mediterranean Sea was another great memory. To be able to take a break from schoolwork and tour Europe for a couple of weeks was one of the top highlights of my study abroad experience.

Funny cultural experience:

When I first moved into my apartment close to the center of London, I looked out of my fourth story window and about a block away I saw the McDonald's golden arch sign and a Tex-

aco gas station next to one another. It was funny and ironic to see both of these institutions almost directly across the street from me when I was expecting a total change from America. It was nice however, to get a late night McFlurry once in a while to remind me of home.

How was the school different from Bryant University?

My school was different from Bryant University mainly in terms of class structure and grading. Classes met once a week and included both a lecture and seminar section. Each section was taught by a different professor and the average amount of time for each class was roughly two hours. The grading system was also different even though the scale was from one to one hundred. A grade of seventy or above is considered an "A" but it is rare that a student ever receives a grade close to one hundred. This is because an assignment deserving a grade close to one hundred is considered publishable work and the student should possibly be teaching the class instead of taking it.

Would you study abroad again given the opportunity?

I would definitely study abroad again if I had the opportunity. It is something I feel every college student should get to experience. By studying abroad you learn you are capable of doing and building upon many things such as your ability to be independent, adaptive, and confident in your decision making.

As the economy struggles through a slow recession, politicians and business lead-ers are scrambling to find ways to restore the confidence of the American consumer. There is trepidation when it comes to federal stimulus

More troubling than this overall poor grade is the D minus in both drinking water and roads. Imagine how serious a problem this could become, from cars breaking down because there were just too many potholes to constant cases of E. coli arising from contaminated water supplies.

As dreary as this future sounds, there is opportunity

much room for growth. President Obama recently announced a plan for \$50 billion in spending for roads, rail-roads and airports. If it makes its way through Congress it would indeed be a start, but the American Society of Civil Engineers estimated in 2009 that it would take approximately \$2.2 trillion to bring the infrastructure to a sustainable level.

The unemployment rate is high, and there are projects that need to be done which require significant manpower. Separately, these can look like a disaster; together, they can be each other's savior.

Sophomore running back Jordan Brown (Glastonbury, Conn.) rushed for a careerhigh 200 yards on 38 carries and scored two touchdowns to lead Bryant University to a 24-7 win over visiting University at Albany on a blustery and cool afternoon before 3.756 on Parents & Family Weekend Saturday at Bulldog Stadium.

Riffe broke Andrew McLarty's 2006 singleseason tackles record of 86, with 12 stops Saturday against Albany to give him 90 for the season and at the same time, passing McLarty's career record of 229 tackles with an all-time best of 231

Riffe had three tackles for a loss and two of the team's five sacks as the Bulldogs' held the Great Danes to only 112 yards rushing on the ground and only 3-of-15 third-down con-


versions in the game. Buddy Leathley finished the day completing 13 of 29 passes for 179 yards for Albany (3-5, 1-4), but the red-shirt freshman was intercepted twice, both coming in the fourth quarter as the Bulldogs pulled away late to improve to 5-3 overall on the year and 2-3 in the Northeast Conference. Leathley also led the Great Danes with 68

yards rushing.
Brown's 41-yard touchdown run in the first quarter put the Bulldogs up 7-0 in the first. After Albany came back to tie the game with a score at the start of the second, Brown put the Bulldogs back on top with what would prove to be the game-winning score from a yard out just before halftime and the Bulldogs would pull away late in the game to improve to 5-3 overall (2-3

Place kicker Chris Bird (Monument Beach, Mass.) gave the Bulldogs some breathing room with a clutch 38-yard field goal at the end of the third quarter to make the score 17-7 heading into the fourth quarter.

The field goal by Bird equaled the third-longest field goal in school history and helped the senior move into fourth all-time for points in a season with 60 this year. Leading 17-7, the Bulldogs caught a break when Albany's Herb Glass missed a 36-yard field goal attempt to the right which would have pulled the visitors to within a touchdown from tying the game.

It was the second miss of the game for Glass who

Bryant will travel to Saint Francis (PA) this Saturday for a 1 pm game while Albany visits Sacred Heart next week





Riffe was one of eleven players who were named honorable-mention national linebacker of the week.

