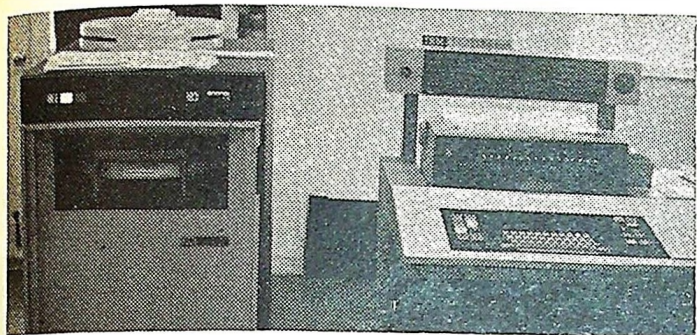

New Computer Aids In Student Study and Service

Once a classroom structure called M9, the small white building between Memorial Hall and Kilcup Hall now houses the first computer to be utilized by Bryant students on campus. The facilities are open during the day for the convenience of the students.

Any Bryant student can use the computer and the key punch, if he has a program that he would like to run. Dorm and commuter students will be able to use the computer during the day, but if the number of students using the computer warrants it, sign-up sheets will be used and appointments made, for use in the center. Assistance will be given to those students requesting aid in running their programs. Priorities do exist in the computer center, however, for students with assigned class projects, for the faculty, and for the administration.

Bryant College will be using the IBM 1130 model, a relatively small computer by today's standards, but nevertheless it is essential equipment

for a sound education in tomorrow's world. The purpose of having the computer is to make it available to the students and also for them to see how a computer actually functions. In most cases when using the facilities, students will be able to present their data and then subsequently run their programs.

To aid in directing the data processing center will be Mr. Charles Snyder. He graduated from Cornell University in 1948 and majored in mathematics. He then taught in public schools in New York state. In 1956 he went to Syracuse University to receive his masters degree in science. He then taught for another eight years, this time in the Plattsburg area and it is at this time he became interested in computers. For the last five years, he has been involved with computers in Oswego County of New York state. From there he has been appointed to take charge of Bryant's computer center and he will be glad to answer any other questions you may have regarding the computer.

"Golden Cup" Won By Narragansett Room

An outstanding cup of coffee has earned membership in the restaurant industry's most exclusive club for the Narragansett Room, Bryant College, 154 Hope Street, Providence, Rhode Island.

The Coffee Brewing Center of the Pan-American Coffee Bureau announced here today that the local restaurant had qualified for its 1969 "Golden Cup" Award, presented to restaurants serving a quality cup of coffee. Among thousands of public establishments serving coffee in the United States and Canada, the Narragansett Room—Bryant College is only the 419th establishment selected for an award this year.

A golden cup, mounted on a wall plaque, will be presented shortly by a field representative of the Coffee Brewing Center.

The Center recommends that only top quality, freshly roasted ground coffee be used, and that the coffee be brewed at the ratio of two to two-and-one-half gallons of water per pound, producing 45 to 50 cups of coffee.

If laboratory testing indicates a quality beverage, fieldmen make unannounced, on-the-spot inspections of the restaurant to sample additional coffee, observe brewing methods and check cleanliness.

The award is for one year and can be revoked when the recipient's coffee falls below the standards recommended by the Coffee Brewing Center.

Recreation Room To Open Soon

This year with the increase number of students at Bryant the Activities Department has taken steps to increase the facilities of the recreation room.

According to Robert Hathaway, Director of Student Activities, the gameroom has been refitted with such recreational equipment as bumper pool, shuffleboard, bowling, 2 ping pong tables, 2 pooltables, and the television.

Mr. Hathaway said that he hopes to have the room open by Monday the 22nd if the work is completed. After October 1, the room will be open evenings and weekends.

For those interested in watching the world series on television, Mr. Hathaway stated that he expects to outfit the gym with one set and the activities auditorium with another.

TEP Holds Used Book Sale

For the first time to our knowledge someone has finally offered the students of Bryant an opportunity to buy used books. Last week the brothers of Tau Epsilon Phi ran a used book store in the student lounge which is located above the campus book store.

Unfortunately many students were not aware that a used book sale was being held. But those that did scrambled to buy whatever books they needed at half price.

The way the system worked was that a student would turn over to the fraternity the books he wished to sell. The fraternity would then sell the books for half of the listed price. Then

they would deduct 10% of the sale price for themselves and turn the rest over to the first party. A book listed for \$10 would be sold for \$5. and \$4.50 would be given to the first party.

It would appear that the system worked out well for students who were both buying and selling books. It offered them an opportunity to get books at a reasonable return on their own books without the usual Confusion and wasted energy of running around the campus like a mad man.

Hats off to the brothers of TEP and Bob Parenteau under whose direction the operation was run.

