'Big MAC' To Open As Scheduled

"On the first floor you will find the GLC office, a conference room, a ticket office, a concessions stand, a second gym and five racquetball courts. On the second floor you will observe the offices of the SPB, the CIA, WJMF, the Ledger, and The Archway." These are just a few typical remarks a tour guide would make while taking first time visitors through Bryant College's new Multipurpose Activities Center(MAC).

MAC should be open for use at the beginning of the second semester. Official opening ceremonies are being planned for later in the semester. The Student Programming Board has already planned a concert for MAC on February 20, featuring NRBQ and a Rock'n Roller skating night on February 19.

SPB is also looking into the possibility of having a "Dallas Night" in MAC during February. This would be a night where cowboy hats would be distributed to the crowd, bales of hay would be brought into

MAC, a country band will perform a square dance and a vacation to a "Dude Ranch" will be given away.

MAC is a completely flexible facility. Each one of its rooms can be used for something other than its designed purpose. Thus, MAC can serve many social and recreational needs. For example, the conference room can be used as a coat room and the gym is equipped with special lighting so it can be used for occasions where soft lighting is required.

Moreover, MAC has other special features which really make it a unique facility. MAC is specially equipped so that an electrical generator will never have to be rented again for functions such as concerts where they were previously required. In addition, the building

has an elevator which makes it completely accessible to handicapped persons.

There are special requirements for reserving the MAC gym for programming functions. First, due to the scheduling of intramural events, reservations for MAC will have to be made at least eight working days in advance. Next, availability of dates will have to be

checked with SPB, Leon Drury, Director of Athletics, Gerri Hura, Director of Student Programs and Services, and Central Scheduling. Then once the date is secured, Bill Angell, Director of Grounds and Charlie Pickett, Director of Physical Plant, will arrange any staging and electrical needs.

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From The Editor's Desk...



This issue is the last in what has been a very successful semester for **The Archway Staff**. There were many positive moments, but I'm sorry to say that our staff is closing the semester on a very disappointing note.

We submitted a proposal last May for a new typesetting machine which would enable us to improve our operation, as well as reduce the cost of out-house typesetting for the College. We submitted the proposal with the hopes of having it accepted as presented and having the machine delivered in conjunction with our moving into our new office. As some of us know, the Bryant College Administration is not known for its speed in dealing with such matters. It was not until late September that the College Administration began to process our proposal.

At first, we were told approval would be only a formality. Realizing that on October 15, the lease on our present typesetting machine was going to expire, the College, acting upon **The Archway's** initiative, temporarily extended the present lease for three months in anticipation of taking delivery of the new machine in January. As a result of this action, we were lead to believe we would receive our new machine in January.

The College's recommendation on our proposal called for the outright purchase of the new machine. We were lead to believe this would occur during the current budget year and delivery would still be made in time for use during the Spring semester. Yesterday, we learned the College has decided to continue to lease the present machine and has asked **The Archway** to submit another proposal for the next budget year at which time we **assume** the College is going to purchase the machine.

The present machine is in desparate need of two improvements. These improvements have been needed for some time, however the deficiencies have been tolerated by us only because we anticipated working with a new machine next semester. Yesterday, we were also informed that under the College's counter-proposal, **The Archway** would bear the financial burden of the necessary improvements to our present machine at the cost of \$1170. An additional \$1000 will have to be expended by **The Archway** as well to cover the cost of the Service Contract. None of these funds were appropriated within our present fiscal budget. We feel that as the College has been making the monthly payments on the lease, they should be the one to pay for the necessary improvements, otherwise **The Archway** will be financially burdened by such costs.

No one in the Bryant Community, except **The Archway Staff** and those close to us, realize the amount of time and effort we, as a volunteer organization, put into publishing **The Archway** weekly. We feel the treatment our proposal received was not appreciative of the efforts of our organization. As it is very difficult to drive a car with a flat tire, it will be an even more difficult task to publish a newspaper with a deficient typesetting machine.

Hunger Night Confusion Cleared Up

To The Editor:

Although Hunger Night is four weeks over, I feel it is necessary to respond to the article in November 26, **Archway**.

According to Matt Reiter, the manager of Bryant Food Services:

The United Way Hunger Meal has always caused some misunderstanding in meal allowance of \$1.05 given to the fund. Let me point out that the meal prices charged at the door do not reflect the prices paid by students on the board plans. As a matter of fact the dinner price is not much less than a student pays per day e.g. the charge per year for a person on the 19 meal plan is \$925.00. This plan covers 206 days, the daily rate comes to \$4.49 per day.

You must consider that the \$925.00 pays for all food service costs:

- e.g. * Maintenance and replacement of equipment.*
- * Fuel Costs - this area being one of the highest*
- Labor Costs*
- Food Costs*
- General Costs*
- Profit ?*

After all this is taken into consideration we have an average of \$1.49 per meal to work with. This must pay for all the above expenses, let me point out the first two items are fixed and quite high. The \$1.05 (food cost only) for the dinner meal is very generous.

