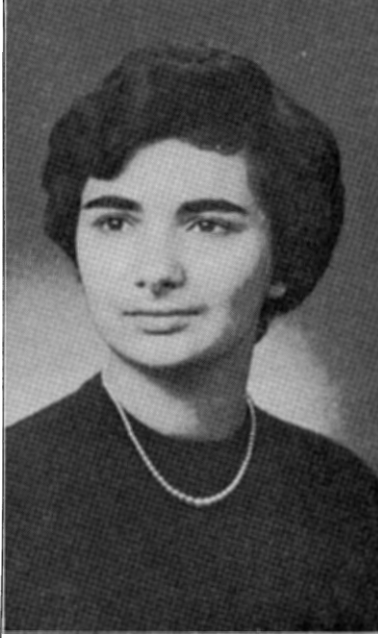

# Dr. Barnaby C. Keeney, Brown University President Will Address Graduates at 1962 Commencement Exercises

Dr. Barnaby C. Keeney, President of Brown University and six other distinguished American citizens will receive honorary degrees at the 99th Commencement of Bryant College of Business Administration, Providence, Rhode Island, on Friday, July 27, 1962, in the new Meehan Auditorium, corner Hope Street and Lloyd Avenue in Providence, Rhode Island at 10:00 a.m. This is the first Bryant College commencement exercise to be held at the new Brown University auditorium. Dr. Keeney will deliver the Commencement Address and will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Science in Business Administration (D.S. in B.A.) by Dr. E. Gardner Jacobs, president of Bryant College.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters (L.H.D.) will be conferred upon the Honorable Claiborne Pell, the junior Senator from Rhode Island. This is the first honorary degree to be conferred upon Senator Pell. Dr. William Clement Gaige, President of Rhode Island College, former Superintendent of Schools in Claremont, California, and a member of the New England Board of Higher Education, is to have the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters (Litt.D.) conferred upon him. Miss Grace M. Glynn, Chief of the Division of Adult Education in the R. I. State Department of Education, who began her career in education as a secondary teacher in the schools of Providence, will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Pedagogy (Ped.D.). Miss Glynn served as president of the Pembroke Alumnae Association from 1960 to 1962. Mr. U. Harold Williams, Scout Executive Emeritus, Narragansett Council, Boy Scouts of America, who recently retired as Scout Executive of the Narragansett Council after 43 years of service, will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters (L.H.D.) and Mr.

Felix A. Miranda, prominent Rhode Island business executive and President of the Imperial Knife Company, will be awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Science in Business Administration (D.S. in B.A.). Mr. Miranda was given the National Brotherhood Award in 1957 and was made a Knight of St. Gregory by Pope Pius XII and a Knight Commander by Pope John XXIII. These degrees will be conferred by Dr. E. Gardner Jacobs, President of Bryant College, who will preside at the Graduation Exercises.

City greetings will be presented by the Honorable Walter H. Reynolds, Mayor of the City of Providence. Presiding over the 99th Commencement Day exercises of Bryant College will be Dr. E. Gardner Jacobs, M.S. in C., Ed.D., President of the College. A musical prelude will follow with selections from Friml, Porter, Lehar, Strauss, and Herbert; while the academic procession will enter to the traditional "Pomp and Circumstance." Upon the beginning strains of the National Anthem, the audience will rise and will remain standing during the invocation delivered by the Reverend

Charles Baldwin, Chaplain of Brown University.

Dr. Barnaby C. Keeney, President of Brown University, will deliver the Commencement address to the 390 men and women graduates of the 99th Commencement Day class of Bryant College which represent twelve states and four foreign countries. The presentation of degrees to candidates for bachelors' degrees and diplomas will be made by Dr. E. Gardner Jacobs. Dr. Michael F. Walsh, Commissioner of Education of the State of Rhode Island, will present Teachers' Eligibility Statements to graduates who have completed the four-year Business Teacher-Education program.

The benediction will be delivered by Monsignor Arthur T. Geoghegan, Superintendent of Diocesan Schools. The recessional music, played by Ed. Drew and his orchestra will signal the end of the 99th Commencement Day Program.

The two-day graduation program of Bryant College will begin on Thursday, July 26, at 10:00 a.m. on the Campus Green. Chairman of the Class Day program will be Mr. Richard Laffargue '62, President of the Student Senate. The invocation will be delivered by Reverend William H. Chard, of the Church of the Redeemer. President E. Gardner Jacobs will address the graduates and will present the annual scholastic awards to those seniors who have attained high scholastic standing and distinguished themselves as school citizens. Miss Sara Elizabeth Schauweker '62, degree candidate of the School of Secretarial Science, and Lt. Col. Edwin J. McCarren '62, degree candidate of the School of Business Administration, will be class day speakers.

The singing of the Bryant College Alma Mater and the benediction delivered by Reverend Chard will bring to a close the Class Day program. Immediately following, the 1962 graduates will proceed to the main stairway of South Hall for the Class Picture, after which the graduates and guests will proceed to Jacobs Hall for the class reception.

The two-day graduation program will come to a close with the Annual Senior Ball to be held at the Sheraton-Biltmore Ballroom on Friday evening, July 27, at 9:00 p.m.

The Members of the Bryant College Student Senate and the Greek Letter Council of the College will march as a body in the Commencement Procession, for the first time in the history of the College.

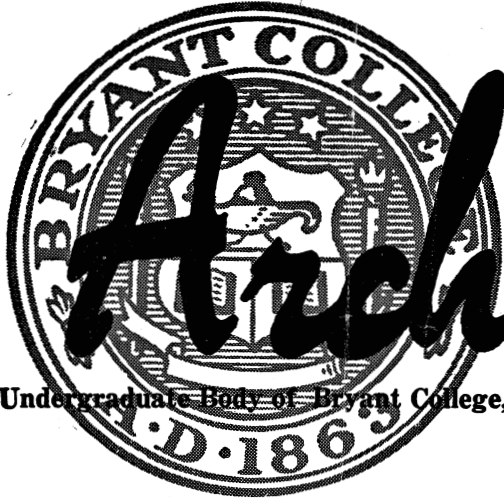

## Simone Brother's Awards Total \$13,400

Two Bryant College brothers have done quite well in winning scholarships for designed automobile entries in the Fisher Body Craftsman's Guild. They are Gerald and Eugene Simone, students of Business Administration at Bryant College.

The first participation in the competition of the Guild came in 1956 when Gerald, the oldest brother, won the 2nd state award in the junior division.
