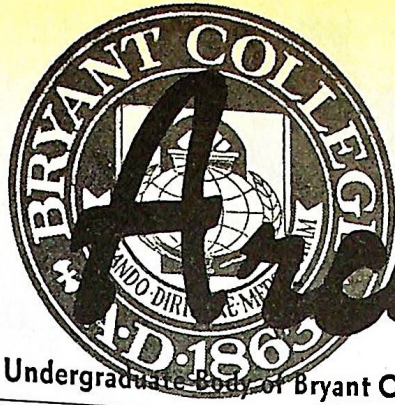

Carol Murawski: Semi Finalist In The Miss Rhode Island College Queen Pageant

On November 3, 1967, Miss Carol Murawski won the title of "Miss Mardi Gras" sponsored by PHI EPSILON PI, FRATERNITY. It seemed as though it was yesterday that she won the title. Carol represented Phi Sigma Nu fraternity and Sigma Iota Xi sorority. Carol's next step at the time was to enter the preliminary contest to the Miss Rhode Island College Queen Pageant. Her resume and her photograph were sent to the national headquarters in New York City. Each year hundreds of applications are sent to the nationals, and in return the national judges choose 10 girls from each state to become a semi-finalist. Carol became one of the ten girls. Her next step is to fill out a six page application form, write two essays, and submit with the application two color photos. Then the national judges in New York City will select one from the ten girls to become Miss Rhode Island College Queen for 1968.

If Carol wins the title, she will be leaving on June 8, 1968, for the national contest. The 10-

Choice '68: Your Contribution

With the coming of elections for the office of President of the United States coming this fall, many students and non-students as well have been searching for a method of accurately measuring the consensus on issues for the majority in our country. Since, at this time, more than 50% of the voting population are under the age of 30, and by the next elections in 1972 this percentage may rise to better than 60%, Time, Inc. decided to sponsor Choice '68, a primary election among student populations around the nation.

Many have asked just what will all of these activities coming up prove to the world. Well, the college population is a pretty fair sampling of youthful opinion concerning current is-

sues facing us all. Not all students are radical, nor are they all communists, or doves, or hawks. The culmination of this student election on April 24, will yield a fairly accurate statistic of the opinions of some present and many future voters. The effect these results will make remains to be seen. Chances are that the two major parties will mull over and consider with the coming of the summer conventions. According to Professor John Saloma of MIT, "Choice '68 is a test of the will and resourcefulness of young people—a test of strength between the young and the Establishment. Students by turning out in large numbers . . . can show the country that they do have great political strength." Professor Saloma stated that with a referendum presented on the ballot, that this could serve to either

back or repudiate the President in his efforts towards the war in Vietnam.

The much repeated statement of the mess made by those that came before us may come to a head in the upcoming primary when students attempt to prove that the American political system is way off base in its methods.

You, the student, here at Bryant College are an integral part of this program, and your participation is essential. You can have the opportunity of helping to choose the next president of the United States and help in demonstrating the consensus on the war by voting on April 24. Between this time and the week before the elections, on and off campus information will be presented to you to aid in preparing for this most important event.

Parietal Hours at Bryant?

With this issue, a new column makes its appearance — Campus Comment, written by *Archway* staff member Mark Schwartz. And as some new columns have a tendency to be controversial, Mr. Schwartz's inclusion for this week is no exception — Should men be allowed in women's dorm rooms and vice versa?

The interesting thing about the results of Schwartz's poll was that everyone was in favor of it, and, as I had expected, the majority of the students who expressed a positive answer to the question were freshmen, two of whom just entered last January. As you'll notice, everyone said more or less that Bryant students being of college age are old enough to conduct their personal affairs themselves, and should be allowed this privilege (or right, depending on how you see it.)

