1964 Alumni Annual Giving Program Underway

On March 4 the first of a series of special mail pieces was sent to Bryant alumni to introduce the 1964 Alumni Annual Giving Program. This program is an enlarged and refined continuation of alumni solicitation begun in 1956.

The program, a new concept for Bryant, has already drawn the response of forty-three men and women to be Class Chairmen.

On January 11, Robert M. McGivney, 1959, General Chairman for the Alumni Annual Giving Program and assistant City Controller for Providence, spoke to eighteen Class Chairmen at a special workshop held on campus. Dr. E. Gardner Jacobs was host to the group at a luncheon, and Professor George Richards and Assistant Professor Edward Hand were also present and spoke briefly of new programs and materials in their departments.

Circle K International Wins Honor Medal From Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge

Circle K International, one of whose clubs serves the campus at Bryant College, has been awarded the George Washington Honor Medal for its college campus citizenship and service program in 1963, it was announced today by Pasquale F. Grieco. This is the third time that Circle K International has been honored by the Freedoms Foundation.

Specifically, Circle K's work in promoting active citizenship by participating in service projects on the campus was singled out for praise by the Freedoms Foundation.

A Freedoms Foundation award enjoys the same prestige and significance in the community service field that the "Oscar" does in the motion picture industry and the "Emmy" of the television world.

Though Circle K International is a relatively new organization—now in its ninth year—it already numbers more than 10,000 members on over 525 college campuses in the United States and Canada. Circle K is the fastest growing and most active service organization on college campuses. Seventy-six new clubs were chartered during 1963.

Circle K is a college level service club sponsored by a local Kiwanis club which voluntarily assumes the leadership responsibilities in its respective college and host community.

The National Alumni Council of Bryant College maintains a scholarship fund from which grants to qualified students are made in varying amounts. The primary basis for consideration is the degree of financial need of each applicant.

There are no restrictions as to the number of grants to be made or the amount of each grant.

Students enrolled at the College may apply at the end of their first year or during their second semester.

Selection of applicants for these grants are made by a board of alumni in cooperation with the Administration and Faculty of Bryant College.

On Saturday, May 30, both classes will meet at Scarborough Beach for surf work. On Sunday, May 31, the combined classes will meet at Camp Yawgoog for small craft safety work. Both of these sessions are required and all must plan to attend on both days. The graduation exercises will be held on June 3, at 7:30 p.m.

Before a person can apply, he must meet the following requirements:

1. He must be 18 years of age or older—or 17 years of age and a high school graduate. On registration night, proof of age is required of all who are 17, 18, or 19 years of age. Seventeen (17) year-olds will also need to show proof of graduation.

2. A current Senior Life Saving Certificate. (This must be presented at registration) Only Red Cross certificates.

3. You must bring your own bathing suit, towel, notebook, and pencil.

4. SWIMMING AND DIVING TEXT and LIFE SAVING AND WATER SAFETY TEXT. These books may be purchased at the first class @ 75¢ each.

5. Registration covering pool and locker room fee—\$5.00—to be paid at the first class.

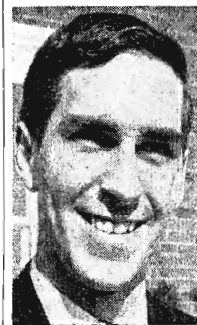

Looking ahead, it is safe to predict a strong team in the following years, the reason being that four of this year's starters are freshmen.

