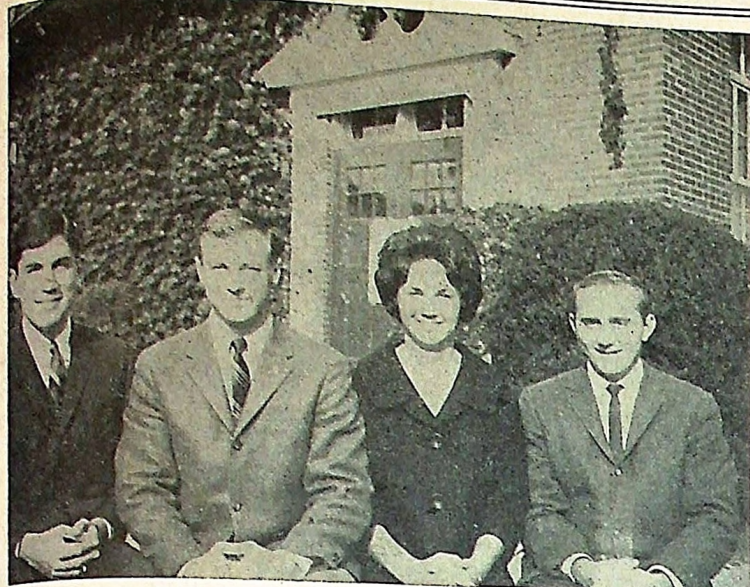

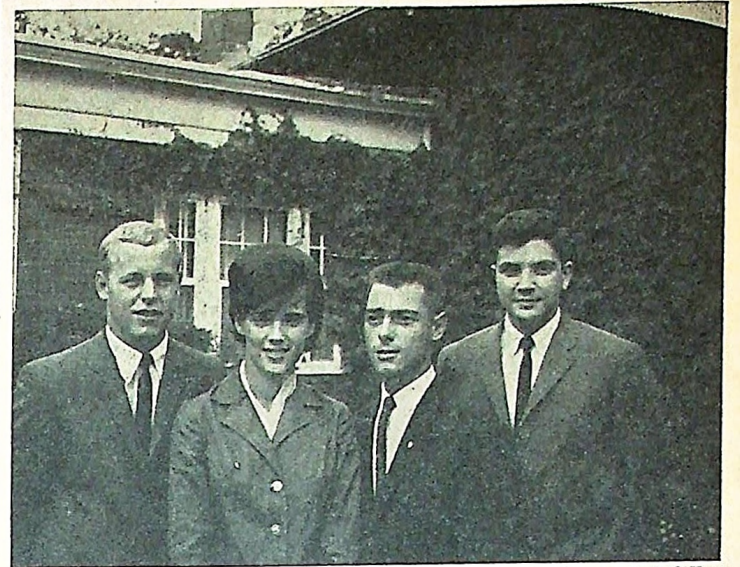

wishers, all wanting to get a chance to see him.

Hundreds of students from Bryant and Brown were on hand to greet the president when he arrived on the Hill. The President seemed almost impervious to secret service requests to stay seated as his motorcade proceeded through the mingling crowd. For those who were awaiting his arrival at the auditorium, it seemed as though President Johnson would never make it.

The excitement in the air as the crowd sat in the mammoth auditorium anxiously waiting for their President was sometimes almost tangible. At one point, someone on the far side of the building came forth with a resounding whistle that echoed throughout the entire auditorium. Suddenly the crowd of 5,000 sat silent. They apparently thought that the moment had arrived. Only seconds later did they realize that they had mistaken a casual wolf whistle for the signal of the arrival of the President.

Now aware that they had been 'taken' the crowd broke into wild laughter and applauded the poor soul that did the whistling. After this little incident, the crowd appeared to be much more relaxed and less tense while they were waiting.

Then, without warning, about twenty members of the Washington Press Committee invaded the press section where this reporter was seated. Apparently, this was the group that had been traveling with the Presidential party; and their arrival meant that President Johnson was only seconds away.

Next, eight or ten secret service men pushed the reporters away from the entrance and the President of the United States walked briskly to the stairs and mounted the stage. Close behind the secret service men and the President were Mrs. Johnson, and Governor and Mrs. Chafee. The first lady had on a red suit and was carrying a red bouquet of roses that had been presented to her earlier. Mrs. Chafee was in a yellow suit and looked very happy and vibrant. The wives of the two officials were seated in front of the auditorium while the Governor joined the President on the stage.

After Dr. Keeney, President of Brown had welcomed the guests, he introduced the president. As President Johnson walked to the podium, he received a loud round of applause from those who had waited so long to see him. At first the President spoke in a low voice. Apparently, he was suffering from hoarseness; but as the speech went on, he began to work into his natural speaking voice.

There was a fine turnout at the first sign-up meeting. The list of players will be published in the next installment of this article.