When I was a freshman, I too thought students were mature enough for this, but around Bryant, it doesn't take too long to see that it "just ain't so." Any upper classman worth his 3 or better classification number knows what would happen if the women could visit in the dorm rooms of the men — WOW! If students "make out," in dorm lounge areas with 50 people watching them, can you imagine what would happen in a private room?

Needless to say, the administration has an interest in this question, and I had discussions with Deans Castronovo and Smith. Their reasons against opposite-sex room-visitation can be divided into three main points:

- a. It is not physically possible due to the setup of Bryant dorms (i.e. rest rooms, three residents per room etc.)
- b. Allowing such activity is an invasion of the rights of the other resident(s) of the room and neighbors in other rooms.
- c. There are moral implications.

Many students felt that "all the others" do it, but as Dean Smith pointed out, "all the others" don't do it. There are many other considerations to be taken. As long as you reside in a College residence hall, this institution is charged by our parents with responsibility for us. Because of this burden of responsibility, the College has the right to make any rules and regulations which it feels are required to carry out this duty in a responsible manner. Besides, when you're at home, do you entertain your girl or boy friend in your bedroom?

And if there are no social or academic advantages to instituting such a plan, why should it be done? The burden of proof is on those individuals who feel it should be permitted.

VISITING HOURS SHOULD BE ALLOWED IN DORMITORIES FOR THE OPPOSITE SEX

The residents of Bryant College should be permitted to have students of the opposite sex in their rooms at certain restricted hours. A few streets from Bryant College is Brown University, R.I.S.D., and various others who have made it a practice to allow the opposite sex to visit the dormitories during certain hours. If these college students have this privilege, then why shouldn't the students at Bryant be treated equal to their neighboring Colleges and Universities.

Recent Interview Held On The Municipal Internship Program

There are many internship programs offered at Bryant College—Pell and Tiernan Internship, the Rhode Island General Assembly Internship Program—but the only one offering compensation is the Municipal Internship Program which is presented during the summer. The program extends from June to September. During this time the student has an opportunity to participate in the activities of the city government. His job may take him to an urban renewal field office or to the main branch of the Providence Police Department.

Roy Dempsey had inquired for and received a position in an Urban Renewal field office. The field office was located on Broadway and was responsible for an urban renewal project area that occupied some 1200 families. Roy Dempsey worked with two girls from Rhode Island College as well as a student from Brown University. The four students worked directly with the field office staff. Each of them was given an assignment at the beginning of the summer. The assignment that was given to Roy was to collect, collate, and enter data into books. He went into the urban renewal project area and obtained data from residences in that area. One such question that was asked of the people was "What ideas do you have that may improve or advance the area?"

Roy Dempsey's next assignment was to go to the Vital Statistics Section of the City Office Building and inquire how many illegitimate births were recorded from the area in the five preceding years.

He received a salary of \$100 weekly and enjoyed his work very much, and quotes, "Anyone who is interested in city government or a specific phase of city government should apply for this job."

Horse Change in Mid-Stream

It was only two years ago when various student groups around the country gained notoriety as dupes and scoundrels for their position in a war that very few people knew about, including your reporter. It began in Berkeley, on Viet Nam day and was headed by a young college graduate already well indoctrinated into the tenets of revolutionary communism. Naturally, anyone who protested against anything at this time, was unjustly branded as a commy. Two significant events that have occurred over the past two weeks have led many to believe that a complete turn around has occurred in the general attitude of the nation. First, occurring was an editorial appearing unauthored in the New York Times (when an editorial appears unauthored, it generally means that the entity of the paper itself is the speaker in the writing). For the first time since the Tonkin Gulf incident on August 4, 1964, the Times has taken a firm stand against the war. The second incident was a demonstration last week in front of the Sheraton-Biltmore in Providence, where Vice-President Humphrey was addressing a regional democratic convention. Most students were protesting against the war in Vietnam or domestic race problems, whereas two years ago the majority of demonstrators were those in favor of the war. These incidents when considered together, reflect a major obstacle to economic and political stability in our country. If our position is wrong (and if the will of the majority proves this theory out) then it is high time that the administration take heed to the will and change their strategy soon.

