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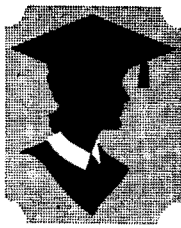

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Varsity Loses To Providence College

In a hard fought game, which kept the enthusiastic capacity audience at a high pitch of excitement throughout the four periods, Bryant-Stratton College Varsity lost to the Friars by a 42-29 margin.

Bryant-Stratton was leading at the half by a small margin, but the lack of sufficient reserve power to cope with the large Friar Squad proved to be their downfall, for on losing Captain Has'ehurst by the foul route and Duckworth by a knee injury, the Indians were forced to retreat and the Friars to pile up points.

Haslehurst was a tower of strength on the defense and Duckworth led in scoring with 12 points. Kennedy and Wright gave the Friars plenty of trouble breaking up many plays. Swanson played a hard steady game.
