## Student caught as alarms rise

In recent weeks, the number of fire alarms has increased dramatically on the Bryant campus. Alarms on campus "have become widespread," according to Bernard Blumenthal, Assistant Director of Residence Life. Blumenthal cited an instance of "seven alarms in one weekend" recently. He added that "with repeated alarms, people take it for granted" and that alarms take "a tremendous amount of time and effort from the R.A.'s and Security during the room evacuations. It's a serious situation and needs to be rectified."

Steps were taken recently to rectify the situation. Bryant officials have apprehended an individual; this person faces a \$100 fine, suspension of housing privileges, and a potential civil penalty. Blumenthal said that anyone caught "faces instant suspension...and the school will review the status of the student."

According to the statistics cited by Blumenthal, more alarms are pulled in single sex male halls and also in co-ed halls, but this is a campus-wide problem. He added that "the situation is disruptive to the life of a college student and I'm sure that a lot of people know that."

## Women's Week to explore aspects of today's woman

The successful woman. What is she made of and how did she get where she is today? These questions and many more will be answered through the wide range of programs during Women's Week at Bryant April 9-13.

Noreen Mattis, Health Educator at Bryant, said the week is an "attempt to raise the consciousness and awareness levels of young women, in areas of great concern."

The various programs begin on Monday with a Women's Expo in the Rotunda from 10-2pm. Exhibitors include the Women's Resource Center, Big Sisters of Rhode Island, Planned Parenthood, Together Computer Dating, Overeaters Anonymous, along with other organizations and agencies providing services to women.

Monday night will feature Arlene Violet, Republican Candidate for Attorney General in Rhode Island, as keynote speaker addressing the topic, "Having it all—Women in Careers." The presentation, scheduled in room 275-6 from 7-9pm, will follow with a panel discussion on the key to being a successful woman. Panelists will include Reverend Kate Penfield, Campus Minister at Bryant and Assistant Pastor at Central Baptist church in Providence, her husband, Dr. Gary Penfield, Vice President of Student Affairs at Rhode Island College, Mrs. Magaretta Edwards, owner of Conserv, Inc. and Manager of the Providence branch of the Small Business Development Center, and Roberta Sultzer, Director of Client Services

and Director of Marketing of Options, Inc.

On Tuesday, the Greek Letter Council will sponsor, "Color Analysis" in the Faculty Dining Room, 3:30-5:00pm. This event features a demonstration by Today's Women of New England, Inc. on the analysis of individuals to find the range of color most appealing in terms of wardrobe and makeup planning. A reception will follow this

presentation. "She's Nobody's Baby," a film telling the story of the women's movement will be shown Tuesday at 7pm in the Janikies Auditorium, and at 12:00 noon, Wednesday. The film, sponsored by Dean Kozikowski, will follow with a panel discussion featuring faculty and administrators.

Wednesday afternoon, a Rape Awareness Workshop will be presented by the Providence Rape Crisis Center, at 3:30 in Room 244. Topics to be discussed include assertiveness, confrontation, and how rape affects all women.

*Foodfright*, a cabaret dramatizing women's obsession with food, weight, and body image will be featured Wednesday at 6:30pm, in the Janikies Auditorium. The production combines music, humor, and personal narratives created by the actresses. They will deal with the eating disorders anorexia and bulimia, in an effort to explain the pressures on women to be thin.

A Nutrition and Fitness workshop/demonstration will be held on Thursday from 12-4pm in the MAC conference room. The following organizations are scheduled: Aerobic Upbeats, 12:30-1:30pm; Bryant Dance Club, 2:00-2:30pm; Ladies Ultimate Frisbee, 2:30-3:00pm; Exercise and Aerobics with Kelly Gildea, 3:00-3:30pm; and the Bryant Karate Club, 3:30-4:00. Representatives from Women's World will also be included in the day's activities.

The final event of the week will feature Casual Corner's presentation of "Dress For Success," a wardrobe planning workshop. The seminar will begin at 3:30pm in the Faculty Dining Room on Thursday.

All members of the Bryant Community are invited and encouraged to attend any of the events during Women's Week.

## Senior Class to donate benches

The class of 1984, with goal of \$5,500 in donations, plans to present the school with five park benches as a senior gift.

The benches, which are constructed of wrought iron and mahogany, are to be mounted on cement and placed around the pond without the fountain. Brian Britton, Head of Physical Plant, favors the idea because the benches and the Archway will share similar appearances and thus, everything will flow together.

Glenda Chickering, Chairperson of Senior Class Gift Committee said, "Students have a bad feeling about senior class gifts, "but she emphasized that '84's gift will be "very visible and it'll enhance the surroundings."

