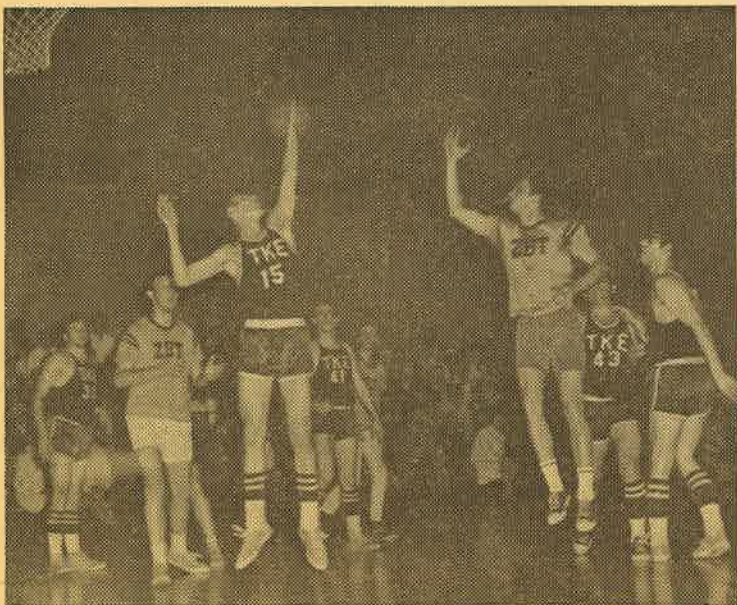

That old saying, "as Genden goes, so goes TKE," applied last Monday night as TKE dealt ZBT a 92-79 loss. Steve Genden scored the season high in the fraternity league . . . 45 points. Genden was just fantastic in this game which gave TKE the first victory in the two out of three series. It was possible for TKE to wrap up this championship series last Tuesday at Hope High School.

The difference in this game was the bench of TKE. Coach Rob Daughton substituted freely and didn't lose anything when he did substitute. ZBT played with most of the same men throughout the game. To see the expression on their faces and to see the way they were trying to keep up with the TKE fast break, one could tell they were in dire need of a bench. For ZBT John Doherty collected 24 points while John Bucchard added 18. For TKE their two big rebounders Ed Buecher and Steve Barnicoat had 19 and 16 respectively. Barnicoat had fourteen foul shots and of fifteen attempts.

In the intramural league the Applepickers moved one game ahead of the Barbarians in a very well played game. The star of the game even though he lost was Doug Meeker. Meeker played a terrific game scoring 24 points, rebounding well, and in general really getting up. Again the lack of a bench hurt the losers as the Barbarians were really beat. For the Applepickers who at one time had a 17-point lead, it was the inside work of Tom Bass and Carl Stone which spelled the victory. Stone threw in close to thirty points.

Lone Senate Runners Gain Dismal Victory

The four students running for Senate office were all easily elected in their bids last Thursday. From the point of view of current Senators, this year's campaign was a grave disappointment.

Despite outstanding successes on the part of the Senate this past school year, the interest in taking part in the workings of student government were almost totally absent. Not only were the candidates few in num-

ber; the voters, too, were sparse. Chip Howard, chairman of the Elections Committee, reports that only 21% of the student body turned out for the election.

Lynne Hayden, who ran for the office of President, did though, have a close race against Bob Stosse of Beta, a write-in candidate, who polled 37% of the votes cast. Ken Snow, running for Vice-President; Bob Coleman, running for

Treasurer; and Jeanne Ritchie, running for Secretary, each polled over 75% of the vote in sliding to a victory.

Although a preponderance of candidates was obviously missing, those students elected to office are all highly capable, and will no doubt continue to work for progress at Bryant. Still, there is a missing ingredient that only you, the student can provide: interest.

