## Bryant Wears White

In cooperation with radio stations across the United States, WJMF kicked off the Wear White Campaign at Bryant this past Tuesday. Designed to express American concern for hostages in Iran, the campaign got off to a start in Atlanta, Georgia early last week. It quickly spread to radio stations across the nation.

The campaign was picked up in Rhode Island by WPRO in Providence. The station initiated the program with the hope of mobilizing the entire state. Since Rhode Island is a small state, it is hoped that it will be the first state to have a mass display of white.

WJMF learned of the campaign last Friday and contacted WPRO on Monday concerning the possibility of joining the campaign. Gary DeGrade, station official in charge of WPRO's campaign, provided WJMF with information on the campaign and welcomed any help in the promotion of it.

After talking with WPRO, Duane Lefevre, Public Relations Director of WJMF, consulted with members of the Board of Directors and a decision was reached to go ahead with the campaign. A public service announcement was prepared for broadcasting, a poster was hung in the Rotunda (counting the number of days hostages have been held captive), and fliers were distributed around the campus. White strips of cloth were made available by the radio station to be worn as armbands, on purses, or on car antennas.

Friday morning station members will be tagging cars in the parking lot. It is estimated that approximately 15,000 cars in Rhode Island have been tagged to date.

By displaying white, a person is not taking a position on the Iranian issue. The white is merely a symbol of hope; hope that the hostages will be returned to the U.S. safely.

In addition to the Wear White campaign, several other nation-wide programs displaying concern for the hostages have been proposed.

President Carter has endorsed suggestions that church bells be rung each noon until the Americans are released and that Americans write the Iranian Mission at the United Nations to demand the release of their fellow citizens.

Bryant students began to show their concern for the hostages last week when they paraded around the campus on several nights shouting out against Ayatollah Khomeini. On Saturday evening an effigy of the Ayatollah was hung from the belltower and set on fire.

Although these happenings do show an awareness of the situation by Bryant students, it is hoped that more constructive expressions of concern will be used in the future. By joining in the Wear White and other national campaigns, Bryantonians can join with other Americans in a national expression of support for the safe release of the hostages in Iran.

Bryant is now in the process of installing an Uninterruptable Power Supply (UPS) system for the Data General computer now in operation. The system was designed by Deltec of San Diego, California. It will be used primarily to correct imperfections in the power supply from Narragansett Electric and secondarily to supplement power to the computer in case of a power failure.

The 6200 pound system is composed of sixty batteries and a control unit, which are housed in a specially designed building located on the roof over the computer center. The building was constructed as one solid unit and was lifted into place over the summer. The batteries and control unit were lifted onto the roof within the past two weeks.

The UPS operates by taking the AC power received from the electric company, converting it to DC power which is then used to charge the batteries, and finally converting it

## Newspaper to Go Bi-Weekly

The Archway Editorial Board voted Wednesday night, December 5, to publish the newspaper on a bi-weekly schedule starting in the spring semester.

The decision to go bi-weekly was reached after several weeks of debate by Board members and discussions with various members of the Bryant Community. Thirteen issues had been tentatively scheduled for the spring; after taking into consideration the Spring and Easter breaks, it was decided to drop four publication dates. This will result in one issue approximately every two weeks.

The Archway has been published on a weekly basis since 1966. In past years the paper has been greatly

affected by an increase in student apathy toward it, as have many other Bryant student organizations. While on-campus students have increased in number, involved students have decreased in number.

Throughout the past two semesters, The Archway has tried many different alternatives to overcome staffing problems. Unfortunately none have been successful and The Archway is now forced to take an action which it had been hoping to avoid.

The Archway will continue to publish on a bi-weekly basis until the Editorial Board feels that the staff has increased to sufficient number where a weekly paper can once again be feasibly published.

## Festival of Lights

### Public Affairs Release

For the third consecutive year, Bryant College will celebrate the holiday seasons with its traditional "Festival of Lights" to be held on Thursday, December 13, 1979, at 9 p.m. in the Koffler Rotunda. The ceremony includes a candlelight service to honor the seasons of Hanukkah and Christmas. A simple service is conducted by the Bryant Catholic and Protestant chaplains, Father John Lolio and Rev. John Carlson, and by representatives from Jewish organizations. Music is provided by the College's Trinity Singers.