Brown averaged 5.3 yards per touch while rushing 38 times for a career-high 200 yards in a 24-7 win over Albany. Brown's performance marks the seventh game he has run for more than 100 yards and is on pace to rush for more than 1,400 yards in the season. He leads the Northeast Conference in rushing yards per game (130.5), points per game (10.5), allpurpose yards per game (189.2) and he is tied for first in rushing touchdowns with 11 through the first eight

Riffe is coming off a twelve tackle performance against the Great Danes. Riffe recorded three tackles for a loss including two sacks for 12 yards. With his 12 stops, Riffe set the single season tackle record for Bryant and is now first all-time in career tackles. The senior linebacker has a team-high 90 tackles on

the season (48 solo, 42 assisted) and leads the unit in tackles for a loss with 14 for 65 yards. Riffe is currently sixth in the conference in tackles and third in the league in sacks. The Massachusetts native is third in the NEC in tackles per game (11.2), first in sacks (7.0) and first in tackles for a loss per game (1.44). A member of the field

A member of the field hockey team was also recognized this week. The late-season surge of freshman Olivia Jankins (West Brookfield, Mass.) hasn't gone unnoticed by those outside the Bryant field hockey program, and that point was made clear by the Northeast Conference Monday afternoon, as Jankins earned her second-career rookie of the week selection for leading the Bulldogs on a 2-0 week.

Jankins collected five points to lead the Bulldogs (8-11, 5-2 NEC), who clinched their first-ever Northeast Conference playoff berth with Friday's 4-2 win over Quinnipiac at home. The freshman midfielder had a hand in four of Bryant's seven goals on the two-win week, helping the program secure its first post-season appearance since transitioning to the Division I level. The Bulldogs will be the No. 3 seed in this weekend's NEC Tournament.

Collecting her second NEC Rookie of the Week award in the last three weeks, Jankins served up a pair of assists in the playoff-clinching win Friday, twice helping the Bulldogs battle back from a one-goal deficit.

Jankins then delivered a goal and a key assist in Bryant's 3-2 double-overtime triumph over Sacred Heart Sunday afternoon on the road in the regular-season finale. The rookie scored off a penalty corner in 61st minute to put the Bulldogs up, 2-1, and delivered again in double-overtime, dishing out the game-winning assist with a cross to teammate Elise Boissoneau in the 99th minute to break a 2-2 deadlock with just 1:48 to play before the game went to a shootout.

10. Lindsey Hudspeth, Women's Basketball

Hudspeth is just one of two seniors on this year's very young Bulldog team. Hudspeth appeared in 28 out of the Bulldogs' 29 games last season, coming in off the bench. She made 23 of 69 three point attempts good for a 33.3 percent shooting average on the year. Hudspeth averaged 3.5 points and 1.5 rebounds last season and will have to step up as a leader for the team this year.

9. Taylor DeBever, Women's Swimming

DeBever is a freshman hailing from Denver, Colorado. In the team's loss to Maine, DeBever took first place in three events, the 200 yard free, the 500 yard free, and she broke a pool record in the 200 yard back. DeBever will continue to improve over the remainder of the season.

8. Frankie Dobbs, Men's Basketball

Dobbs will be playing his first season as a Bulldog, as a redshirt sophomore after transferring from Ohio University. The Bulldogs will look to Dobbs to fill the void left by 2010 graduate Chris Birrell. Starting as point guard, Dobbs will really need to step up as a leader on the court to help the Bulldogs have a better season than last.

7. Nicholas Karadimas, Men's Swimming

Karadimas is in freshman year and has already made a big splash in the pool. In his first meet as a Bulldog, Karadimas took first place and set pool records in the 100 yard fly, 200 yard IM, and the 200 yard free. Look for Karadimas to continue to make a big impact on the team as the season continues into the winter.

6. Brittney Stahura, Women's Basketbal

Stahura is the team's lone junior this year. In her freshman campaign, she shot a team best 53 percent from the field and recorded 46 rebounds in just 190 minutes of play. In her sophomore season, Stahura appeared in all 29 games and finished third on the team in total rebounds with 120. Look for her to play a bigger role inside.

5. Casey Ostrander, Women's Swimming

In her freshman campaign, Ostrander set four individual school records, in the 50 free, 100 free, the 100 yard back, and the 200 yard back. She was also a member of four school record holding freestyle teams. In one of the team's first meets of the season, Ostrander took first place in three events, the 200 yard back, the 100 yard free, and the 50 yard free. Look for Ostrander's name to continue to pop-up in the record books this season.

