Students Going Back to High School

During Spring break an estimated 25-35 Ambassadors will be returning to their high schools relating information about Bryant College to their former high school counselors. Each Ambassador will discuss their views on Bryant and answer any questions a counselor may have pertaining to all areas of Bryant College.

Under the direction of the Admissions Office, an information packet will be given to each Ambassador. The information packet will contain catalogs, sports information and other material which will be given to the high school counselor to be made available to high school students.

The newly formed Ambassador program had originally proposed to send an Ambassador to their high school and have an information session with high school students on a group basis, but this proposal was altered at the suggestion of Dean Roy Nelson of the Admissions Office. Dean Nelson pointed out that at present, some high schools only allow a college visitation once every three years due to the increasing competition among colleges. In addition, many high schools only want to see official college representatives, not students, and many high schools are only offering career nights rather than college representative visitations during school hours due to students missing classes.

Massive Financial Aid Cuts Possible

Figures in this release are approximations by education and Federal departments, and are not confirmed to be 100% accurate.

Seventy-five percent of Bryant students. These three thousand students will find their financial aid packages reduced or eliminated if President Reagan's proposed budget for 1983 passes.

The Breakdown: Basic Educational Opportunity Grants (BEOG) will be cut from 2.3 to 1.4 billion starting in fiscal year 1983. The Basic (or Pell) Grant for Bryant College alone would be cut \$278,850 (39%). Nationally, 1.2 million recipients will no longer receive the Grant. Locally, 16,328 Rhode Island students will be above the new eligibility index of \$14,000 (previously \$27,000) that is necessary to receive the Basic Grant.

Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (SEOG) tentatively will be eliminated. Six hundred and fifteen thousand students who opt to go to higher priced institutions will be forced out of the colleges of their choice.

Along with the SEOG, the State Student Incentive Grants (SSIG) would be eliminated. The SSIG currently provides 300,000 state matched grants through 15 states.

Regarding work study opportunities, 250,000 job openings will be lost as the College Work Study program is cut by 30 percent to 397.5 million dollars.

The Federal Government has discontinued capital contributions to the National Direct Student Loan Program (NDSL) eliminating low cost loans to 266 thousand needy students. The Guaranteed Student Loan Program will also be affected.

What is being done about these pending cuts? American Council of Education (ACE) is lobbying for a split package. A split package would break the single bill budget proposal into numerous categorized and related bills, one of which being student financial aid. The benefits of a split bill package would be that lobbying efforts can be concentrated on a smaller package making it less expensive to the lobbyists.

Here in Rhode Island, ARISe, the Association of Rhode Island Students has established a letter writing campaign aimed at expressing student concern to their elected state representatives. From seven colleges in the state, the total letter goal is 7,000 - 10,000 pieces of mail.

The Bryant College Student Senate will be implementing the ARISe letter campaign on Monday and Tuesday of next week in your 10 and 11 o'clock classes. At this time, a speaker

will give an overview of the current situation, and students will be given the opportunity to write letters to their state representatives during classes. All personal letters collected at Bryant will be pooled together with those collected at the other Rhode Island colleges.

This "mass mailing" of student concern will be presented to Rhode Island congressional representatives Pell, Schneider, St. Germain, and Chaffe at a public hearing to be held on Saturday, March 6th at the University of Rhode Island extension building in Providence. At this hearing, a discussion will be moderated between student and congressional leaders. It will be the aim of student leaders to convince these representatives to back the student position and lobby against the aid-cuts. This hearing will receive heavy state media coverage.

In order to help student leaders sway the lobbying efforts of the state representatives in our favor, there must be a large showing of student support to back up these student leaders. Without substantial student support, all the efforts of our Student Senators may be futile. We all can show our concern and support through next weeks mass letter campaign. Now is the time to act...your support is crucial. Are you willing to let a college education slip through your fingers? Only time will tell.

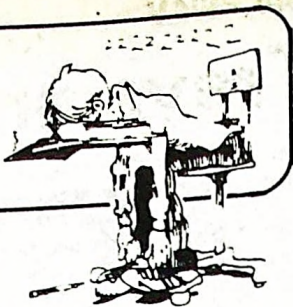

Financial Aid: A topic that may be considered "overcovered", as each year colleges across the country deluge their readers with statistics and information on student assistance. This year, however, students can not shrug off the effects of the Aid Budget cuts, as they were shrugged off in the past years.