Following the "Festival of Lights"

service in the Rotunda, a candlelit procession of students, faculty, and staff leaves the Unistructure and walks to a nearby campus tree, which is officially lit by Bryant President William T. O'Hara. A reception with hot cider and punch in the Koffler Student Center concludes the evening's events.

The Festival of Lights is preceded by a festive dinner in the Salmanson Dining Hall from 4 to 6:30 p.m., featuring Santa Claus and his helpers. Traditional songs of the season provide the background for the holiday meal.

From 5 to 7 p.m., the film "Miracle on 34th Street" will be shown in the auditorium.

It is with much regret that I am informing you of my formal resignation from the Student Senate. I have thought it over during the past week and a half and finally reached a decision last night. I feel that this year's Senate is the best ever that this school will ever see. We have gotten more done in this semester than in the three and one half years that I've been here.

The reason for my resignation is

that I feel that the Student Senate is not representing all students on campus. I am referring to the Invalids not receiving money from the Ways and Means Committee of the Student Senate. The Student Senate is set up for the purpose of representing all students. I don't feel that they are doing this. The Invalids asked for money, like any other club or organization recognized by the Senate, and they were denied. I feel that this was a misrepresentation. The G.L.C. received a budget of \$5,501 which they allocate to each of the Frats and Sororities; even ones with five to seven members.

To the Editor:

WJMF, in cooperation with radio stations around the United States, urges you to **Wear White** as a symbol of hope that all the hostages in Iran will be released safely. White cloth is available in the Rotunda, at WJMF's studios and at various other locations throughout the Unistructure. We are urging anyone with cars to display white cloth from their antenna, hood ornament or

mirror. We are also urging people to wear white armbands or white clothing or to display white cloth on their pocketbooks.

Wearing these white symbols does not mean that you are pro anti-Shah; nor does it mean you believe that military action should or should not be taken. It is a simple sign of hope that all 50 hostages will be set free safely.

## Evening School Notice to Day Students

Since the close of preregistration, it has been necessary to add some additional sections. Over seventy-five percent of the evening students preregistered filling seventeen sections. An equal number will probably fill before the close of our mail registration on January 11.

New sections are Pre-College Algebra on Monday evenings, Principles of Marketing on Tuesday evenings, and Microeconomic Principles on Wednesday evenings. These are in addition to the original section listed those evenings which are filled. Three other courses, Taxes and Business Decisions;

COBOL Programming and Law of Business Organizations have been added. The first two on Thursday evening and the law on Saturday afternoon.

Day students wishing to add or drop an evening course for the spring must wait until January 14. At that time you may do so in person or by mail only. No telephone requests will be accepted. A maximum of ten day students, including the five who preregistered, may take any given evening course. The instructor cannot add you into a evening course. It must be done by the evening school.

## Part-Time Employment

Any students wishing part-time employment during winter session and/or spring semester should notify the Student Employment Coordinator's office in the Counseling Center as soon as possible. If you currently have an application on file and did not work during the fall semester, please submit your new schedule for the spring and your plans for winter session.

The office hours for the remainder of the academic year will be the same as this semester; Monday and Tuesday mornings; Wednesday afternoons; and all day Fridays. If these hours are not convenient for you, please call extension 491 and other arrangements will be made.

## O'Neill Book Published

### Public Affairs Release

**Eugene O'Neill: A World View**, a collection of essays by leading American and European O'Neill scholars and performers, a new book edited and introduced by Virginia Floyd, associate professor of English at Bryant College in Smithfield, Rhode Island, is being released this week. The result of a series of symposia that Doctor Floyd organized and moderated in the United States and abroad, the book features reflections on the playwright's private and artistic life by such O'Neill experts as Ingrid Bergman, Geraldine Fitzgerald, and celebrated O'Neill director Arvin Brown. The book was published by Fredrick Ungar Publishing Company of New York City.

