

## Over 700 STUDENTS IN ATTENDANCE DURING SUMMER SESSION

On Friday, June 18, the experimental Intercession Program came to a close. With a vacation of two days, students were once again on their way to classes as the regular Summer Session started on Monday, June 21.

The Summer Session is divided into three class periods with time breaks as follows:

- First Period—8:00 to 9:35
- Second Period—9:45 to 11:20
- Third Period—12:00 to 1:35

During the Summer Session one test or one term paper will be required. A final examination will be given on the last day of the session. The final will count two-thirds and the test or paper, one-third of the student's final grade.

The maximum number of cuts has been set at four. Cuts in excess of four will bar the student from the final exam unless he has written permission from the Dean of his Department. Permission will be granted only when extenuating circumstances justify cuts beyond the allowance.

The Secretarial Department has a summer enrollment of 249 students. A total of 19 instructors are teaching the following courses: English, Office Machines, Written Communications, Math, Word Study, Sociology, Literature, Geography, Machine Transcription, and once again, Shorthand and Typewriting.

There are 445 students enrolled in the Business Administration Department for the summer session. A total of 23 instructors in this Department are teaching the following courses: Accounting, Taxes, Money & Banking, Investments, English, Public Speaking, Literature, Modern Novel, Geography, Law, Statistics, Retailing, Advertising, Math, Psychology, Physical Science, Biology, International Relations, Sociology, Management Seminar, U. S. History, Law, and Personnel.

The Summer Session will end on July 22 with the completion of final exams. A schedule of final examinations for both the Secretarial and Business Administration Departments is presented below.

## FINAL EXAMINATION SCHEDULE

Final examinations for all summer school classes in both the Secretarial and Business Administration Departments will be held according to the following schedule:

1. Summer school classes meeting at 8:00 A.M. will have their final examinations on Wednesday, July 21, from 8:00 to 11:00 A.M.
2. Summer school classes meeting at 12:00 will have their final examinations on Wednesday, July 21, from 12:00 to 3:00 P.M.
3. Summer school classes meeting at 9:45 A.M. will have their final examinations on Thursday, July 22, from 8:00 to 11:00 A.M.

Classes without final examinations end on Tuesday, July 20.

## Field Day on July 19

On Monday, July 19 from 2:30 to 4:30, the fraternities and sororities will take part in a Bryant College Field Day. The activities include the 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, broad jump, regular relay, stunt relay, 3-legged race, wheel barrel race, and the softball throw for distance. In addition to the above activities which are for both men and women, the shot put and the football pass for distance for men and the volleyball serve for distance and the 100-yard backward race for women are also offered. The participants in Field Day include Chi Gamma Iota, Kappa Tau, Beta Sigma Chi, Alpha Theta Chi, Beta Iota Beta, Phi Upsilon, Alpha Phi Kappa, Sigma Iota Xi, and Sigma Iota Beta.

If any other fraternities or sororities are interested in participating in the day's events, they should sign up at the Student Activities Office as soon as possible.

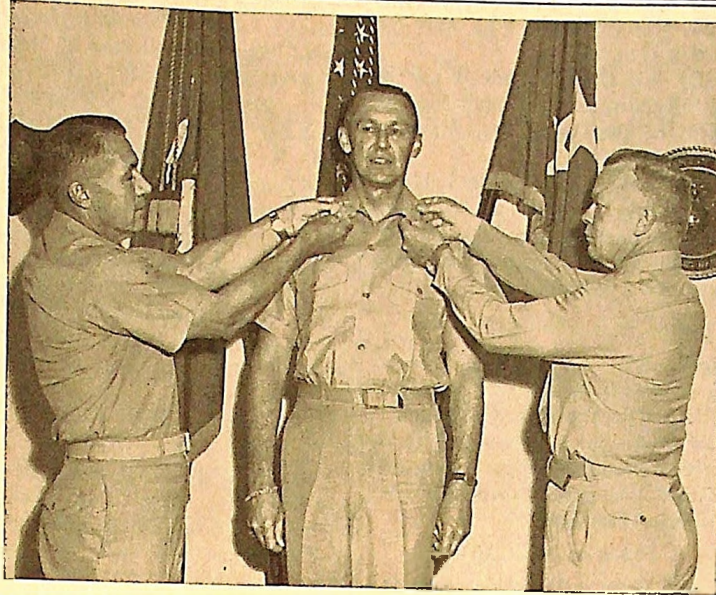

## Bryant Grad Promoted to Rank of Colonel

MARINE CORPS SCHOOLS, QUANTICO, Va., June 25—Twenty-three years ago, a young Marine Reservist at Quantico had the gold bars of a second lieutenant pinned to his uniform. Last Friday, June 18, again at Quantico, the same Marine had silver eagles, denoting the rank of colonel, affixed to his uniform.

