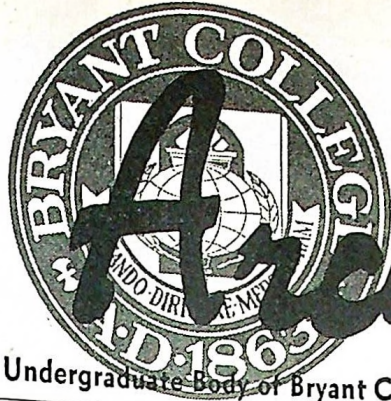

JOHN SPENCER CHURCHILL SPEAKS AT LECTURE SERIES

On Thursday, April 4, Bryant College was indeed fortunate to have John Spencer Churchill as part of the current Lecture Series. As an author, painter, lecturer, and nephew of the late Sir Winston Churchill, Mr. John Churchill presented a superb lecture both in historical content and wit. One could feel the "Churchill presence" throughout the entire lecture. This was particularly evident during Mr. Churchill's impersonation of his uncle. It was a real treat for the audience of about two hundred, for the manner of delivery, diction, and facial expressions were a perfect copy of the late Sir Winston. Historically, Mr. Churchill traced the family's ancestry to the Norman Invasion of 1066, and the Jerome and Vanderbilt families of America. The raising of the Churchill children and life in general at Blenheim Palace, Sir Winston's birthplace, was wittingly recalled. Unique insights to Sir Winston's thirst for knowledge and his enormous capacity for

work were also told with much gusto. During the lecture Mr. Churchill's relationship with his uncle emerged as a fellow traveler, muralist of family history, and confidant. In answer to a question from Dr. Lebovitz concerning Sir Winston's like or dislike for General Charles De Gualle, Mr. Churchill replied to the effect that, "He did not trust him."

Mr. Churchill, himself, is quite talented and well-known in his own right. Besides being a painter (mainly murals), an author and lecturer, Mr. Churchill also is a pianist. His poise and handling of situations is phenomenal. While on lecture tours he often paints portraits professionally. Mr. Churchill's wit and ability to relate past events in the context of which they occurred gives his lectures a rare quality of uniqueness.

Congratulations are in order for Dr. Sol Lebovitz for the outstanding job he has done in bringing such an outstanding personality to our Campus.

Choice '68 Given LBJ Support

The high point of the Choice '68 conference held in Washington, D. C. from February 10-13 was provided by President Lyndon Johnson's decision to meet with the project's Board of Directors. In an interview described by aides as unusual, the President discussed for nearly an hour and a half the students' plan for the national primary to be held April 24.

Since student dissent over the past year has been directed primarily against White House policies—leading most observers to believe that the student vote will be anti-administration—there was considerable surprise and curiosity that the President would take such an extraordinary time with the leaders of the collegiate primary.

Nonetheless, the President expressed to the group his conviction that this kind of vote from students was highly significant, that when students express their opinion intelligently, people across the nation "stop, look, listen, and evaluate." He added his belief that a stronger vote amongst the nation's youth would favor Democratic candidates and policies.

The President ended the meeting by wishing the students and Choice '68 success.

"The Stardusters" will lose Dennis Preto and Ken Stein who are graduating. Paul Des- (Continued on Page 4)

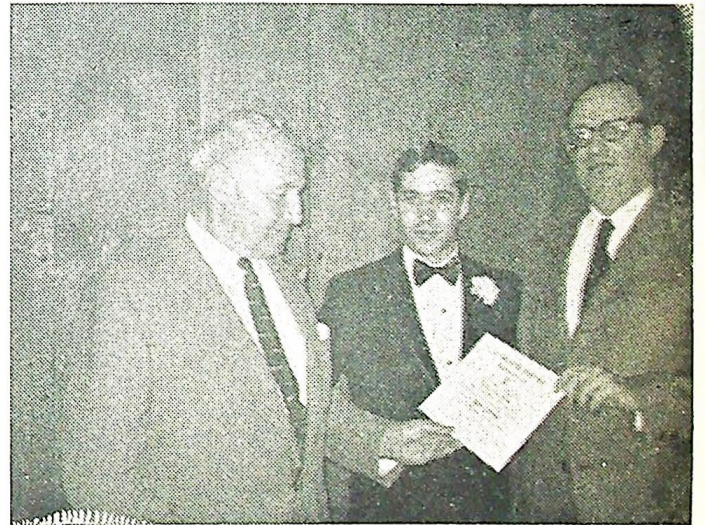
Bryant Announces Scholarship In Memory of Dr. King

The Student Senate has announced plans to run a campaign to raise funds for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Scholarship. Paul Delude, President of the Student Senate, will be chairman of the campaign. The Senate will call on students, faculty, and administration for contributions.