The Rape of Bryant College

Since moving to college hill, Bryant has been forced to be the victim of the local aristocracy. For years students, faculty and administration, alike have been caught in a vice grip between the local gentry and Brown University. That God of educational tradition around the block has been busily enhancing twisted ideas in our community concerning the true identity of the modern college student. Poor little Bryant being different from the gargantuan lumox around the corner still must continue fighting the ridicule from the surrounding countryside for merely being natural. On the other side of the coin are our beloved neighbors; with their noses too high to tie their shoes, they seem too busy to stop stifling the progress and agility of this institution. With our growing affluence, more and more students have sought transportation to their school by car, and yet, for many it would be better to park in a lot on the other side of the city and take a bus. Adding insult to the injury already placed upon the students, the faculty has been adding their licks too. To avoid the consequences dolled out by our harassers, many have sought refuge on the campus, teacher parking lots. This illegal, yet obvious respite from the onslaught of our puppeteers has been lopped away with one mighty blow. In escaping the terror, we were hit with greater consequences. Our pocket-books and our tempers are being forced to the breaking point. When will someone recognize our plight and become the good samaritan?

To perform what you can do best — that is what I believe the purpose of our program of extracurricula activities has been established for. In order to circumvent this missing link in the Bryant chain of activities, various groups of individuals have united for the sole purpose of making music, or so they claim. Last weekend I had the misfortune to be at a gathering where one of these groups was playing. I must admit that their desire to make music is commendable, but their ability to make music leaves the eardrum shattered. Possibly with some practice and a few lessons they might be able to achieve a proprietary command in music among the many student functions around campus.

Draft Exemptions For Peace Corps Volunteers?

Volunteers for the Peace Corps are not given exemptions from the draft. They serve their country in a "social service" rather than a military service, but are still eligible for drafting after two years.

One argument offered in defense of this policy is that many would-be draftees may elude this possibility by volunteering for the Peace Corps.

Advocates of Peace Corps exemptions retaliate with the fact that a high standard of selectivity is used in choosing volunteers. Many men now serving their country in the military would not qualify for the Peace Corps.

This problem poses a serious question to the draft-eligible men of our country. And a serious answer seems to be in order.

Is the only way to serve a country and prove your love for that country fighting your enemies? Or, can a man prove this love in another way? The other way seems to be some type of "social service."

In my opinion, the Peace Corps volunteer should not be exempted from the draft. But, his two years of service to his country should be some how credited towards his obligation to defend and protect his homeland.

Any man, who is a man, would not hesitate to defend his wife, family, or girl, no matter what the risk to him, if there were a present and pressing danger. A man whose wife is attacked would not consider a danger to himself as a deterrent in protecting her.

The threat of the Viet Nam war may not seem so present and pressing as the above example — but IT IS!

A "social service" such as the Peace Corps may fulfil partially a man's duty but, does he fulfil his obligation to the one's he loves?

A student might, if the scheduling of exams is anything like it was last semester, have two exams Monday, two on Tuesday, and two on Wednesday. Three or four in two days is hard enough to handle without some relief between exams. For many this little extra time may mean the difference of passing a course or failing a course, staying in school or flunking out.