4. Siamone Bennett, Women's Basketball

Bennett joins Hudspeth as the other senior on the Bulldogs' roster this season. Bennett started in 28 games during her junior season, averaging 10.6 points per game. She also led the team in offensive rebounds with 109 and blocks with 40. Bennett recorded four double-doubles on the season. Look for her to play a big role under the basket for the Bulldogs this season.

3. Cecil Gresham, Men's Basketbal

Gresham was only able to appear in eight games last year before being sidelined by a season-ending injury. Gresham was averaging 14.5 points per game and had become the program's thirty-first 1,000 point scorer before the injury. In his junior season, Gresham led the Bulldogs in scoring and received Division I All-Independent Team Honorable Mention awards. Gresham returns this year as a red-shirt senior and should be a big part of the Bulldogs' offense.

2. Michael Chroney, Men's Basketbal

Look for Chroney to play an important role this season in his senior campaign. Chroney joined the Bulldogs during his sophomore year as a walk-on and saw limited action that year. Last season, he appeared in twenty-eight games, starting in seventeen. At 6'2", Chroney led the Bulldogs in total rebounds with 107, defensive rebounds, and rebounding average during the season. He also posted a .417 shooting percentage on the year. Chroney should only play a bigger role this season.

1. Raphael Jordan, Men's Basketball

As a freshman last season, Jordan started in five games and appeared in all thirty. He had 217 points in the year, averaging 7.2 per game. Jordan led the team in scoring on five occasions and was second on the team in assists and steals. Jordan led the team in free throws attempted and made, good for a .711 free throw percentage on the year. Jordan's free throws came in handy in the final minutes of the team's game against Wagner last season. Jordan was fouled with just seconds remaining in the game; he hit both free throws to give the Bulldogs their one and only victory of the year.







I am writing a response to "The Dangers of Four Lokos" written by Meagan Voulo and published on October 29, 2010 in the opinion section of The Archway.

In the editorial Voulo explains how the federal government should take action and make sure that FDA regulations are followed precisely by Phusion Projects and other similar companies that produce alcoholic energy dripks

duce alcoholic energy drinks. Although I completely agree with her belief in regards to the necessary policies involved with Four Loko and other comparable beverages, I do not support all of the reasoning and evidence she uses to prove her point. The staff writer claims that "basically, Four Loko is an alcoholic energy drink that has recently been deemed 'Liquid Cocaine' by CBS News" and "clearly, if school administrators find this drink so much more dangerous than alcoholic beverages or energy drinks, then we should stop and think about our safety.

There is no justification for using these sources as proper and knowledgeable authorities on why Four Loko is dangerous. Neither school administrators nor CBS News are experts on the effects of alcoholic beverages and energy drinks, so both of their views are purely opinions.

Álso, Voulo initially declares "the well-known fact that alcohol and caffeine are dangerous when mixed. However, later on she explains how Phusion Projects is undergoing investigation because "the company does not warn customers of the dangers of mixing alcohol and caffeine." She suggests, or rather assumes, that most people are aware of the high risks involved with mixing alcohol and caffeine without any proof. Even if Voulo did have proof of this generalization, it contradicts her following position in regards to the lack of warnings.

If a majority of people are already aware of the dangers involved with Four Lokos, then it stands to reason that a cautionary label would not make a very beneficial impact.

As previously stated, I completely agree with Voulo and her proposal to increase the government's involvement with these alcoholic energy drinks. I simply believe that

she would make a much stronger case if she were to use credible sources, such as health officials, doctors, or specialists, to explain to people why these beverages are so dangerous. Moreover, her arguments would be more formidable if she would avoid using statements that seem to contradict one another. It would create less confusion for the readers and would help in providing evidence that is clear and less refutable.

When politicians have filled us with empty promises and the media have failed to do their job properly, we as a nation have turned to comedians. On Saturday October 30, 2010 an estimated 215,000 people converged on the National Mall in Washington DC led by political satirists and comedians Jon Stewart and Stephen Colbert for the Rally to Restore Sanity and/or Keep Fear Alive.

Other less liberal signs preached the truth of 9/11 which has been kept secret by the Obama administration. Others posed the question of the President's nationality.