The Student Senate has kicked off the campaign by contributing over three-hundred dollars to the fund. This money is in place of the annual banquet. Bob Bolton, President of the Freshman Class, has announced that the Freshman Class will contribute one-hundred dollars.

Dr. E. Gardner Jacobs announced yesterday that a full tuition scholarship in memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, will be awarded to a Negro student based on need and achievement, beginning with the September semester. Seven-hundred dollars of the scholarship will be provided by the College. The matching funds will come from another source, unknown at press time.

The fund will be given to a Freshman student and will be handled by the Providence Urban League.

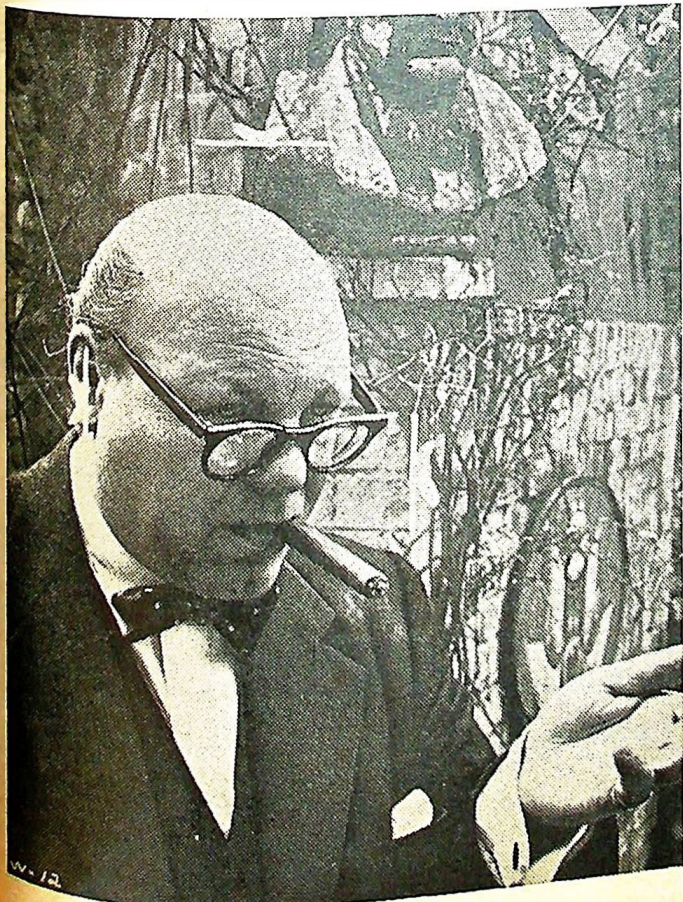

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"Campus Comment"

QUESTION: What do you think of the mid-semester warn-
ing system?

ANSWERS:

SY HYMAN, Class of 1971: Warnings are a big waste of money, time, and energy and only serve to depress the student. Students already know how they stand in each class. Parents seem to think that the marks are final which causes unnecessary disturbances at home. The marks that warnings are based on comprise less than one-half the student's final grade.

MURRAY COPP, Class of 1969: I am not against a system of mid-semester grade reports. However, at Bryant, a total picture of how the student is progressing is not available. If these reports are to be released, they should include all courses regardless of a D or F grade. The only other point I find unsatisfactory about the present system is that these reports are sent to the student's parents. The person paying the bill to the college should receive them, be it parents or student.

DOUGLAS M. MCCAIG, Class of 1968: I am opposed to the present system of mid-semester grade reports at Bryant. I would think that it would be possible to dispense with grade reports after the freshman year. Bryant upperclassmen are most capable of keeping a record of their grades and are able to determine what kind of an average is being attained in each course. Much unnecessary paperwork and needless bunching up of quizzes could be avoided if a more sensible and practical system were adopted.

JAMES M. WOLK, Class of 1969: Yes, I believe that it is essential for the student to know if he is doing poorly in a subject while there is still time to improve. I do feel, however, that the present method which is being used is tactless. The fact that we receive this notice over vacations gives the student nothing but grief. This lack of tact can do nothing but add to the mental stress already placed on the student. Vacations should provide a time for release. Certainly a vacation should not only be for physical relaxation, but a time to relax mentally as well. I would like to qualify the above statement by adding that to be mentally relaxed does not mean to be mentally lax.

STEVE HILL, Class of 1970: Theoretically, the mid-semester system is good, but like most theories when applied, they do not fulfill their intended purpose. If a student cannot study effectively by now, a reprimand from his parents is not going to change the situation. After all, when the student goes out into the business world, the employer will not send home any warning to the person's parents. The student knows what his grades are; if he is deficient in his work, it is up to him to improve it.