When actual statistics compiled on Bryant students indicate a 47% decrease in assistance received, some action should be taken on the matter. Tentatively, the National Direct/Defense Student Loan and Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants programs will both be abolished, the Rhode Island Allotment of College Work Study funds will be cut from approximately \$22 to \$11 million dollars, and the base income for a basic (Pell) Grant will be cut back to \$14,000 from \$27,000. A question arises that if 50% of the existing aid program budget is cut, would this not put about 50% of the country's college students out on the street?

It is evident that the Reagan Administration Budget program recognizes that there is an abundance of college students and a shortage of blue-collar workers, and feels mandated to solve this economic tragedy of occupational imbalance. These Budget reapportionments will definitely accomplish this goal, although it is not a goal that any student wants to see.

What can be done about this disaster? Quite a bit, according to top college administration officials and the Student Senate Executive Council.

The lobby of Pro-Education organizations is an effective one: to break up the budget proposal into a number of small interrelated packages, which can be concentrated on better than a total budget proposal. There is much support for this break-up proposal, since it will benefit welfare programs in general. Sophomore Senator Joe Deegan is working on the Bryant letter-writing campaign to contribute Bryant's share of the 7 to 10 thousand letters to representatives goal for Rhode Island.

Seventy-Five percent of the people who are reading this right now will be affected by the aid budget decrease, almost 3,000 students. If every one of these students were to write a letter to the Rhode Island Representatives/Senators, it would be obvious that Bryant students care. Don't sit back and let other students write the letters, WRITE YOURSELF, and convince your friends to write too, or they may not be back in two years. I know I won't if something isn't done.

Senator Wants Aid

To the Editor:

I would like to address one of the most important issues facing Bryant, Rhode Island, and national students as a whole. That issue is financial aid.

To give you some idea of what will happen if Reagan's budget is passed as is, let me show you just a few of the statistics that will become a reality.

Pell grants will be cut by 40%. In terms of dollars this represents a reduction from 2.3 to 1.4 billion dollars. This would eliminate approximately one million students from the institutions of higher education.

College work study will be cut by 30%, or in terms of jobs, will mean 250,000 fewer jobs for students.

Supplemental grants (SEOG), State Student Incentive Grants ((SSIG), and Direct student loans are scheduled for elimination.

Now the upper classmen and Seniors are saying, that's too bad, at least I made it through the system. Think again. The administration is not going to start only in fiscal year 1983, but next fall. Scheduled cuts are: Pell grants, cut by 91 million; College work study, cut by 44 million; 6 million will be axed from (SSIG), and the list goes on and on.

What about graduate school? For 1982 the GSL, which funds one half of all graduate students will be cut by more than half. The proposal for fiscal year 1983 is complete elimination of any loans to graduate students.

What is being done? The Student Senate of Bryant College in association with ARISE (Association of Rhode Island Schools), and R.I.P.I.R.G. (Rhode Island Public Interest

Research Group), and with the complete cooperation of the faculty and administration will begin a massive letter campaign to take place in the classrooms on Monday, March 1st at 12:00 p.m. and Tuesday, March 2nd at 11:00 a.m.

Now the reason for my writing is appealing to the Bryant community for two reasons. First, please don't look at this as an intrusion upon your class time, but rather a way to continue higher education for the majority of us, 75% of Bryant students are on some form of financial aid. Second, and equally if not more important, we need people to make this work. People to go into the classroom, discuss the potential nightmare ahead of us, and urge students to write to their representatives in Washington.

I might add that this campaign is not unique to Bryant. The vast majority of colleges and universities in R.I. are participating in this campaign. Between us we hope to gather between seven to ten thousand letters which will be presented at a public hearing which will be held at a public hearing in the U.S. extension building in Providence.

Anyone interested in helping implement this campaign Please see Joe Deegan at attend our training session for classroom lectures on financial aid this Saturday, February 28th at 7:00 p.m. in the Student office. It is a must that all students take an interest in this issue.

Students Trying to Save Aid

The current proposed financial aid cuts appear to indicate that the Reagan administration has no commitment to higher education. This topic was discussed when Vice President for Student Affairs, Mr. Leslie LaFond addressed a recent meeting of the Association of Rhode Island Students (ARISE). With this fact in mind, ARISe has taken action that involves strong participation by Bryant College. Exactly what is Bryant doing to battle the financial aid crisis? Will it work? Our Student Senate leaders may have some answers.

