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BRYCOL OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZED

Brycol will be officially recognized today, by administrators, for the entire Bryant community. Originally, the foundation was set up to have complete control of the Senate budget and Senate entertainment programs. Obtaining financial freedom was seemed to be too large a hurdle, so the scope was lessened to focus only on providing services to the students of campus. The agreement, reached by the Brycol Interim Board (Kevin McGarry, Howard Flaum and Timothy Banning) and the administration contained three

criteria guiding these services.

First, Brycol must seek to provide the students with services and products at a better price than a student could receive elsewhere.

Secondly, the services must provide students with educational, business experience and employment opportunities.

Thirdly, at the same time it is providing services, it must generate small surplus revenues to reinvest into the foundation with the purpose of investigating feasible, new services and expand on existing services.

The foundation's offices will be located in the Smith House. This expense will be shared by the College and Brycol. A contract will be made explaining the exact responsibilities of the foundation towards the Smith House.

Board members will be appointed and elected.

After this one year trial period, the status of Bryant will be reevaluated and a new, long-term contract will be adopted.

Brycol hopes to get into full swing over the summer and be ready to operate its programs by fall.

Townhouse Resident Assistantships for 1975-76

Townhouse Resident Assistantships are available to qualified upperclassmen interested in working with the Student Affairs Office to improve student life in the Townhouses.

Potential Townhouse Resident Assistants are expected to be persons who approach new situations with enthusiasm and comparative ease. They must also be willing to confront and effectively resolve individual and group problems.

There are two positions available for September, 1975; one male, one female. General areas of responsibility for Townhouse Resident Assistants are:

A. Helping to establish a conducive educational environment within the Townhouse.

B. Assisting and advising groups of students.

C. Acting as a referral agent.

D. Helping students to enforce the rules and regulations of the College.

E. Assisting with general administrative responsibilities.

F. Assisting in the management of the Townhouses. Renumeration: Waiver of single room fee.

Applications will be available Tuesday, April 22, 1975, in the Student Affairs Office. They must be completed and returned by Tuesday, April 22, 1975.

Student Center Fund Raising Campaign

The Student Center Fund-Raising Committee, a sub committee of the Trustee Student Center Committee, was appointed by Dr. George Kelley, Chairman, last week.

The Student Coordinators are Mike Hammer and Kevin McGarry. Mr. Robert Meek will serve as Faculty coordinator. Together they will work with Mr. Dick Twomey, Director of Development for Bryant College, and his assistant, Mrs. Shirley Barden.

The Bryant Community's portion of the total \$1.9 million project is \$475,000. The campaign will hopefully reach its goal by December, 1975.

The Senior Class phase of the campaign is in full swing. There are approximately forty seniors and underclassmen working on the program. The senior captains are Dan Landerfin, Rich McGrath, Lisa Pesanello, and Ron (Ripper) Regen.

Most of you may not realize; but, their is a committee on campus called the "Student Center Committee." This committee is composed of students, faculty, administration, personnel who's job is to design, finance and decide the purpose, function and need for structure of this type.

I interviewed Ray Quinlin, this past week, who is in charge of the initial physical design of the structure. It is estimated that the two or more story structure will cover 40,000 squar feet. The building is planning to be simple in shape and will become part of the brown brick-water setting of our campus. The exact site of this structure has not been decided on however, the area between the dorms and the unistructure has a good potential.

Once the committee completes its task, the Board of Trustees will review the recommendations made by this committee. A building of this type will be most beneficial to everyone. At the same time Bryant's accreditation will increase causing our diplomas to be more valuable.

This new and very much needed addition to this campus will be completed some time during 1973, depending upon preliminary plans, bids, documents, etc. This new structure will cost \$1,900,000 to build. How will the funds be raised? It is being proposed that:

Donations from parent's alumni, friends, etc.	475,000



FACULTY-STUDENT DIALOGUE PROGRAM ON ORGANIZATIONAL CHANGE


ORGANIZATIONAL ROLES AND MANAGERIAL STYLES

A "Striking" Question

Dear Editor,

Did you have your boots on April 4 when The Archway printed the Article "Tuition Increase Explained! If not you have dirty feet, and its not mud.