JOSEPH FAGAN, Class of 1969: The one major defect of the mid-semester warning system is its effect on the exam schedule prior to the warnings. All courses seem to have tests within a one-week period before the warnings are due. This means the student has to cram rather than study the subject matter.

SPEAKING THEIR PIECE

Dear Editor:

The day was Friday the fifth day of April and it had just ended a week where a majority of the students had been faced with a barrage of three to six tests.

The reason that this bunch-up had occurred was that last week was the final week before our mid-semester grades were due. This day marks the half-way marks of the semester, but two thirds of our marks must be in so that the administration could get out their warnings to our parents. Now on one of the three mailing days that we are home for our Easter break, some of the students will receive a letter telling them that they have a couple of D's or an F.

I am quite sure that this system serves no benefit for the student. When you are in college you should be intelligent enough to know if you are doing well or not. We all have

the responsibility to ourselves and to our parents not to let our grades slip. When we graduate from Bryant, I am sure that our bosses are not going to send a letter to our parents telling them that we are not doing a good job and our job is in jeopardy.

I suggest that the administration drop this policy for the following three reasons.

1. It causes a majority of the tests to fall in a short period of time, not giving the student ample time to prepare for them.
2. It facilitates doing two-thirds of the semester work in half the time.
3. We are presumed to be mature future businessmen who should know enough about themselves, so that they don't have to be told that they are not doing well.

One of our required courses in the B.A. department is Political Science. In this course we are told that trends indicate that as social and economic conditions worsen, the reactions from citizens is generally nil; however, on the other hand, when conditions seem to get better, dissension and turmoil of a kind take place. In the case of Bryant College, situations analogous to the above generalization can be drawn. The point where Bryant botomed out of its depression took place around the time we were accredited, and since that time, we have been on an upward trend. At this point, this school is in sort of a twilight zone between recognition and reaction. Many members of the administration, faculty and student body have begun to recognize that the smooth and progressive operation of this institution cannot take place without coordinated action between all parties. This time in the school year is a particular thorn in the side of many of us, for it denotes the end of a marking period when warnings are passed around. But, just what is the reason for this irritation—after all this is just another carry over from HIGH SCHOOL days? And that, fellow students, is the POINT!! Why this carry over from by-gone days? We had it in our constitutions to qualify for college; why then are we not qualified to know whether or not we are passing a course at the half-way mark? Our student handbook informs us all that the school has a responsibility to the parents, but I am of the opinion that this reason too is "old hat." If a student hasn't the responsibility to maintain adequate grades, then I doubt that he would react to the shake of a parental index finger. Another argument that can be set forth against the Warning System is credibility. In the classroom, the typical statement goes as follows: "Oh by the way, there will be a test next week for warn-analyze such a statement, but I am aware of some of the reactions to it. It appears unfounded and shortsighted that exams are literally "jammed down the student's throat" merely for a vague and out-of-touch rule. And what about the faculty? Do they really enjoy this requirement—the clerical workload is on their shoulders? If the fourteen carat gold-plated lines of communication are to be established, let's make policy like this and others are ready to help make this institution, Bryant College, as progressive as the best of them.

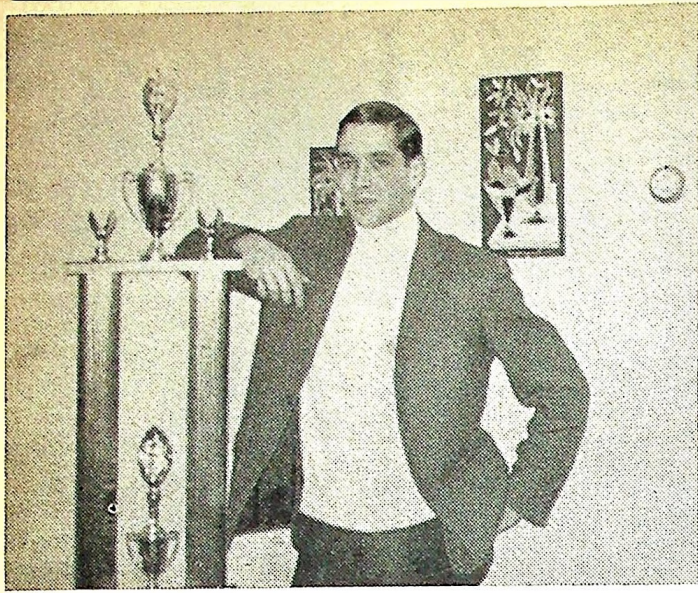