Our job is to offer a program that will satisfy most everyone. Keep the total costs of

education down, and hopefully make some profit, today's economy has played havoc in our business.

If you have any questions at all please don't hesitate to call me.

NewsBriefs

Late Monday night, recording artist John Lennon was shot and killed in front of his New York apartment. He was later pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital. He had been shot three times. Lennon was currently enjoying a comeback in the music industry, after his tremendous success with the Beatles.

The Soviet Union has prepared a plan for possibly invading Poland. The Russians are bothered by the liberal trends which have been taking place in the nation. The White House urged Soviet Leaders not to intervene but officials said they had no verifiable evidence that Moscow had decided to send in the troops. At this point, it is still uncertain whether mobilization along the Polish border was aimed at intimidating the Poles or is a part of a larger military strategy.

Soviet arms technology has shown steady gains in the past few years. The Defense Department said that the Russians are still behind but they are catching up quickly. In the last five years the Russians have been building up their superiority in troops, weapons and sophisticated military hardware. This all comes at a time when the United States has been put in the underdog position due to budgetary cut-backs in military spending.

Iran's Parliament spent a fifth day considering the latest American reply to Teheran's conditions for releasing the Hostages. The Speaker of the Iranian Parliament said that if Washington truly wants to solve the matter, it will be solved. The Iranians are willing to meet the demands laid down by the Iranian Parliament on November 2. These demands are that the United States would pledge not to interfere in Iran's internal affairs, that the U.S. would unfreeze Iranian assets in American banks, that all American banks, that all American law suits, against Iran, would be abandoned and the wealth of the Shah be returned to Iran.



Catholic Diocese Appoints Chaplain

Bryant College now after several weeks has a new Catholic Chaplain. His name is Father David Norris. Father Norris replaces Father Lolio, who left Bryant earlier this semester to become pastor of a parish. Father Norris is a native of Rhode Island and he has spent many years serving as a priest in the state.

Father Norris' educational background is diverse. He attended Our Lady of Providence Seminary, in Providence. From there, he went on to study in Belgium, at the University of Louvain, the oldest Catholic University in the world. He graduated from the University in 1972 with a degree in Theology.

After returning to the United States, Father Norris worked in the Diocese of Providence, performing mostly parish work. In 1978, he became the Chaplain for Rhode Island Hospital in Providence. In addition to his duties at the hospital, he served as part-time Chaplain at the Rhode Island School of Design.

Father Norris was one of five priests who applied for the opening at Bryant, and Father Norris was appointed by Bishop Louis E. Gelineau, Bishop for the Catholic Diocese of Providence, to become the Catholic Chaplain of Bryant College.

The number of priests that applied for the position explains why it was not until several weeks after Father Lolio left that a replacement was appointed.

Father Norris would like to be involved in all aspects of Bryant life. He would like to teach, particularly a course relating to religion. He would like to encourage the cooperation among all the religions at Bryant. He believes that it is truly an advantage to have all organizations working together. Father Norris said that everyone at Bryant has been helpful to him. He is pleased with the atmosphere and the spirit thus far, and would like to see it continue. He believes that there is good cooperation between his office and the faculty, administration and staff. As he said, we are all working together for the good of this community.

Counseling Coordinator Selected

William Phillips comes to Bryant as Coordinator of Counseling for the Center of Student Development.

He holds a B.S. in Psychology from Assumption College, a Master's Degree in Counseling Psychology from Columbia University and an Education Specialist's Degree in College Counseling from the University of Connecticut. Recently Mr. Phillips has been a counselor at Providence College and Director of Residence Life for Assumption College.

As Coordinator, Mr. Phillips will be responsible for the personal counseling aspects of student development. This includes the existing counseling services, the Student Assistants Program and the various workshops now being held.

Mr. Phillips has set three objectives for himself and the Center. First, to improve the image of the Counseling Center, second, to educate students on what Counseling is about and thirdly, to reach out to more students.

A major problem for Mr. Phillips is "to get over the stigma of a counselor." Counseling is not only for "traditional" problems but also for everyday problems of a student (classes, friends, etc.) and also, just someone to talk with.

Mr. Phillips also hopes to reach more students. He stated plans for new workshops next semester. Programs of Identity issues will be a goal for the new Coordinator in addressing the social side of students.

Mr. Phillips wishes "to expand; to reach out to more students." This will hopefully be accomplished through a wider variety of workshops, more programs from the professional staff and by going to where the students are: in classrooms, residence halls and group meetings.

Mr. Phillips wishes to stress that the Counseling Center is open to all students. Says Mr. Phillips, "being young, I am still going through or have recently gone through school. I can relate to the students problems." Mr. Phillips hopes the Counseling Center will be a comfortable place for students to go to just talk to people.



Disc Jockey of the Week




WJMF Disc Jockey of the Week Mike Stascavage.