In particular I question the following: The Average salary of a Teacher is about 16,000. There are about 90 teachers on the staff here at Bryant. If every teacher received a 10% increase this would amount to about 144,000 dollars a year. Taking some leeway we can call it 150,000 a year or 300,000 dollars for two years. Considering the Maintenance workers increase about 50,000 a year, the two year total would be 100,000 dollars. This gives us a two year total of 400,000. If we padded that

figue a bit we can call \$500,000. However there is still a discrepancy of about 1,000,000 bucks! I am not questioning the utility increase because I don't have any information dealing with that. This \$100,000 is not an accurate figure, since I did not include the college administrators salary increase, because I have no idea what it was (is). I really don't think it would amount to one million or even 1/2 million dollars. Are we being manipulated? Bryant's increase in tuition is 15% more than any other college on the comparative chart. Why? Even if the other colleges cost more I'm sure they get more return in the division of student Services.

Annual Competition For Overseas Study Opens

The Institute of International Education today announced the official opening of the 1976-77 competition for grants for graduate study or research abroad in academic fields and for professional training in the creative and performing arts. It is expected that approximately 550 awards to 50 countries will be available for the 1976-77 academic year.

The purpose of these grants is to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and other countries through the exchange of persons, knowledge and skills. They are provided under the terms of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961 (Fulbright-Hays Act) and by foreign governments, universities and private donors.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens at the time of application, who will generally hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant and, in most cases, will be proficient in the language of the host country. Except for certain specific awards, candidates may not hold the

Ph.d. at the time of application. Candidates for 1976-77 are ineligible for a grant to a country if they have been enrolled in a university or doing research in that country during the academic year 1975-76.

Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree, but they must have four years of professional study or equivalent experience. Social

work applicants must have at least two years of professional experience after the Master of Social Work degree; candidates in medicine must have an M.C. at the time of application.

Selection is based on the academic and/or professional record of the applicant, the validity and feasibility of his proposed study plan, his language preparation and personal qualifications. Preference is given to candidates between 20 and 35 years of age who have not had prior opportunity for extended study or residence abroad.

Country Comfort

The Country Comfort is now open to students. The activities that can be held as specified in the "Bryant College Country Comfort Agreement" are limited to meetings, speeches, craft classes, and faculty-student dialogues.

Rules for parties are as follows:

- 1) They can be held only on Friday and Saturday nights.
- 2) The sponsors of the parties must leave a \$25 damage deposit with the Student Affairs Office, which will be returned upon satisfactory inspection of the premises after the party.
- 3) The sponsors must

make arrangements with Security.

4) The sponsors are responsible for cleaning up after the party and leaving it in satisfactory condition.

The Country Comfort will be open Monday through Thursday from 3 p.m. to midnight; on Friday from 3 p.m. to 2 a.m.; Saturday from Noon to 2 a.m., and Sunday from Noon to Midnight.

All scheduling of activities must receive approval from the Student Affairs Office. It comes under the direct jurisdiction of the Student Affairs Office. The Country Comfort Committee/Club is permitted to assume general responsibility for the supervision of the facility.

How Preregistration Works

The time of preregistration has come again. Many college students were angered by numbers which they were assigned to register. If this is the case talk to Dean Alberg.

for a few times in a row he should set up an appointment with one of the Deans, preferably Dean Alberg and discuss this situation with him.

Dean Alberg who is the registrar at the college handles all the procedures during registration. I talked with him this week concerning preregistration. The numbers are assigned to the student by the IBM computer on campus. Mr. Snyder runs the numbers in the computer for the dean. The birthdays are 'shuffled' by the computer and then the numbers (1-165) are assigned to the birth dates by the computer.

