For the past three years, a college committee has been working behind the scenes, studying energy waste on the Bryant campus and doing something about it. Changes implemented in the lighting systems, insulation, and heating have saved the college tens of thousands of dollars in operating expenditures. But they can go only so far without your cooperation.

This is where the Student Senate is stepping in to assist the Energy Management

Committee. One of our main objectives is dealing with student and faculty awareness. Because some of the real conservation can be done by the students of Bryant College. Without knowing it, you are wasting energy daily. See how many wastes you are guilty of.

-leaving lights on all night (room, suite or bathroom)

-ignoring dripping faucets and showerheads.

-leaving T.V.'s or stereos on when you leave the room.

-not defrosting the refrigerator when the frost is built up.

## Epidemic plaguing overstressed

### Suicide poses problem on college campuses

Suicide is a subject most people don't like to discuss. However, people should be informed about it. Recent surveys show that 80% of the population have at one time or another thought of committing suicide. Most of the time it is just a passing thought. Bill Phillips of the Counseling Center says it usually occurs when, "A normal person has an extra amount of stress and is having trouble dealing with it." But it is important to realize that suicide is a symptom of a problem, rather than a problem in itself. There are factors that occur that cause a person to consider an attempt.

The month with the highest amount of suicide attempts at colleges is October, and February is the second highest. These two months are the second months of each semester. One possible explanation drawn from this fact is that the novelty of school is gone and reality starts to set in. Tests begin, work piles up, and more stress is put on the student.

Many studies have been done on suicide attempts by college students. Based on the information gathered it has been determined that at a college with an enrollment of 10,000 students, 1,000 of them should seek

professional help during the year, and not necessarily for suicidal thoughts. The studies also conclude that 300-400 people experience, at some time, such an extreme depression that it disrupts their daily lives. The last bit of information that is important is that 5-20 people will attempt suicide, and 1-3 will succeed. These figures vary depending on the size of the college. On large universities it is

and/or have feelings of extreme and chronic sadness. It must be understood that a person should not necessarily become worried if they have one or two of these symptoms because these can occur without signifying that a person has an abnormal level of depression.

The following information was compiled by Bill Phillips and is a list of certain criteria used by professional counselors to determine a

indication that a person is suicidal.

Below are a few myths about suicide:

1. Those who talk freely about suicide will not ever actually attempt it. (related myth: they're trying to get attention).
2. Discussion about suicide with a suicidal person will help trigger the act. (it's important to discuss it).
3. People who kill themselves usually do so without warning (80%).
4. People who have apparently achieved their goals in life do not commit suicide.
5. Non-professional people cannot prevent suicide.
6. People in therapy/getting professional help do not commit suicide (fact: most suicides

So what do you do if you think someone you know is suicidal? Bill Phillips says it is sometimes hard to approach a friend with a sense of concern, "but, problems need to be talked out," he said, adding that this is what the Counseling Center is for. "It is a place where healthy people can go to talk about normal problems in everyday life," said Mr. Phillips. John Winters and Phillips are the counselors at the Center, which is located in the upper level of the Unistructure near the Office of Student Activities. Both state that if there is ever anything you want to talk about

hard to spot people who need help, whereas on smaller campuses people know each other better and also know more people. It is easier to recognize someone who seems to be troubled.

There are certain symptoms that occur in a person who becomes severely depressed and upset. They may have a loss of appetite, withdraw from people, have a sense of isolation (of being psychologically alone, even if in the midst of a crowd), suffer from sleep disturbances (either sleep more or less than usual), be apathetic, have a low self-image,

person's lethality. Lethality is the degree to which someone is likely to commit suicide.

1. AGE - The older the person, the higher the risk. Except in one case: the adolescent.
2. SEX - Over 70% of successful suicide attempts are by males; over 70% of all attempts are by women, however.
3. MARITAL STATUS - Rate of suicide is higher for single persons.
4. PHYSICAL ILLNESS - Recent poor health increases the risk.

Beware of oversimplification and jumping to conclusions. There exists no conclusive

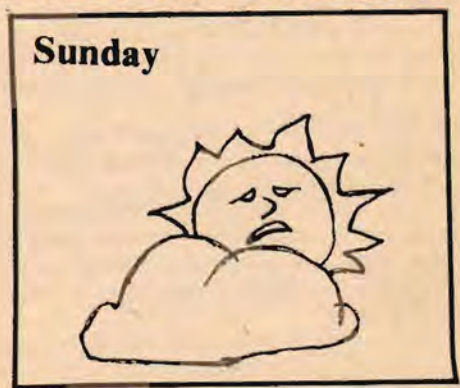

## Bookstore Manager refutes article

To the Editor:

I would like to set a few facts straight in regards to two articles in the *Archway* dealing with "desk" or "complementary" copies sold here at Bryant.