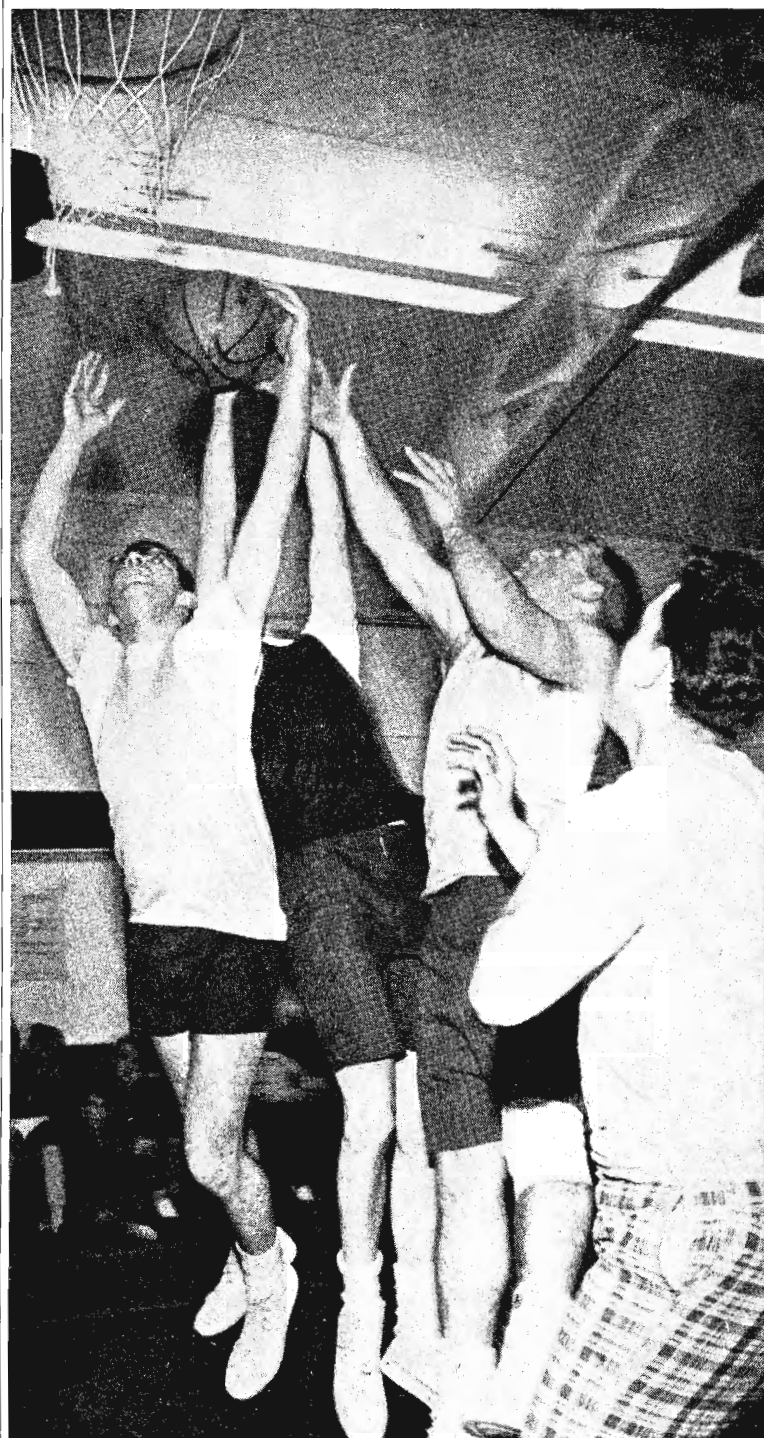
Baseball News

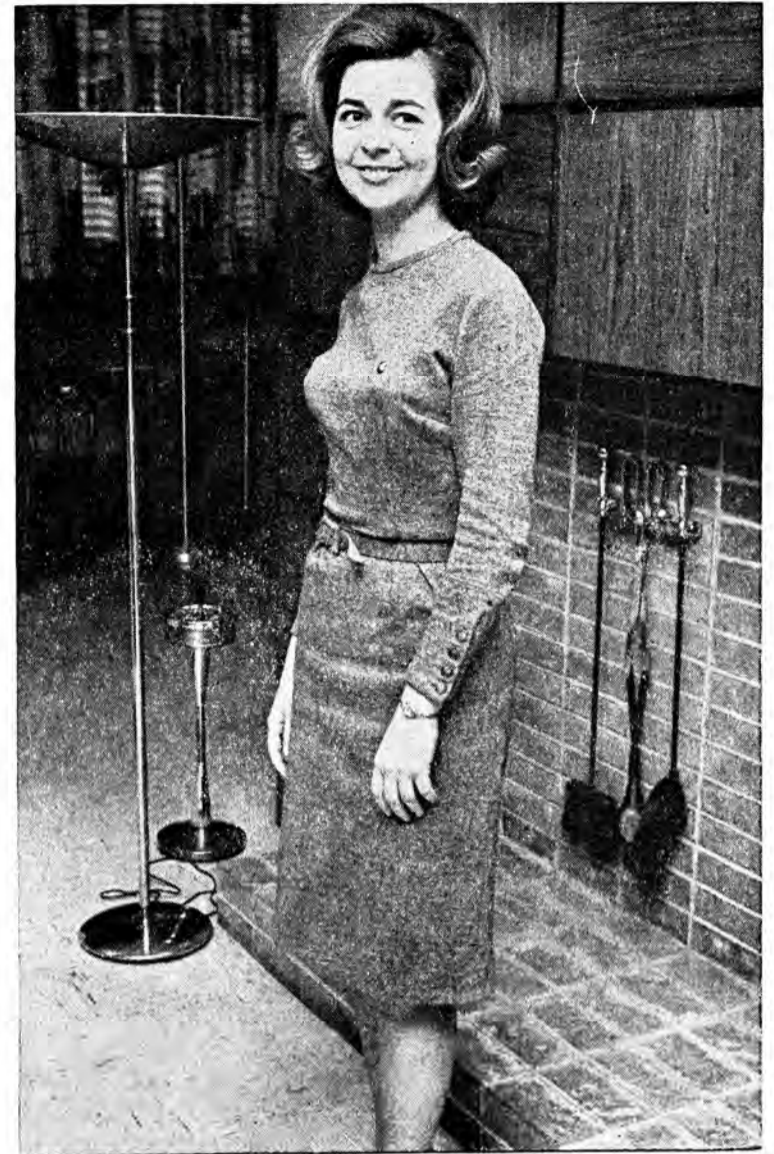

