Young Presidents' Organization Addresses Bryant

On February 10, 1970 four members of the Young Presidents Organization addressed the audience assembled at the Student Activities Auditorium.


The Y.P.O., as they call their organization, is an international organization with approximately 2,300 men and women in its membership. Contrary to previous information, the Y.P.O.'ers told the audience that a candidate for membership must be president of his company be-fore age 40. General requirements state that a candidate's company must employ 50 or more employees and have at least \$1,000,000 in annual sales. Mr. Bronson Fargo, unofficial spokesman for the group that night, stated that the typical member company employs 200 people and has approximately \$5.000,000 in annual sales. Other members of the panel were John Feeley, Todd Ballou, and Philip Siener, Jr.

The lecture started by each man giving a short description of his company including the number of employees and sales volume as well as the nature of their business.

Three of the four gentlemen expressed a desire to "so public." One of the three said that it was his company's goal to incorporate by 1972.

Of the four men on the panel two came up through the ranks while the other two inherited family businesses. One of the men started in business as a manufacturers' representative. His company asked him to come to work for them as a sales manager. From sales manager he was promoted to vice-president and finally to presi-

All four panel members felt that their companies were relatively small even though their sales ranged from \$6 million to just under \$10 million. One company has two subsi-(Continued on Page 3)



Thom Brown Resigns As Financial Aid Director

Thom P. Brown will be leaving his post as Director Financial Aid today, of Friday, February 20, 1970. His new assignment will be at Roger Williams College in Bristol as Director of Student Financial Aid and College Personnel Officer. Mr. Brown has been at Bryant College since Sep-tember 1966 and was international student advisor in addition to his financial aid duties. He is President of the Financial Aid Officers of Rhode Island and a member of the Federal Relations Committee of the Eastern Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators.

He graduated from Hobart College, Geneva, New York in 1958 where he was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Theta Delta Chi national social fraternity. Following his graduation he attended the Navy Officer Candidate School in Newport. Leaving the Navy as a Lieutenant after five years of active duty, Mr. Brown was associated with the Personnel Department of Industrial National Bank of Rhode Island.





"Mental retardation is not a mental illness," those were the words of Mr. Miles Santomur, Assistant to the Director of the Office of Mental Retardation.

Mr. Santomur was a guest lecturer last week at Mrs. Marsella's afternoon Social Problems class. He also stated that "mental care or mental health should not be mixed with mental retardation, they just are not compatible. First of all mental retardation is not a mental illness nor is it necessarily a medical problem any more than any individual or any group could be considered mentally ill or in need of medical care. It's a health problem, it's an educational prob-lem, it's a vocational probit's a development lem, problem. But we do not feel. at least I do not feel that mental retardation or that the mentally retarded should be indiscriminately given health care or care by a psychiatrist any more so than anyone of us. Mental illness is a problem between the inter-psychic mechanisms, mental retardation is a development problem. People are limited intellectually, their abilities to comprehend, to develop are limited because there is intellectual limitations. Mental illness is an affliction that we all can acquire as a result of undue anxiety or anxiety that we are unable to handle. Mental illness and mental retardation are not the same thing. The mentally retarded like anyone of us can be-come mentally ill, let's don't confuse the two types of afflictions.

We feel that the majority of the retarded should reside in the community that if they can't reside in their own homes then this behooves us to establish halfway houses, group homes, apartment dwellings, professional foster care homes, private foster care homes

or what have you. That the mentally retarded person has a right to live in a small group that he has the right to live by himself if he so chooses. But in any situation it should be as small as possible, as home-like as possible. He should have the same right to privacies as others have. Each of us needs a room of our own, a place to withdraw and no! be herded into large dormitory type facilities and be treated in a dehumanizing fashion."

Mr. Santomur also stated that it is unfortunate that when the general pub lic thinks of retardation, the image they got is one of a Mongoloid idiot, when in fact this form of retardation accounts for only about .2% of all the men-tally retarded. The men-tally retarded account for approximately 3% of our population and this is a conservative estimate.

"The mentally retarded "The mentally retarded should not be considered different. We concentrate on the differences and when we do he begins to think he is, then he begins to act accordingly. The re tarded will act socially as they are treated. It is only they are treated. It is only when they need to use their intellect that they cannot function properly. The big gest offenders are parents and property of the big of th and professionals in ref gard to their treatment of the retarded. We must keep them in the them in the community much as possible and allow them a normal life. act the way they do because of the way they have been treated " treated."

rector of the Lecture Series, opened the assembly to questions from the audience.

One student asked if companies were still look-ing for the aggressive young man. The answer that the four panel members seemed to agree upon was "yes" provided agprovided aggression means ready and willing to accept responsibility for the good of the company. When asked about their commitment toward the community, specifically pollution and the hiring of blacks, their answers were again similar to each other. All companies seemed to be pursuing all known means to fight pollution. All but one company stated that blacks were on the payroll. However, none had blacks in executive positions. A training program was said to be in the works to help qualify their black employees for executive jobs. The one company that did not have any blacks in its employ stated that it had gone to the Office of Economic Opportunity to recruit black people. Due to this company's location in Bristol, with no black people living in the immediate area, a transporta problem is present. transportation The distance discourages would be workers. This company has hired a black student from an area college to recruit other black people to work in the Bristol area; not only for the company doing this work but for other small companies in the area as well.

A wide variety of questions were asked. Other questions dealt with inflation, the sales force, and general business backgrounds. Everyone in attendance seemed to enjoy learning while himself about many aspects of business from sources other than the classroom The next lecture in the




