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Coach Drury Removes Arnemann and Fritz From Hazing Speaker Basketball Team

In a move that Men's Head Basketball Coach Leon Drury cited as a "disciplinary decision," junior Bob Amemann and sophomore Bob Fritz were released from the team on January 26. The decision was made following incidents during the

St. Michael's game on January 24.
Although Drury refused to comment on the reason for either players' dismissal, saying "that's between the players and myself," the expulsion of Arnemann stemmed from Arnemann's refusal to play in the St. Michael's game. Arnemann, a one time starter who this season had been demoted to a secondary role, refused Drury's request to go into the game when Bryant was down by approximately 40 points with just minutes to play. Because of his decision not to play, Drury notified Arnemann two days later that he would no longer be a member of the team.

In the case of Fritz, Drury told him that his role on the team was to be a supportive one, meaning that

Fritz's primary job was to encourage the other players and congratulate them when they came off the floor, not to play substantial minutes. During the St. Michael's game, Drury reportedly observed Fritz not being supportive of his teammates or enthusiastic about the game. Drury concluded that Fritz was not fulfilling his role on the team and

therefore dismissed Fritz from the

When asked how the departure of the two players affected the team, Drury commented that there were nonegative results. He further stated that having the roster reduced from sixteen to fourteen players produced a more "workable team" and that he could now spend more time with the

GLC Hosts

The Greek Letter Council hosted a guest speaker on hazing on February 2, 1989 in the Janikies Auditorium. The speaker, Eileen Stevens, spoke on the consequences of hazing after her son, Chuck, was killed in 1978 at Alfred University as a result of acute alcohol poisoning caused by a hazing incident that occurred on the campus.

Eileen Stevens suffered the loss ofher son at Alfred University when he was 20 years old. Her son was pledging a fraternity on campus and during the pledging period, was forced to spend the night locked in an automobile trunk and consume a half pint of Jack Daniels, a large amount of wine and a six pack of beer. A combination of freezing temperatures and alcohol induced cardiac arrest, and Chuck was soon pronounced dead after being rushed to a New York hospital.

The incident in which her son was killed was called an "accident" by the school administration. Several other pledges were left in critical condition, "Accident" was the wrong word for this incident. Quoting Ms. Stevens, this was a

that took place every semester. In heranger and devastation, Ms.

Stevens formed CHUCK, which stands for Committee to Halt Useless College Killings. The ultimate goal of this organization is to eliminate hazing practices that are dangerous in nature and to promote national awareness of hazing and its consequences.

"Nobody should be asked to receive degrading treatment or compromise their dignity," quoted Ms. Stevens. "Fraternities and Sororities stand for leadership, sister/brotherhood, and pride. It does not stand for secrecy or peer pressure."

The message that she brought out was not anti-fraternity or antisorority. In fact, it was just the opposite. She has spent time talking with sororities and fraternities across the country and has learned a lot about what they stand for.

Her speech received a standing ovation. The Bryant audience, consisting of all the sororities and fraternities and interested students, were very emotional during the speech and showed their appreciation for herefforts. We were

Public Safety Secures 650 Spot Parking Lot with Hi-Tech Survelance Equipment

"As of February 13th, if you must park you vehicle in the commuter lot, overnight parking that is after midnight, will only be allowed in the section closest to the athletic fields," indicated Richard Wheeler, Director of Public Safety. "This is the only area of the commuter lot that will accommodate the 650 resident students who park in the commuter lots overnight," stated Wheeler. This section of the commuter lot will be equipped with additional lighting, a 24-hour surveillance camera system, and an emergency call box.

Wheeler reassured, "we are attempting to provide the safest possible environment for the Bryant community." The new high-tech camera surveillance system should virtually eliminate vandalism and



discourage other serious crimes from occurring against persons and property by enabling Public Safety to monitor the lot 24 hours a day. "The four cameras utilized have the capability of recording a vehicle's registration plate at 100 yards and can rotate 360 degrees," indicated Wheeler. "Resident students would have first choice in parking their vehicles in the most secure area on campus," he said, since this will be the only part of the commuter lot utilized for overnight parking." Overnight guests who

have to park in the commuter lot will also be expected to comply with this policy.

