NEW CAMPUS PRESENTATION TO BE GIVEN TO STUDENT BODY IN NEAR FUTURE

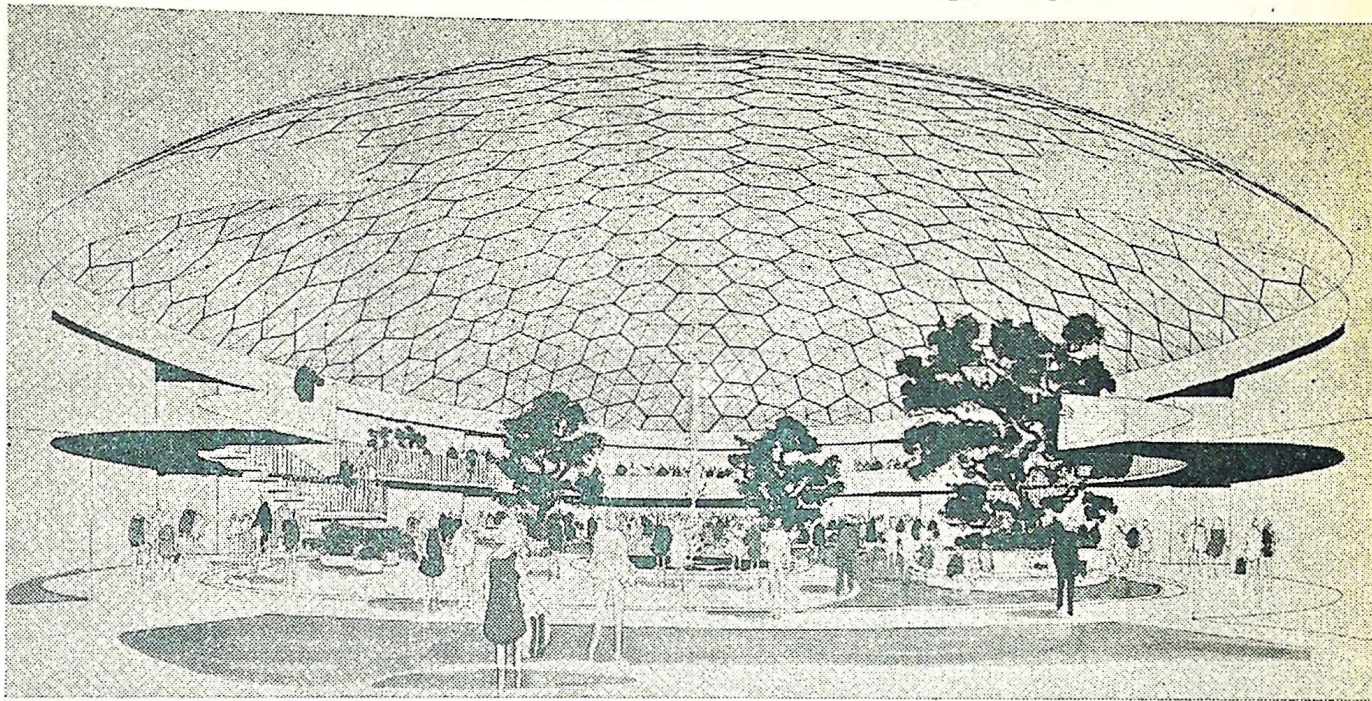
While the Bryant campus bubbled with inactivity this summer, the planners of the Tupper campus busied themselves with a multitude of problems, designs, and plans. As a result, the planning process has progressed smoothly and groundbreaking of the campus draws nearer every day.

As it stands now, the external concepts are almost complete and work has been started on the internal designs of the buildings.

Mr. J. Robert Hillier, master plan architect, working in conjunction with Mr. Joseph Hagan, Director of Development, and several other college officials, has established a schedule of approximate times and events that will occur in the near future. First on the schedule is the October 8th presentation of the full design including a model to the Long-Range Campus Planning Committee. The Planning Committee is composed of members of the student body, faculty, and administration.

On or about October 16th there will be a presentation to the Board of Trustees at their annual meeting.