Hailed as "a generous sampling of intriguing perspectives" (*ALA*

*BOOKLIST*), Doctor Floyd's book explores the impact of O'Neill on Europe and Europe on O'Neill with articles by such distinguished critics and scholars as Clifford Leech, England; Tom Olsson, Sweden; Peter Egri, Hungary; and Maya Koreneva, the Soviet Union. In "An American Perspective," aspects of the O'Neill genius are scrutinized by, among others, John Henry Raleigh, Albert Bermel, and Horst Frenz. Here articles explore the roots and effects of O'Neill's Irish Catholicism and New England puritanism, his mysticism, and his humanism.

Doctor Floyd is the first researcher authorized to read and comment upon the legendary O'Neill working notebooks, which have been totally restricted by Yale University's Beinecke Rare Book and Manuscript Library since the author's death more than twenty-

five years ago. Long fascinated by O'Neill's "understanding of human suffering" and perplexed by his neglect in academic circles, she has spent the past five years enlightening scholarly gatherings around the United States and the globe. Doctor Floyd organized The Modern Language Association (MLA) symposia with American and European O'Neill experts in 1975, 1976, and 1977, and traveled to Hungary in August, 1978, to work with scholars from the USSR, Czechoslovakia, Poland, and East Germany. In December, 1978, her latest MLA seminar—featuring Ms. Bergman, Ms. Fitzgerald, and Mr. Brown, among others—drew a record-breaking crowd of 2,200.

Currently, Doctor Floyd is finishing a second book based on her research at Yale, *Eugene O'Neill's Ideas for Plays*.

## Orientation Leader Applications

The specific duties and responsibilities of the Orientation Leader are as follows:

The Orientation Leader is appointed during the Spring Semester by a Selection Committee according to the time schedule below.

As an Orientation Leader, the student is expected to work toward the basic goals of the Orientation Program, assist new students with specific problems and personal concerns, and to serve as a representative of Bryant.

Compensation is provided for students selected as Orientation Leaders. Compensation includes a salary of approximately \$400 and room and board. The appointment of an Orientation Leader extends

from Spring through the Fall Semester. Fourteen (14) Orientation Leaders will be selected of which one (1) will be selected as Chairperson.

The Orientation Leader must:

1. Be actively involved in the design and preparation of the Orientation Program and Program materials.

2. Be available for both Spring and Summer training, Summer Orientation and Fall Orientation.

3. Serve as a general information and referral source for new students and parents regarding Bryant College.

4. Conduct small group meetings and participate in group discussions with new students and parents.

5. Acquaint students with student services and rules and regulations for Bryant College.

6. Live in the residence hall with the Orientees. (During the Summer)

7. Assume initial responsibility for discipline cases and special health problems which may arise.

8. Attend scheduled Orientation Staff Meetings.

9. Inform students about the testing program and assist students in making decisions regarding Advanced Placement Tests.

10. Serve as a member of the College Orientation Staff and perform other duties as assigned.

## Penmanship is Still Important

"Handwriting plays a significant role in today's communicative world," says Mary Nemesh, in an article in *The Balance Sheet*, a publication for business teachers. Penmanship, long a forgotten art, is actually a viable communication tool in business. Handwriting still is one of the most important skills a person can possess, and the typewriter will never totally replace hand and pen.

In recent years, the teaching of penmanship has been neglected in the schools, with the expected results that people today have more

illegible handwriting than ever. The article suggested several exercises teachers can do to help their students handwrite better, such as extra practice, work of difficult letter combinations, work with different pens and inks, and praise of students with superior penmanship.

There are two objectives to the penmanship practice: legibility and fluency. Good teachers will try to develop them both. Good handwriting is a business communications tool as useful as the newest word-processing machines.

## Craft Fair a Success

One thousand holiday shoppers viewed the handiwork of area craftsmen at Sunday's Second Annual WJMF Crafts Festival. The event, held in the Koffler Student Center, was coordinated by WJMF Public Relations Director Duane Lefevre.

Lefevre said that the number of merchants had doubled since last year. However, the number of shoppers had failed to double as hoped, because of "poor publicity."

A survey Mr. Lefevre took during the course of the afternoon event found the customers satisfied with the selection and prices. About half the customers came from off-campus, said Lefevre.

