Statement of Platform:

Students have been ushered into the corridors of power by the capable leadership of the officers of the Student Senate. Such changes as increased communications between students, faculty, and Administration, the "Reading Period," and an increase in public relations through the adoption of a foster child and an institution of other charitable funds took place during the past year. However, the past administration has not resolved all the problems that are facing the students at Bryant College.

In addition to the continuation and the extension of these policies, we will strive to accomplish the following:

1. A change in the present cut system.
2. A pass-fail marking system for electives.
3. Student representation on many Administration-Faculty committees.
4. Opportunity for students to sit-in on classes which

might help them in their studies or might be of interest to them.

5. A revival of the Grievance Committee.
6. A formal dialogue involving a group of teachers, students, and Administration meeting monthly to discuss any issues they consider relevant.
7. An extension of student evaluation of teachers to the Secretarial and Teacher Education Departments.

The Leadership, Involvement, Knowledge, and Efficiency represented on this slate will lead to great change thru communication, consensus, and compromise.

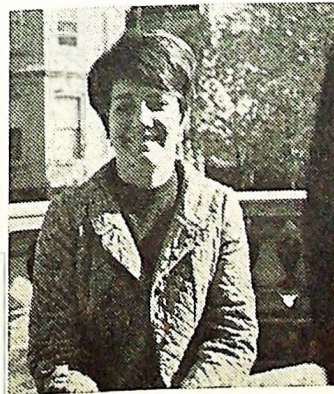
Beta Sigma Chi
