### SENATOR PASTORE TO SPEAK TO DELTA OMEGA

United States Senator of Rhode Island, John O. Pastore, will speak to members and guests of the Delta Omega Business Society at its final dinner-banquet for the semester at the Admiral Inn on January 13, 1964. The meeting will start at the usual time of 6:30 p.m.

Coined as "Rhode Island's Little Firecracker" by the Saturday Evening Post in 1949, Mr. Pastore has risen dramatically in the ranks of Democratic politics both in his home state of Rhode Island, and as Senator in Washington since 1950.

Mr. Pastore received his law degree from Northeastern University and many honorary degrees, among them a Doctor of Science degree from Bryant.

His political action grew over the years and between 1945 and 1950 he was governor of the state.

As much at home in Washington as Cranston, the Senator is a noted part of the nation's political scene.

Mr. Pastore was a personal friend of the late President John F. Kennedy.

While in Congress the Senator has been enthusiastic in many Congressional activities, among them the first Conference of Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy which met in Geneva in 1953.

He has proven himself a forceful man in his own state. Recently his approval was noted on obtaining a Federal Grant for the East Providence Water Improvement Project.

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## EDITORIALS

### DORMITORY DISCIPLINE

In a recent conversation by two dormitory students, dissatisfaction was strongly expressed over a dormitory president's enforcement of discipline. The statement overheard was nothing more than a paradox. Why on earth would someone criticize a dormitory president for enforcing the rules when he is only doing his job?

It is pretty much of a known fact that no matter how good a job an administrator does, there is always someone who will complain. Are these complaints registered out of jealousy? out of hate? It could be anyone of a number of reasons.

Part of an education in college is to learn how to get along and work with other people. Certainly there will come a time in our lives when we go to work and have to abide by the decisions of our employer. We may not always like his decisions and rules, but in order to keep a job and be happy in it, we must make an effort to try to follow the decisions and rules of the employer.

As an appeal to the dormitory students, we present the following ideas: Let's apply the principles of working with job administrators to working with dormitory administrators. Give a little effort and work along with them and the counselors. Occasionally they may come up with a decision that an individual will not like, but we must remember that it is their job and that they try to make decisions that are best for the majority. If the students feel that they have a legitimate complaint against a dormitory officer, there are proper channels to take; there should not be any personal actions taken by the students themselves.

Keep in mind that the dormitory presidents are responsible to the house mothers, deans, and dormitory council as well as to the individual students who elected them.

If we try to understand the difficult position that these officers are in and if we are a little more considerate knowing that they are fellow students, an atmosphere of harmony will prevail that will be conducive to better and more efficient dormitory organization.

### HAZING OF PLEDGES

The recent episode at a Brown University fraternity house has once again brought fraternities on all college campuses in the area into the limelight. There isn't any question that what went on at Brown was morally wrong. Pledging is a time to become well acquainted with the fraternity brothers and to have good, clean, unforgettable experiences, not a time to endanger the well-being of a would-be brother.

In the near future, pledging activities will begin on our campus. The fraternities can be sure that they will be under fairly close watch so as not to have an incident such as that at Brown occur on the Bryant campus. If the fraternities on the Bryant campus conduct their pledge activities as they have in the past where there was constructive, fun-filled chores for the pledges to take part in, we will once again prove that the fraternity system at Bryant is an asset not a detriment to student life.

