Hillel is the Jewish organization on the Bryant Campus. At the present time Hillel is running a few activities which will interest the student body at Bryant.

Every Sunday morning at eleven o'clock there is a brunch at Hillel House jointly sponsored by the Bryant and Brown Hillels. The brunch is like a Sunday meal at home, consisting of lox and bagels with danish.

Starting Sunday, October 22, a new service will begin called the Tallis and Tiphilin Service. It will be held before the brunch at ten-thirty each Sunday morning. The Tallis is a kind of shawl worn to almost all religious ceremonies. On each end of the Tallis there are strings; each one of the strings represents a prayer. All the strings have knots and these knots represent the Lord's name. The Tiphilin are little black boxes inside which is found the Torah. One of the boxes is worn on the head so a person will think of the Lord all the time. The other box is worn on a person's left arm close to his heart so he could feel the Lord in his heart all the time. The Tallis and Tiphilin are used in some morning services. On Sunday we will conduct a service in which the Tallis and Tiphilin are used.

Hillel House is now open to all Jewish students all of the time. You do not have to be a member of Hillel to reap the benefits of its work.

Advertising Director Talks to Delta Omega

On October 9th, Delta Omega was proud to have as its guest speaker Mr. Peter Barstow. Mr. Barstow graduated from Brown University in 1967; he received a Bachelor of Arts degree in History and International Relations.

Mr. Barstow has worked in the broadcast field for fourteen years and has done extensive work in TV, Radio, and Audio-Visual production. He is now with Horton, Church, and Goff Inc. Advertising Agency as a Radio-TV director and Audio-Visual Specialist.

"The How's of Advertising in the Broadcast Media," was the topic which Mr. Barstow brought to our attention. His talk was very interesting and rewarding. He explained to us that in his field each person he meets could someday be helpful to him. In advertising you must have the ability to remember voices, faces, and especially names. He explained that in producing an advertisement the director must obtain the right person to be able to sell the product to the consumer, and this is one reason for remembering names, voices, and faces.

Mr. Barstow brought his handy tape-recorder with him and let us hear some of the advertising which he has done himself. He is responsible for such advertisements as Bass Weejuns, New England Electric, Active Eight, and Dennison Processing Paper.

He explained to us that the first four seconds of an advertisement must be eye striking in order to hold the attention of its audience. He also explained that an advertisement does not happen over night. First, all thoughts are put on paper, then drawn in forms of pictures; then people are picked to do the advertisement and finally after weeks of work the advertisement is produced, but the hardest step is yet to come, that is, selling the advertisement to the public.

Mr. Barstow is a very successful businessman and Delta Omega would like to thank him for giving us a greater insight on advertising. We are sure that all who attended the meeting acquired considerable information on advertising.

Sid Tinson, President of Delta Omega, and the Officers would like to also thank the freshmen who attended our first meeting, and we all hope to see you as members next semester.

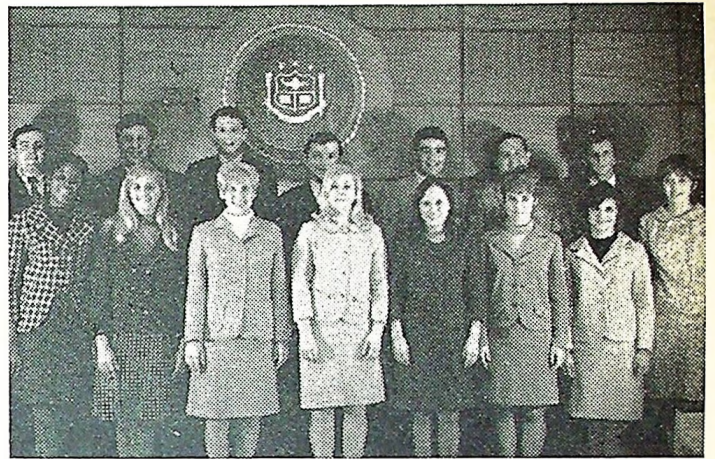

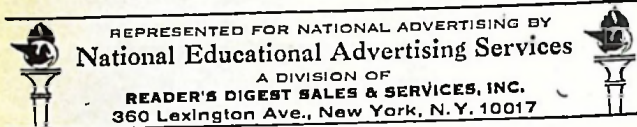

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THOUGHT FOR THE DAY

In 1923, a very important meeting was held at the Edgewater Beach Hotel in Chicago. Attending this meeting were nine of the world's most successful financiers:

- The president of the largest independent steel company;
- The president of the largest utility company;
- The greatest wheat speculator;
- The president of the largest gas company;
- The president of the New York Stock Exchange;
- A member of the president's cabinet;
- The greatest "bear" in Wall Street;
- Head of the world's greatest monopoly;
- President of the Bank of International Settlements.