First of all, as a business college, thinking in business terms should be utmost in everyone's mind. When buying a product, you try and buy it at the lowest price possible... thus saving your company money and passing the savings on to the consumer. Our case in point, and I believe that I can speak for the nationwide/industrywide practice, desk or complementary copies are purchased outright from a faculty member by the local bookstore or one of a number of national concerns after the faculty member reviews and uses those books for their courses. We buy them back as we would buy back books from our own student body. Thus, a new book is purchased, sold as used increasing our gross margin (our profitability) and saving the consumer 25% off the retail or selling price -- the bottom line; a benefit to all concerned.

In regards to your headlines, *FREE BOOKS SOLD* and *BOOK SALES UNETHICAL*, I resent the sensationalism. My point being, again, an outright purchase from an individual, a signed document legitimizing the sale and the resale of said book(s). Whether this is an unethical practice is a judgement call based upon an individual's personal feeling or preference. I firmly support our practice on reselling these books. I will as stated in the last paragraph of your first article replace any books marked as such with a new or used copy depending on how the consumer originally purchased the book. I will respect an individual's preference.

Some points not mentioned were: The publisher representative contacted; was she asked to explain why these books are circulated in such abundance as they are? Probably not! Aren't their marketing and distribution inclusive in the retail pricing of the book? Yes! Bookstores do not establish the selling price of approximately 95% of books purchased. We adhere to the publishers suggested retail price. No freight expenses are added on -- we absorb this as a part of our Standard Operating Procedures (SOP). The remaining 5%, if not less, is for the publisher,

usually not nationally known, who do not allow return privileges of their product. A 25% mark-on is set to allow us a loss factor for those non-returnable.

Other inaccuracies in your articles are that The Follett College Book Co., is a sister division (one of seven) all under the umbrella name of The Follett Corporation. Book publishers do not, repeat do not send us, collectively meaning The Follett Corporation or any other national concern, every edition of every book they print. We do not give these books out to faculty members -- that is the publisher's responsibility. We will sell to a faculty member a copy off our shelves and refund their monies after the publisher sends them back a "complementary" copy. If we did randomly hand out their books, the publishers would lose all control of the quality of their performance, inventory control and probably most of all, their potential market.

I've asked to speak or present a forum when I first came here to Bryant to the student body of bookstore management, publisher representatives and wholesale concerns... I was not warmly welcomed. As this is the third largest expenditure of a student after tuition and room and board, I've asked to present a program during the "crossroads" summer program... again, not warmly welcomed.

I do welcome comments! I'm a good listener. But the facts should have been presented in a solid article, researched fully... not one, two or three articles of piece-meal "adventures in journalism". As your paper is published but once a week, a bad or ill-feeling sometimes occurs till the next issue giving a party rebuttal time. This is needless.

I am proud of my job, the people who work with me and the Corporation I work for. I know that no wrong was done. I believe that the Bryant Community should be made aware of the fact that true, dedicated professionals are at their service.

Again, thinking in business terms, here at Bryant College, should be utmost in all of our minds.



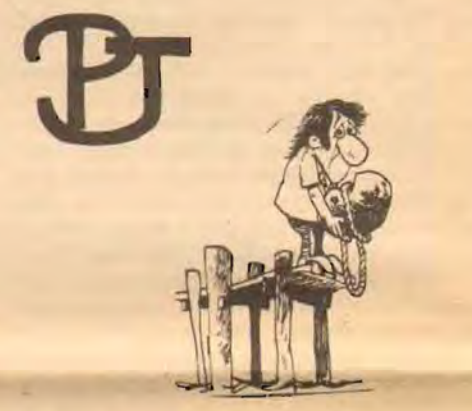

# Winning the war with textbooks

There it is. Your very own 750-page textbook which holds all the information you need to know about a subject.

How are you ever going to start to learn 750 pages of valuable information? Page 1 is always a good place to start, but Ken McKenzie, Assistant Director of the Evening Division, has a few suggestions to help you really learn what you are reading.

These suggestions will not work if this is the day before your test because they take time.

First of all, ask yourself, "What am I going to learn from this course?" There must be something you can learn from the course.

## Dealing with test anxiety

Your heart is pounding. Your breathing quickens. Your palms are sweaty. All types of signals are rushing to your brain. You are experiencing test anxiety.

These symptoms are part of your body's normal reaction to stress and help to put you in a better position to deal with a challenge, according to Bill Phillips, Coordinator of Counseling Services.

Some people become very uptight before an exam--so uptight that they can not handle the pressure and fall to pieces at exam time. Phillips says, "The extremes of too little stress or overwhelming anxiety at exam time are not good."

"You must try to keep your body at an optimal level of stress," noted Phillips, who has given several talks at Beat Academic Probation sessions on 'How To Cope With Test Anxiety.'

