## As Result of Senate Action . . .

# WARNING SYSTEM TO CHANGE THIS FALL

Friday, March 14, 1969

The Warning System proposed by the Student Senate to the Administration on February 13 was approved this week by the faculty. The new proposal will go into effect in September.

The Warning System is the most controversial topic facing the Student Senate this year. Most students feel that warnings are unnecessary since they do not tell students anything they do not already know. At a dialogue held on November 1968, the Warning System at Bryant College was thoroughly discussed by the faculty, administration, and students. At this time, Dean Galski stated that warnings were a time consuming and expensive procedure. However, because of parental interest they must be continued.

The Student Government at Bryant College has found that the majority of students who fail to meet the academic requirements do so in their freshman year. We, therefore, feel that warnings should only be sent to the parents of freshmen and first year transfer students. We feel that by the time a student has reached his sophomore year, he has oriented himself to the full time job of studying for a college degree. At this point the meaning of the warnings become insignificant.

The Warning System is also indirectly responsible for another problem of equal significance. The current rule forces the faculty to administer two tests before the deadline. The warnings often place the student in a situation where he might have two or three tests in one day. This is like using gasoline to put out a fire.

In a survey of twelve New England colleges and universities, it was found that not one of the reporting schools placed any limitations on the faculty in the giving of tests. We strongly agree with the administering of three tests per semester, however, we believe a professor should be allowed to determine at his own discretion the time at which his students have covered a unit of material sufficiently enough to be tested. With the exception of a mandatory completion date, no arbitrary test deadline should be effected by the administration.

Proposal as presented to the Administration—

(1) warnings should only be sent to freshmen and transfer students in their first year; (2) the three test policy be continued; and (3) no stipulation should be placed on the dates that these three tests be administered.

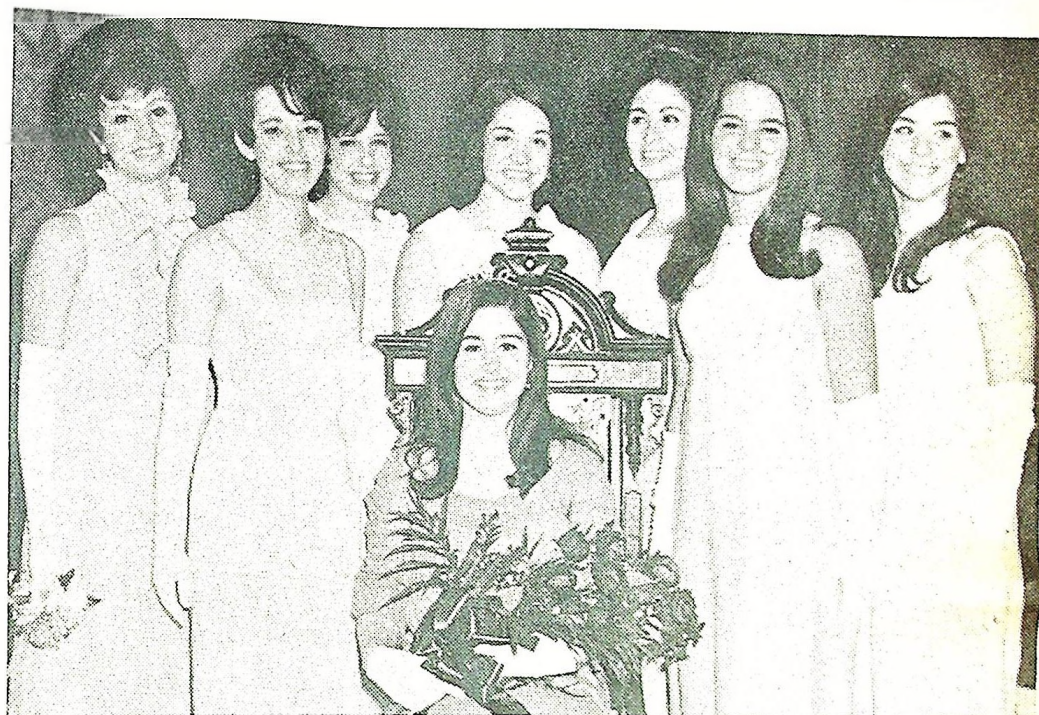

## Senate Legislature Acts on Make-Up Exams

The Legislative Council of the Senate voted through three proposals at its meeting on last Monday. Already approved by the Senate's Executive Chamber, the proposals will be forwarded to the administration for consideration.

The first proposal deals with Snow Removal. It was proposed that the school contract the job of snow removal on and around campus and side streets, so as to facilitate better student on-street parking following snow storms. In this way, commuter students will be able to attend classes, as well as dormitory students. Also, at a reasonable wage rate to help expedite the clearing of sidewalks on campus.

The second proposal was concerned with disseminating class cancellation notices to the local radio stations at a time earlier than the present 6:45 to 7:00 A.M. In this way, commuters will not have to risk hazardous driving only to arrive at school and find classes cancelled.

A possible policy of make-up exams for students who are attending college sponsored activities (i.e. conventions, lectures, internship programs and job interviews) was in the third proposal. An approved list of activities will be prepared for the allowance of make-up exams.