Student Senate President Paul D'Adamo, along with many fellow Senators, is very active on the financial aid issue. Referring to the Senate's upcoming letter campaign, Mr. D'Adamo stated "Hopefully, if we can get the numbers next week, we should have some sort of impact." When asked how much of an effect the State of Rhode Island would have on the national picture he stated many other states (especially Massachusetts) have developed similar campaigns to fight these proposed financial aid reductions.

"I see the mass of college students around the country as a sleeping giant, a force with voting power and vocal ability that could be mobilized to battle these aid cuts." He also

addressed a topic that may be of greatest concern to seniors. The effect of aid cuts may still exist for many, even after graduation. "Seniors should consider the effect that these cuts could have on graduate school." "Presently, half depend on guaranteed student loans." Financial Aid cuts at the graduate school level would, in fact, be "cutting off the nerve" leaving grad school enrollment at a questionable level.

Bryant's official ARISe representative is Student Senate Vice President Diana Gibbs. With debate on the financial aid issue in Washington going on until July, Miss Gibbs sees the current ARISe actions as "just the

initial step". Referring to the students, it's a chance to "wake them up" on the issue. "The real test is, will students keep up the support?" This is important if we are to keep pressure on the congressional leaders. She stated that ARISe has no definite future plans; we must wait to see what develops during the upcoming weeks.

The Student Senate Ways and Means Committee has approved the proposal for Paul D'Adamo, Diana Gibbs and Joe Deegan to go to Washington to represent Bryant in the nationwide rally.

A student Briefing Day on financial aid will be held in Washington on Monday and Tuesday of next week. The Bryant Senate may try to send a representative; at this time plans are not definite. One thing is definite however, our student senators are working diligently, on our behalf, to battle the threat of financial aid cuts.

ARISE or Financial Aid will fall

The Ramones at Center Stage
The concert hall was completely dark while the expectant crowd took up the Ramone's "let's go" chant. The opening chords of the movie theme song "The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly" rang out as people strained to see the stage through the darkness. When the music reached a crescendo, the lights burst out to reveal a smoke-enveloped stage with an enormous Ramones banner running from

floor to ceiling. From somewhere behind the wall of smoke a bass drum began a pounding rhythm which the crowd picked up, and with a crash of guitars the Ramones appeared through the smoke and launched headlong into a rendition of "Rock 'n Roll Radio." From that point on the show never slowed down, in fact it went off at a frenzied pace which muddled some of the songs together (since many Ramones songs sound very similar even at moderate speed.) Were it not for the 1-2-3-4 countdown to every song it would have been very difficult to distinguish between many of the tunes. Fortunately, most Ramones songs sound good at high speed, and the crowd (a bit sped-up itself) was waving and bouncing right along. The biggest crowd-pleasers were the more familiar Ramone's numbers; "Rock 'n Roll High School", "I Wanna be Sedated", "Chinese Rock", "Rockaway Beach", and from their latest album, *Pleasant Dreams*, "The KKK Took My Baby Away." They played surprisingly few songs from *Pleasant Dreams*, relying mainly on older material and songs off *End of the Century*.

The Ramones do not have a great stage presence, especially lead singer Joey Ramone, but they have a devoted cult-type audience and a rollicking energetic style which combine to more than compensate for their lack of charisma. The main fault with the show was the sound system; both the Ramones and their

warm-up band, The Roll-Ons (from NYC), had problems with feedback during many songs.

Overall, the concert went very well, and the Ramones came back for three encores, although the audience was fairly quiet about calling them back. The Ramones have the "garage band" sound down tight, and they perform with infectious enthusiasm.