I then inquired if the possibility existed for a student to get a low number each registration period. He said if the student is a transfer student with a three of higher classification then the possibility might exist. If the student has spent four years at Bryant then he should not always get a low number. If the "odd" did happen and a student did get a low number

Instead of mailing schedules home this year they will be available in the commuters lounge late next week or the early part of next. If you have some problems with your schedule then you should see Mrs. Reed or Mr. Tarapata during the week of April 28, or July 30, to change any conflicts of time you may have. Both academic advisors will be in a conference hall during the week of April 28 in the back of the registrars office to help you with your individual case.

I asked why they held some courses open until the numbers were very low, than open the courses up again. In essence anyone in the middle numbers were locked out. He told me that if he had allowed all the seats in a room to be filled immediately then the students at the end would only have courses which conflicted in times with other courses which were available.

He told me he did feel it was unfair to those in the middle but with the present system this was necessary.

If a student does not want to see the advisor before the middle of summer then he can use the add drop form to complete his schedule. There hopefully will still be seats available in classrooms because next semester there is an average of five less students per section than last semester.

To help eliminate any schedule problems more teachers could be added. Dean Alberg agreed but said that in order to do that some teachers would probably have to be fired. But still with the present teaching staff we have there were only 344 courses open and we had 3650 students in the day school. This year there were only 2,650 students who registered and there were 355 courses open.

Since the college depends on the students to raise any questions they have about scheduling, they should be discussed with Dean Alberg. This is the only way he said that the system can be individualized.

Bryant College To Hold Seventh Annual Seminar For Secretaries

The Department of Secretarial and Office Administration at Bryant College will hold its seventh annual Seminar for Secretaries on Wednesday, April 23, 1975, from 8:00 to 10:00 a.m. in the Auditorium. The theme is "This is Your World Participate".

The guest speaker will be the Honorable Lila M. Sapinsley, Rhode Island State Senator. Mrs. Sapinsley, the first woman to chair the Board of Trustees of State Colleges, with her main theme in all board meetings the development of programs to encourage black and disadvantaged students to enter higher education. She also serves on many hospital boards throughout the state as

well as being a board member of the Trinity Square Repertory Co. She has worked to establish the John Hope Settlement Day Care Center and the Fox-Point Day Care Center.

In 1975 she was elected Minority Leader of the State Senate, the first woman to hold this position in the State of Rhode Island. While in office she was advocated an overhaul of the Board of Regents, conservation of our environment, equal opportunities in housing, employment and education. She secured a passage of her bill prohibiting discrimination against women in the granting of credit, making Rhode Island one of the first to grant such a law.

Co-chairpersons for this event are Professors Karen L. Carley and Pauline W. Tucker. Other faculty members who are assisting are: Mary Jane Pelkey, chairman of the department; Bianca Bernstein, George Claffey, Dr. Marie Cote, Loretta P. Lukowicz, Dr. Francis Mahan, Robert Meek, Dr. Leger Morrison, Alice H. McLaughlin, Dorothy F. O'Connell, Dr. Priscilla Phillips, Eileen Rafferty, and Dorothy Webster.

Senate Referendum "Are You In Favor Of The Culmination Period?"

The Student Senate announced last week that it will include a referendum on the ballot for next week's Legislative Branch elections. The Senate felt that the issue was of such great importance that the entire student body should voice their opinion. It was also decided that there will be a special ballot for the Senior class, which would not ordinarily vote in the

upcoming election. The referendum, which states, "Are you in favor of the Culmination period? will affect the LONG RANGE status of the Culmination period. The short range status will be determined by a vote of the faculty this week. The Senate urges all students to voice their opinion on the controversial period, so that final determination can be made on its long range status.

Senate To Conduct Faculty Course Evaluation

The Bryant College Student Senate will conduct a Faculty-Course Evaluation starting next week. The program, which is similar to the one used in the fall semester of 1973, has been approved by the Executive Committee of the Faculty Federation. Students will be asked to complete an evaluation for every course that they are enrolled in. A few minutes will be set aside

at the beginning of each class for students to complete the evaluation. The entire program is computerized, so the results should be printed within two to three weeks. The results should be helpful to students during the registration period next semester. If you would like to help the committee by passing out the evaluation in your courses, please see Scott Matty or Nick Montt in the Student Senate office.