Senate Makes Proposal To Extend Library Hours During Exams

Something is being done. At the Senate's last meeting a motion was passed, if accepted by the library administration, that would increase the hours the library would be open during culmination week. The proposed additional hours would be: a closing time of 9:00 on Fridays; opening the library from 10:00 a.m. until 9:00 p.m. on Saturdays; 11 a.m. until 12 midnight on Sundays, and Monday through Thursday, keeping the library open until 1:00 a.m. This proposal will be referred to Dr. Wood, Vice President of Academic Affairs. The Senate will hear more on this matter at today's meeting.

Also discussed at our last meeting was the possibility of more computer courses at Bryant. This was referred to the Academic Committee. TAP will also be expanding its courses next semester. If you have any ideas or suggestions in regard to the TAP courses, drop in the Senate office and leave a note in Nancy's box.

Once again, the Senate will be selling flower arrangements as a Fund Raiser. You will all be pleased to find out all arrangements will be priced under \$5.00. So start thinking about who you can give them to for the Holiday season.

The Senate announced that it will be sending a delegation of student leaders to a leadership exchange conference. This will be held at Providence College on February 1. It should prove to be very educational.

"Students Working For Students"

And now you can earn even more. Now you can also serve in the Army Reserve or Army National Guard while you're enrolled in ROTC. It's called the Simultaneous Membership Program (SMP). If you qualify, you'll serve as an officer trainee in a selected Reserve component, and earn \$70 or more a month, to start. Add the \$100 a month you'll receive in the Advanced Course, and you could end up with over \$170 a month for yourself.

FACT #6: It takes more than brains or brawn to win an Army ROTC scholarship. Sure, your SAT or ACT score carries a lot of weight. And there are certain physical requirements. But Army ROTC looks for other qualities, too. Leadership qualities. So if you're involved in varsity sports, or your student government, or even if you're holding down a part-time job after school, ROTC will award you points for it toward winning a scholarship.

FACT #8: Now, when you graduate from ROTC, you can opt to serve at home with an Army Reserve or Army National Guard unit part-time. It's called the Reserve Forces Option. Take advantage of it, and you can put your ROTC training to work in your civilian career right away. The problem is with the courts. Since the Earl Warren Supreme Court the American judiciary has been so preoccupied with the rights of rascals that it has neglected to protect the rights of decent people.

In Raleigh, North Carolina, Sarah Williams was tending her grocery store alone stocking a shelf, when she turned to see a man behind the counter where he had no business

being--emptying the contents of the cash register into his own pockets.

She shouted for him to stop; he did not stop.

With the money, he headed for the door.

Sarah Williams, no match for the larger man, drew her storekeeper husband's gun from beneath the counter and, aiming at the floor, fired a warning shot.

The warning shot hit the fleeing man in the foot.

Guess who was arrested. She was.

The man cannot be charged with armed robbery because he was unarmed. He cannot be charged with felony larceny because the \$600 he took never left the store.

The one arrested is Mrs. Williams--for "assault with a deadly weapon."

The problem, as I say, is with the courts.

More important than anything else our new president does will be his selection of judges.

Historically, judgeships have been passed out as political payoffs or purposely to promote an administration's social philosophy.

Historically, the only non-political advice any president has had available on this subject came from the American Bar Association. That's not been good enough.

Now the American Family Institute--a Washington - based, independent, non-partisan research and educational organization--has designated a 22-member panel of prominent persons to recommend and evaluate judicial nominees.

That should help.

The Republican platform recognizes the need, pledges the party "to work for the appointment of judges at all levels of the judiciary who respect traditional values..." It's about time.

DeWitt's Back

Bryant Evens Its Record

Bryant upped its record to 2-2 with a 80-72 victory over Rhode Island College on Dec. 3. This win followed a 72-70 loss to Quinnipiac College late in November.

Ernie DeWitt is coming off his hamstring injury-scoring 17 points and grabbing 16 rebounds in the Quinnipiac game, and 27 and 10 respectively in the RIC game. DeWitt is described as being "sore, but healthy."

Despite losing the Quinnipiac game, Bryant Coach Leon Drury feels that his team played extremely well. "There were two good teams playing, we (Bryant) made a good comeback. We had an uncontested layup with seven seconds left and missed it. The same individual (Paul Berlo) given 9 tries at that same shot, would put it in 9 out of 9 times. It's just one of those things. I guess it was in the cards."

Berlo has been averaging 19.25 points per game, second only to DeWitt's 22 ppg. Freshman Ron Harrison has been "verysteady and poised" according to Drury, and is "an excellent player for a freshman."

Harrison has an 11.5 ppg average. Dennis Verni, who scored a career high of 18 points against RIC, has a 10.75 average.

Drury said that "this has been the most difficult start-competition wise- that we've had in a long time. UMASS (Bryant played them last night) is a good team talent wise. They play excellent defense, but sometimes their offense breaks down." Bryant has never defeated a Division I school, and UMASS will be the first Division I opponent from the Northeast. "We're going to have to play a great game."

As for the future, Drury said, "we'll take them one at a time, University of Hartford is 4-0 now, and are very confident. Bridgeport, although 1-0 are very strong. New York Technical will be a chance for the students to see a real good basketball team."