Senior class gifts in the past have been the bell tower, WJMF, library detection system, and various memorial scholarships. Interestingly enough, two other senior gifts have been planned for over two years but have not yet been constructed. The reason is "everything has priority over senior class gifts," said Glenda. As a result, the two pending gifts, a picnic area between the freshmen dorm and townhouses and the beautification of the circle, have been delayed and the \$10,000 allotted for the picnic area and \$16,000 for the circle are collecting interest in a bank.

Glenda did not expect to make as much money as past senior classes but asked all seniors to look at the gift as a "positive thing." Kevin Flanagan, an internee at the Alumni Office, said the money will be collected through dorm deposits whereby pledges are due July 31. As a supplement to the deposits, Katie Hillas, administrative coordinator from the Alumni House, and Glenda are going to have a phonathon where four teams will be formed. To increase the competition, a member will be awarded two senior banquet tickets valued at \$60 for acquiring the most pledges.

## Senate elections to be held in booths

Have you ever voted in a voting booth? You'll get your chance on Monday and Tuesday when the Student Senate holds elections for sophomore, junior, and senior senators.

Rhode Island Board of Elections. In addition to helping with Bryant's elections, four members of the Board of Elections will be on hand to register students to vote in the national elections. The Senate hopes to register students as they vote for the student senators.

To register you need a driver's license (or some form of positive identification). Students will be registered for Rhode Island because Massachusetts has very strict voter registration laws and Connecticut requires an oath to be taken when registering. Once you are registered, however, you can change to another state.

Registration will take place from 9-4 Monday and Tuesday.

## Nine hour marathon raises megabucks

This Wednesday the new Executive Council of the Student Senate presided over its first meeting. This year's officers are: Jeff Barovich, President; Dave Pogorelc, Vice President; Greg Stafstrom, Treasurer; and Jackie Alpaio, Secretary.

Two issues spurred a great deal of debate among the senators and the audience—next year's budgets for major organizations and guest policy for Wine and Cheese. The Senate is in charge of allocating the student activities to organizations. The budget of \$120,615 was divided as follows: C.I.A.—\$2,533; G.L.C.—\$12,315; S.P.B.—\$77,625; Senate—\$26,642; T.A.P.—\$1,500. This was decided on by the Senate Ways and Means Committee and

approved by the Senate. A motion recommending that the S.E.A.L. program develop a policy to let guests into Wine and Cheese was also discussed. This motion was defeated.

Next Monday and Tuesday the general Senate Elections will take place. The Executive Council hopes that there is a good turnout of voters and that students express their opinion as to who they feel will do the best job. At the same time the elections take place, a voter registration drive will be going on. Schools across the country have been encouraging students to register to vote either in their home state or where they attend school. Students voting can make a great deal of difference, so students are encouraged to register next week.

## The world's out there... Are you ready?

The average college student has more than enough to keep himself and his mind busy during the academic year. He worries about such subjects as mid-terms, scheduling, which teacher to take or not to take, and of course, final exams. Also to consider is a room-mate for next year, Spring Weekend, summer employment, and the list goes on. In most cases students get lost in the busy work of college life and forget to look ahead to one of the most important periods of their life. That period being senior year and the year immediately following graduation. This is the time that many decisions must be made which will effect the rest of their life.

The transition from the "college world" into the "real world" begins during one's senior year. Is that the only time to start thinking about moving into the "real world?" According to Sharman Paulhus, Assistant Coordinator of Career Services, "It's never too early to start looking ahead and preparing for the future."

Career Services handles the interviews/recruitment process for approximately 75-80% of the senior class each year; the majority of which begin the process the first few weeks of their senior year. Paulhus says, "We are not only here for seniors. We are presently in the process of making an awareness of the Career Services Center and its services to juniors, sophomore, and freshmen."

This awareness campaign came about after

two graduating seniors expressed their concern and sympathy for in-coming seniors to Paulhus. She agreed saying, "Most juniors don't realize that when they return as seniors the interview/recruitment process begins almost immediately. They are suddenly hit with three to four week deadlines for resumes, cover letters, and pre-screening." Because there are only two career service counselors,

and an abundance of students, appointments with the counselors become backlogged for several weeks. Consequently, leaving seniors with the fear of not knowing what to do or how to meet a deadline. Paulhus says, "This can be alleviated to an extent by looking ahead and utilizing Career Services as an underclassman."

With this in mind, Career Services is offering an orientation entitled, "Transition from College to Work: Are You Ready?" It will encompass three important topics, of which all students will encounter. The first topic is "Preparing for Senior Year." It will touch upon areas which underclassmen should consider such as volunteer work, internships, job objectives and job goals. The second topic will be, "What to expect Senior Year." This area will cover career service awareness, resume writing, coverletters, interviewing techniques, and how to become a marketable student. A juggling act will be incorporated into this topic emphasizing time management. The final area will be, "What to Expect After Graduation." Two Bryant College graduates will speak on life in the "real world", what to do if you haven't found a job prior to graduation, and how to decide which offer to accept.