Faculty Votes In Favor Of Culmination Period

The Curriculum Committee conducted a poll of the faculty this week to determine their position on the culmination period. All faculty members were given a ballot to indicate if they were: A) In favor of keeping the culmination period as scheduled; or B) Opposed to keeping the culmination period. Any faculty member that was

opposed to the culmination period was asked to specify their recommendation for replacement of it. According to Mr. John Zeiger, chairman of the Curriculum Committee, a majority of those faculty members who responded were in favor of keeping the culmination period. The culmination period will remain as scheduled for May, 9-16, 1975.







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A Choice?

ESQUIRE magazine (April 1975) brought to the reader advice on "How to Get Old and Do It Right," indicating that eight basic rules should be followed: (1) stand up straight, (2) mind your gerontic zones, (3) never stop working, (4) no cosmetic devices, (5) learn to narrate, (6) rage, don't whine, (7) embrace winter, and (8) acquire a big ego. Each of these rules was accompanied by a whimsical picture and some not-so-nonsense commentary. Another feature described "The Grandest American Old" and carried the comment, "You find them in Boston." The accompanying picture shows thirteen Bostonians, ranging in age from seventy to eighty-eight. Included are such notables as former Speaker of the House John McCormack, Pops conductor Arthur Fiedler, and Brookline's number one hostess Mrs. George C. Shattuck.

All articles discussing old age are not witty, amusing, or comforting, however. A recent article in the NEW YORK SUNDAY NEWS (Clinton Cox, April 6, 1975) describes the plight of a frighteningly large proportion of the aged: "There are approximately 1.4 million people in New York City aged 60 or over. Most of them live on fixed incomes

that were never large enough for all their needs and have now been made totally inadequate by rising costs. It has been estimated that one third of the senior citizens in Brooklyn, for instance, live on less than \$2,000 a year . . . Over 70,000 of the city's senior citizens have special dietary needs, but are unable in many cases to eat even one decent meal a day. Over 60% of the Bronx elderly cannot speak English and have the added burden of being "ated by language." Photographs accompany this article also, graphically emphasizing that old age to many might will be the ultimate calamity.

Little imagination is needed to see that the land of the aged possesses a very fragile ecology. When one of the frail parts is disturbed, everything is liable to come tumbling down. What happens when rents are raised? Less for food. What happens when one eats less food or cheaper food? Medical problems increase. What happens if one doesn't take care of medical problems? Emergencies exist. And what happens when one does go to the hospital? What little savings existed are spent. Independence is lost.

What do many old people do? Some days they just stay in their rooms and listen to the radio. Other days they

spend hours writing letters to government offices, trying to get a situation straightened out. Sometimes they spend hours waiting in line—and don't even get waited on that day. They can't get the reduced bus fare until ten o'clock; so they can't wait in line early. On the way home, they can't qualify for the special fare after four; so they can't stay in line too long. The picture is not pleasant. Clinton Cox sums up the plight of the elderly living in one of the oldest hotels in Brooklyn: "Inside the room (a lounge), which is lit by naked bulbs, the handful of older people sitting in the frayed stuffed chairs lining the walls are almost lost in the emptiness of

the cavernlike room. No one speaks. One woman tugs absently at her skirt. A man

dressed in a black suit with a black tie and frayed white shirts, sits very straight and still, hands resting on a cane . . . Most of the men and women stare into space . . .

occasionally someone coughs. Somehow they seem like grade-school youngsters forced to attend their first dancing class and waiting shyly and silently for something to begin."

It might well be that the only way to grow old gracefully is to die young.

Summer Session Registration

The first returns are coming in for the 1975 Summer Sessions Registration, and they look promising.

As our Graduate students all know, there will be two Sessions, May 12-June 21, and June 23-August 2, with classes on campus, at Raytheon in Portsmouth, on the Navy Base in New port, and at BIF in West Warwick. Each class is scheduled for two evenings per week, either Monday and Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday, from 6:30-10:00 p.m. Each Session runs for six weeks.

