Gray Scores His One-Thousandth Point

Don Gray, an eighthsemester senior, scored his 1000th career point in Bry-1000th career point in Bryant's 9th victory held last Thursday against University of Maine. Although he only needed 3 to make the career mark, Don made 11 just to be sure. This makes Don the second to accomplish such a fete at Bryant lish such a fete at Bryant, the first being Tom Smile.

Don has been a star athlete dating back to his high school days at Rogers High both in basketball and baseball. Although only 5' 9" tall, and 165 lbs., he has amassed such statistics as 245 rebounds; 1008 points in his college career as of Thursday's game. He was leading scorer in his sophomore year with a 17.2 average. He has since made a winning battle against mental and physical odds against him from an attack of mononucleosis. He has constantly been a spark to the team as well as an offensive and defensive threat to our opponents on the court with an average of 9.9 points a game.



Curriculum Changes

Much talk has been in the air concerning the present curriculum of studies offered at Bryant. Consequently, numerous questions have been raised relating to possible future lating to possible future changes, additions, and omissions concerning the curriculum. Recently I interviewed Dr. Thomas A. Manion, Academic Vice President of the College, to find out exactly what the college administration has in mind concerning curriculum changes. ulum changes.

The motto of Bryant, "Education for Business Leadership" is a compact summation of the desired result of the following proposals for the near future. The need today is for good business leaders, not just "specialized business mechanics" in a given business area.

Four new majors are in the process of approval this week: Industrial Manage-ment, Finance, Office Administration, and Accounting systems (EDP). If approved, these new majors will take effect at the new campus in 1972.

Also, by 1972, the requirement for one to be eligible to sit for the C.P.A. Exam will be extended to five years of undergraduate study instead of the four year minimum now required. At Bryant, a student planning to eventually sit for the C.P.A. Exam can continue here for one year of graduate study after receiving his B.S. in Accounting. The student will then qualify to sit for the exam with five years of study completed.

The new proposed Finance Major will prepare the student for a career in business finance from a management standpoint. management standpoint.
Institutional Management
will be a major in Travel
Tourism. The Accounting
Systems (EDP) Major will prepare the student for a career in programming, a field of widespread expansion today. The Office Administration Major is particularly designed for women who wish to continue

their education beyond an Associate Degree in Secretarial Studies. This program will consist of mainly management courses, in the last two years, to prepare the student in assuming more executive and administrative duties.

In addition to the six

present majors, Secretarial Studies, Teacher Education, Accounting, Management, Marketing, and Economics, plus the four new proposed majors, stated previously, two more programs have been added to the night school curriculum, Trans-portation and Law Enforcement. This gives Bryant a total of twelve undergraduate majors.

With the above changes in mind, one can readily see Bryant's attempt to keep pace with the ever changing complex world of business. The school is also in the process of initiating a core program where the first two years of the Business Administration Program will be almost identical. More professional electives are now being offered to seventh- and eighth-semester students. It is hoped that fifteen professional business credits, out of the sixty required for graduation, will become electives in the near future. The core program and the individual selection of business elec-tives will also be of great value to transfer students from two year colleges.

A final question in many students' minds is whether more liberal arts courses will be offered in the future. Presently, sixty hours of liberal arts study is required for the B.S. degree. The majority of these liberal arts courses are explicitly required for graduation. It is hoped that, in the future, the curriculum will only state so many credit hours required in science, so many in humanities, so many in English, etc. Then the choice of how to "spend" these various credit hours will be left up to the student in accordance with his own particular interests.

IN REPLY TO MAGICAL MYSTERY TOUR

If you're there to see the Registrar, why do you expect the secretary to answer what you came to see the Registrar for? Her job is not the Registrar's job. The secretary is there to keep records of the arrangements made by the Registrar, Dr. Hammond, and the Assistant Registrar, Mr. Alberg, and is in no way obligated to disclose this information.

Furthermore, the article stated that as one sits in the office and surveys the surroundings he sees "a quivering, cowering student trying to speak to Dr. Hammond." Are you, the student body, going to stand for being pictured this way?? Since when are we afraid to stand up for our own rights?

WORDS OF THOUGHT FOR HARRY KRISHMAN

The Bryant environment is quite honored to have a person of your writing caliber among us. We will have equal pride watching you develop into another Jonathan Swift. For it was his work title "A Modest Proposal" which satirized the evils of 17th century England. Of course our institution has not reached the point to where roast children are being served in the dining hall.