The Transfer Student . . . A Challenging Experience

Every autumn thousands of young men and women make their annual pilgrimage to the institutions of higher learning, which flourish in the quaint atmosphere of Providence's East side. Students of all races, creeds, and economic backgrounds converge on the prestigious and established campuses which serve to comprise Rhode Island's own Left Bank.

Many of the arrivals have been here before. They are the upperclassmen, that omniscient group wise in the ways and wonders of college life. For them, returning means the renewal of old acquaintances and the making of new ones. It opens another chapter in their college life, that ephemeral experience which they will always treasure.

The most noticeable group of new arrivals has to be the freshmen. Their beanie-crowned heads can be seen in every direction, clustered all over the campus. But even without the traditional beanies their vacillation will always give them away.

In the midst of all the upperclassmen and uncertain freshmen there is still another group, perhaps not as obvious, but nevertheless as much a part of the academic scene as the others. Bryant has all of the attributes needed for the success of transfer students. A friendly student body and faculty, and an understanding administration have left it entirely up to us. We welcome the challenge, and hope to meet it admirably.

DEX Holds Elections

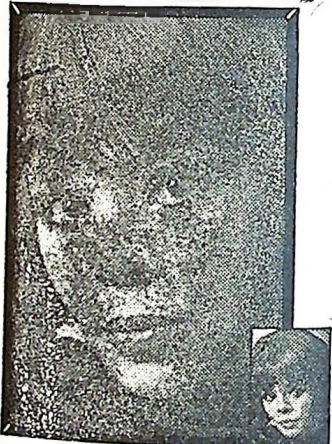

The sisters are looking forward to a great year and would like to welcome the freshmen to Bryant and wish them lots of luck.

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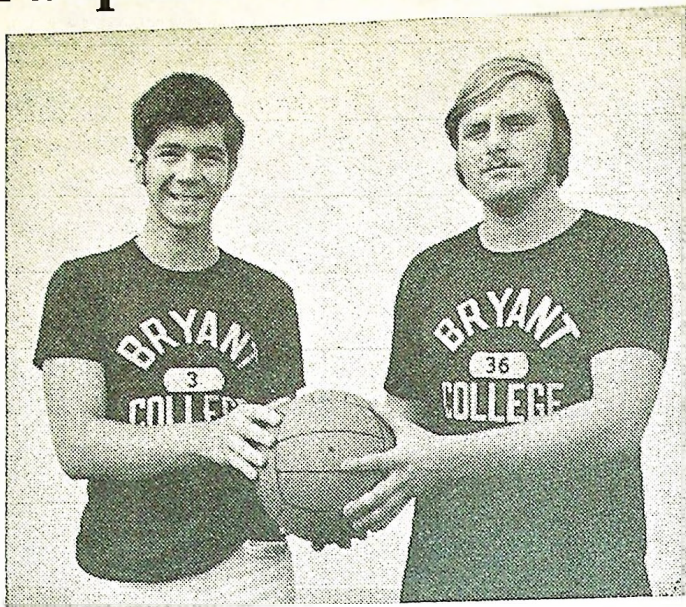

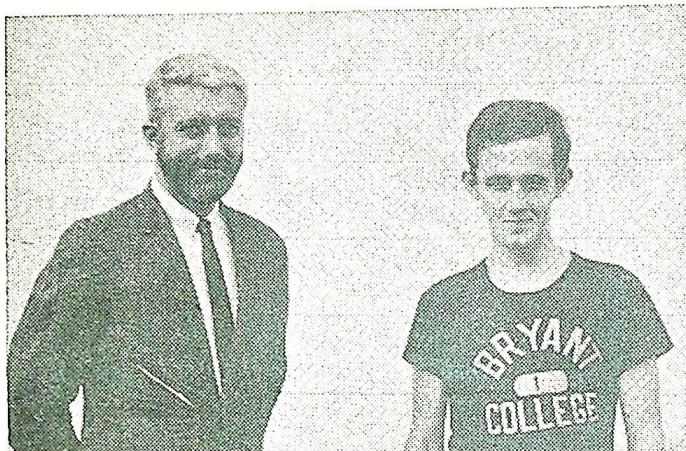

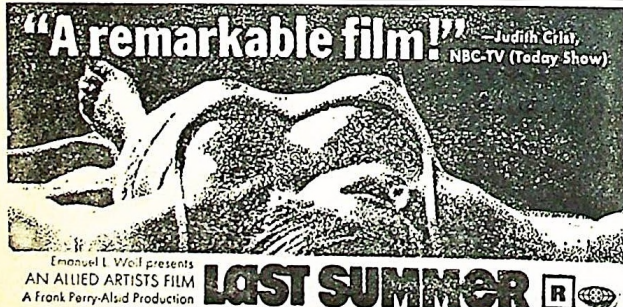
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