It is hoped that during the week of October 20th a full presentation including slides,

models, and drawings will be made to the entire student body, faculty, and administration of the college. It should be pointed out, however, that this is not a final date and is subject to change.

Ending this month of presen-

tations, it is expected that a presentation will be made to the news media.

This presentation will discuss such topics as the development program including plans for design, construction, and possibly plans for financing the project.

Peace Organization Given Recognition By Senate

Last Monday the Student Senate voted in favor of allowing the Vietnam Peace Action—Bryant Chapter—to be formally recognized. This means the organization now has legal status, giving it a voice and a vote in the senate.

The representative and acting president of the organization is Mark Epstein. The immediate aim of this group is to have a moratorium at Bryant on October 15.

There will be approximately 400 colleges and universities throughout the country participating in the moratorium. Included in this group are Brown and R.I.S.D. who have already decided to close for the moratorium on October 15.

The national founders of Vietnam Peace Action are remnants of Senator Gene McCarthy's followers, as pointed out in a recent issue of the Providence Journal.

The Peace Action group contacted Mr. James Estey, new president of the Teachers Federation, who stated that he would not take a stand for or against the moratorium. Mr. Estey said that he would be willing to express his opinion only as to the tactics to be used. As for calling off classes, he said he felt this type of action would not serve a fruitful purpose at Bryant and would only result in a day off for students to take a vacation.

Draft Procedure Found Invalid

SAN FRANCISCO—(CPS)—The San Francisco Federal Court has handed down a draft decision that could significantly disturb draft procedure while freeing a number of present 1-Aers from induction.

Judge Robert I. Peckham ruled this week that universally enforced regulation that prevents draft registrants from being accompanied by legal counsel when summoned before a local draft board is invalid and "constitutionally suspect."

Judge Peckham was the magistrate who ruled earlier this year that members of draft boards must be residents of the area from which they send men.

Those men who have appeared before draft boards, usually on

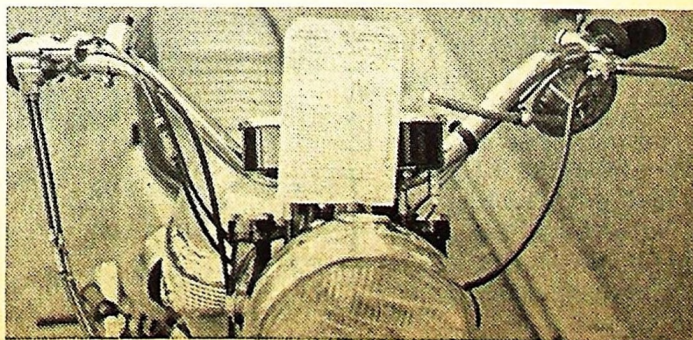

Moratorium Called

To whom it may concern

Bryant College, Administration, Faculty, Students

You probably share our view that most of the problems facing the country—inflation, the urban crisis, the persistence of poverty, the alienation of youth, the failure to re-orient our foreign policy—are related to and exasperated by the continuation of the war in Vietnam.

The basic idea is to set aside October 15 for a one day moratorium on "business as usual" in order that students, faculty members, and concerned citizens can spend the day working in the larger community to end the war. Should the war continue unabated, in November two days would be set aside for this task.

We are in the process of building widespread campus support and expect to expand into other sectors of the society. Over the next month we hope to meet with many participants in the summer intern program to discuss the work that can be done this fall on your campus and in your community. If you have questions or suggestions about the Vietnam Moratorium, please feel free to call.

Viewpoint

All Americans by now must surely have heard of President Nixon's announcement that an additional 35,000 Americans will be brought back from Vietnam.

To most students, this probably indicated a reduction in the number of draft calls for the future, even before the President announced that the draft quotas for November and December would be cancelled. The spreading of the October draft call over the three month period and cancelling the calls for November and December is welcome news for us all, regardless of age or occupation. The reduction in troops and draft calls is but another display of good faith on the part of the United States. So far, Hanoi has scoffed all suggestions and has not reciprocated our troop reductions in any way.

What many students do not realize is that the projected draft calls for January and/or February may have to be increased.

If the situation worsens; intensified communist aggression, and it becomes necessary to send more men to Vietnam, more manpower will be needed. Need of more man power equals more draft calls.