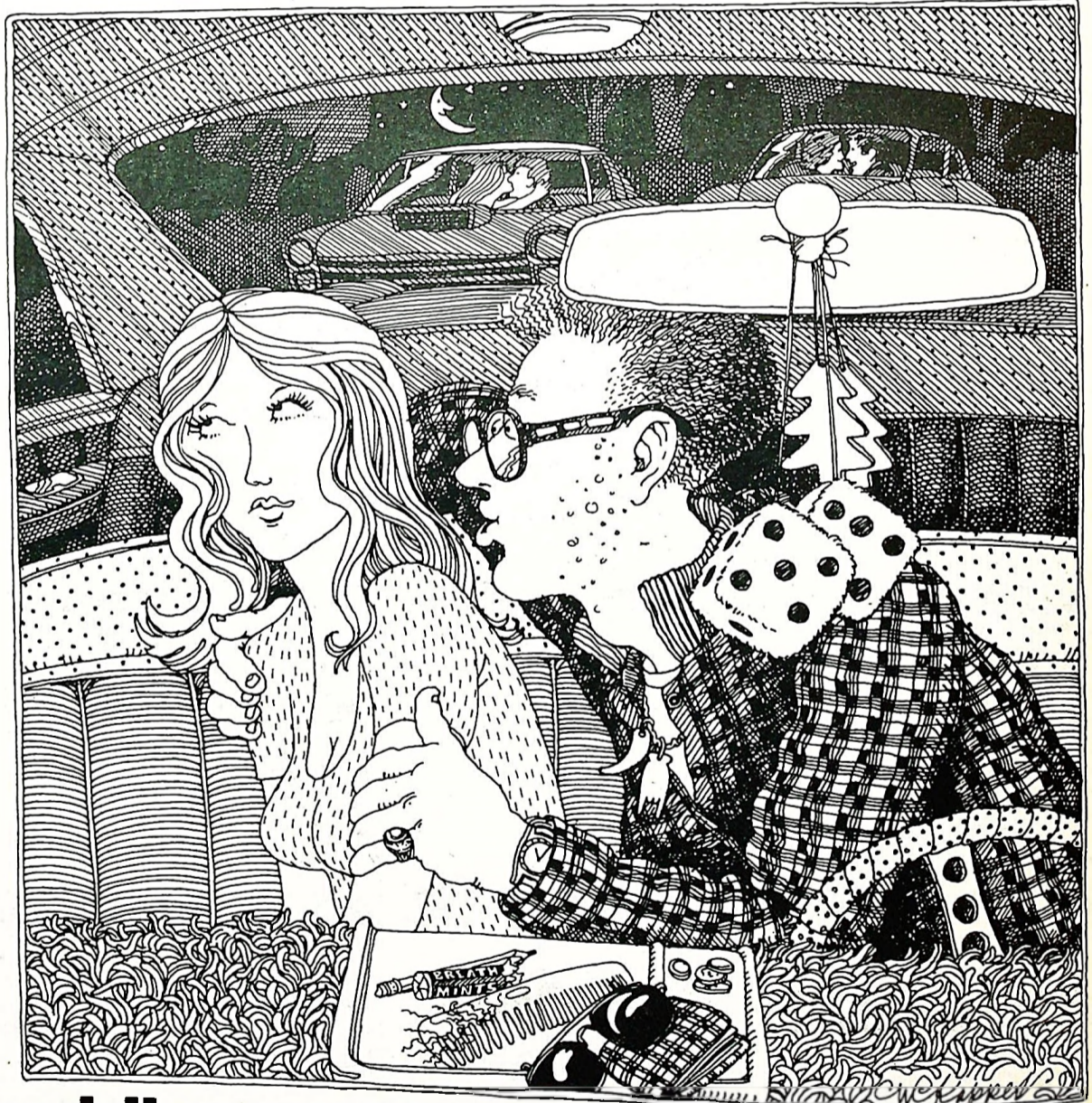

- 5) **Refreshments**-Coordinate supply and

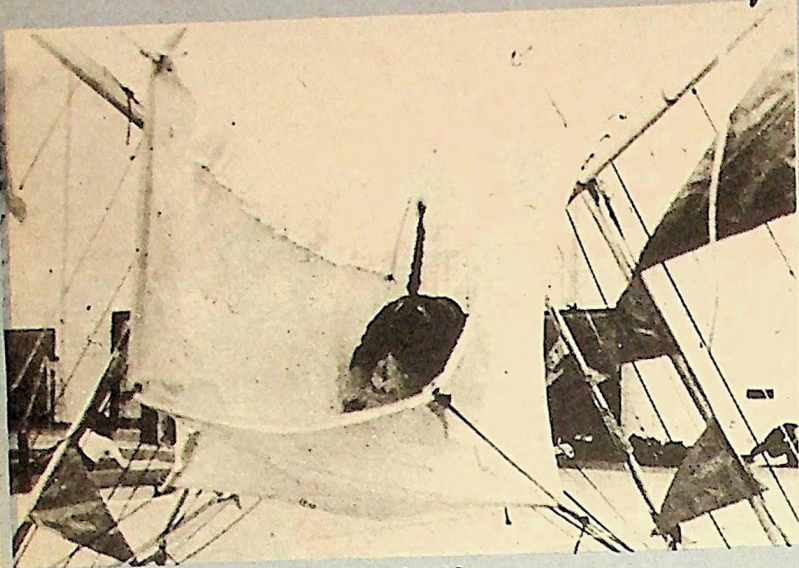
- distribution of refreshments donated by McDonalds, Tropicana, Coca Cola, and Saga Food Service.