Sarcasm is sometimes a brutal, but needed tactic to bring across a point. I believe there to be a distinct difference between sarcasm and cynicism. Cynicism is the last refuge of the idealist. Let me pass this thought on to you . . . be it only but a sheath for your own literary scalpel.

Theoretical concepts far too often become the premise for the idealist writing his "ideal article". Most theories remain workable only on the surface of a piece of paper.

It is the science of pragmatism that turns ideas into workable solutions. It also is pragmatism that discards cynical criticism for rationale and reasoning. Ideas should be intellectual instruments for directing our activities when we are dealing with reality. The pragmatist, William James, puts forth the concept that an "idea is truth only if it corresponds to reality." He argued that truth in its practical character means the property of an idea that will lead us successfully from one point on the continuum of our experience to some other point through a successive series of experiences. John Dewey, an American pragmatist, points out that good is not defined, "in terms of desires and satisfactions that occur regardless," but in terms of a "harmony of satisfactions and desires that result from intelligent inquiry." This concept might be applied to the Needed Good at this school.

You have so "carefreely" lifted the words "Hare Krishna" from Allen Ginsburg's poem. If your research had taken you a little further than just the title you too might have found that 'Hare Krishna" is a newly formed American religious cult based around peace and harmony with one another. Hardly a title synonymous with your articles.

The word "Peace" seems to be an overused word in this day.

By no means do I see any detrimental effects in seeking "Peace." Personally I see more hope towards the attainment of peace between men by helping the pragmatist than blindly following the stoned idealist.

The words "Hare Krishna" meaning "to live with peace", becomes pragmatic only when people cease to just state the phrase and start applying it.

The purpose of this article is not to promote a personal feud between one another but to make known the presence of a highly opinionated system of intellectual checks and balances on one another. May it be that we and others might pick up some new ideas . . . at least a mild stimulation of thought.

V. A. College News

Q-Last summer when I went to school under the G.I. Bill, I was confused by the hours shown on the attendance card. I was only taking three hours, yet on the card it showed semester 15. Why is this?

A-Since summer school is an accelerated session, payment is based on standard class sessions rather than semester hours. sions per week.

However, to avoid confusion, this year the card will show the actual semester hours. You will still be paid on the number of standard class sessions.

Q-I am attending school under the G.I. Bill and am receiving \$155 per month for myself and dependent wife. Do I have to report to the VA if my wife goes to work? Will she be dropped as my dependent, if she is to make a certain amount of money?

A—The answer to both of your questions is "No." The amount of your wife's income has no bearing on your dependency status as far as educational assistance is concerned.

Q-Recently I started training at State University. I now find that I would like to return to my home town and enter a junior college for the first two years. Is this permissible under the G.I. Bill?

A-Yes. Assuming that your ultimate training objective remains the same you may transfer between recognized colleges and universities. Contact your nearest VA office and request approval of the school you now desire to attend.

Q-I have been attending college on the G.I. Bill for the past two years. I married three months after I enrolled but VA still pays me a single person. Why?

A-You have not previously notified VA of your marriage. You can receive additional allowance for one dependent when you submit a declaration of marital status and a certified copy of the public record of your marriage. The effective date of the increase will be the day you first advised the VA of your marriage provided the proof is furnished within one year.

Everybody got into the act as Bryant defeated Gordon in league action last Monday night. All nine members of the team saw action and all but one registered in the point column. Bobby Chuprevich led the way although playing only half the game. He finished with 22 points. Also finishing in double figures were Tommy Burns with 16, Bill Zilliox, 13, George Yates 11, and Don Gray 10. Tommy Asselin also contributed 9 second half points, in coming off the bench.

The team defense limited Gordon to 17 first half points while employing a 3:1:1 half course press. This placed Gray, Peckham, and Burns at the "three position" double teaming the ball, and forcturnovers and bad

Zilliox again played an excellent game. He turned in thirteen rebounds to go with his thirteen points. He also played strong defense in his second straight strong performance. With John Westman out of the lineup with an injury the team is now down to nine men.

Burns had done some outstanding work against Colby and started the next night against Babson. Also seeing plenty of action is sophomore Bob Pasano. Chuprevich is the only player on the team averaging in double figures. He's averaging somewhere around twenty points a game. With Gary's scoring gone, the team is going more and more to Chuprevich.