The answer to relieving test anxiety? An old scout motto: 'Be prepared'. "You really have to psyche yourself up for an exam both intellectually (what you know) and psychologically (through your emotions and attitudes)," Phillips said.

Phillips offers strategies in three basic time periods for preparing for an exam, all of which depend upon pacing yourself. (See last week's article on Time Management).

1. **Before the exam** (10-14 days)--Find out from the professor as much as possible about the exam (i.e. type of questions, what is on the test, open or closed book, materials you can use, etc.).

If you have more than one test around the same time, study your hardest subject first. If you know you are having trouble in a particular subject, start studying two weeks before the exam in 'short half hour chunks'--one week before if you are doing fairly well in the course.

Some helpful hints are: make up your own possible test (and then answer it); figure out if there are any basic ideas which are keys to understanding the rest of the subject matter; realize which topics repeatedly come up in class or in the book.

2. **The night before and morning of the exam**--Do not take any artificial stimulants to keep you awake, such as coffee or cola. They will carry your body into an area where the level of stress may be too high--the opposite of what you've been preparing yourself for.

Avoid 'group worry sessions' and cram sessions. These only increase your anxiety. You should only need 3 hours of studying the night before the exam.

So, after you have studied, treat yourself to something relaxing (no, not heavy partying). Some well-meant advice from Mom also applies here: get a good night's sleep, eat well, and get up early enough so you don't have to rush to the exam.

3. **The exam**--According to Phillips, "spare yourself the grueling wait should you arrive too early." You do not need to see everyone else's test anxiety, so arrive 1 or 2 minutes before the exam starts.

When you get to the test, glance it over once, noting the point values, then carefully read the directions and underline or circle crucial words in the instructions (i.e. discuss, enumerate, 1, 2, or 3, etc.).

Some students find listing all the technical data, such as dates or formulas, in the margin of the test is helpful. This 'memory dump' serves as a reference throughout the exam.

Remember--length does not equal quality. Avoid slinging the bull. Be concise, and

Look in your syllabus and glance through your textbook to familiarize yourself with the course.

Once you have the general idea of the course, you must find the general idea of the chapter you are about to read.

Glance through the chapter looking at headings, subheadings, bold-faced and italic type, and then read the chapter summary. "You have to get an overview of the course, the book, and the chapter before you can understand details or definitions," reasons McKenzie.

The next step is a little more difficult than the first two. Read the chapter. That's all. Don't highlight or memorize. Just read the chapter and try to figure out its meaning.

Now the hard part. McKenzie calls this the "outline step". So, guess what you have to do for this step? That's right. Outline.

There are several ways to outline a chapter. Some people find highlighting and/or underlining are the quickest and easiest ways to do this. McKenzie strongly recommends writing an outline on a separate piece of paper. The outline provides an organized method of reinforcing what you have read. Don't be afraid to tie class notes into your outline. The outline also doubles as a study guide at exam time.

"Doing these steps may take extra time right now, but come exam time you won't have to re-read the chapters. You'll only have to look at your outline," McKenzie explained.

Other factors which will help you learn while reading your text are your environment, the time of day, and the amount of time before the exam.

Some people need absolute quiet to read.

some prefer music in the background. Where you read best is up to you. Experiment to find your best setting.

Figure out when your peak hours are. This varies from person to person. Maybe right after class while the lecture is still fresh in your mind, or right after you wake up from a quick nap. Again, this varies.

All these steps are designed to help you learn the material, not just to memorize it for an exam, so it will all take time. But this is time well worth your effort.

From freshman year through senior year, these suggestions will help you comprehend what you are reading. Freshmen--get into good habits now. Seniors--these steps can help you on any professional exams such as the C.P.A. exam you might have coming up.

The Women's Soccer Team has begun the 1982 season in the face of some extremely tough competition. To this point the women's record stands at 0-3. This was followed by a tough 7-1 loss to Brown University and a 7-0 setback at the hands of Tufts on September 29th.

Such high scores should not be taken as an indicator of inferiority ability but rather as proof of the level of competition at which the women have had to play. An important point to note, also, is that the team has lost Coach Gerry Gray to an illness for 3 weeks. His position has been filled by Interim Coach Bernie Blumenthal.

Among all these disappointing facts some bright spots have emerged. The team has been supported by the consistent play of kSenior Tri-captains Carol Bevan, Allison Forbes, and Sandy Mitchell. Other strong points include the aggressive defensive play of fullbacks Terry Shedd, Cheryl Goerke, and Cindy Rice. Against Brown, a night game on Sept. 25th, the women played good defense and missed some chances on offense, said Coach Blumenthal. "The Brown game was a different experience for us, we played a tough Brown team under the lights and the girls all learned some things."