Bowlers Take Tourney Qualified for Sectionals

Competing in only one of ten events, the Bryant College Bowling Team won the 1982 Association of College Unions—International Region I Tournament last weekend. The victory qualifies them for the sectional roll-offs of the National Bowling Conference in April.

Bryant took the tournament with 27 points overall. The next closest competitor, M.I.T., had 21 points.

The tournament has competitions in trap and skeet, darts, video games, chess, table soccer, bowling, table tennis, pool, and frisbee.

The Indians earned five points in each of five categories, taking first place in individual overall (Steve Guzski), team overall, singles (Guzski), Women's 3-game Block (Lisa Monroe) and Men's 3-game Block (Guzki). Monroe also earned one point for 3rd place overall. Ty Rheum got one point for a 3rd in the singles competition.

There are four ways to qualify for the sectional roll-offs. First, a team could get an

invitation by winning a sanctioned intercollegiate tournament.

To get an automatic bid, a team must be in the top three teams in the National Junior College Athletic Association; win one of fifteen Association of College Unions—International regional tournaments; or win the conferences.

Bryant has won an ACUI tournament, and may also qualify in the last respect, if it wins the Tri-State Bowling Conference.

Currently, RPI is leading the conference, with 224½ points. Bryant is second with 205½. Western New England has 181½.

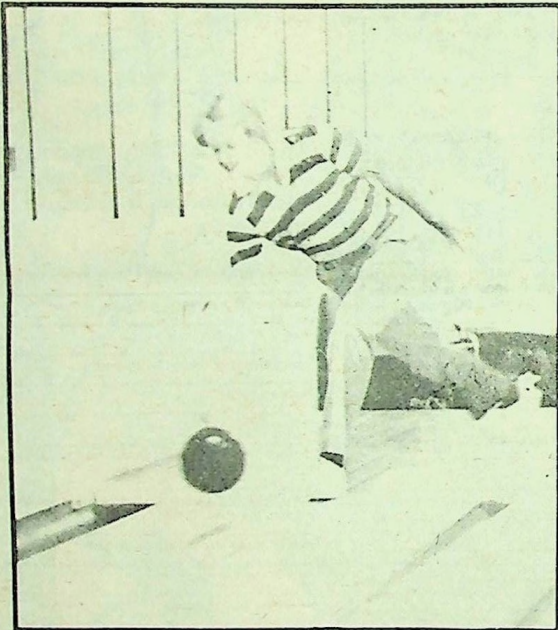
The last regular season competition will be tomorrow, at the University of Lowell. Bryant will also take on UCONN in the 6-3 event, and RPI in the position round.

On March 6th and 7th, the team will compete in the AMF Intercollegiates in Wellingford, NJ. On May 15th, the Nationals will be held in Orlando, Florida.

This is the second time in three years that Bryant has qualified for the sectionals. In the 1980-81 season, Bryant was chosen as an alternate.

"I'm very excited, I feel I have as good a chance as anyone else," satiated Guzski when asked about the tournament. Coach McKenzie feels "he is certainly capable of winning that and advancing to the prestigious FIQ World Cup tournament."

By also winning the ACUI team title, the Indians automatically receive a bid to compete in the National Bowling Council Roll-Offs in Orlando, Florida. It was quite an honor for Bryant College as Ken McKenzie's team and Steve Guzski gain more and more respect each week in the world of collegiate bowling.

Indians Lose Heartbreaker to Assumption, 82-81

The Bryant College Men's Basketball team ended their season on a heartbreaking note, losing to Assumption 82-81, in Northeast—8 Conference Playoff action on Tuesday.