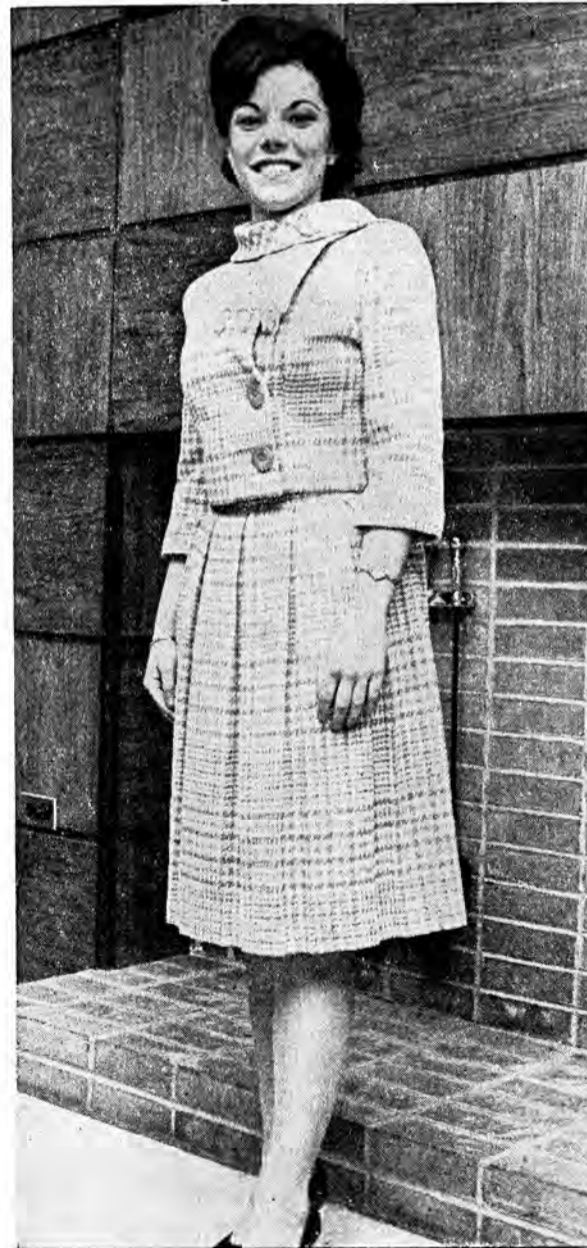

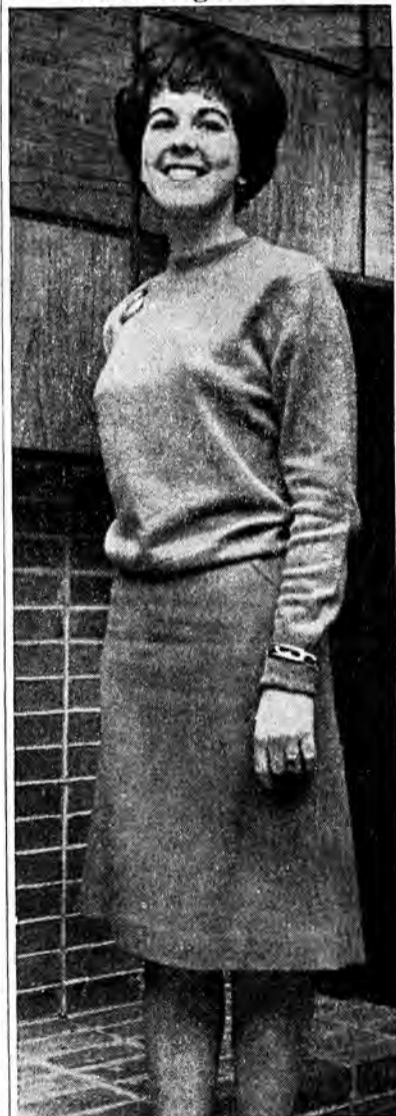