For the First Session on campus, 10 classes are scheduled; with six at Raytheon; three at Navy, and four at BIF.

For the Second Session, on campus 10 classes are scheduled; with 2 at Raytheon and 2 at Navy.

If this final Registration follows the same pattern as the Preregistration, there will be a record enrollment of Graduate students in Graduate courses this Summer.

Fall Semester Planning

While the Spring Semester is running, and final Registration is under way for the Summer Sessions, plans are being made for the Fall 1975 Semester. Classes will begin on Tuesday, September 2, the Semester will end on Friday, December 19. There will be a Preregistration for the Fall Semester, but the

dates have not been set for this as yet. And there will be a final Registration by mail from August 4 through August 15.

Two Year Planning

In addition to the above, a two-year tentative schedule has been prepared to cover the Academic Years 1975-1976 and 1976-1977, similar to the previous Two-Year Plan. This has just been sent to the Graduate Faculty.

ATCSB Scores and Examinations

The Graduate Office has just received the ATCSB scores for the March 22 Examination. Almost 30,000 applicants took this examination around the world. To date for this academic year, 90,000 have taken it.

Over 100 applicants designated Bryant College to receive their scores, which means 350 applicants for the academic year to date.

The Graduate Office will be reviewing these scores to help determine the admissibility of these applicants to our MBA programs.

For those who still need to take this Examination, the next date is July 12, the place URI. Application must be received at ETS in Princeton no later than Friday, June 20.

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Evening Division News

Preregistration has begun with mailings made to all currently enrolled evening students. Preregistration closes April 26. Registrations received after that will be returned to the student.

Summer evening registration begins Monday, May 5. Day students registering for evening summer

session should receive permission cards from the Registrar's Office. Evening students wishing to take day intersession or summer session courses should get permission from the Evening School Office.

Waiting lists for evening courses will be started when classes are completely filled. This will put no student at an unfair advantage.

A new two year catalog is about to go to press. It will be mailed to current students during the latter part of the summer. There are a few substantive changes that I think you should look for. The English offerings have been revised. The Law Enforcement requirements have changed. A major revision of courses scheduled by night has been done to allocate courses more evenly throughout the week.


College where he earned his Master's degree in Education after obtaining the majority of his credits from the Boston State Teacher's College.

After graduating from Boston College in 1951, with his BS BA, Mr. Reynolds attended the Boston State Teacher's College then the Worcester State Teacher's



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

Bryant Keglers Vie for National Title Finish Second in Tri-State League

Yesterday, the Bryant College bowling team traveled to Kansas City, Missouri for the NAIA national tournament. This annual clash between eight regional championship teams starts today and ends on Saturday afternoon. Eddie Kozin of Bryant, qualified as the number one bowler in the country after rolling a super 1301 six-game series on March 18 in Auburn, Massachusetts. Bryant qualified and is seeded second among the eight qualifying colleges and universities. Last year the Indians placed a close

second to Clarion State. Bryant is presently competing in their third straight NAIA tournament, and fourth in the last five years. Bryant will be facing the challenges of Rockhurst College, Oregon University, Winona State, Methodist College, Harding College, the University, Winona State, Methodist College, Harding College, the University of Wisconsin at LaCrosse and Glenville St. in the NAIA sponsored tournament finale.

The Tri-State League was finally concluded last Sunday afternoon in Wilbraham, Massachusetts, on the

Wilbraham 10 Pin Center lanes. Oddly enough only three of the 14 league teams saw action; Bryant, the University of Connecticut and Cornell University. This was caused by the absence of Cornell in the league's tournament finale on Saturday, April 5, in Lowell, Massachusetts. A blizzard kept the "Big Red" from making the scheduled appearance. Subsequently, league officials set up a special playoff; first the Huskies of U. Conn. opposed Cornell in the team event, followed by Bryant against Cornell in the doubles event.

