He says this is the year to make greater strides for the school in that they are playing higher class schools like Colby and St. Leo, and in general will be participating in their toughest schedule in many a year. If they can do well, then the team along with the school will have their reputations put in a better light. Perhaps when the Indians begin knocking off the better teams they will get the notice. The freshman team faces Roger Williams tonight and Johnson and Wales tomorrow. Johnson and Wales went to Kansas City last year as regional champions. The Freshmen are led by Bruce Stewart, Ray DePellean, and Carl Mancuso.

Let's all get out tonight and tomorrow night to welcome in the basketball season. Remember, both games start at 8:30 and are played at Marvel Gym.

Archway Editor Resigns

Representing Columbia, Argentina, India, Japan, Greece, and Syria, the students attentively listened to the Dean talk about America's involvement in Vietnam, historically and politically.

As an added highlight he gave the group a personal experience of Vietnam. Dean Smith was on an amphibious vessel that transported Vietnamese refugees from Haiphong to Saigon when it was part of French Indo-China.

Afterward Dean Smith fielded questions from the floor. In closing the evening, he noted that it "is interesting that we are all from different countries and are able to discuss world problems with such harmony."

Blood Bank Drive Set For December 12

The annual Blood Drive will be held on Friday, Dec. 12, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. in the Gardner Hall, Study Room near the dispensary. Bryant College maintains a Blood Bank which was started in 1955. Since that time approximately 75 pints of blood per year have been used by members of The Bryant College Family.

As of Oct. 1, we have no blood left on deposit and cannot respond to your calls of need until the supply is replenished through this Blood Drive appeal. All students and their immediate family can draw upon this supply free of charge in time of need. Members of the faculty, secretaries, staff members, and maintenance crews are also covered. Everyone is,

therefore, responsible for replenishing the supply on deposit in the Bryant College Blood Bank which is maintained at the R. I. Hospital.

One hour of your time and the donation of a pint of blood could save a life . . . it could be your own. If you care to contribute, please observe the following instructions: 1) Pick up donor cards through the records office, activities office, dispensary or switchboard in the administration building. 2) Fill out card. 3) Return card to the activities office or the dispensary. 4) An appointment will be made for you through the activities office. Watch bulletin boards for your scheduled appointment.

IMPORTANT — no alcohol for twelve hours before donating. No cream, milk, or butter fats for four hours before donating.

Fruit Juice, Coffee, and doughnuts will be served at Gardner Hall.

You may not donate if: 1. You have had an operation within the past year, 2. You have a cold or allergy at the time of donation, 3. You have had jaundice at any time in your life.

If you are not sure of your eligibility, come anyway. You will be properly advised.

Students who donate blood will be excused from class for the period they miss plus one hour afterwards.

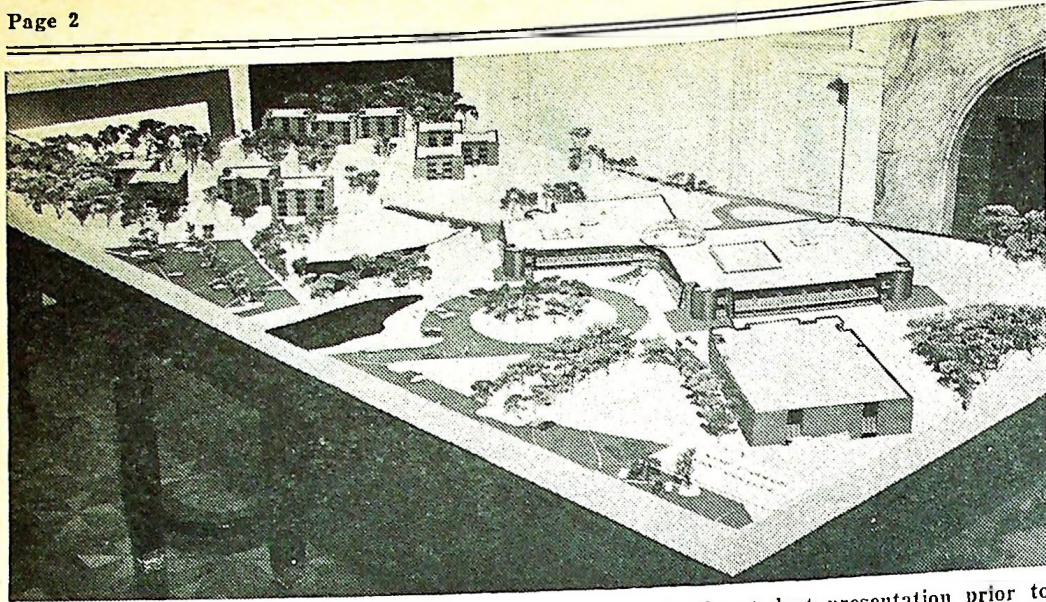

TWO FACULTY MEMBERS PARTICIPATE IN INTERRACIAL ADOPTION PROGRAM

Today's world is full of hunger, war, starvation and children wandering around without a place to go. What happens to these children? Where do they go? The answer is in the hearts of those people who care about their fellow man.