Assumption's Kevin Nolan put in a 12 foot baseline jumper with two seconds remaining, to give the Greyhounds the victory over the Indians.

Up 80-74 with four minutes left to go, Bryant Coach, Leon Drury elected to pull the ball out, explaining later that "we were trying to get an isolation play on the boards."

Assumption's John Miller deflected a Bryant pass, and the Greyhounds took over, scoring six points in two minutes to tie the game 80-80 with 26 seconds remaining.

Dennis Verni was fouled as he went up for a shot, and stepped to the line for two free throws. He only converted on one of two

attempts to make the score 81-80, and set the final play.

With only five seconds remaining, Assumption Coach Joe O'Brien called for a time out, but Nolan didn't hear him, and sank the game-winning shot.

Bryant had the ball with one second left on the clock, but the pass to Lee Shatzlein from Paul Berlo was errant and time expired.

Nolan led all scorers with 22 points, Berlo and Steve Ruggieri added 20 apiece, and Shatzlein and Ron Harrison had 17 and 13, respectively.

The Indians finished their season with a 14-12 record (5-7 regular conference play).

Coach Drury will welcome all but one of the 1981-1982 Indians back next year, as Peter Sansouci is the only graduating senior.

Sansouci has a career average of 2.27 points, 1.54 rebounds, and was 49% free throw shooter (although he shot 70% this year).

Angelli, a resident of Greenville, R.I., is a strong believer in the learning and teaching of

the basics. During his stay at Bryant, Angell will attempt to establish a program consisting of a series of exercises and drills to help build technique. Stated Angell, "technique is the most important attribute in throwing the shot and discus, not strength."

While teaching at Lincoln High School for five years, Angell developed a similar program which turned out a number of nationally ranked competitors.

Angell, a 1971 graduate of Bryant College, has been to see the Olympic games, and he is not hesitant to use any new techniques in his teachings. Coach Angell is looking forward to this years season with much anticipation, for this is his first coaching job among the college ranks.

Bryant Loses in Semifinals to Springfield

The Bryant Women Indians closed out their season with a close 64-47 loss to Springfield College in the second round of the Northeast Conference playoffs. Bryant had beat Assumption in the last seconds, 71-70, to advance into the semifinals. It was close because it was nationally-ranked Springfield they played. It was also close because, as is the case in many games, the score does not indicate the way the game was played. Down 30-27 at the half, Bryant fought back within two point with just under nine minutes left. Springfield then outscored Bryant 19-9 to run away with the lead. Springfield outscored Bryant 30-24 in the second half. Both teams hit the boards strongly, as they both pulled down 33 rebounds apiece. Beth Hansen led the Indians with 12 points and eight rebounds. Nancy Traver had nine

points and five rebounds, while Sue Crisafi had eight and five respectively. The Indians ended their season 12-9, bukt Coach Mike McKee said he was "very pleased with the season." "We played well against Springfield", said McKee. "We played great defense but they just outscored us. They held us scoreless for three minutes, but in that time they only scored three point against us." Donna Cole will be the only Indian to graduate, so McKee will welcome quite a few veterans back next year. Cole averaged 5.1 points and 3.7 rebounds this year, as well as blocking 25 shots (a team high). Sue Crisafi led the Indians in scoring, assists and steals, averaging 12.8 points, assisting on 128 hoops and stealing 44 in 21 games. Nancy Traver was the best free throw shooter for the 58% (team) Indians, putting 68% of her attempts at the charity strip. Beth Hansen led in both scoring percentage (47.6%), and rebounding (11.4 per game).