The fourth proposal, concerned itself with a new faculty advisor system, whereby faculty members will be assigned a proportional number of Freshman students during Orientation Week. This faculty member will be this group's advisor for their remaining years at Bryant. In this way, closer counseling and guidance will be possible for the students.

In response to the editorial entitled "Addenda To A Tow" which appeared in the March 7 edition of the Archway, I wish to direct the following remarks.

The editorial, in my opinion, was grossly inaccurate, highly emotional, and contained very little fact.

If the author (who did not have the courtesy to sign his name) finds it necessary and must regurgitate, I would appreciate it if in the future he would refrain from doing so in the student paper.

As for the parking ban, it had been announced on most of the major radio stations since the storm that struck the area the preceding week. And I seriously doubt the announcement in the Providence Journal was in fine print. I feel that it is safe to assume that most people listen to the radio, but had anyone not heard the announcement on the radio or read it in the papers

they had a third source which was reading the signs under which they were parking. I don't feel that this is too much to ask of a college student. I find it hard to believe that the author would actually suggest that the Providence Police Department provide a babysitting service for Bryant students by placing a patrolman on Hope Street to inform arriving students of the parking ban.

I also feel it is purely conjecture on the part of the author to assume that the city's police officers derive a great deal of satisfaction by tagging illegally parked cars.

I was personally informed by an administrative authority that the towing of the cars at Bryant was not a unique situation, that in fact, this was standard operating procedure throughout the city.

Now to answer his questions which were:

1. What kind of thanks do

we get, when we give up evening time for courses in law enforcement?

To this I can only say that I was not aware that I or any other student was giving up any time in order that the college might offer courses in law enforcement. In fact, the evening division is in no way our concern. I would also be willing to bet that the Providence Police make up but a small percentage of the Police officers who attend Bryant's Evening Division.

2. Are we beginning to understand now why college students do not like cops?

I don't really know, are we? How can we honestly condemn a police officer for doing that for which he has been engaged to do by a municipality?

It is, in my opinion, that only through higher education (such as Bryant's Evening Division) that we will be able to obtain a higher caliber of law enforcement personnel.

I also feel that the author's wrath was misdirected in that it should have been leveled at the city administration and even then without validity, for what other course of action was at their disposal?

I must admit disappointment in the editorial staff for allowing such an emotional, erroneous, immature and misdirected article to appear in the student paper. I am sure that the image of Bryant students has not been enhanced by it.

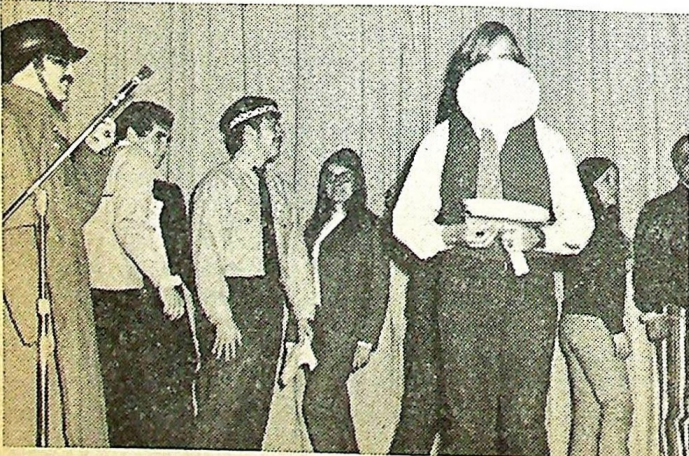

## Bryant After Hours

Bryant's thirty organizations, eighteen fraternities and sororities, faculty, and administration, publish literally hundreds of thousands of papers (2100 ARCHWAYS per week), reports (senate faculty evaluation—2000 per semester), notices, posters, and flyers for the purpose of keeping the Bryant public informed, each year. Of these, approximately one third are in the form of flyers or notices which are passed out, placed on cars, and posted.

These thousands of papers are the only way (excluding the P.A. system in the Wigwam, the ARCHWAY, and stamped letters) in which advertising may be done. But in the process of this advertising, Bryant becomes one big litter basket.

Papers fly from walls, windows, doors, and any place scotch tape will stick. And despite the efforts of maintenance men, activities workers, and students from the Senate, the college still takes on this unpleasant face.

I would like to offer two alternative solutions to the growing problem.

- 1) Establish more centralized bulletin boards for the posting of flyers and posters (made of cork to facilitate the use of thumb tacks instead of unsightly tape) including one in the dormitory dining hall corridor and one inside the Wigwam.
- 2) Place in force rulings, prohibiting the taping of posters to glass doors, walls, and windows so that Bryant may again assume a clean look.
- 3) As classroom announcements are not allowed (a good policy), establish a daily bulletin, not to be read by the instructor, but a single sheet to be passed through the class during its session. Such a bulletin would serve not only the student organizations, but also the administration.

This method would insure every student attending classes of reading the announcements for the day. (e.g. club meeting, fund drives, fraternity and sorority meetings, faculty absences, and administrative notes) Bryant certainly needs to take on a new face!