Within the State of Rhode Island, there is an organization that assists in finding homes for needy children. This society will find a home for any child no matter what race, color or creed he is. The organization is known as the Rhode Island Families for Interracial Adoption.

This group is the first transracial organization of its kind in the state. The society is a first. There has never been an association for the purpose of placing children of mixed cultures in families different from theirs. No serious problem has arisen due to this system of placing children; in fact, it has been quite successful. Their goal is to make known the need for transracial adoption; to assist and encourage prospective parents and cooperate with adoptive agencies; to demonstrate through the adoptive experience the benefits provided to the child, family, and society and to work for legislation conducive to interracial adoption.

A monumental change of thinking is taking place regarding the placement of interracial children. Placement officials are getting away from the matching background theory, but these facts are still considered. The agency is looking more for solid couples who have a steady security and experience in raising children.

Two couples who adopted interracial children are

Mr. and Mrs. William B. Sweeney, Jr., of Bristol, Rhode Island and Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Illacqua of East Providence, Rhode Island.

Mr. William Sweeney who was born in Warwick, Rhode Island, is an Assistant Professor of Economics at Bryant College. He has five children and his adopted child Eileen.

Mr. and Mrs. Sweeney had the idea of adopting children for many years. The reason for adopting now was that there was an appeal made for the adoption of mixed Negro children and the Sweeneys took advantage of the situation and adopted Eileen. They haven't encountered any more than the usual family problems and if any real problems arise, they have confidence that they can handle them.

Mr. Sweeney said, "I feel as though Eileen will have no trouble throughout her schooling years and will be treated the same as any one else in the family."

Along with his duties as a teacher at Bryant College, Mr. Sweeney also takes a great interest in the Rhode Island Families for

Interracial Adoption. He is specifically involved in the publicity aspect of the organization, and stated that "the program's point is to orient toward the thought of adoption."

Mr. Joseph Illacqua is an Assistant Professor of Economics at Bryant College and has two children, one of whom is adopted. It is strictly a coincidence that both Mr. Sweeney and Mr. Illacqua are in the Economics Department.

Mr. and Mrs. Illacqua had the idea of adoption for a long time and took a gradual approach to the idea. The Illacquas knew that many children were without homes and wanted one of them to have a proper home to grow up in; so they adopted Danny.

Mr. Illacqua remarked that "We wouldn't have considered adopting our child if we felt we couldn't resolve any future problem." Both his wife and he feel as though they can handle any problem that they may encounter. He also mentioned that he will have a closer relationship

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with civil rights and any other racial questions because now he is dealing with the situation himself. Any decision he makes will be on a personal basis instead of a community basis.

The Illacquas are also part of the Rhode Island Families for Interracial Adoption and are involved in the publicity of the organization.

Both families hope others who care will adopt racially underprivileged children into their families.

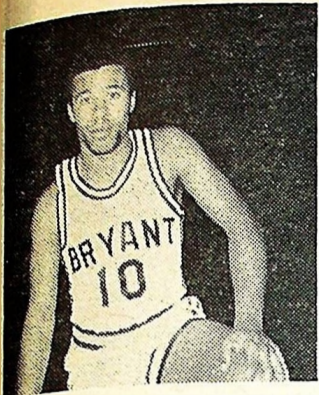

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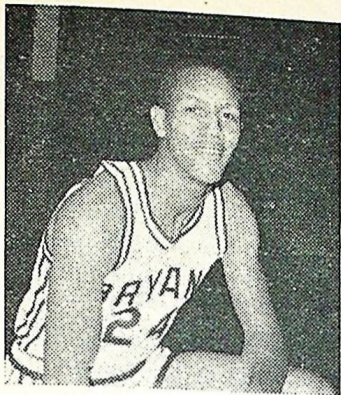

With the basketball season beginning tonight we are going to spotlight the two men who will lead the Indians on the court this year, the men who have been voted on by their fellow teammates as co-captains: George Stanton Peckham III and Donald A. Gray.

George is a seventh-semester management major from Peacedale, Rhode Island. He is a transfer student from Johnson and Wales Junior College, where he won the Freshman - Athlete - of-the-Year Award. While at Johnson and Wales he was captain of both the basketball and cross country team. His outside activities at Bryant are somewhat limited. He has been a referee for volleyball and football, as well as a charter member of Matu Mzuri, the new black student club on campus.

In discussing the basketball season, he stated that the team is stronger than last year. While trying to avoid any predictions for the upcoming season, he did say that Babson would still be the team to beat in the Naismith Conference. He went on to say that the highlight of the season will be the St. Leo game. St. Leo will be playing P. C. two days before they meet the Indians. He concluded by stating his hope for a bid in the N.A.I.A. tourney at R.I.C. A victory in that could lead to the national tournament held in Kansas City.

Quite modest about his personal achievements on the court, I contacted John Gillooly and found out some interesting facts about his last season play. He scored 255 points while shooting 47% from the floor. He had 145 rebounds for a 5.6 game average. The most remarkable statistic uncovered was his average of 5 steals a game.