Hopefully, we will not be faced with increased draft calls but we must recognize that the possibility does exist. Two unpredictable factors will determine future draft calls, 1) the outlook of the war, and 2) the rate of volunteers into the service.

On September 19 President Nixon announced that there will be changes made in the draft before February regardless of what Congress does. Instead of calling the oldest first, the new plan will call those 19 years old first. The purpose of the new plan will be to remove uncertainties from the 20 to 26 age group. Each person would be vulnerable for one year only, excluding an emergency which would require an all out effort. Under the new plan, each graduating student would be considered to be 19 years old for one year after graduation. If he got past that year without being called, he would not have to worry about being called in the future. The President and other officials stressed the fact that any change in the draft system will not affect college deferments. The big difference in the plan is that young people will be subject to the draft for only one year instead of seven years.

While many students would be happier if they were not subject to the draft at all, this proposed plan is certainly an improvement over the old system. At least now, the student will have only one year of uncertainty and will be able to plan his future that much sooner.

summons for being delinquent in registration, and who have stood mute or requested the assistance of an attorney or counsel have normally been held in contempt and classified 1-A. Their classifications are now invalid and most draft boards will probably ignore them rather than submitting to the legal rigamaroll necessary to change the person's classification or validate the 1-A status.

Judge Peckham clearly ruled that only Congress can refuse the right of counsel for any person being interrogated by federal institutions and that no legal delegation of this power had ever been granted the President (and through him local draft boards). Besides, Packham continued, such a delegation would be "constitutionally suspect."

The decision effects all draft boards under jurisdiction of the government unless challenged or overturned in a higher court.

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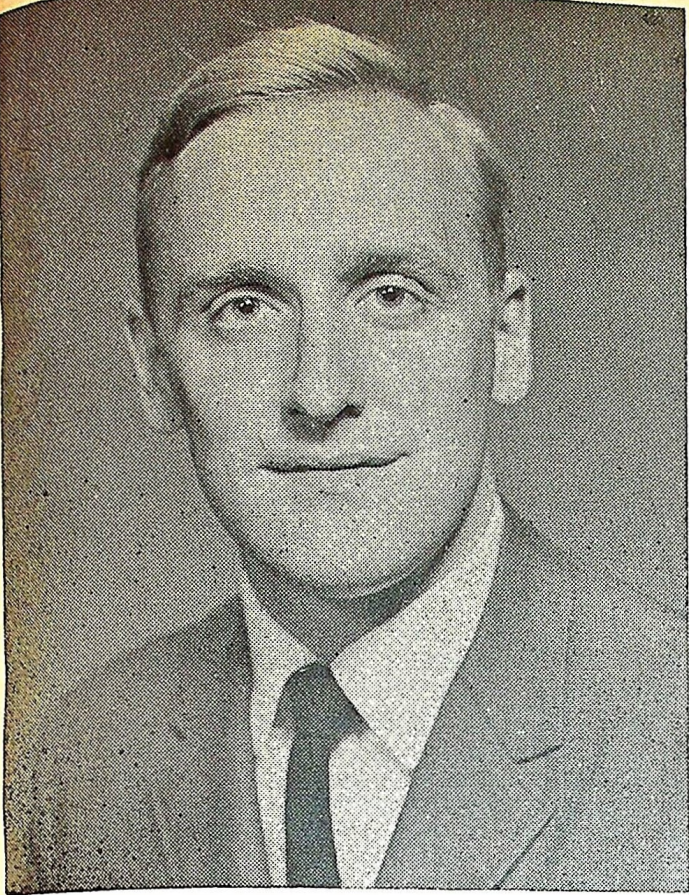

pick the one you feel is best suited for yourself.

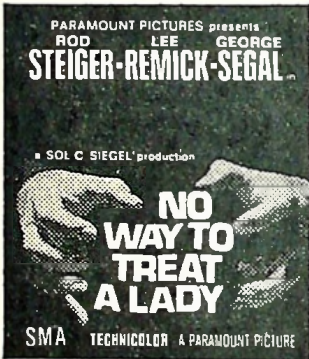