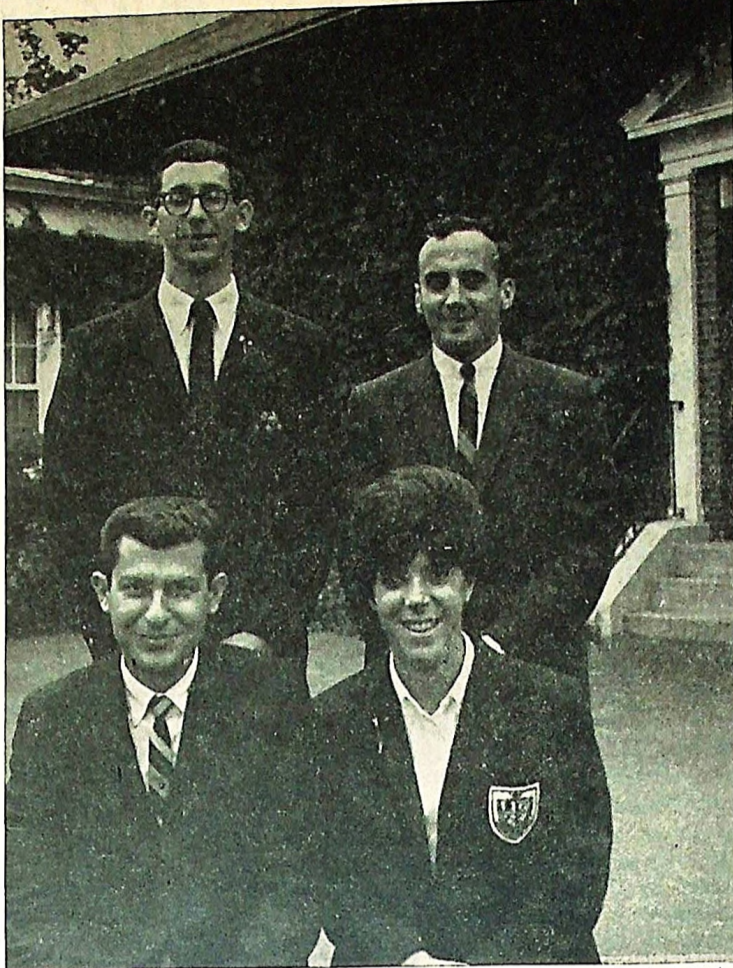

Barren tennis courts are no more, as Bryant College starts its Fall Tennis Singles. Although this is only the second year for the tournament, participation has almost doubled. Many people who once felt that tennis was only a summer sport are now beginning to realize that the tennis season is not limited to just the summer.

The tournament will be held in three rounds plus the finals. The first round ends October 15; the second, October 21; the third October 27. The finals must be played by November 2. Although matches may be played on any court, it is compulsory that the finals be played on Bryant courts. A draw sheet has been made for the tournament by the Athletic Office. It lists the three divisions: Fraternities, Sororities, and Independents. This draw sheet is outside the Activities Office, and students can check the dates when matches are to be played. Matches may be played any time before the deadline. It will be the winners' responsibility to report scores in writing to the Activities Office after each match.

Games are governed by Official Tennis Rules. Matches will consist of the best-of-three sets. This will be single elimination. Participants must furnish their own equipment. Each player should have one can of new balls available for each match. The unopened can should be turned over to the winner of the match. In this way no individual would be required to buy more than one can of balls for the entire tournament. All one pays for the tournament is just the price of a can of balls; there is no entry fee.

Tennis is really a great sport, and many people are happy that Bryant has revived the sport. This year's rapid growth in representation shows how interested everyone is becoming in tennis. More and more people are realizing that extra activities help round out campus life.

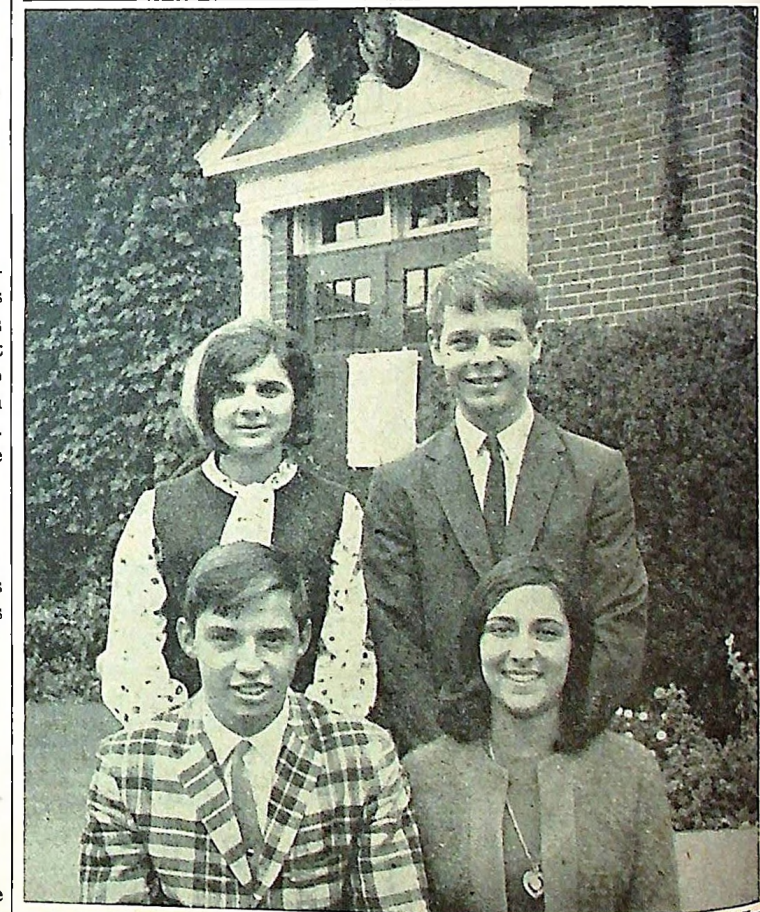
Last year Kappa Tau was the winner of the George A. Richards trophy with a total of 675 points.