Our other co-captain, Donny Gray is also a seventh-semester management major from Newport, Rhode Island. Aside from

basketball Don is on the Varsity baseball team and was a member of the Letterman's Club. He has taken part in the Intramural bowling program and lists his hobbies as reading, sleeping, tennis, and golf. After graduation he plans to be a naval officer, and eventually become a high school basketball coach.

On the court Don has amassed an impressive list of achievements. His statistics for last year are lower than his past two years because he had suffered a bad case of mononeucleosis. Not one to let little things stand in his way, Donny was put in enough to spark the team from behind into a victory. He has scored 898 career points, and could become the second Bryant student to break the 1,000 mark. His point average for the past two seasons is 12.2 and his rebounds amount to 3 a game.

Both men have stated that the team is made up of 14 players of equal ability. Both complimented the other on their respective abilities on and off the court. In discussing Mr. Folliard, the coach, they both gave him credit for instilling a winning attitude in the team. George said that he felt Mr. Folliard is a good coach. He gets involved in practice and he tries to aid each individual player. As a side light, he also added that Mr. Folliard and Mr. Stein are undefeated in two on two.

In commenting on the selection of these two men as co-captains, Mr. Folliard said that they would "accept the leadership that was lost with Ben Billie's graduation. They are two of the finest individuals on the team, and they have the ability to play well together."

So, to the two men who will lead the Bryant Indians in the basketball court, we say good luck and congratulations to our two students of the week.

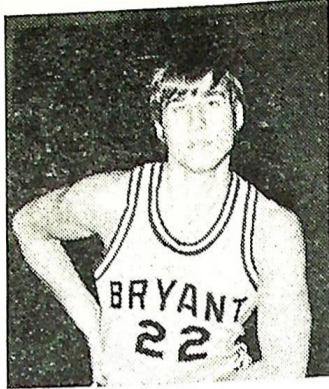

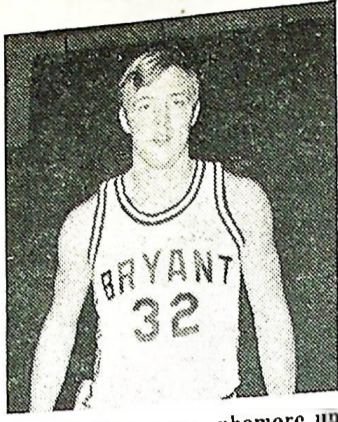

Bob Chuprevich—one of the leading scorers on last year's team, Bob had a twenty point average. Also a strong rebounder and a keen competitor, at six-three.



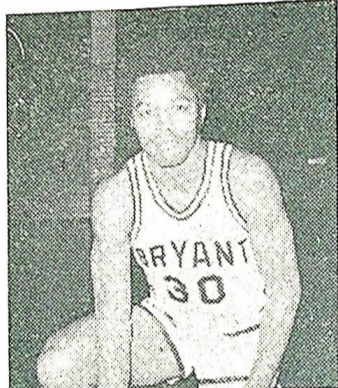
Tom Burns—a sophomore up from the freshmen team where he averaged 15.7 points per game. He also was a top assist man. Tom is six-three.



George Yates—a returning letterman, George is six foot five. He averaged 13 points a game last year. A fine rebounder and a good outside shooter.



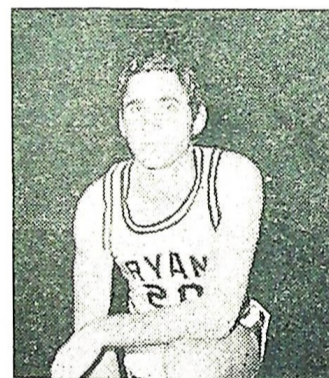
Bob Pasano—a sophomore up from the freshmen team where he averaged 17.1 points per game. Bob is six-foot three and plays forward.



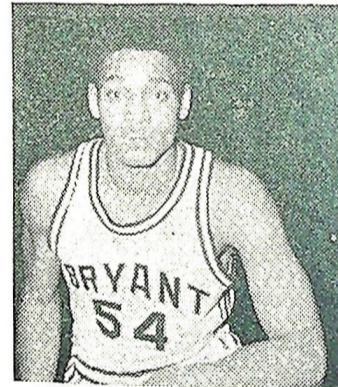
Maud Alexander—a five foot-nine-inch speedster from Johnson and Wales. He averaged twelve points a game for them.



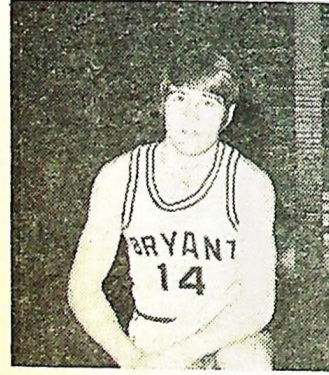
Tom Asselin—a sophomore up from the freshmen team where he had a 20.7 average. Tom should be one of the better rebounders on the team.