The merchants, mostly from Northern Rhode Island, were favorably impressed with the organization of the fair, according to Lefevre, although repeat

exhibitors found sales off from last year. According to Lefevre, the merchants attributed the drop-off to the greater number of craftsmen, and shoppers' fear of a recession.

Lefevre expects the event to continue as an annual affair, and hopes to see a doubling of attendance next year, with about the same number of merchants. He plans to increase attendance through store-window posters advertising the fair.

The event is a fund-raiser for Bryant's radio station. WJMF receives a commission of each merchant's sale, in addition to a small registration fee. Lefevre also sees the fair as a public-service, as it allows students to do holiday shopping on campus.

Mr. Lefevre is a sophomore marketing major from New Braintree, MA. He joined WJMF last year in its sales department.

## An Open Letter:

To all Bryant Students:

The Archway Editorial Board this past Wednesday made a very important decision by our vote to publish bi-weekly next semester. The Archway has been printed on a weekly basis for almost 14 years. The Board acknowledges the fact that our decision marks a step backward in The Archway's history. But at this point in time there is, unfortunately, no other path open to us.

Staffing The Archway has reached an all-time low. Three Editorial Board positions are presently vacant (and have been all semester). Staffs of the various departments are very small in number—too small to do an adequate job in any department of a newspaper.

A prime example, and the one which mainly influenced the Board's vote, is the Production Department. The positions of both Production Manager and Assistant Manager are both unfilled. The staff is very small, yet their job of putting together the paper is very large. Fortunately, for The Archway, Craig Brickey, Editor-in-Chief, had served as Assistant Production Manager last year. Throughout this semester Craig has unofficially served as Production Manager. But this situation is not feasible—1 person cannot adequately serve 2 positions! The work load is too great.

Senior Survival is not explicitly directed toward the four-year senior who is majoring in a business concentration. Hayes stressed that the program is directed at all seniors. Four sessions of Senior Survival were presented this semester; four more will be presented throughout next semester.

Next semester's sessions are entitled "Hiring Your Next Boss: A Few Things You Should Know," "Establishing Credit: How Do You Rate?", "Investing in More than a Six-Pack," and "Living on Your Own: The Search for an Apartment."

An informal, warm atmosphere prevails all Senior Survivals. Because the program is held at the Mowry Alumni House, only the first 45 students to make reservations one week in advance are able to attend.

Speakers are chosen by the Bryant Alumni Executive Board and the Alumni Office. Most speakers are Bryant Alumni, some are faculty and administrators, and a few are outside professionals who did not attend Bryant. According to Hayes, it is not hard to find speakers who are more than willing to share interesting facts about themselves to Bryant seniors, on a strictly volunteer basis.

Speeches are not given in the classroom lecture format. A half-hour cocktail hour starting at 7:00 p.m. precedes the hour to hour and one half speaker time plus question and answer period. The program concludes with coffee and dessert. This gives students the opportunity to continue discussions on a one to one basis with the speaker guest and others attending.

Hayes emphasized that the Alumni Association and Alumni Office are continuously trying to better Senior Survival. Questionnaires are distributed to people in attendance at the sessions with the purpose being to have, "The students tell us what they want, or if we have missed anything." Feedback from last year's questionnaire led to the addition of three new topics to the program.

How do the seniors feel who have attended Senior Survival? All of the feedback from the program is positive. Comments were made such as: "a beneficial and valuable program," "informative and interesting," and "mind opening." The general consensus of those students interviewed was that listening to the speakers was very beneficial and that they enjoyed the informal, relaxed way in which Senior Survival is conducted.

normally, eliminating the crash come down in which programs on the computer are lost. The computer will operate on battery power for approximately fifteen minutes, allowing enough time for the shut down.

According to Jack Burns, Director of the Computer Center, the UPS system will, in the long-

run, "make the computer more reliable." It will not go down for power failures or be affected by the irregularities that occur in the supply of electric power.

The system has yet to be tied in electrically, stated Charlie Pickett, Plant Engineer, but it is expected to be in operation by the middle of next semester.

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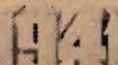