Certainly we must admit that here were gathered a group of the world's most successful men. At least, men who had found the secret of making money.

Twenty-five years later let's see where these men were:

- The president of the largest independent steel company—Charles Schwab — died a bankrupt and lived on borrowed money for five years before his death.
- The president of the greatest utility company—Samuel Insull — died a fugitive from justice and penniless in a foreign land.
- The president of the largest gas company—Howard Hopson — went insane.
- The great wheat speculator—Arthur Cutten — died abroad insolvent.
- The president of the New York Stock Exchange—Richard Whitney — was released from Sing Sing Penitentiary.
- The member of the president's cabinet—Albert Fall — was pardoned from prison so he could die at home.
- The greatest "bear" in Wall Street—Jesse Livermore — died a suicide.
- The head of the greatest monopoly—Ivar Krueger — died a suicide.
- The president of the Bank of International Settlement—Leon Fraser — died a suicide.

News For Viet Vets

Rhode Island veterans who receive compensation checks because they were disabled in military service during the Viet-Nam era — after August 4, 1964 — will be entitled to compensation at the same full wartime rates provided for veterans of other wartime service, the Veterans Administration office at Providence announced today.

For a Viet-Nam era veteran already drawing compensation at the peace-time rate, VA will automatically adjust the award to pay the higher wartime rates, beginning October 1 and the new amounts will be included in checks scheduled to arrive on the first of November.

A recent new law also makes Viet-Nam era veterans and dependents of deceased veterans eligible for the first time for VA pensions. Pensions are payable to low income veterans permanently and totally disabled from reasons not traceable to their military service.

Needy widows and surviving minor children of Viet-Nam veterans who died of nonservice connected causes also may receive pensions under the new law.

"Fraternities in America, and the Story of Tau Epsilon Phi"

The American college fraternity system had its inception at the College of William and Mary in Williamsburg, Virginia, the second oldest college in America. Here was founded, on Dec. 5, 1776, the first Greek letter society called Phi Beta Kappa for "social and literary purposes." It had all the characteristics of the present-day fraternity, the charm and mystery of secrecy, a ritual, oaths of fidelity, a grip, a motto, a badge, a background of high idealism, a strong tie of friendship and comradeship, an urge for sharing its values through nationwide expansion. After half a century of existence, during which but few chapters were added, Phi Beta Kappa became and has remained a scholarship honor society.

The early part of the nineteenth century saw the formation of several Greek-letter societies on various campuses throughout the eastern United States, but none of these exhibited any particular degree of permanency. In many colleges during this period there were literary societies formed, somewhat different in characteristics from the Greek-letter organizations, which bore names of classical origin such as Adelphean, Ciceronian, or Cullipian.

During the 19th century such fraternities as Kappa Alpha, Sigma Phi, and Delta Phi were founded at Union College. These three branched to many other universities. But since 1900 the new fraternities developed greatly outnumbered those organized during the preceding century.

For many years, there existed in the Department of Pharmacy at Columbia University, two fraternities, to neither of which, however, members of minorities could gain admission.

During the year 1909-1910, two small groups of men became imbued with the idea that friendship acquired during collegiate days should be bound together through some means for the remainder of one's life.

During the following year, the two groups decided to hold a conference. Both groups decided that each needed the other. Many meetings and discussions were held in the next few days. There were ten men altogether, and they all decided to form Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity on October 19, 1910.

In the quiet library where they held their first meeting, they all took a solemn and binding oath, pledging themselves to secrecy and fidelity, sincerity and devotion, eternal friendship, and brotherly love.

They chose the first pin, an oval one in shape with the inscription TEP reading downward in gold upon a black background and with a golden trimming around the edge. They also composed a constitution, of which the framework is still in use today.

During the early 1900's the fraternity grew to many schools on the eastern coast. Such schools as N. Y. U., Boston U., Tufts, Vermont and Harvard were granted charters of Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity. Also TEP became international by granting a charter to McGill University in Montreal. The 1920's saw Georgetown U., Pennsylvania, Syracuse, Dickinson, Charleston, Georgia Tech, and the University of Michigan granted with TEP charters.

During 1921, "The Plan" made its appearance and TEP had its first real magazine.

Today Tau Epsilon Phi has spread in a network of chapters across the country from New Scotia and Maine on the Northeast tip to Southern California on the West Coast, and Florida and the U. of Miami on the Southeast tip.

The creed of Tau Epsilon Phi is most important to all members. The creed states the following:

To live in the light of friendship—to judge our fellows not by their rank nor wealth but by their worth as men—to be eternally before us the memory of those whom we have loved and lost—to hold forth in the solidarity of our brotherhood the nobility of action which we make for the preservation of our highest and worthiest ideals—and thus be true to the ideal of friendship.