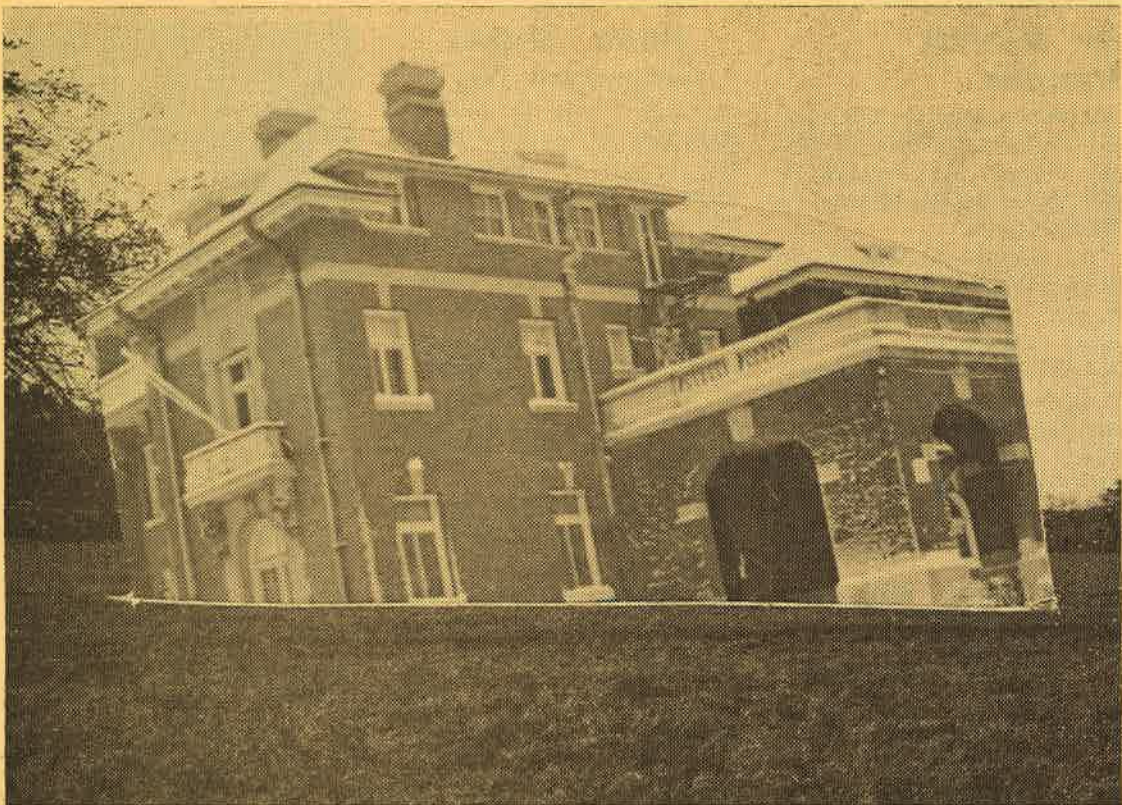
Pledging is finally over. The sisters are just as happy as the pledges that pledging has come to an end for another year.

C.I.A. Uncovers Plot at Bryant

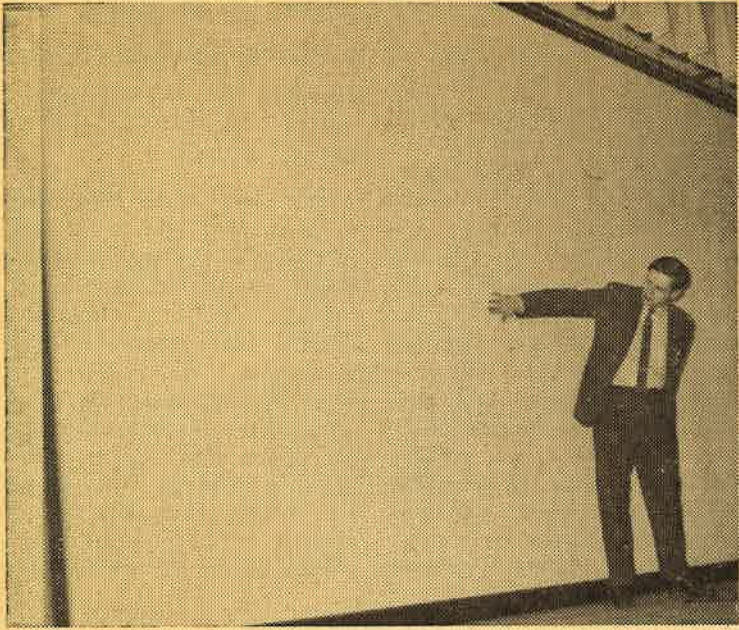

on a new device that will seat three men on one snow blower. This, he says, will make it much easier for the maintenance department to pack snow down harder on the non-essential walkways around the campus. To: Faculty From: Administration Subject: Procedure to be followed in case of death

It has been brought to the attention of this office that many employees have been dying while on duty for apparently no good reason. Furthermore, the same employees are refusing to fall over after their demise. This practice must STOP AT ONCE.

On or after May 1, 1969, any employee found sitting up after he or she has died will be dropped from the payroll at once, without an investigation under Regulation 29, Section 8-1, Paragraph A.

Where it can be proved that the employee is being held up by a desk, typewriter, or any other support which is the property of the Company, a ninety-day period of grace will be granted. The following procedure shall be followed:

"If, after several hours, it is noticed that any employee has not moved or changed position, the department head will investigate. Because of the highly sensitive nature of our employees and the close resemblance between death and their natural working attitude, the investigation will be made quietly so as to prevent waking the employee if he is sleeping. If doubt persists as to his true condition, extending a paycheck shall be considered a true and valid test. If the employee does not reach for it, it may be reasonably assumed that he is dead. NOTE: In some instances the instinct is so strongly developed that a spasmodic clutch reflex action may occur."

In all cases, a sworn statement by the deceased must be provided on a special form available from maintenance. Fifteen (15) copies shall be made: Three (3) copies to be sent to Washington; two (2) to the deceased. The remaining copies shall be sent to the department files to be lost in the usual manner.