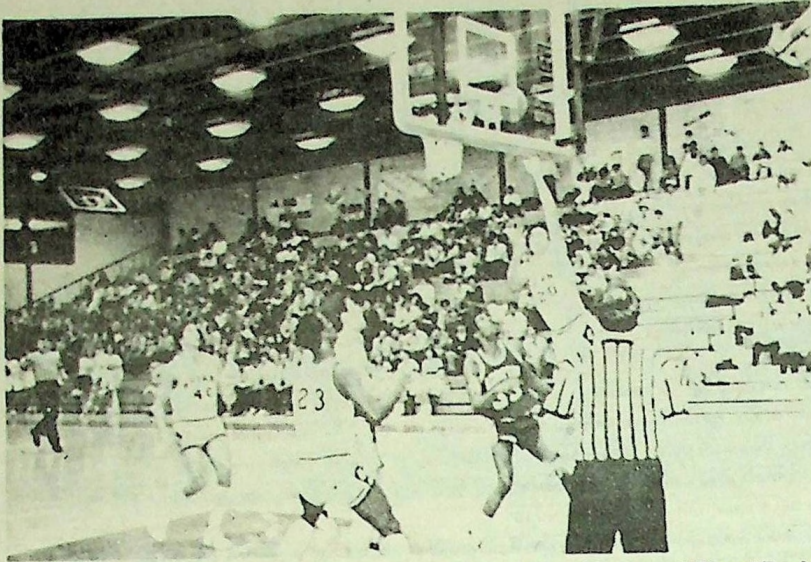

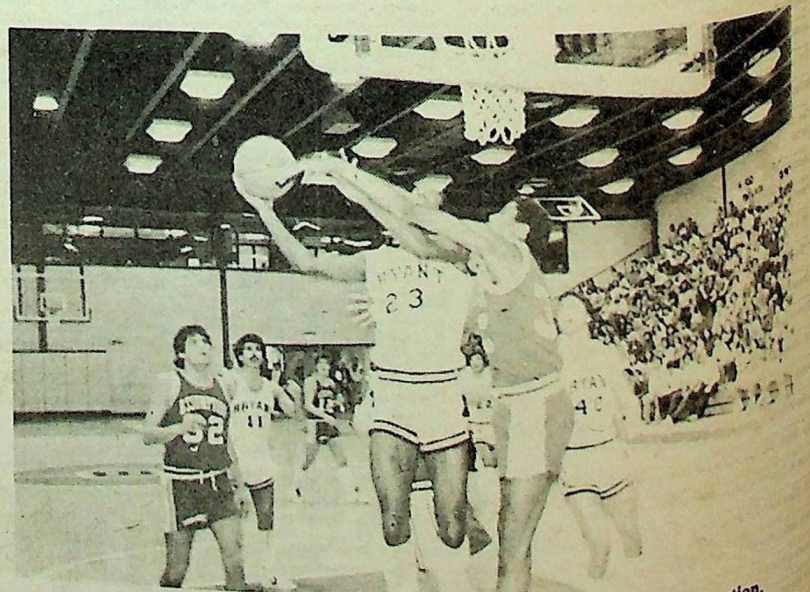

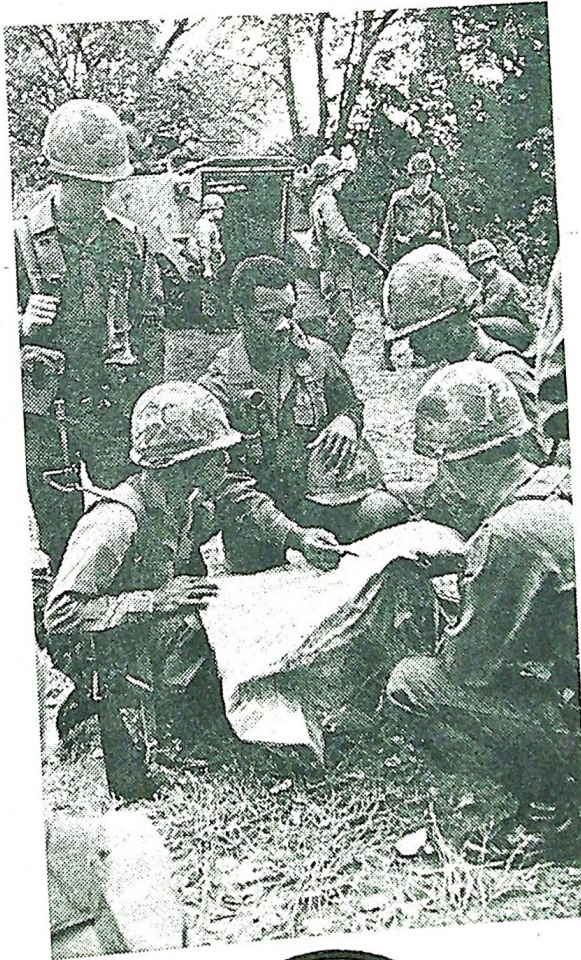