Bryant rallied to take 17 of a possible 27 match points after dropping 8 of the first 9 decisions to a Cornell squad that averaged in the 190's during the early going. Cornell bested U. Conn., but the Huskies earned enough match point victories to secure their first place standing and seize the 1974-75 Tri-State Championship. U. Conn. had a final record of 228.5-149.5, followed by Bryant's 225-153 mark, Worcester Polytech Institute's (East team) 223-155 record and Cornell University's 218-160 win loss total.

Captain Bill Flanagan

bowled the high three-game series for Bryant in the doubles event, with a 194-193-180 triple or 567. Flanagan teamed with Bill McKee of Manchester, Conn. (199-177-191) an aggregate of 1128. McKee was the league's top bowler this year and also rolled the year's high triple, a 722 series in March of this year. Ed Kozin paired with Joe Kubiskey while Mitch Chapman and Ken McKenzie rolled as the third team.

Two hundred plus games were recorded by Mitch Chapman 201, Ed Kozin 201, and Joe Kubiskey 225.

Rio Grande Vanquishes TKE in Finals

Paul Seymour led the Pickle Company to an impressive 99-61 trouncing over TKE on Tuesday evening, April 8 in the Bryant gymnasium. Seymour, a transfer student from Auburn University, hit on 14 field goals before Coach Jeff Kusz substituted early in the second half. The 6 foot guard is expected to team with Kusz in forming the Bryant College backcourt next season.

TKE and Rio Grande both entered the championship game after winning their respective league double-elimination tournaments.

The Pickle Company started Seymour with guard Bob Carson, forwards Herb Lavery and Scott Rosenzweig; and Rick Dosedlo at the center position. They matched up against TKE's backcourt duo of Steve Pincince and Norm Tryhian, and front line of Mike Rebello, Greg Zienowicz, and Ken Bowman. Zienowicz, a forward, and pivot man Bowman all but carried the club through the game as they combined for 35 points. Guard Norm Tryhian, a former Rhode Island schoolboy star, scored 8 of his 10 points in the first half, but could only hit one hoop from the field in the latter half of play.

Seymour swished home the game's first three baskets before TKE's offense started rolling. Zienowicz and Tryhian contributed in bringing TKE back from an 14-8 deficit to a 20-18 advantage. This brief TKE lead proved to be the only time that the fraternity champs had the upperhand during the entire game. After a Rio Grande hoop and a TKE time out, the Pickle Company ran off (with the aid of a fast break) 12 consecutive points to make a close game into a 32-20 lead. The independent champions took command and by halftime steadily increased their lead to 19, points at 48 to 29. Pickle Company's favorable margin ballooned to 26, (71-45) midway in the second half. Coach Kusz freely interchanged his lineup while TKE mentor Charlie Armstrong stayed mainly with his starting five. A telling factor in the Pickle Company's wide margin of victory was primarily attributed to their great depth; especially that of Jay DeGray and Gary O'Brien, who paced the renewed attack with 9 and 8 points respectively. Brian Mullervy played well off the offensive boards while Rick Dosedlo pulled down numerous rebounds on defense. Lavery and Dosedlo each scored 14 points apiece in leading the

run and gun offense of the first year team.

Also seeing action was John Jenkins (5 points) and TKE's Bob Young, Paul Cullen and Mike Forte.

The final margin of 38 points represented the largest lead of the game. Strangely enough, TKE had battled this same team in the second round of the Schaeffer tournament in losing by a mere three points, 51-48.

The Rio Grande Pickle Company showed all during the season that they are without a doubt the best intramural team at Bryant, perhaps the best ever to perform in the college's intramural program.

Rio Grande amassed an

amazing 17 win, 1 loss record for all games from the regular season; the Schaeffer tournament and the playoffs. The following is a chronological list of results from the 18 games of the various intramural competition which the Pickle Company faced. This list excludes four forfeit victories in the regular season. Rio Grande was 6-0 in regular season play; 6-1 in the Schaeffer tournament and advanced all the way to the semi-finals before Boston State, a two-time finalist eliminated them. They rebounded strongly from the loss to Boston State in Boston, and soundly defeated all five playoff foes, at Bryant.