A recent survey shows that 600 students park nightly in the commuter lot. In inclement weather, snow removal is hampered by sporadic parking across the entire lot. "This new parking arrangement will alleviate that problem," stated

The emergency call box is also a first for Bryant with more being planned for the future. This unit will be located at the edge of the commuter lot and will be identified

at night by a blue light which will oscillate when activated. Once activated, it sends an alarm to the Public Safety Office which, in turn, will dispatch a mobile unit to investigate. The emergency call box also provides two-way communication between the caller and the Public Safety Office, in the event that a student would like an escort to his/her dorm.

"We hope that the Bryant community will utilize this new communication system whenever our assistance is needed," said Wheeler.

Fire Alarm Solution Remains Faulty

Over winter break, the Smithfield Town Council passed an ordinance regarding fire alarms on the Bryant campus. This was done in response to the large number of alarms that the fire department answered last year. What this means for Bryant students is that they will have to pay for false alarms.

Of the 141 alarms answered, approximately 50% were false. These included pulled alarms, smoke-triggered alarms, and blocked heat sensors. The other half were due to actual fires and faulty mechanisms. There are 4,500 alarm devices on campus, consisting of pull alarms, heat sensors, and smoke sensors

According to the ordinance, Smithfield will directly charge Bryant \$400 for each alarm. Students will have to pay a portion of the fine for false alarms. For example, if an alarm is pulled in Dorm 11, and no one is apprehended, the fine will be divided among the residents of that dorm.


Fire alarms clearly pose problems. They inconvenience residents, put firefighters at risk, and practically ensure that the system won't work well when needed most.

If a person is off campus at the time an alarm goes off, should that person have to pay a portion of the fine? Do the residents have to pay if the perpetrator lives in another dorm? Will students have to pay if an alarm goes off in a building other than a dorm?

The reasonable answer to these questions is: certainly not. It doesn't make sense to hold one person responsible for the immature actions of others.

Imagine for a moment that you are an alarm-puller. If pulling an alarm was fun before, then it's even more fun now. Besides just throwing fellow students out in the cold for an hour (or longer), you make them pay for it.

This so-called solution does not solve the problem. Instead, it provides the school with a convenient way to dispense fines instead of justice.

Peace And Quiet Are Students' Rights, Too

Earlier this year, Boston University proposed new regulations limiting overnight visiting in our dormitories and controlling alcohol use. These proposed regulations were greeted with strident objections by those who viewed them as an infringement on students' rights as "adults." Properly understood, however, these new regulations are a defense

fundamental rights, such as the right to privacy and the right to study. The problems at Boston University that led to these regulations are not local; they are widespread and

grounded in the recent history of the American university.

Thirty years ago, most colleges and universities unashamedly stood in the relation to their students known as in loco parentis - - a Latin phrase meaning "in the position of a parent," This relation was most obviously manifested in living arrangements. Dormitories were sexually segregated, and there were elaborate regulations governing their use which came to be known as "parietals," another Latinism meaning "within the walls." Curfews ensured that female students at least were in for the night by a decorous hour - perhaps 11:00 p.m. during the week and 1:00 a.m. on the weekend. And if they did not spend the night in the dormitory, they were required to

sign themselves out to a specific and approved alternative location.

Beginning in the 1960s these

regulations were swept away. Students were reclassified as adult, to be free of parental regulations whether literal or metaphorical. In the area of sex, a so-called revolution attenuated even self-regulation. None of these changes would necessarily have affected the quality of life in college dormitories had college students universally or even predominantly conducted predominantly

The offending roommates insisted on their rights as adults, which they interpreted as broadly as needed to cover their escapades. It is clear that such behavior is not an expression of freedom but of license. Unfortunately, the English language lacks a term meaning "one who has reached the age of majority while remaining an adolescent.'

This term would notproperly apply to all college students, most of whom fully merit the label of "adult." But it is

> As President of a university, I began to receive complaints from students that their roommates were moving in "Significant Others" for occasional nights, or sometimes, for every night. I suspect the proportion of willing voyeurs is no greater among college students than among

Nutrition and the College Athlete

Athletes often question the role of diet in their performance. The following are some tips for athletes.

The most easily utilized sources of extra calories are carbohydrates (starch) during intense activity and fats during moderate activity. In no case is the need for protein increased for any kind of athletics. Protein is poorly used for energy, and a high protein diet can even impair endurance.

Adequate fluid intake is critical for best athletic performance. The body cannot be conditioned to function without sufficient water.