### End of Semester Information for Business

#### Administration Department Students

1. Cards indicating that you are excused from, or ineligible for the final examinations, will be distributed in your last scheduled class.
2. If you receive a card indicating that you are ineligible because of excess cuts and feel that you have a valid reason for this extended absence from class, take the card to the Dean's Office at least three days before the examination and explain your case. If approval to take the examination is granted, this fact will be endorsed on the card and when presented to the proper instructor, will authorize the taking of the test.
3. If for some reason you have a conflict in time between examinations, please report the facts to the Dean's Office as soon as your complete examination schedule is known. A special examination will be arranged for you.
4. Every student—unless barred because of excess cuts—may take the final examination, regardless of his average, if he wishes. If you elect to take the final in the hope of raising your grade, you must notify your instructor in advance so that he will provide an examination paper for you. Once you report for and take the examination paper, the grade thereon must be considered in determining your final average.
5. All students taking final examinations should provide themselves with necessary paper and writing materials. Unless use of books and notes is permitted in taking the examinations, such material should be left at home or at least placed on the hat racks in the room. Cribbing of any kind can be most injurious to your record.
6. All students must present an identification card at the time of each examination. If you do not have a photo I.D. card, you may obtain a signature I.D. card at the Records Office.
7. Please read the examination schedule carefully and make your own personal time schedule.
8. If you are ill and cannot take an examination, please notify the Dean's Office promptly so that plans may be made for a special final. Any student who, without good reason, fails to take a final examination at the scheduled time will be assessed a late examination fee of \$5.00. This does not apply to students who are on active duty with Reserve groups, nor to those genuinely ill, nor to other cases which justify an absence from the examination. Prior notice to the Dean's Office will generally be required as a basis for avoidance of the fee. Payment of the fee to the College Bursar will be a prerequisite for the making of arrangements for a special late examination.
9. Semester grades will be mailed January 29. Grades will not be available either from instructors or the Records Office before this date.
10. Registration for the Spring Semester will take place as follows:
  - Monday, February 3, 1964
  - 8:30 to 9:00 A.M., New Students
  - 9:00 to 9:30 A.M., Students who entered in 1961
  - 10:30 to 11:30 A.M., Students who entered in 1962
  - 1:00 to 2:00 P.M., Students who entered in 1963
11. Smooth operation of the College demands adherence to the above time schedule. Unless illness or other serious reasons are a factor, a late registration fee of \$5.00 will be assessed.

### Secretarial Department Student Information for the Mid-year Examination Period 1964

1. Classes end January 17.
2. On the last meeting of each class all students who are excused from the final examination will be given cards evidencing this special privilege. If you do not receive an "excuse card," you must take the examination during the examination period, January 20 through 24.
3. A cut allowance of 4 classes for each 3 class hour course, 7 classes for each 5 hour course, and 8 classes for each 6 hour course is granted without penalty to take care of illness and other necessary absences. There are no excused cuts except when conflicting college activities prevent attendance in class. Double cuts are given on days before and after holidays and vacations. The Deans of the Departments may modify the double cut penalty for cause.
4. A student who has a quiz average of 80 per cent or better for the number of quizzes required by the instructor and who has kept his cuts within the limits specified above will be excused from the final examination and will be given a grade equal to the average of his quiz grades.
5. A student who has a quiz average of less than 80 per cent or who has not taken the number of quizzes required by the instructor or who has cuts in excess of the allowance specified above will be required to take a final examination. The final grade shall be the average of the quiz average and the examination grade. The quiz average shall be the total of the quiz grades divided by the number of quizzes taken.
6. To be eligible to take a final examination in any subject, a student must have completed his work assignments in a satisfactory manner by the date set by the instructor and must have kept his cuts down to eight or less for a three-hour course. Where illness or other extenuating conditions are present, the Dean of the department may waive the attendance requirements. No re-take examinations are given.
7. Registration for all students in the Secretarial Department for the new semester will take place at 9:30 A.M. on Monday, February 3. Renewal teacher-education students will register at 10:00 A.M. on Monday, February 3.

There is in the Student Senate a new committee of which I have made mention but possibly not clarified. This, the Student Senate Review Committee, deals with the organization members of the Senate. The purpose of creating the committee was to give organizational assistance to any organization represented in the Bryant College Student Senate.

Lately, it appears, more and more questionnaires are being handed out on campus. One or two of these may have been offensive or otherwise objectionable to any number of students or faculty, so a curb has been placed on the distribution of all questionnaires. All Student Senate member organizations must bring their questionnaires before the Senate or Executive Committee for approval. If the organization is not a member of the Student Senate, the questionnaire must have the approval of the administration.

John Adams, President of the B.C.A., and Pete Castelli, President of the G.L.C., feeling that there should be no reason for any absence from any Student Senate meeting during the semester, drew up an amendment for Article XIII on Absenteeism. The amendment would limit each member organization to one absence from a Senate meeting with 2nd absences calling for a semester's suspension for the Student Senate. There are only eight meetings a semester and since each organization has two delegates to the Senate at least one should be able to be present at least seven out of the eight.

The Student Senate is working for a better Bryant. Unless we, the students, support the Student Senate actions, and actions of its member organizations, all Student Senate work will be in vain. The stronger your Student Senate, the stronger the students. The strength of Bryant lies with each individual member of each class.