Bryant's next opponents are Brandeis on October 1st and Babson at home on October 5th, two teams that are more on Bryant's level. The women are looking to notch two wins, and some confidence and fan support could help make that happen.

## Hallet wins record fourth NE tourney

The list of accomplishments for Bryant College golfing sensation Jim Hallet keeps getting longer and longer. The Senior Captain captured an unprecedented fourth New England Intercollegiate Golf Championship last Monday and Tuesday at the Country Club of Pittsfield, MA; and the Cranwell Golf Course in Lenox, MA.

Hallet's two over par total of 143 helped Bryant into a two-way tie for second place with Central Connecticut State College. The Indian's team score of 609 was eight shots off the pace set by the University of Connecticut.

By winning the 49 year old tourney, believed to be one of the oldest intercollegiate events in the nation, Hallet

surpassed the 46 year old record of Willie Turnesa, who won three straight titles from 1934-1936.

Playing at the Country Club of Pittsfield on Monday, Hallet's 73 left him three shots behind Connecticut's John Thomas, and two behind Andy Miller, also of Connecticut.

On Tuesday, Hallet fired a one under par 70 at Cranwell, overcoming both Miller, who ended up second at 145, and Thomas who finished third at 146.

Other strong showings by Bryant members were Bill Walthouse, 153; Bob Dimattei, 156; Mike McKenna, 157; and John Jepson, 165. The top four scores for each team were included in the final totals.

Bryant's next event is next Monday and Tuesday at the Toski Invitational at Amherst, MA.

Military Science holds clinic

# Students spend day "hanging around"

Perhaps you've seen the posters around school urging you to "Be Adventurous." And perhaps you've always wondered what it felt like to be in a boat on white water. Well, as the ad would lead you to believe it is nothing less than exciting. And while the Department of Military Science hasn't yet offered a clinic in white water rafting, it has held classes on a subject equally as challenging and requiring just as much intestinal fortitude.

Both instructors and students involved in the Reserve Officer Training Corps program here at Bryant recently held a clinic for freshmen and sophomores in the art of rappelling, a necessary skill in the sport of mountaineering. Basically, rappelling is the process of descending the rock face of a cliff by attaching yourself to a rope and making a controlled slide down that rope. For safety, and safety is highly stressed throughout the entire process, each student is required to wear a helmet.

The clinics are held annually by the Department of Military Science and are open to members of the Bryant community. More than ninety percent of the instruction is conducted by students in the ROTC program. This not only helps the students hone their instructional abilities but gives them a chance to more fully develop their leadership potential. Each student instructor is carefully rehearsed in advance in every detail in order to insure the utmost in safety.

Senior Bill Henry and juniors Mike Bradley, John Caramadre, and Dan Powers

were the instructors in charge of both the conduct of the demonstration and of the actual descent by novice rappellers. They taught how to tie yourself into a "Swiss seat," how the aluminum "snap link" or carabina functioned, how to connect yourself to the descent rope, and how to act as safety for your buddy in case he or she accidentally slipped during descent. In every case this was done in a most professional manner, and the care and attention to detail exhibited by these student instructors was evident in the closing remarks of the students.

Junior Linda Ysewyn commented that, "This really goes a long way toward curing any fear of heights you may have." Perhaps Kathy Delaney put it somewhat more simply. She just said, "It's fun."

Whatever comments were made several things became more evident as the day progressed. Every student gained a good insight into his or her own mental state and became much more confident in the ability to deal with situations heretofore viewed as impossible to achieve. Both physical and personal courage were challenged, and those who met the challenge can look at themselves in a new light. Further, the ability of the students in charge to organize such an activity and to carry it out successfully undoubtedly added to confidence they already exhibit in their leadership traits. "Being Adventurous" is just a part of the leadership experience so necessary in today's world. Each participant, whether as a student or as an instructor, takes with him more of the skills necessary to meet the challenge because they have reached deep into the soul and have brought forth the necessary spirit to "go for it."

After the rappelling clinic was finished everyone took a well deserved break and went to Slater's Park in Pawtucket to partake in the annual fall picnic sponsored by the Military Science Department. While everyone reminisced over the events earlier in the day, they began to realize that they share a common bond of leadership ability and of physical and moral courage. The comradeship experienced by all during those few hours

together will be remembered for a long time. The hours during and after the party simply reinforced those feelings.

## Withhold Information

Bryant College assumes that failure on the part of any student to specifically request the withholding of categories of "Directory Information" indicates individual approval for disclosure.

### ANNUAL NOTICE TO STUDENTS

Annually, Bryant College informs students of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. This Act, with which the Institution intends to comply fully, was designated to protect the privacy of education records, and to provide rights of students to inspect and review their education records, and to provide guidelines for the correction of inaccurate or misleading data through informal and formal hearings.