Loss of sodium (salt) is rarely a problem but loss of potassium and magnesium can be a great problem

if one perspires extensively. Unless these are replaced, performance suffers. Good sources of potassium are fruits and fruit juices, especially oranges. Magnesium is found in nuts and whole wheat breads and cereals, as well as in green vegetables.

The use of sugar or candy just before competition is now know to harm performance. However, a dilute solution of orange juice after the start of the competition can have a beneficial effect in terms of water and energy supply.

Chaplain's Corner a National Sname Homeless in America

"What I Did During Winter Break - Part II"

Not all of January was spent in work, work, work. Even though much time was take up, as I wrote last week, by a search process for new chaplains at Brown University and the University of Rhode Island, I did get to enjoy some vacation time. And I got to spend it in one of my favorite cities (besides the newly-named "hot" city of Providence!): New Orleans.

Truly "a feast for all the senses," this unique southern city was the site for the Catholic Campus Ministry Association's 20th anniversary celebration and first national convention. Workshops, keynote speakers, and special

worship services did not prevent the more than six hundred college chaplains from taking in the sights

and sounds of the Crescent City. Mingled amid the music, crowds and smells, however, was a not so pleasant reality which even a shortterm tourist couldn't help noticing: street people. Each time I walked down a street, at least two individuals would approach with stories designed to get money. Some stories were quite creative, such as the young man who did a snappy routine designed to let him shine my shoes for three dollars. Other approaches were less entertaining, more direct: "I haven't eaten in

three days; can you help me out?"

These entrepreneurs of the sidewalk, sleeping in department store doorways and lining the curbs by day and night, were a visible

reminder of the serious economic problems of that particular state and city. They were also a graphic symbol of, a direct contact with, what is often experienced as cold statistics: the homeless people of America. Sounds ironic, doesn't it:
"Homeless of America"? "Give me
your tired, your poor..." says the quote on the base of the Statue of liberty. Well, we've got them! And it is a national shame.

It is easy to overlook or ignore this "problem" until statistics take on a human face in a homeless mother and her child sitting in a cardboard box as a shelter against a cold February wind. The warm climate of a southern city, or even the relatively mild winter so far in our area of the country, should not serve as excuses to ease our consciences on this matter. These

people, whether we encounter them in our daily travels or not, are here around us: in New Orleans, New York, Boston, Providence, Hartford and in your home town or the largest city nearest to it. The remain a challenge to our "kinder, gentler nation", from the highest echelons of government to a college student preparing for a career in business. They give a direct test for the integrity of the words of the prayer offered by President Bush at his inauguration: "Heavenly Father... write on our hearts these words: 'Use power to help people.' For we are given power not to advance our own purposes not to make a great show in the world, nor a name. There is but one just use of power and it is to serve people. Help us remember, Lord. Amen.'

Career Savvy-Computer Information Systems' Concerns

Q. I've heard that the job market for CIS majors is drying up. Is this true?

A. No. The CIS field changes very rapidly, so the need for some functions tends to be phased out as the need for other functions expands. Currently, for instance, graduates of two-year programming courses are having trouble finding jobs. There's a good market, however, for CIS professionals who have a

good understanding of business, so Bryant students, with the combination of business and CIS training, are doing well.

Some leaders in the field predict that the need for COBOL business programmers will drop in the coming years. Expected causes are a shift of activity to the end user, as well as increased use of software purchased outside the company and possibly outside the country. Japanese competition for software development is seen as a strong potential threat.

On the other hand, shortages are already developing in certain specialized functions within the CIS field. These include database analysts/administrators, telecommunications specialists, systems programmers and people with a knowledge of networking. Another function that is projected to grow is that of the CIS consultant.

In summary, the trend in the field seems to be toward a requirement for more skills and

preparation. This includes both increased technical expertise and a thorough understanding of business. And since the field changes so rapidly, flexibility and continued upgrading of skills will continue to be important.

Q. Where do CIS majors make the most money?

A. In terms of industries, CIS majors seem to do best where computers are seen as an integral part of the process. These include utilities, banking, financial services

and insurance as well as the data processing industry. Salaries tend to be somewhat lower in industries such as manufacturing, retail/ wholesale, and education.

From a geographical perspective, California pays the highest average salaries, followed by New York City, Baltimore/ Washington, Boston, and Chicago. However, in a recent survey, the highest satisfaction with pay and benefits was found in Denver, one of the lower paying localities.