The transition orientation will take place on Tuesday, April 24, 1984 at 6:30 pm. It will be held in the Center for Management Development Conference B/C. Refreshments will be served. Paulhus extends an open invitation for all students to attend and adds, "This is a great way to begin looking ahead and especially to start answering some important practical questions about your future. Our door is always open for all students and we are here for your benefit."

## Student arrested for possession

A Bryant student, Gary Desciotta, was arrested on drug charges at daybreak last Friday, March 23. Smithfield police entered his room in Dorm 3 and, according to police, found \$5,000 worth of cocaine, marijuana, drug paraphernalia and cash.

According to Peter Barlow, Director of Residence Life, the police were acting on a tip Residence Life received from a student. Barlow said the drugs were found under a bed and in a closet.

Pesciotta, a sophomore who is from Toms River, New Jersey, was released on \$400 bail after pleading innocent at his arraignment last

Friday. After a decision made by Barlow and Les Lafond, Director of Student Affairs, Pesciotta left school last Monday. According to police, if Pesciotta is convicted, the minimum sentence is a year in prison or a \$1,000 fine.

There were two other drug arrests on campus last year. Barlow said he feels "the more aware people are the better."

"It's an open society and there is no fear of being apprehended."

Barlow further stated, "the campus is a reflection of our culture."

In order to control drugs at Bryant, Barlow says he observes, the R.A.'s observe, and they act on tips. He commented drug trafficking will continue "because it is accepted by students."

# 'Food fright' to focus on women's obsessions

On Wednesday evening, April 11 at 6:30pm in the Janikies Auditorium, SPB will sponsor a presentation of *Foodfright*. This program focuses on the obsession of women on our society with food, weight, and body image. The show is the work of three women who co-wrote and perform it drawing upon their own experiences with eating disorders. *Foodfright* is being welcomed to colleges in an effort to stem the tide of serious eating disorders which is sweeping college campuses.

Current statistics indicate that 1/3 of college women are affected by some form of disordered eating. The two most frequently reported eating problems are anorexia nervosa and bulimia. Anorexia nervosa is marked by deliberate self-starvation. The anorexic may strive to lose all traces of body fat. As the disease progresses she may lose 25% or more of her total weight-not only fat, but muscle as well. Despite this weight loss the person continues to perceive herself as fat.

And so self-starvation continues as the anorexic struggles to control this area of her life which is symbolic of the perfection she seeks in all of her life.

Bulimia is characterized by recurrent episodes of "binge eating" followed by purging (vomiting, laxatives and/or diuretics). The medical complications of bulimia are serious, including menstrual dysfunction, dental problems and heart and kidney changes caused by the electrolyte imbalances which can occur. Bulimia is generally regarded as an addictive behavior-not unlike addiction to alcohol and other drugs. For the bulimic food provides instant relief from painful feelings. Because the bulimic can have the pleasure of eating anything she wants and then rid herself of this food without gaining weight, once established, it is a hard habit to break. The bulimic often describes herself as trapped within this destructive gorging/purging cycle.

90-95% of all victims of eating disorders are women. With a combined fatality rate of up to

20%. (10% from the illness and 10% due to suicide) eating disorders pose a very significant health problem. Although the factors contributing to eating disorders are complex, a significant factor is society's "thin-is-in" mentality and the fashion industry's idealization of the ultra thin fashion model as the standard of beauty all women must strive to attain. These societal values are taken to an extreme by the highly motivated, intelligent girl who most frequently develops an eating disorder.

As a society we must begin to challenge the unrealistic, unhealthy expectations placed upon women. Women who recognize signs of obsession with food and body image in themselves should seek help to deal with the emotional roots of these issues. Anyone recognizing actual symptoms of disordered eating--self-starvation or bingeing and purging--need to seek help immediately before serious health problems develop.

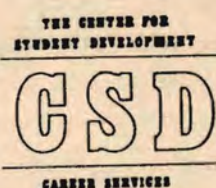

This was the second major musical production by the Players and they have demonstrated a grand effort. As the curtain opened Sunday night, the audience was treated to a bright, carefree-looking extensive set of the luxury liner, S.S. American. The set was solid, believable and attractive. Set designer, Rob Block, deserves the hardest of applause for his work. The directing staff made good use of the college's limited stage and filled it effectively. There was good use of upper deck level entrances, which broke any chance of monotonous entrances from the stage left and right wings. One draw back of the fine cruiser was the sharp and steep angle of the down ramp. The cast was too apprehensive in using it and this lost linear and spacial continuity in the staging and choreography.