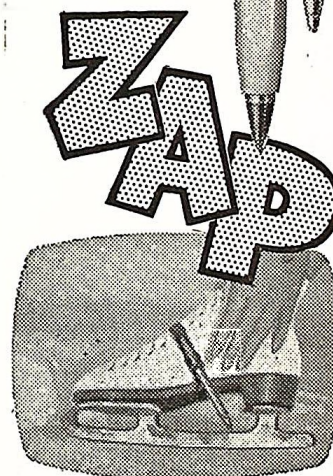

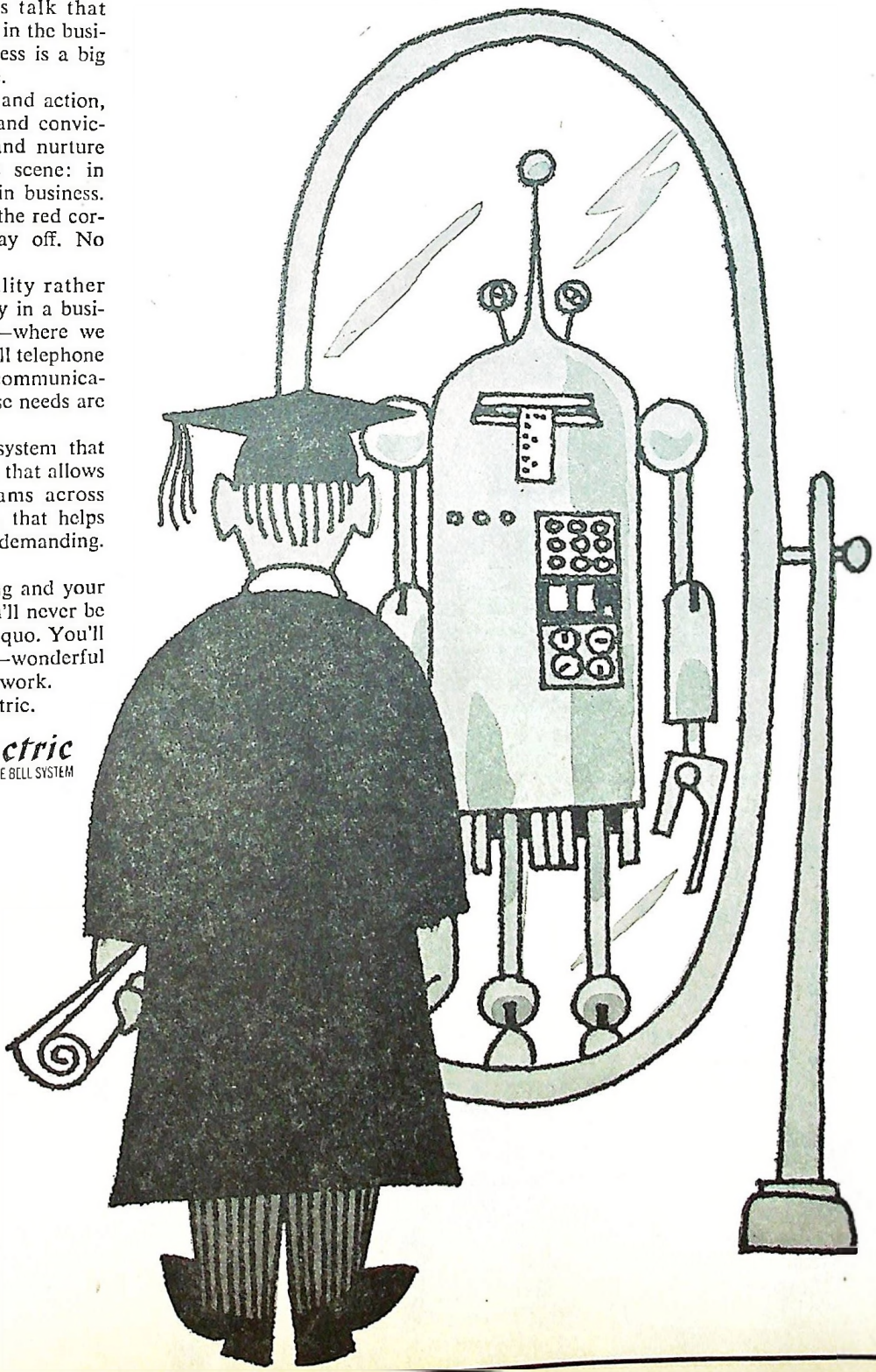