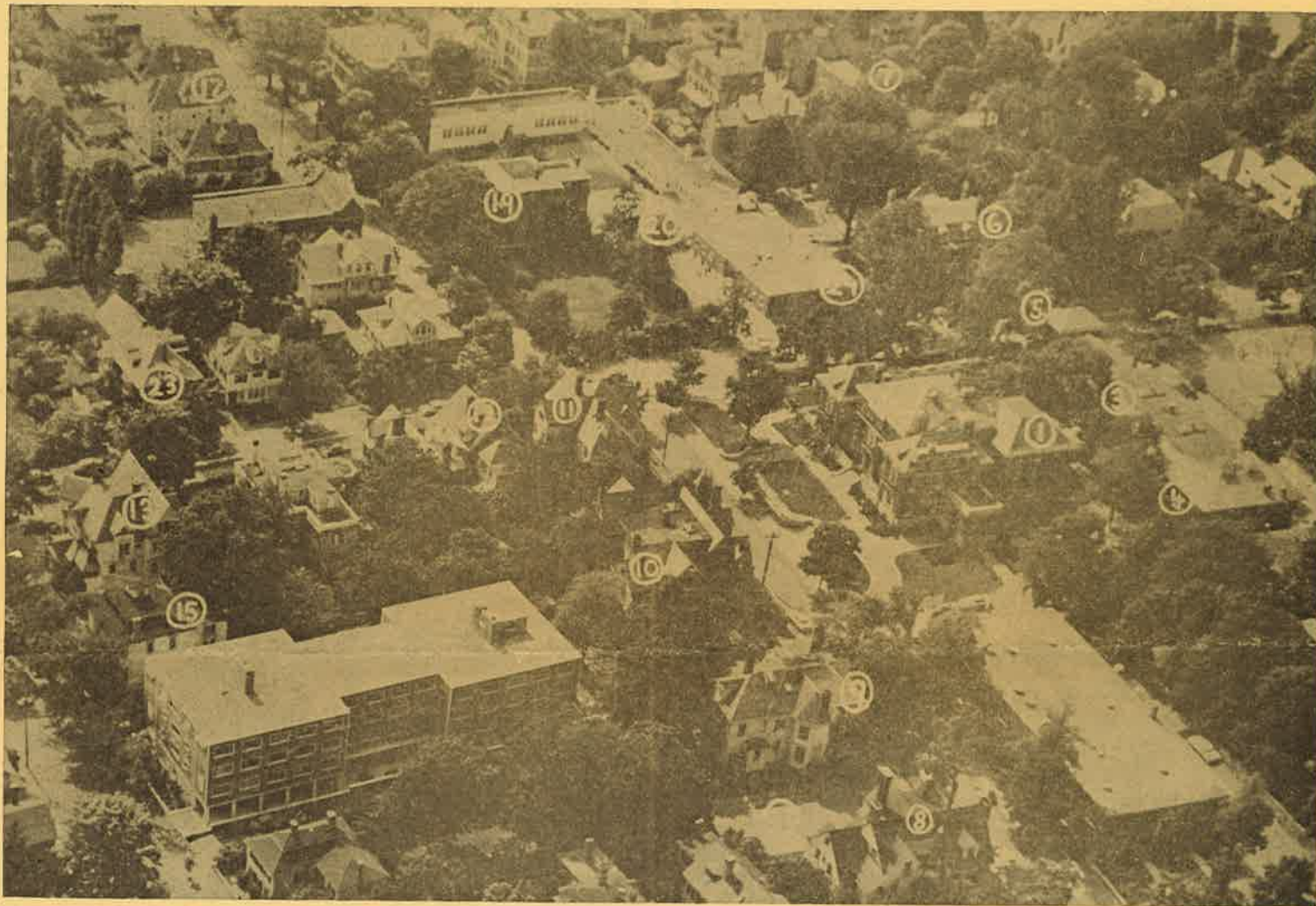

With many colleges and universities discussing the idea of co-ed dorms, Bryant College makes another stride (not step, stride!) forward in the annals of liberal education with the announcement yesterday that starting in September, co-ed housing will take effect.

Bryant's release was especially noteworthy. Brown and Pembroke students expressed delight at administrative approval recently of a co-ed dorm whereby male students would reside on one floor and females on the next floor, alternating every other floor in the same structure. Where rooms have in the past accommodated three or more students, the one-for-one ratio will still hold, as the administration is of the opinion that two individuals of one sex residing in the same room with one person of the opposite sex will cause undue emotional stress and burden and result in poorer academic achievement of the minority.

In her statement, Dean Castronovo, Dean of Women, said, "Ninety percent of the present dormitory regulations will be thrown out the door."

Dean William C. Smith was heard to say, "Well, ah think it's real fine. It'll help the students get a well-rounded education. It'll allow Bryant students to get to know one another a little bit better."

Parking Meters to Be Installed

It was reliably reported today by informed sources that the Providence Traffic Department with the assistance of the Police Department will soon start on the installation of parking meters on certain sides of streets bordering the Bryant Campus.