The cast seemed cold and stiff in the beginning of the first act, but had loosened and warmed up to the house by the second act. At times the energy level was low and characterization slipped, but the sincere effort

to jump back to character was evident.

Kevin Laperle, as Moon-Face Martin, the bumbling gangster, was quick and refreshing. His character was an added comic relief to the already funny story. Moony's girlfriend, Bonnie, played by Mary Kelliher, was also energetic and smart. Her acting and dancing was as bubbly as the character and her enthusiasm never died. David Dupere's witty portrayal of "the gentleman" Sir Evelyn Oakleigh took the audience by storm.

Also deserving merit is Sue Beauregard who played the sultry, sexy yet caring Reno Sweeney well and Julie Rotondo, whose sweet voice, melodic voice filled the stage with crisp and clear sound in her efforts as Hope Harcourt. The entire cast did a fine job with their rendition of "Blow Gabriel Blow" in Act Two. Cast energy, spirit and enthusiasm was most evident in that number.

There were a few technical problems such as feedback from the amplifier. And although the band played very well they sometimes overpowered the performers. Also, more professional polish could have been added to help awkward microphone handlings, breaking out of character when lines that were never meant to be said were said, and a somewhat carefree attitude when curtain props did not work. But overall the Bryant Players made a valiant and definite effort to produce this difficult and demanding musical.

## Men's Hoop in review

It will go down in the record book as the worst season in modern Bryant basketball history, but for the sake of 29 additional points, it would have been the best record in four years.

The 1983-84 Indians finished the season with a 6-21 record, the worst winning percentage in the 22 year history of modern Bryant basketball. But the Indians lost so many close games that a total of only 29 points in 10 select games would have given coach Leon Drury's squad a very respectable 16-11 mark.

Included among the 21 losses were a double overtime loss, three one-point setbacks, a pair of two-point defeats and three three-point losses. All totaled, 12 of the 21 losses were by six or less points, including 11 of the first 14 setbacks.

Despite the dismal record there were some bright spots for Bryant hoop fans. Lee Schatzlein established his credentials as one of Bryant's all-time top players with a sensational senior campaign. The 6-4 forward from East Haven, Connecticut was one of the

top scorers in New England throughout the season as he averaged 18.3 points per game. His 521 points this season gave him a career total of 1475 points putting him fifth on the all-time Bryant scoring list.

Senior Ron Harrison also joined the 1,000 point club as his 392 points gave him a four year career total of 1,114 points.

The play of two underclassmen, sophomore Gregg Cooper and freshman Manny Barrows, provided reason for future optimism.

Cooper, a 6-4 sophomore forward from Augusta, Maine, averaged in double figures for the second consecutive year. His 11.3 average in the 27 games this season gave him a total of 600 points in the first two years of his collegiate career.

Barrows, a freshman point guard from Providence, R.I. earned a spot in the starting lineup midway through the season and averaged eight points per game while he saw regular duty. His best performance of the season came in the final game of the year when he scored 16 points against Assumption.

## Rugby opens with big win

Beautiful teamwork led to a Bill Hoadly try and minutes later Averick added another. The rest of the game saw Bryant playing a control offense. St. A's couldn't get past midfield and never threatened to break the shutout. The only disappointing aspect of play for Bryant was John Delpha's inability to connect on any of the conversion kicks.

The Bryant "B" side showed why they will be producing great players in the future as they ran all over St. A's in a lopsided victory. The players all worked well together scoring most of their points in the first half. Pete Marcella, Scott Fagin, Todd Lasher, and Chris Devoe all scored tries for the Indians. The final score could have been higher but a merciful referee ended the game just as the

Indians are preparing for another score.

Bryant's next home game is tomorrow vs. Coast Guard. Game time is 1:15 and the game will be played on the new fields behind the baseball field. The ruggers hope to see everybody out there.

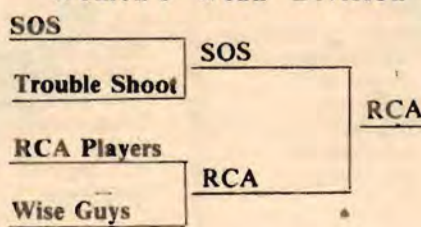

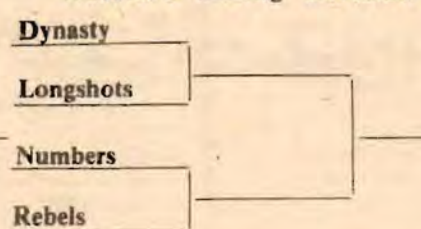