To walk in the path of chivalry—to be honorable to all and defend that honor—to fill our given pledge at all times.

To serve for the love of service—to give unselfishly which we may have to offer to do voluntarily that which must be done.

To practice each day friendship—chivalry—service—thus keeping true to these three ideals—of the founders of our fraternity.

Sigma Lambda Chapter of Tau Epsilon Phi is proud of its colonization. We are confident that our ideas and plans will materialize in the near future.

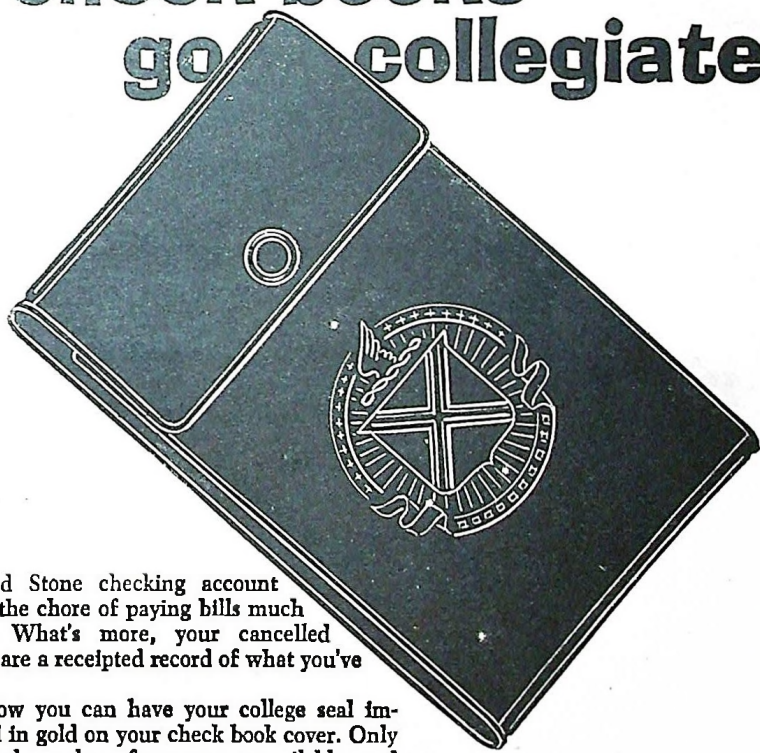

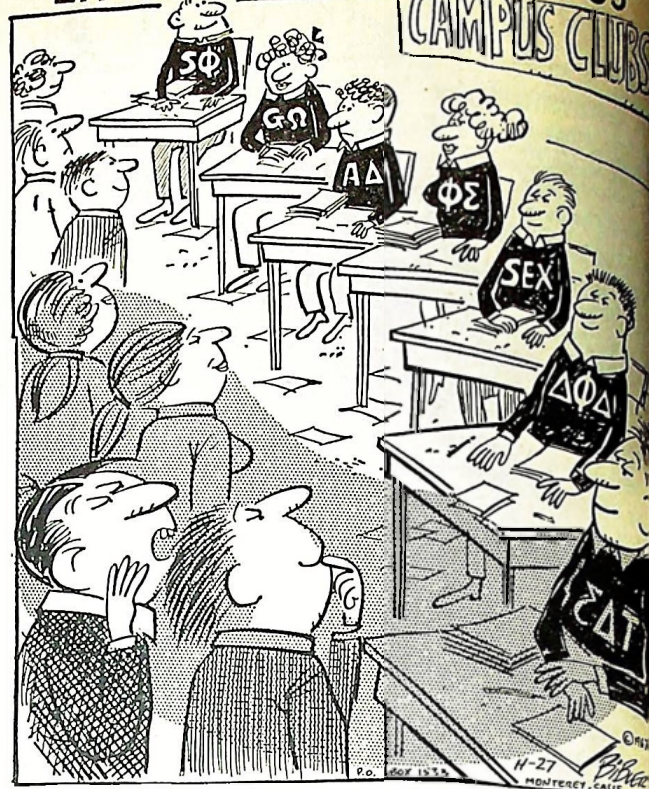

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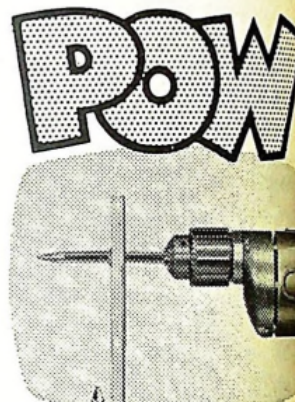
