Dr. Hoslett To Take Three Month Leave-of-Absence; Dean Gulski Assumes Post of Acting President

It was announced Wednesday, October 22, that Dr. Schuyler Hoslett, President of Bryant College, will take a three-month leave of absence due to reasons of health. The announcement was made as a result of action by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees.

Announced at the same meeting, Nelson J. Gulski, Dean of the College, will serve the three-month period as acting president of the College. Dean Gulski has been associated with Bryant College for over forty years.

It is expected that all operations of the College will continue as they did under Doctor Hoslett. Dean Gulski will have the assistance of the Central Staff of the College: Thomas Manion, Vice President; Frank Delmonico, Treasurer; William Smith, Dean of Student Affairs; and Joseph Hagan, Director of Development. These people will assist Acting President Gulski as they did President Hoslett. It is expected that no new programs or policies will be instituted by Acting President Gulski; but instead, the established policies of President Hoslett will be continued.

Bryant Student Named To Governors Youth Advisory Council

Governor Licht made good last week a campaign promise dealing with hearing the voice of the student. The governor announced the formation of the "Youth Advisory Council to the Governor." This council consists of representatives of all Colleges and high schools whose job it is to advise the governor and the legislative body of the state of the concerns, desires, and goals of the young people.

The Bryant College represen-

tative to this council will be Steve Hill. Steve is a Junior at Bryant and is Vice President of the Legislative Council of the State Senate and President of the Ski Club. He has spent the last summer working on the internship with Senator Pell in Washington.

It is expected that the Governor's Youth Advisory Council will meet for the first time sometime in late October or early November.

Cross Country Team Wins First S. N. E. C. Championship

The Bryant Cross Country team won the Southern New England Conference Cross Country Championship this past Saturday on the 4.9 mile course at Nichols College.

Led by Roy Lapidus (second), Charles Gugliemetti (fourth), Bob Armstrong (eighth), Dick Maltelos (sixteenth), and George Edge (twentieth), the Indians scored 50 points to 61 for Bridgewater and Quinnipiac, 70 for SMU, and 87 for Nichols.

Mike Taylor and Charlie Haskell finished twenty-eighth and thirty-first for Bryant. Forty runners started the race with thirty-two completing the hilly course.

Not only was this the first time the Conference championships were held, it was also the first championship ever won by a Bryant team.

Saturday's win at Nichols came after a sweep of a quadrangular meet held at the Tupper Campus last Wednesday. In that meet, Bryant, with 42 points defeated Fitchburg, 50, SMU, 54, and Merrimack, 66. Roy Lapidus not only won the race, but tied the course record

at 26.37, after a breakneck run with Steve Thibault of Fitchburg. Bob Armstrong (sixth), Charlie Gugliemetti (tenth), George Edge (twelfth), Dick

Maltelos (thirteenth), Mike Taylor (twenty-second), and Charlie Haskell (twenty-fourth), completed the scoring for Bryant.

James Brown To Speak At Lecture Series

James Brown, editorial writer for the "New York Times," will be the first to speak to the Bryant College Lecture Committee. Mr. Brown joined the editorial board of the "Times" from the "Providence Journal" where he was editorial writer for two years. Mr. Brown was born in Philadelphia, Pa., and graduated an economics major from Yale College. He then attended Brown University Graduate School pursuing Asian studies.

Mr. Brown served in the United States Marine Corps and was awarded the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star.

In 1948, he became a reporter and state editor for the "New Haven Journal-Courier." In 1950 he served as editor of the "Southington (Conn.) News." In 1951 he took a similar position with the "Branford (Conn.) Review." From 1952 to 1955 he was news editor of the "New London Day."

Mr. Brown spent the next two years as surplus commodities supervisor in India for the American Friends Service Committee.

He returned to the newspaper business as assistant city editor and editorial writer for the "Portland Press-Herald." He then went back to India as press officer in Calcutta for the United States Information Agency. Following this, he began work for the "Providence Journal" and took an instructorship at Brown University.

Mr. Brown will speak on "THE MIDDLE EAST AND THE INSIDE VIEW" October 28th, in the Student Activities Auditorium at 7:30 P.M. The lecture is open to the public.

Fade Out?

The Fade out theory of ending the Vietnam War is reported gaining recognition in Washington as a distinct possibility. It theorizes that the war will not end as a result of fighting or as a result of negotiations but will just fade out over a period of time. The continued lull in fighting tends to support this theory. At the infiltration rate from the North is down 66% from last year. The experts feel that the war will not completely fade out for another three years.

On the favorable side, a fade out indicates that the casualties will decline proportionately. On the unfavorable side, the war should not be allowed to go on for another three years.

As college students, we know all too well what another three years of war means. It is one thing to fight for one's country and another thing to fight knowing that there are limited objectives and a limited time to fight. Why go to war when all we are doing is stalling for time?

The main drawback to the fade out theory is that it is based upon the assumption that the North will get tired of fighting and just call it quits.

It seems hard to believe that after all the years of war in Vietnam, the North will suddenly decide that they no longer want to fight, unless it is to their advantage to do so. Could they be fading out because they are afraid of being beaten? Not very likely. Even our own leaders cannot foresee a military victory. Could the lull be like a calm before the storm? Again, not very likely although a possibility. This tactic has been used many times before without success. Could the lull be a trick to get as many Americans home as quickly as possible? The Communists are stupid. They may realize that their best chance to obtain their objectives is to get the United States out of South Vietnam. The better way to get the United States out of Vietnam than to keep fighting... at least until all of our troops are removed?

U.F. Sponsors Campus Contest Between Organizations

Dear Student:

This year as last, the students, faculty, and administration are sponsoring a United Fund drive on our campus. It is not necessary to dwell on the benefits of the United Fund. I am sure that all students are familiar with the many good services they offer.

The student section of the United Fund drive will include, among other things, a contest to see who can raise the most money. The groups competing in this contest will be all fraternities, sororities, campus organizations, dorms, and commuters. Scoring will be done on a basis of contribution per organizational membership.

The operations of the contest are simple. Each organization's name will be placed on a large chart in the union. As each member of each organization contributes to the U.F., his organization will increase in marked percentage. If each member of an organization con-

tributes \$1, that organization will receive a 100% rating. If the total contribution of an organization amounts to \$10, and there are 20 members, that organization receives a 50% rating.

A running tally will be kept of each contribution, and each organization. At the close of the contest, an award will be presented to the organization with the highest rating percentage.

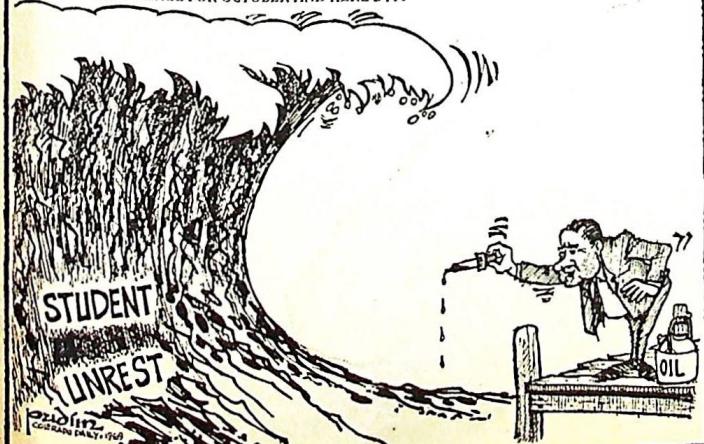