Colonel Edward A. Galiskis, who is graduating from the Counterinsurgency Course here today was promoted to his present rank during informal ceremonies held in the office of Lieutenant General F. L. Wieseman, Commandant, Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Va.

The colonel reported here June 13 for two weeks active duty as a student of counterinsurgency and following his graduation June 25, will return to his civilian position as vice president of the Giannini Scientific Corporation, Amityville, Long Island, N. Y.

Born August 31, 1921 in Hartford, Conn., Colonel Galiskis attended Hartford Public High School and later was graduated from Bryant College, Providence, R. I.,

where he received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Accounting.

Entering the Marine Corps on Aug. 6, 1942, at Springfield, Mass., he was appointed a second lieutenant on December 16 that year, after completing the 17th Reserve Officers Course at Quantico.

His first duty assignment after being commissioned was at the Navy Supply Depot, Bayonne, N. J., where he remained for eight months. He then was transferred to Camp Lejeune, N. C. and became a member of a replacement battalion slated for overseas duty in the South Pacific.

Arriving on Guam in the summer of 1944, he was assigned to the 3d Marine Division and remained with that organization throughout the remainder of World War II. During that period he served as assistant Regimental S-3 Officer; Scout Platoon Leader; Battalion S-3 Officer, Company Commander and Company Executive Officer.

He was awarded the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V" for heroism while serving with the 3d Battalion, 9th Marines, during the Iwo Jima Campaign.

After World War II ended Colonel Galiskis returned to the United States and his civilian occupation. He has remained active, however, in the Marine Corps Reserve program in New York where he has served as Commanding Officer, Volunteer Training Unit 1-28; Commanding Officer, 1st Communications Support Battalion; Executive Officer, Reserve Officers School; Commanding Officer, 2d Battalion, 25th Marines; and is now a member of Volunteer Training Unit 1-7, in addition to being President of the General Karl S. Day Chapter of the Marine Corps Reserve Officers Association, New York City.

A complete list of his medals and decorations includes the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V"; Purple Heart Medal; Presidential Unit Citation with one star; World War

## New Student Union and Bookstore To Be Completed by September

By September of this year, Bryant College will have taken two more progressive steps. The new bookstore and student union will be completed. Alterations have already begun.

The bookstore will move from the basement of South Hall to what is now the snack bar portion of the Student Union. This new location offers the advantage of being much more roomy than the present place the bookstore is located in.

The snack bar's new location will be what is now the study hall in Jacob's Hall. However, it will no longer be merely a snack bar. It will be a combination snack bar and cafeteria which will be open to all students, faculty members, and employees of Bryant.

Beginning in September, a new system will be put into effect. Commuters will no longer use the present cafeteria. They will not have to because they will be able to get meals at the new union. The cafeteria will be reserved for dormitory students only. However, if dorm students want to eat breakfast in the union, they may do so because there they will be offered more of a variety of beverages, ranging from coffee to frappes.

The new union will serve as a cafeteria from seven until two, at which time it will convert into a snack bar where a variety of snacks, including pizza, will be served. This snack bar will be open until ten-thirty. It will also be open on weekends, and provisions will be made for deliveries to dormitories so dorm students can study without being subjected to hunger pains.

Draperies will be put up in the new union and the juke box will be hooked-up to a sound system that will pipe the music to all parts of the room. There will also be an outside telephone.

As a final attraction, a portion of the floor of the union will be marked off to serve as a dance area at certain times. The lights will be able to be dimmed to give the effect of a miniature dance floor.

So beginning in September, students, employees, and faculty members will be able to eat meals in the union from seven to two. From two till ten-thirty, and on weekends, snacks will be available.
